As a yearbook staff we decided to dedicate this year's annual to two 1979 Cokeville high school graduates.

Micheal Lee Allen, 20, died Monday, July 6, in the St. Benedict's Hospital in Ogden Utah as a result of injuries received in an automobile accident June 27, near Cokeville. He was born May 22, 1961, in Montpelier, Idaho to Don A. and Betty Nostaja Allen. At the time of his death, he was employed by the Wyoming State Highway Department. Mike attended Cokeville Schools where he participated in basketball, football, and wrestling. Mike received the citizenship award in the 8th grade.

David Lannie Deromedis, 20, died Tuesday, July 21, 1981 in the Westchester County Hospital in Westchester Penn. of causes related to an automobile accident June 25. David was born November 15, 1960, to Joe and Shirlee Deromedis in Montpelier, Idaho. He attended Cokeville Schools where he was outstanding in leadership and sports. He was named to the all-state basketball and football teams. He was Cokeville High School student-body president and salutatorian of his graduating class. At the time of his death, he was a missionary for the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day-Saints, acting as a district leader in the Pennsylvania, Philadelphia Mission.

As classmates, David and Mike did a lot of things together. They were both involved in music, sports, drama, and many other activities. They also enjoyed the outdoors. Skiing, hunting, and fishing were a big part of their lives. During their senior year they played on the state runner-up basketball team and the state champion football team.



In advanced arc welding, David Larson and Wayne Harmon made fifth wheel trailers. It was a big project that proved to be quite interesting.


In the wood shop, various projects rolled out as usual.




This year's staff was young. Only three people returned from last years staff. With the advisors' help everyone learned quickly how to do his job.


Panthers Hang Tough




This year's Homecoming brought many tears to the team and to the fans. The loss against Pinedale was painful to bear, but the Panthers gave it all they had.

Three seniors were chosen as tri-captains: Wayne Harmon, Steve Excell and Orson Nate.




Under the direction of Coach Moore and Coach Warren the matmen learned the many techniques of becoming good wrestlers.




