




A Few Breaks a Day Keep the Doctors Away


State Champs Made Homecoming Unforgettable




Sports were another story, however, for this class. The boys succeded in a State Championship in football for the second year in a row while the girls brought home consolation trophies in both volleyball and basketball.


Most of the freshmen kept busy with extracurricular activities and an occasional party.



Varsity Boys Get Revenge

The boys' varsity basketball team had a successful season. They placed third at regionals and went on to the state play-offs.

After suffering a 17 point loss to Snake River during the season they got revenge against the Rattlers by defeating them 78-55.


At the Regional Play-offs the Panthers had a good start against Jeffrey City, defeating them 73-57. They ran into trouble during the second game getting beat by Snake River, 66-53. After their loss to Snake River, the Panthers buckled down to play their kind of basketball and beat Farson 60-44, and then Encampment 59-37.

The boys were excited about their State Play-off berth and felt wellprepared as they went to Casper. In their first game the Panthers met up with the south East Goshen Cyclones who had won second in their conference. The boys played an excellent game and defeated the Cyclones 71-66, as Tim Teichert had a season high 34 points. During the second game the Panthers met another rough team, the Big Horn Rams, and were defeated by 1 point in O.T., 50-49. In the Consolation bracket the Panthers easily beat the Wright Panthers 77-61. The Panthers had only two more games to win to receive the Consolation Championship, but they needed to beat the Bow Basin Wranglers whom they hadn't beaten all year. They were eliminated 81-70.







Wrestlers Roll On


For the first time in seven years, the Panther wrestling team brought home a trophy from regional tournament. Of the 9 wrestlers on the team 6 placed qualifying them for the state tournament. The other three ran into problems because of having to go up two weights to have a spot on the team.

The biggest upset of the tournament was Bryan Dayton's defeat of Kemmerer's Don Brunski, who had only lost one match this year. Brunski had defeated Bryan twice during the season and was favored in his weight class.


Bryan Dayton, Tim Teichert and Kenny Peterson each took the championship in his own weight class. Bridger Fuez and Ken Thornnock won third place medals in their classes and Troy Holden finished fourth. By placing in the top four, each person gained a berth to the state tournament in Riverton.

Finding the competition rather stiff, the underclassmen struggled against their mostly 2A opponents. In the semi finals, the Panthers found only 3 wrestlers still active in the tournament. Trying to snatch a place in the state championship match, Bryan, Kenny, and Tim all fell short by as many as 1 or 2 points, while their opponents all went on to win the state championship. When the final dust had cleared Kenny and Tim finished third, while Bryan finished fourth.


Having wrestled a total of 10 years, Coach Teichert's knowledge and experience has been the deciding factor in many close matches.





For the fourth performance, a ventriloquist performed to both the high school and grade school. He seemed to bring his puppets to life with his ventriloquy act.


A magician and his wife came to perform before the high school as the next entertainment. They performed some impressive magic and included some of the students in their act.

The last performing group was a team of modern dancers from Western Wyoming College. They exposed some new culture to our school through their modern dance.


The last assembly was the student body general assembly. At this assembly the candidates for student body offices spoke.







NEW Boss Likes C.H.S




The cooks, custodians, and chauffeurs are the three C's of C.H.S. These three groups of people not only had to care for the high school but also the new grade school.

Sixth and Seventh Grade Numbers Boost Team
















