Seniors Set New Scholastic High


Nine out of the fifteen Seniors were honored this year by their scholastic records. These Seniors became members of the "National Honor Society".

for a New Year




Highlights of CHS Re-lived Through Sage Stories









Personalities, Characters, and V.I.P.'s






