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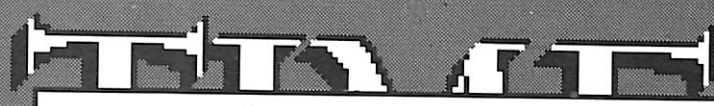

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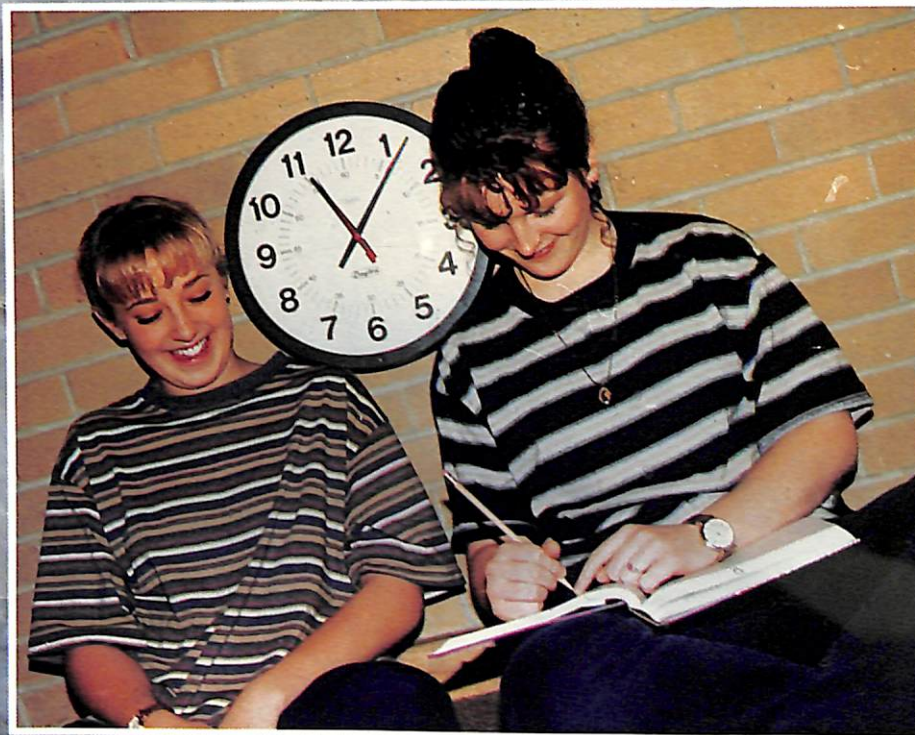

Wait.

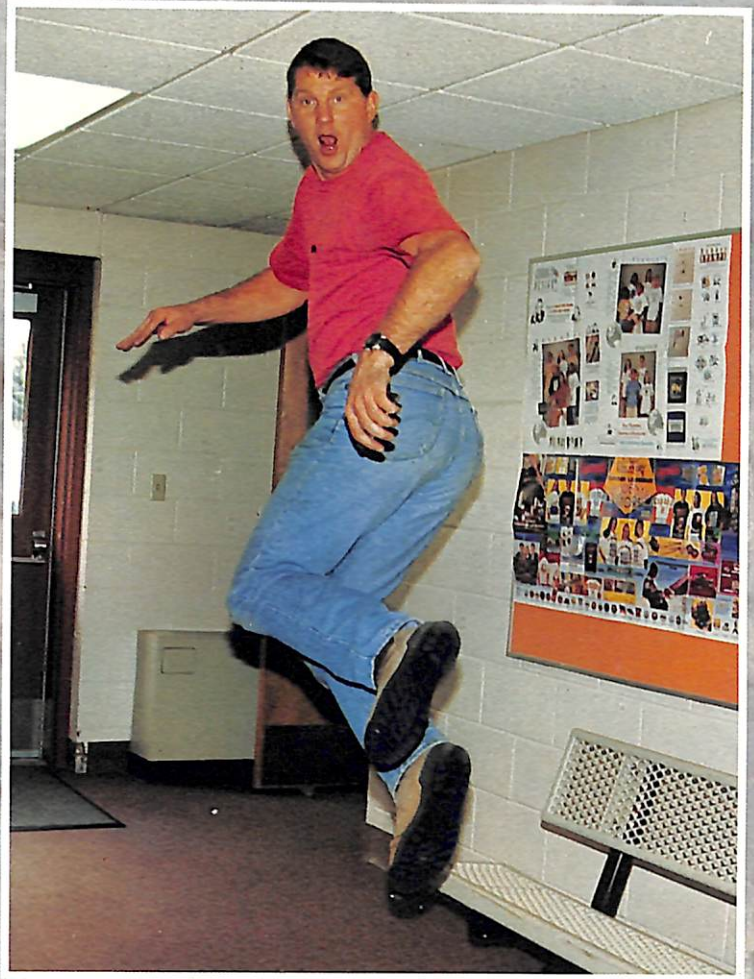

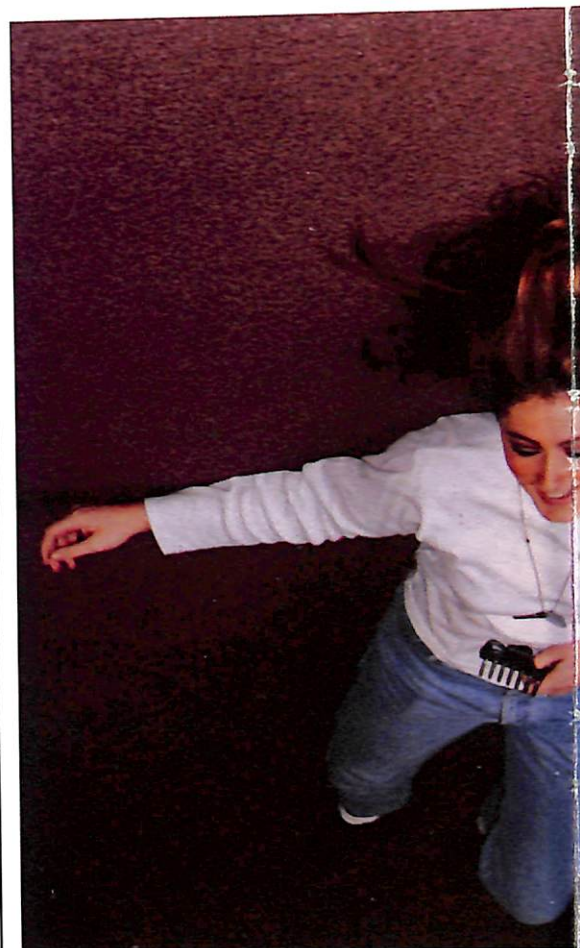


# Thank Heaven For Friends

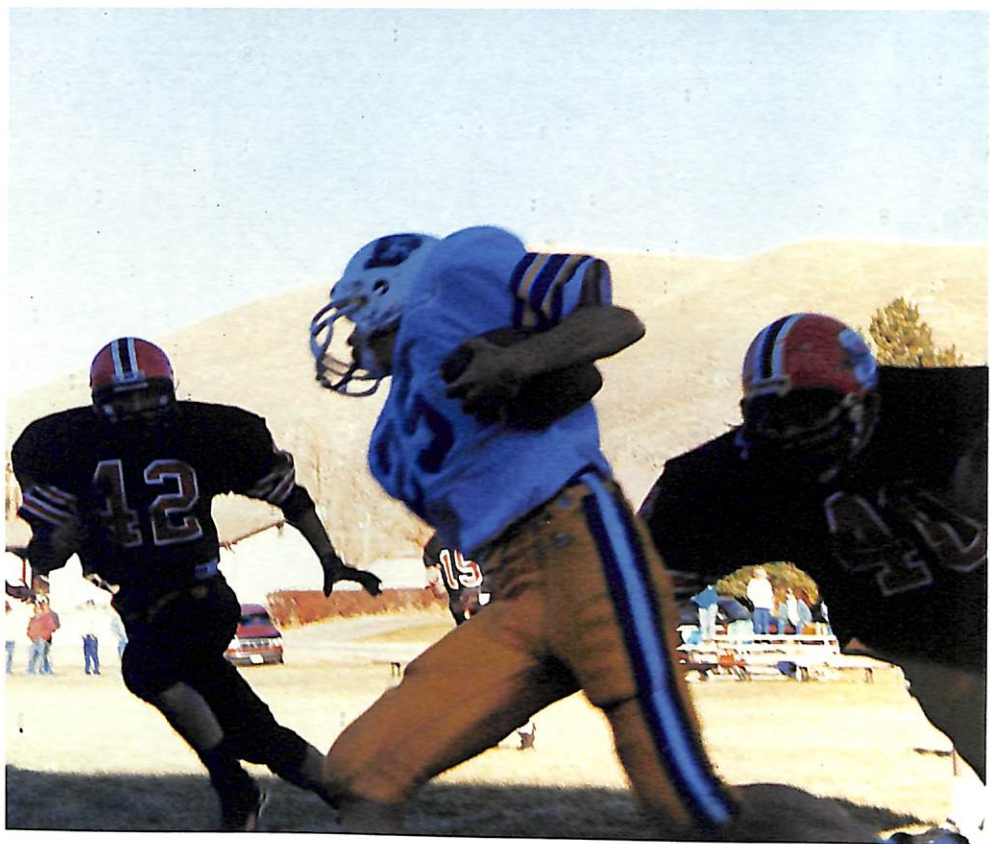

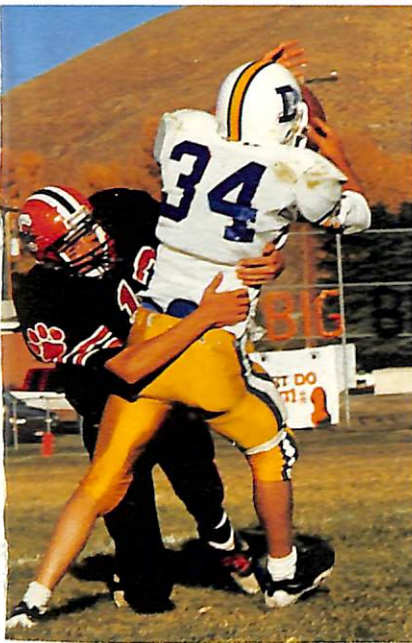


Zack Bird 42, and Colby Roberts 40, stop a Dubois player from getting into Panther territory.

# They Had a Tough Season

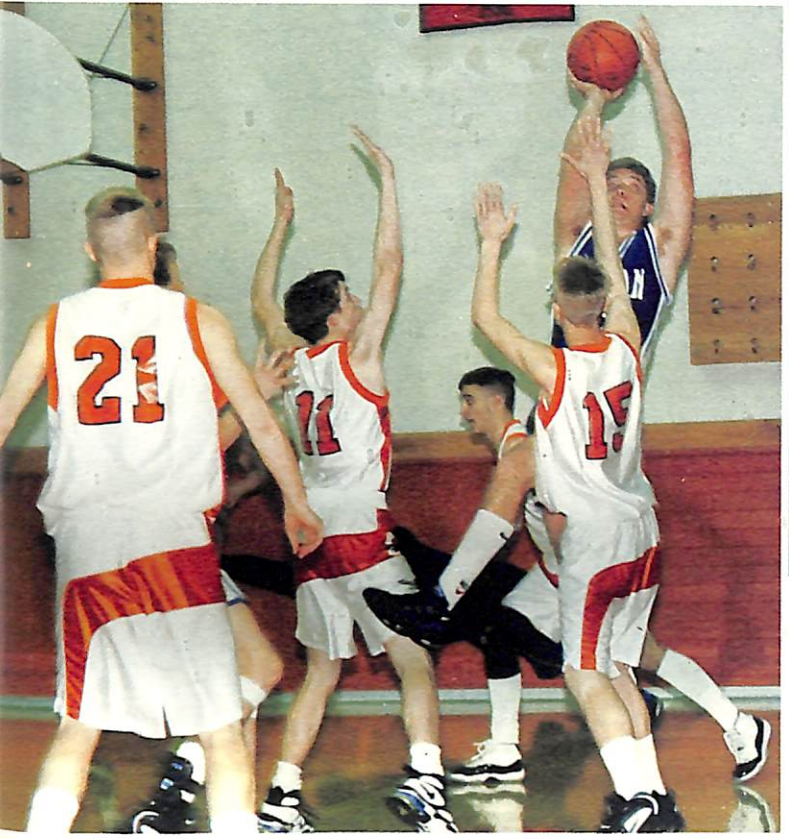

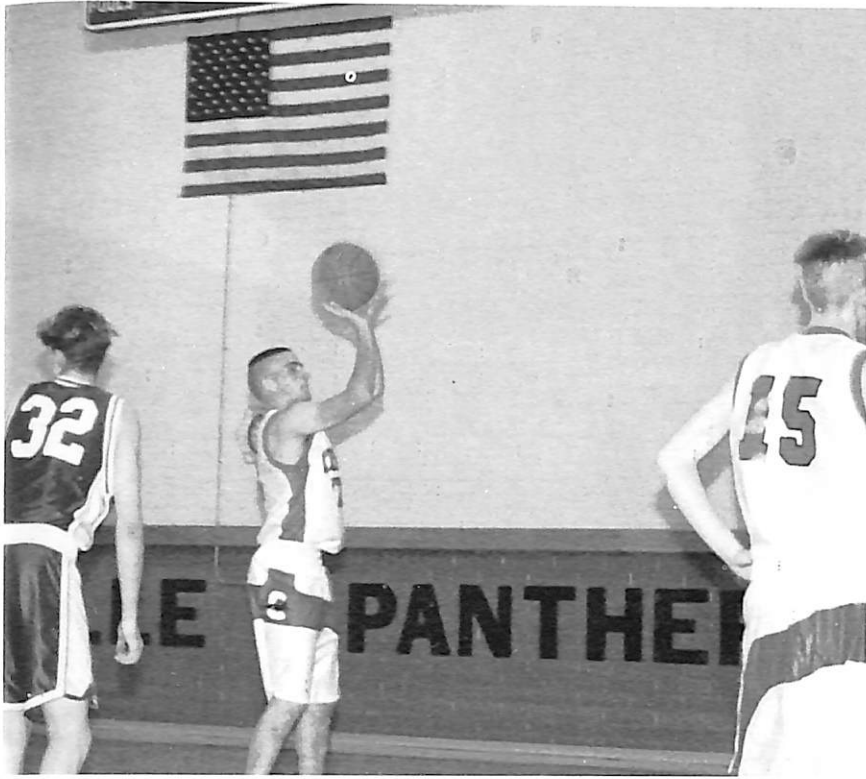

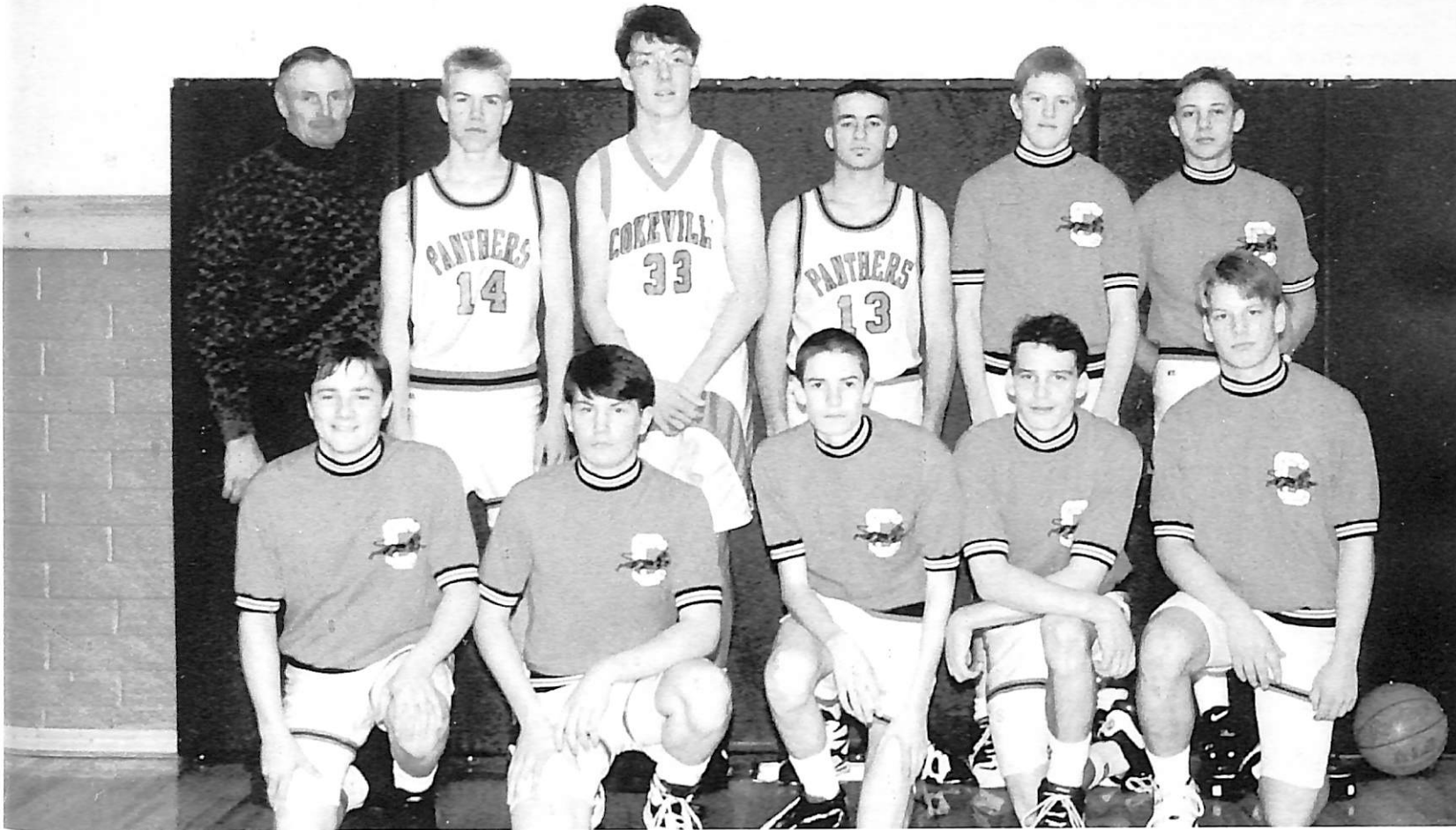

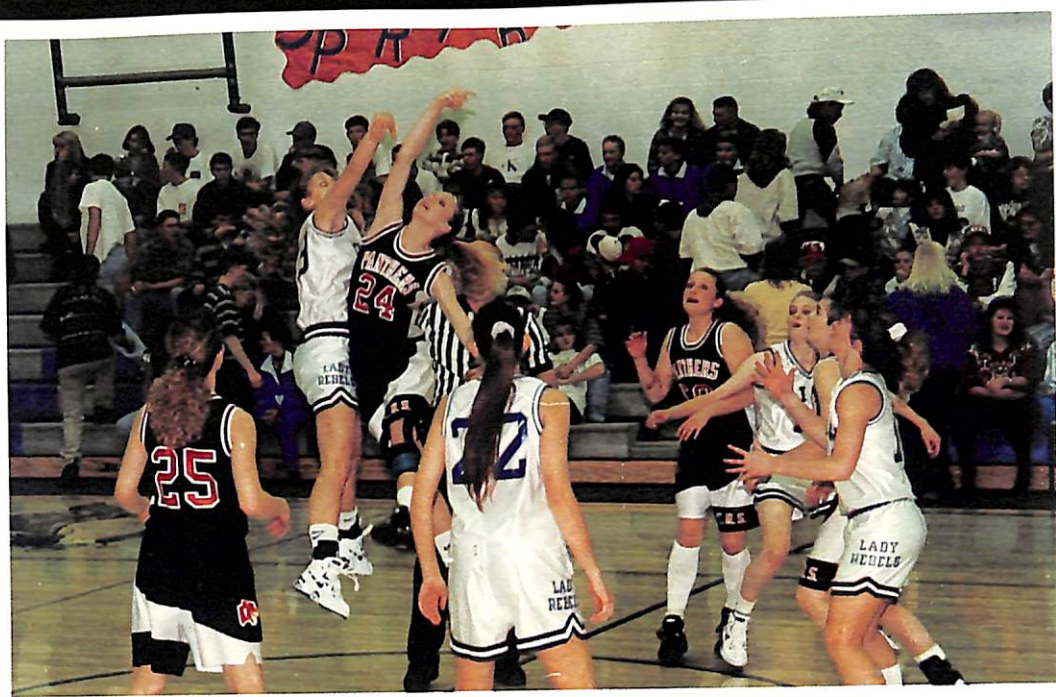

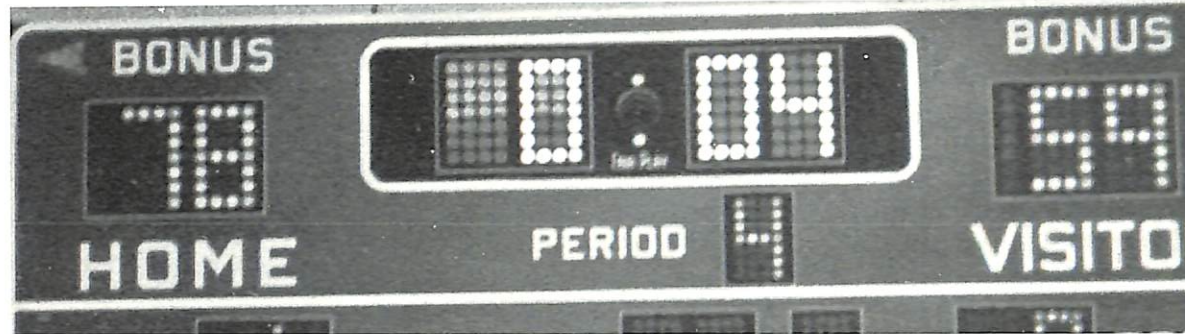

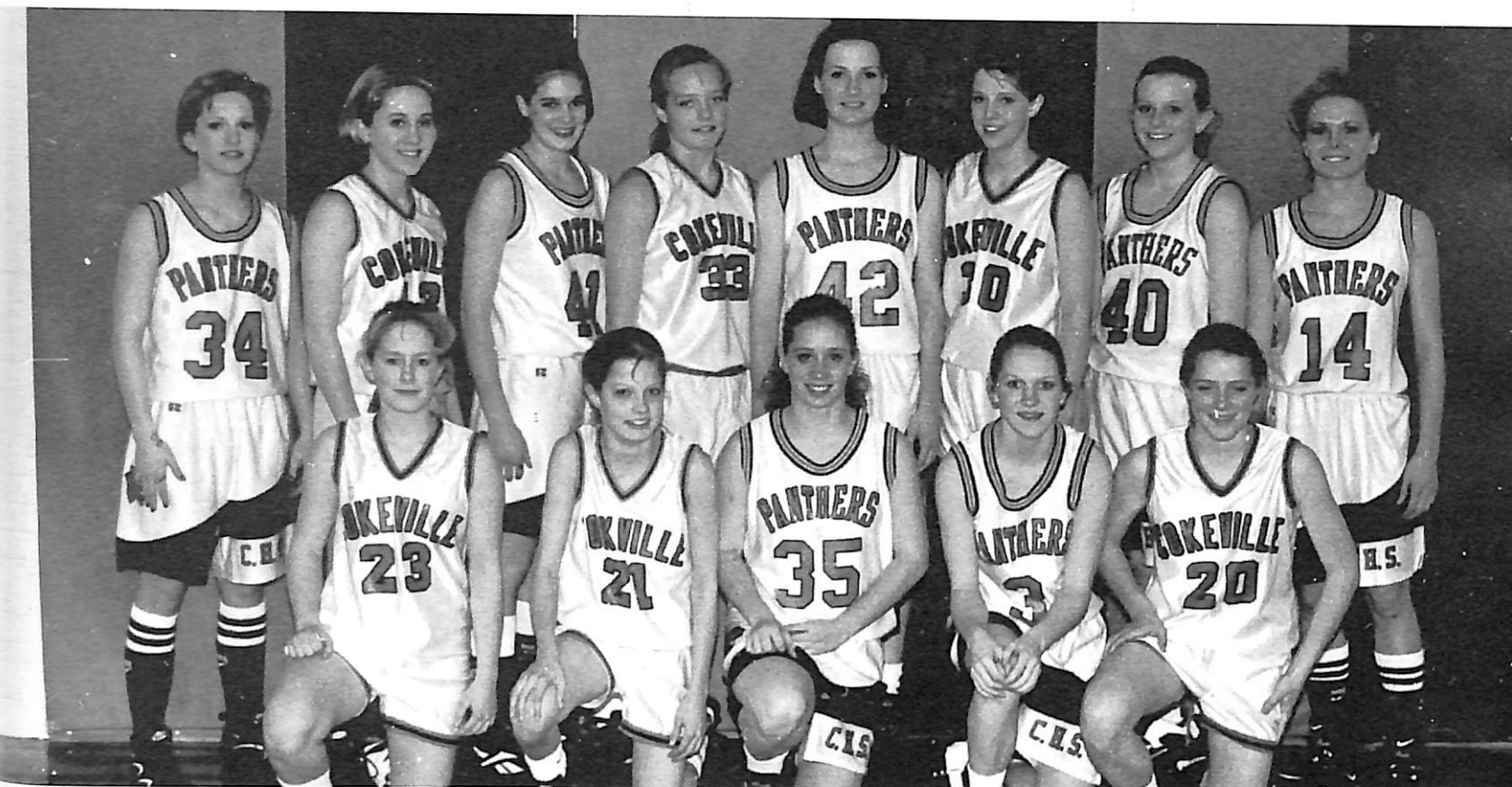

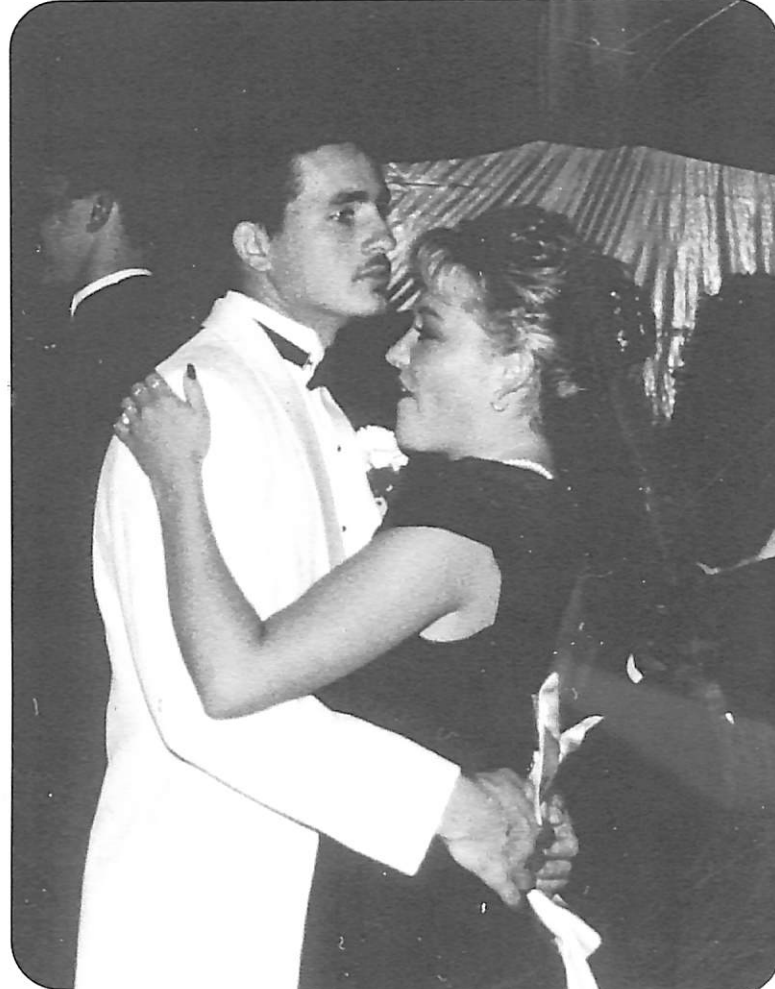


## Letting Go!

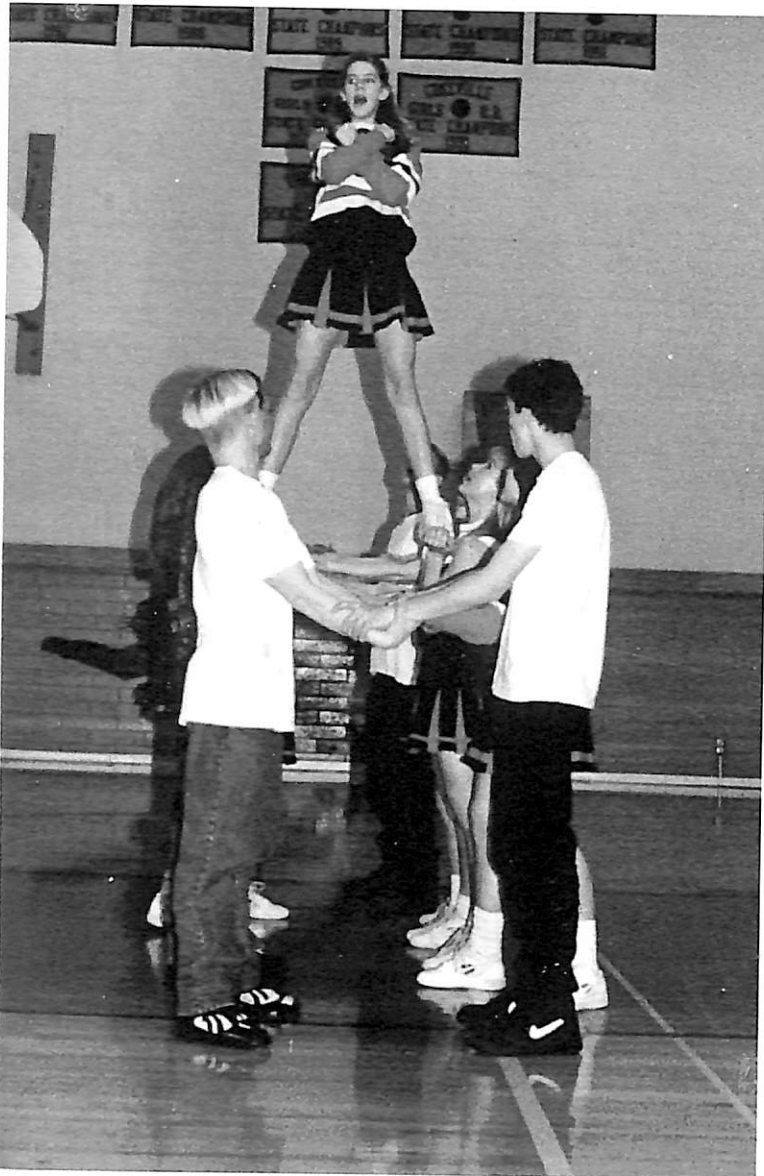

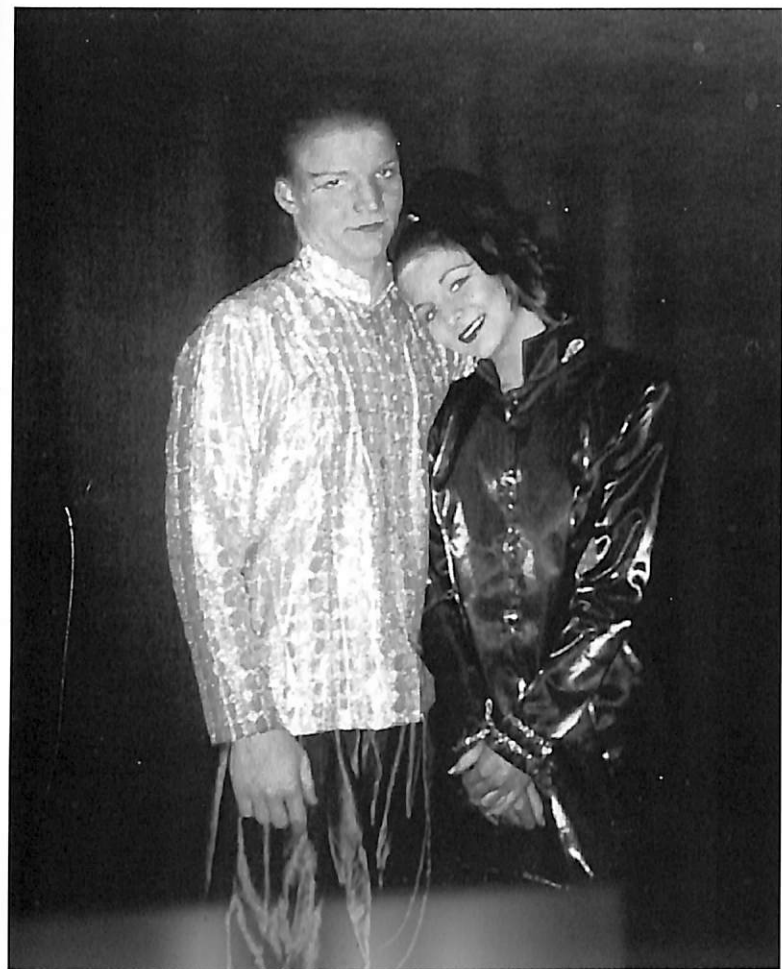

Even though the staff is under a lot of pressure they still find time to have fun. They love to take breaks and play a good game of Old Maid, and eat a bag of popcorn.



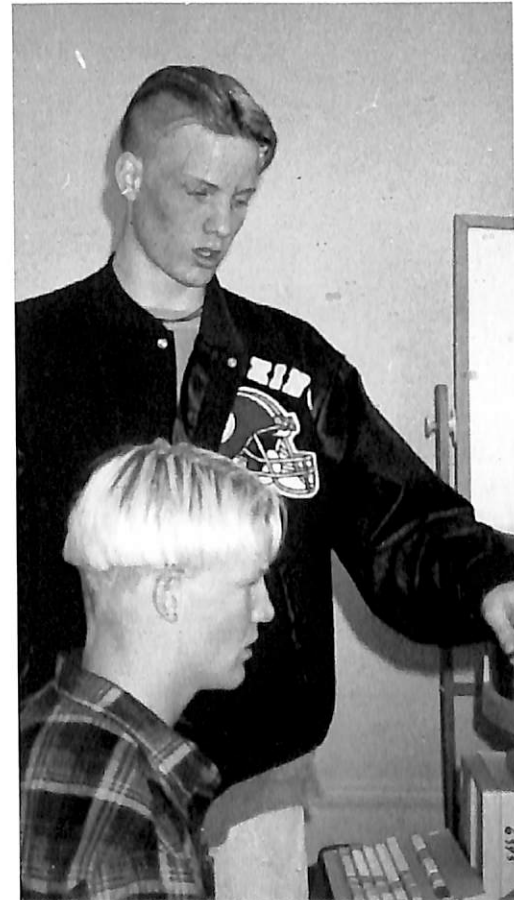

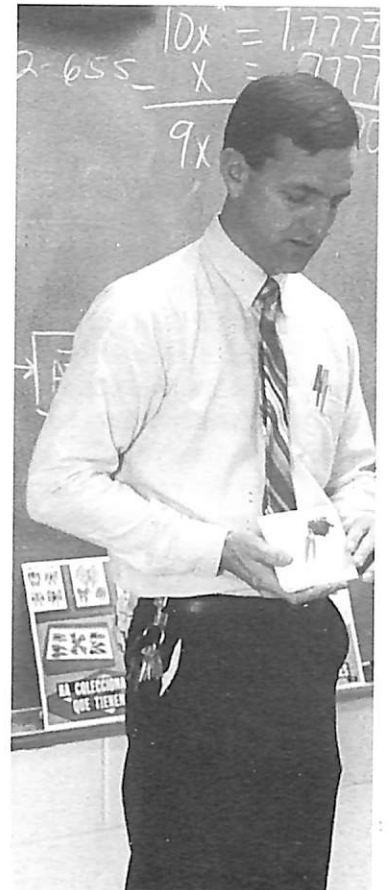


# Having Some Fun

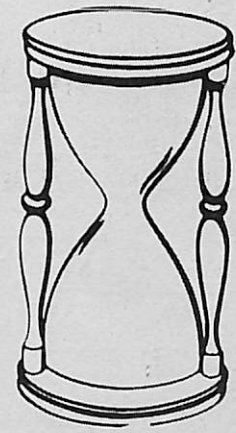
