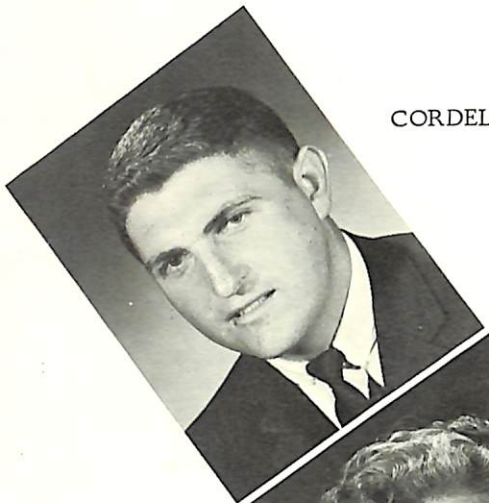
Under the direction of Bill Hutchinson, president of the Board of Education, the school board decided the school policies and the school year.

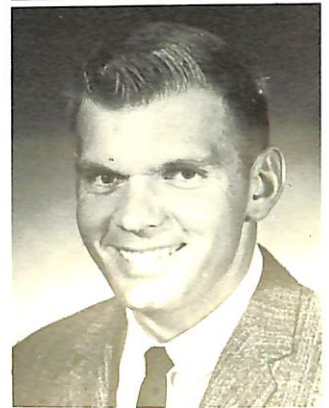

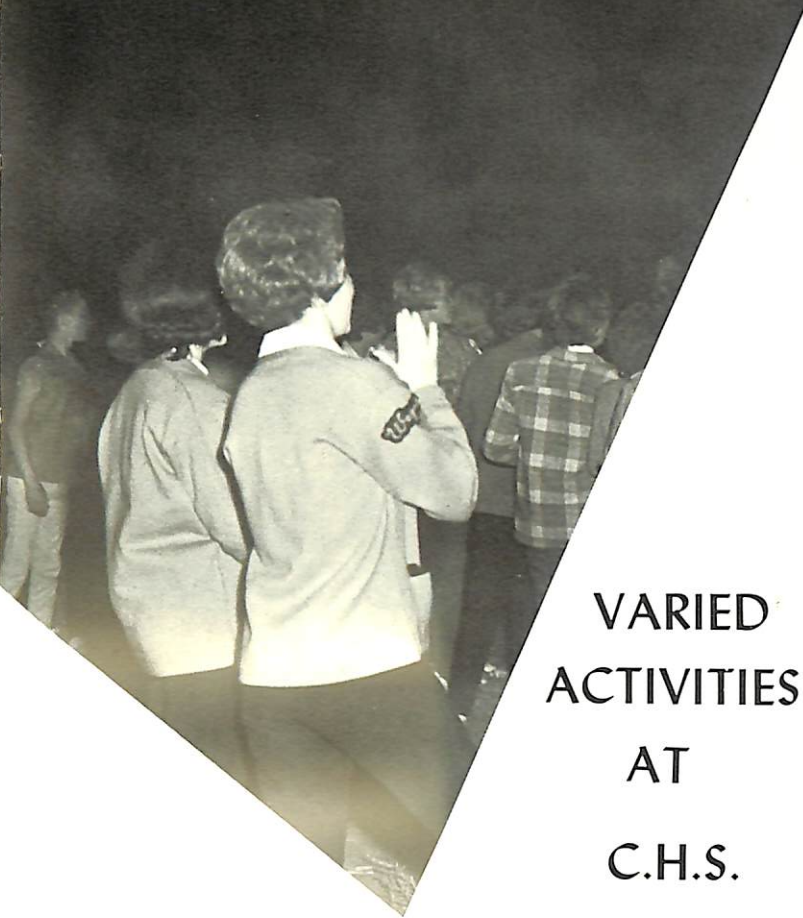
## THE STUDENT COUNCIL KEEPS THE STUDENT BODY ROLLING

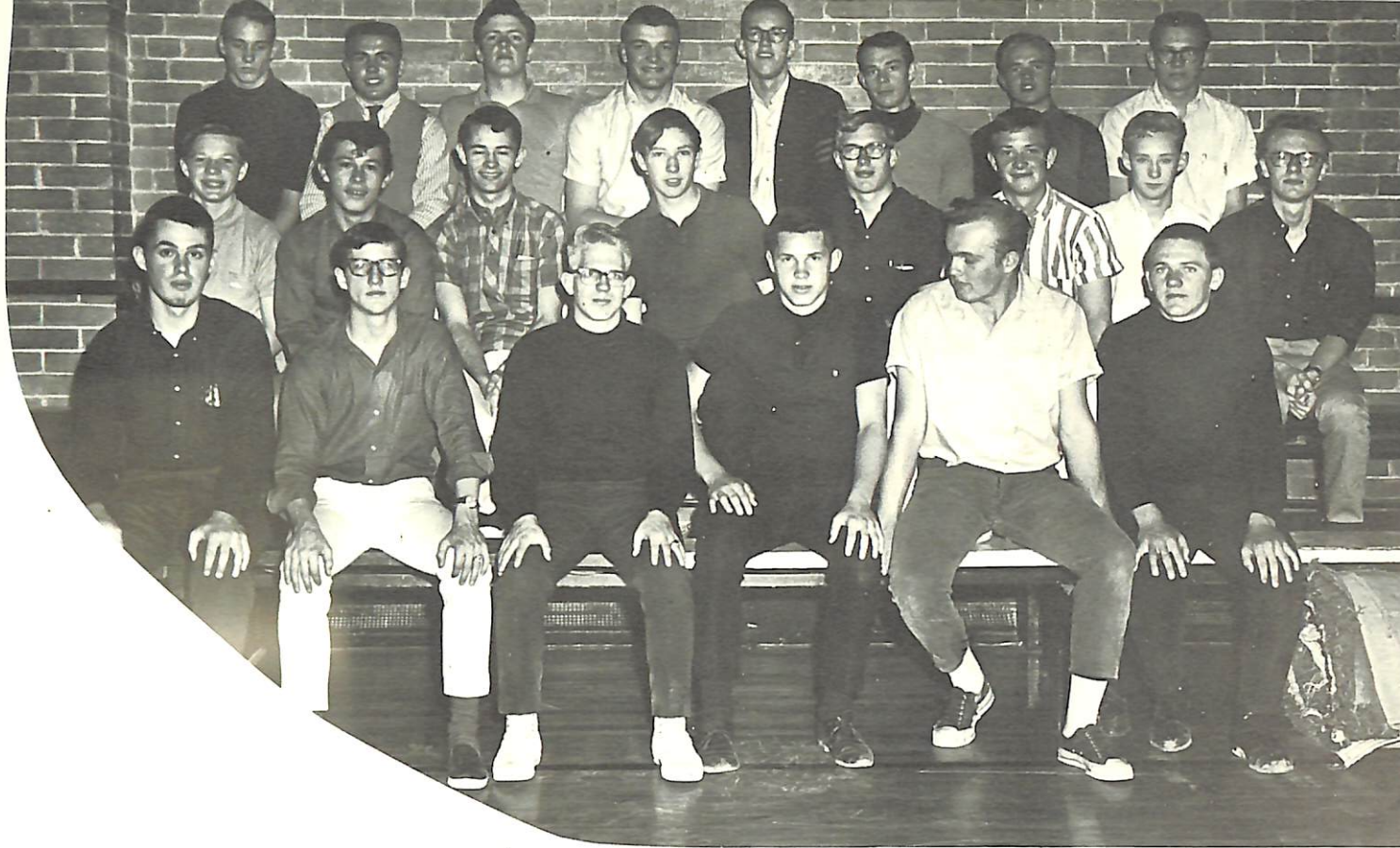

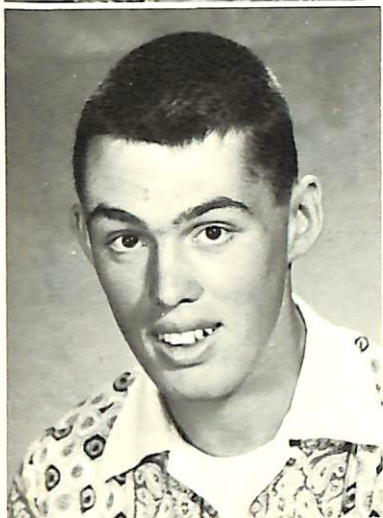


## MANY EXPERIENCES MADE YEAR GREAT

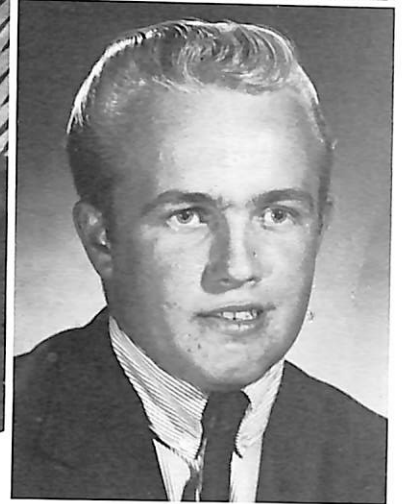
## THE ACTIVE JUNIORS
