

After three boring hours of morning classes, Ross Orwick and Bridger Feuz looked forward to their fourth hour drafting class — probably because they knew lunch hour was near.



Of course the basic necessities of life, such as make-up and cologne, are still part of what we wear, and so are the typical athletic uniforms and special outfits worn for the musical.



While fixing the toga, as did many throughout the day, Cindy Wixom joins in the fun of "Toga Day."


After the excitement in the halls between classes on "Cool Cat Day," the Senior English class read of Beowulf and heroes.






The juniors meet together as class president Bob Excell proposes a toast for "health, happiness, and success" in the future.


Pancake Pandemonium!

Glen Prows, the only sophomore scheduled to ride on the float, needed help holding his bubbles in the tub.




Without a clean school, the mud and grime we track in every day would come back to haunt us. One day the muck would be so thick that we wouldn't be able to find our way!


Without the busses, we would be unable $_{30}$ to come to school to unlock our minds and







Strong defense on both sides limited the scoring to the first 3 until the fourth quarter. With an injury to Cokeville, the Big Horn Rams put together a key drive and crushed Cokeville's spirits as they scored for 6. The rest of the game belonged to the Rams as they stopped the Cokeville offense and denied the Panthers a 1-A state play-off for the first time in history.





Omnipotent Lady Panthers Dominate Competition

As the volleyball season began, the team was excited and had hopes of being successful. Their hopes turned to reality as they won their first nine matches. They began to realize the possibility of an undefeated season after beating a very tough Kemmerer team. Those hopes all ended, though, when they were beaten by Big Piney on Homecoming. The girls decided that this loss wasn't going to ruin their season and that they were still going to work toward a state championship. After winning the regional championship, the girls travelled to Casper for the state tournament. On Nov. 2, 1985, the Lady Panthers made history by becoming the first Cokeville volleyball team to win the state championship and also by having the best record in C.H.S. history — 20 wins and 1 loss.

SECOND TO ONE

At the district tournament held in Rock Springs, Cokeville was five points shy of winning first place, losing by four to Bow Basin in the championship game, 41 to 45. The second place showing was, of course, disappointing after the close game for first, but for a team that had lost four out of five starters from last year and who were expected not to do very well all season, it was satisfying enough.

The varsity started the season pretty well in a conference in which everyone thought that Encampment would dominate. In their second conference game, the varsity beat Encampment at home, 44 to 38. From then on, everybody was beating everybody in the Three Trails Conference. Scott Thornock, a junior guard, and Charlie Dayton, a senior forward, were named to the All-Tourney team.

At state the Panthers were placed on the tough side of the bracket. But against LaGrange, Aaron Metcalfe led the way with 25 points in a 59 to 50 victory. The Panthers' next adversary was the mighty Big Horn Rams, a team which eventually won the state championship. The Big Horn squad rolled over the Panthers 71 to 36. Aaron again led the team in total points and was the only player in double figures with 16. Cokeville was then sent to the other side to the consolation bracket and were pitted against the Midwest Oilers. In that contest the Panthers just couldn't get it together as they lost 59 to 64 even with Scott Thornock's 27 points. Scott was also chosen to represent Cokeville as a member of the All-State team.










Girls Can't Overcome Nemesis


















EVERYONE CAN PLAY






Kids Learn From Activities.
