
# LEARNING SKILLS AND CRAFTS FOR FARM, SHOP AND FACTORY







# DELIBERATE AND DECIDE








The basketball season started in December and ran until March, with many ups and downs. Some members of the team are still wearing battle scars!




## HIGHLIGHTS




## SOPHS. IN VARIOUS MOODS!
