

Excell Elected Wyoming Leader




Mr. Teichert is also the advisor for the school newspaper, *The Sage*, which was started again this year.




Mr. Forrest refers to his textbook during a Biology lecture.





School Gets New Bar, Cook, and Bus Boy








Friday, Homecoming Day, everyone wore orange and black for the assembly, parade football and

volleyball games.






The Music Man was performed on March 21st and 22nd. It turned out to be a great success, except for the few minor flaws that come along with any production.







Student Council Changes Bylaws






Epidemic at State FHA







Yearbook Computerized


A new computer grading system, written by Mr. Taylor, Business Teacher, was implemented this year for the yearbook class. This system is an updated version of the trial system used last year.




















Weight

At the state meet the inexperience of the younger two matmen had them out of the tourney the first day, but as they put it, "We'll be back next year and be that much better."










