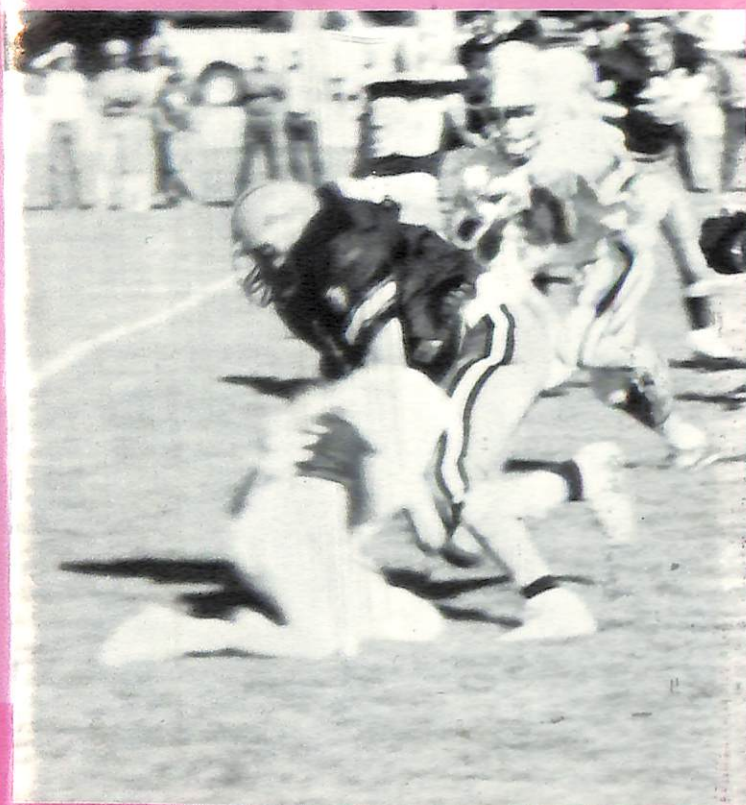

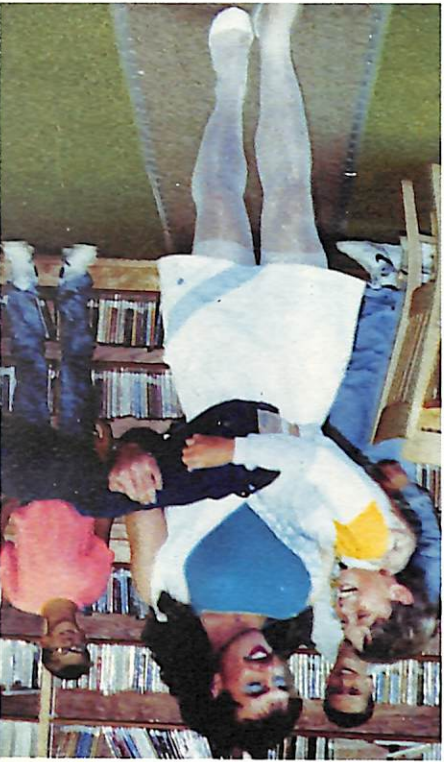

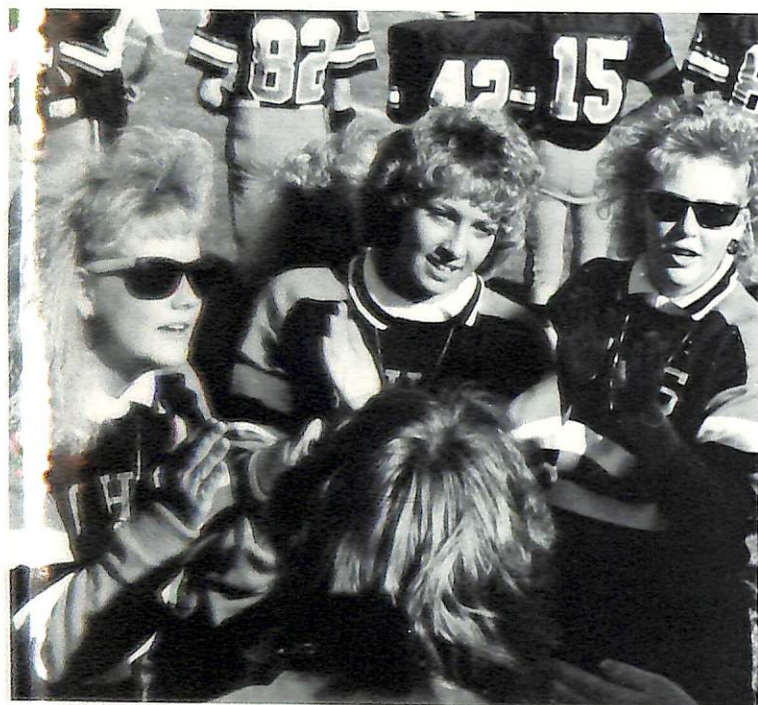
Cowboys and Panthers Dance Together

the WHSAA to allow us to play in the 2A division which was still playing 11-man football. It was a pretty brave thing to do, but the players and coaches had confidence that they could "hang in there" with the 2A competition. After all, we consistently stay among the leaders of the Southwest 2A schools every year. The 1A schools were glad to see us leave; the newspapers and 2A schools called us "arrogant." But after everyone had had their say, the 1A Panthers had trounced the Burns Broncs 46 to 10 to take the 2A State championship.

What does it take to become a state champion football team? It takes work, lots of hard work, and our football team does just that!

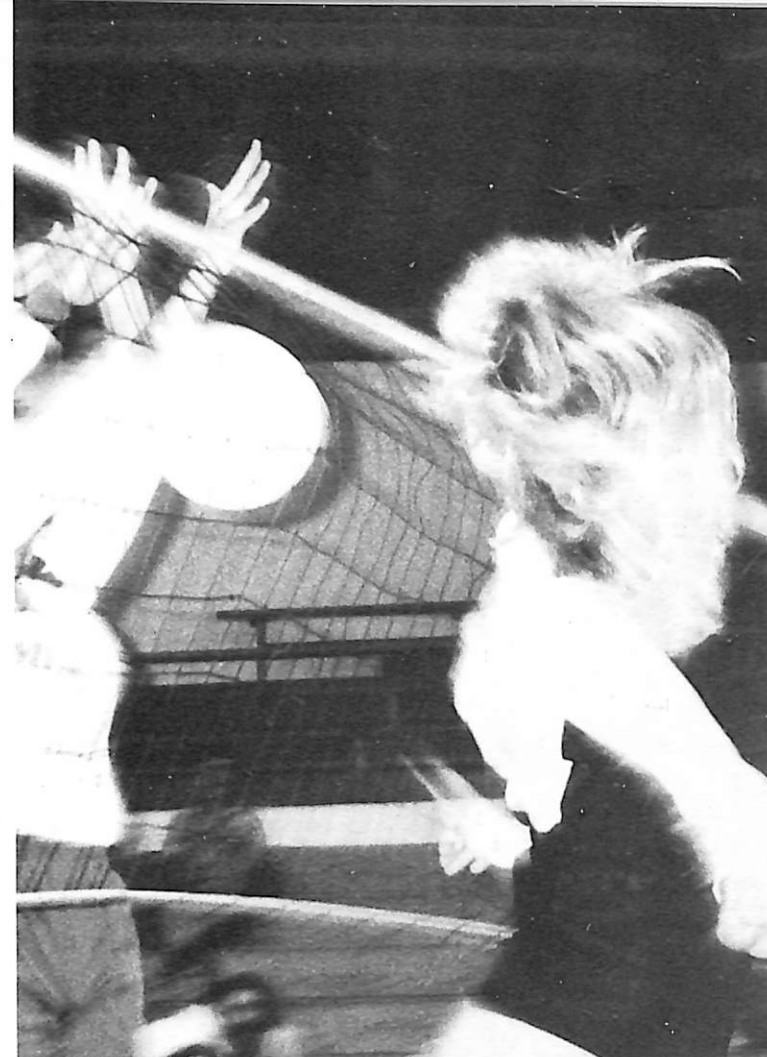

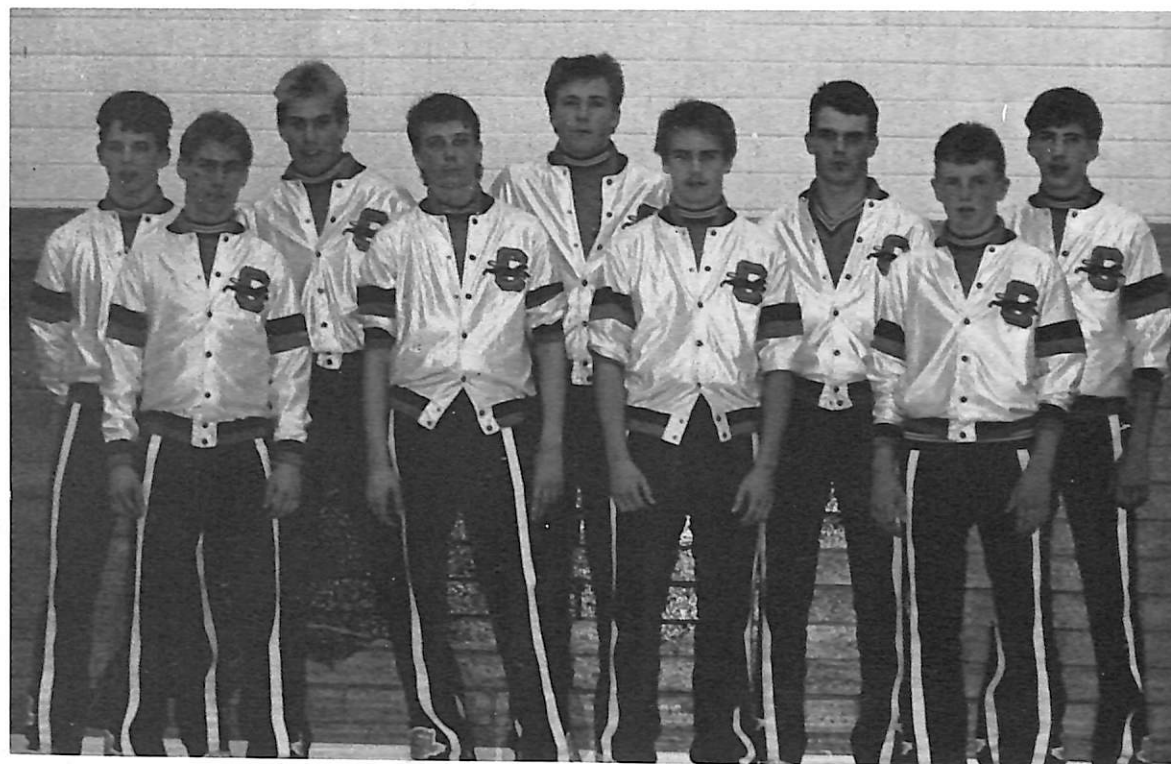

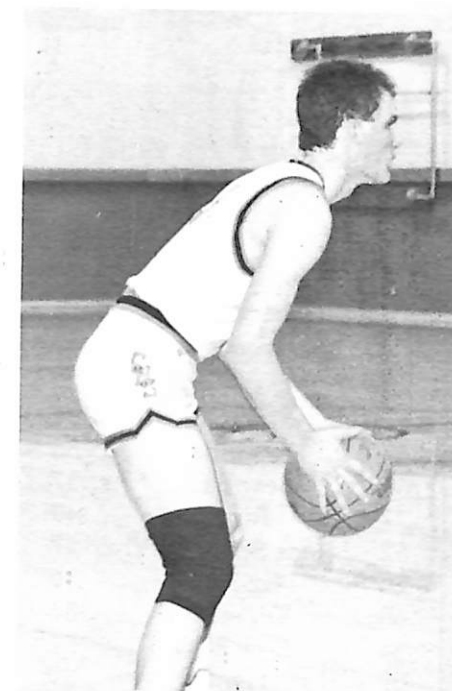

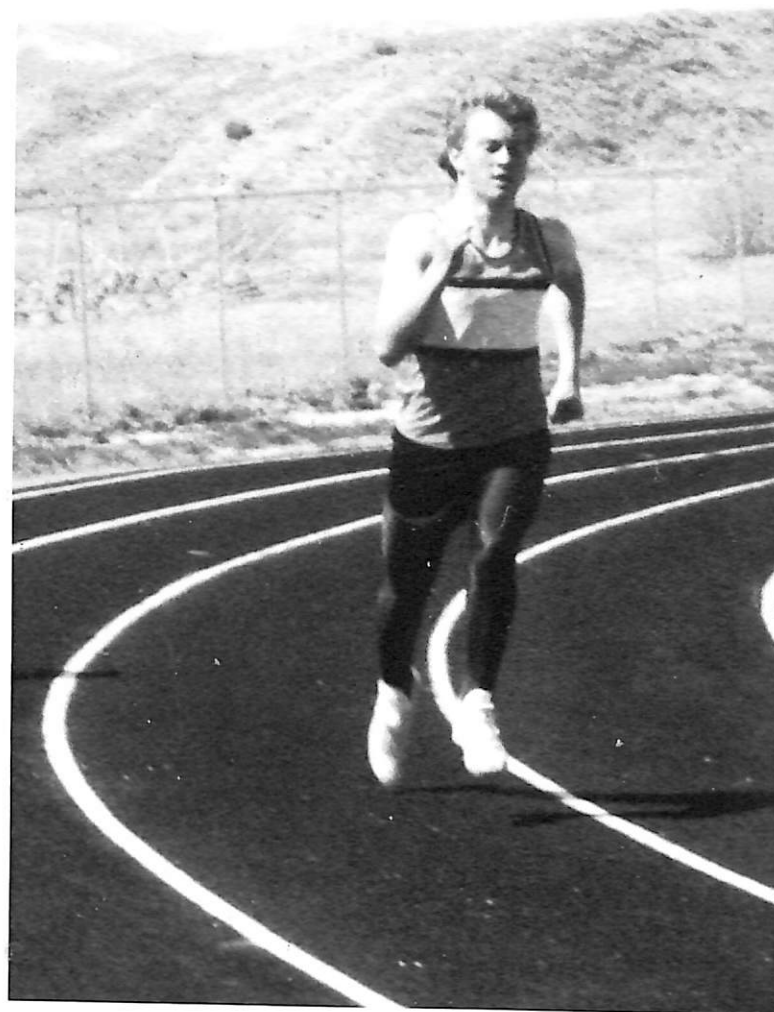

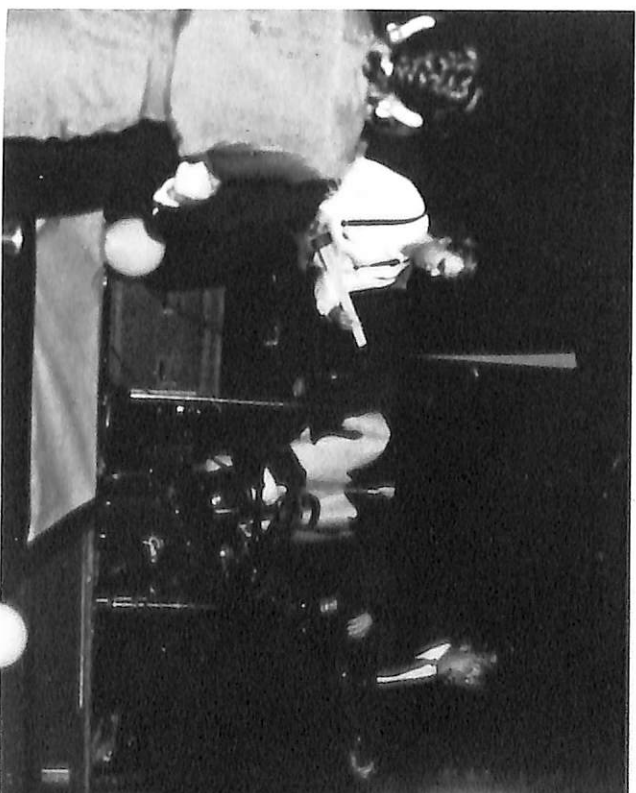

Juniors Will Be Forever Young

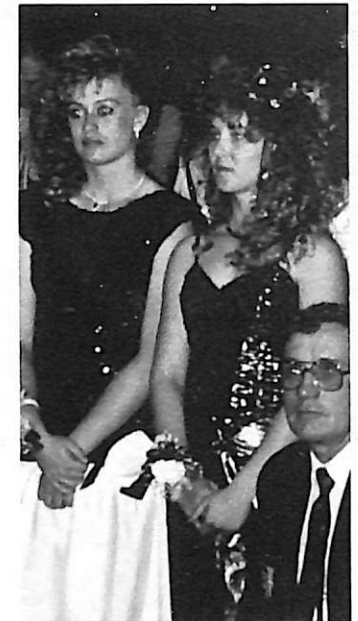

Bring Back Birdie

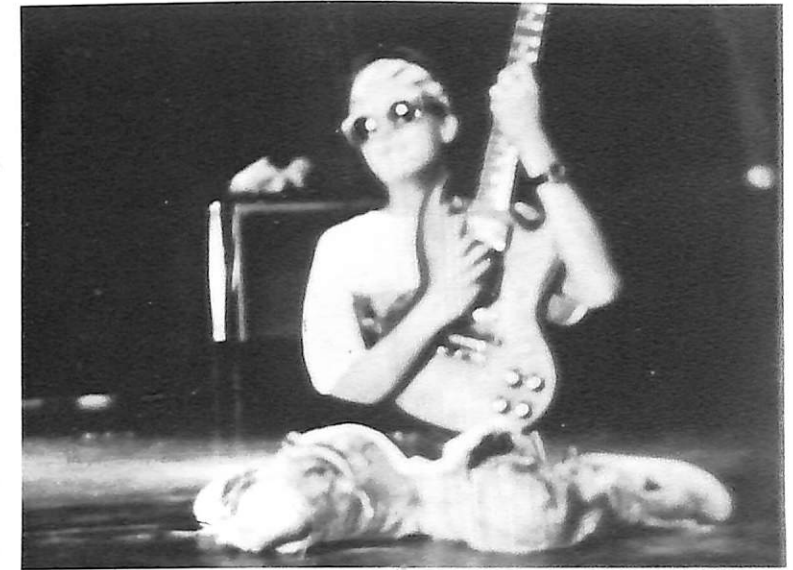

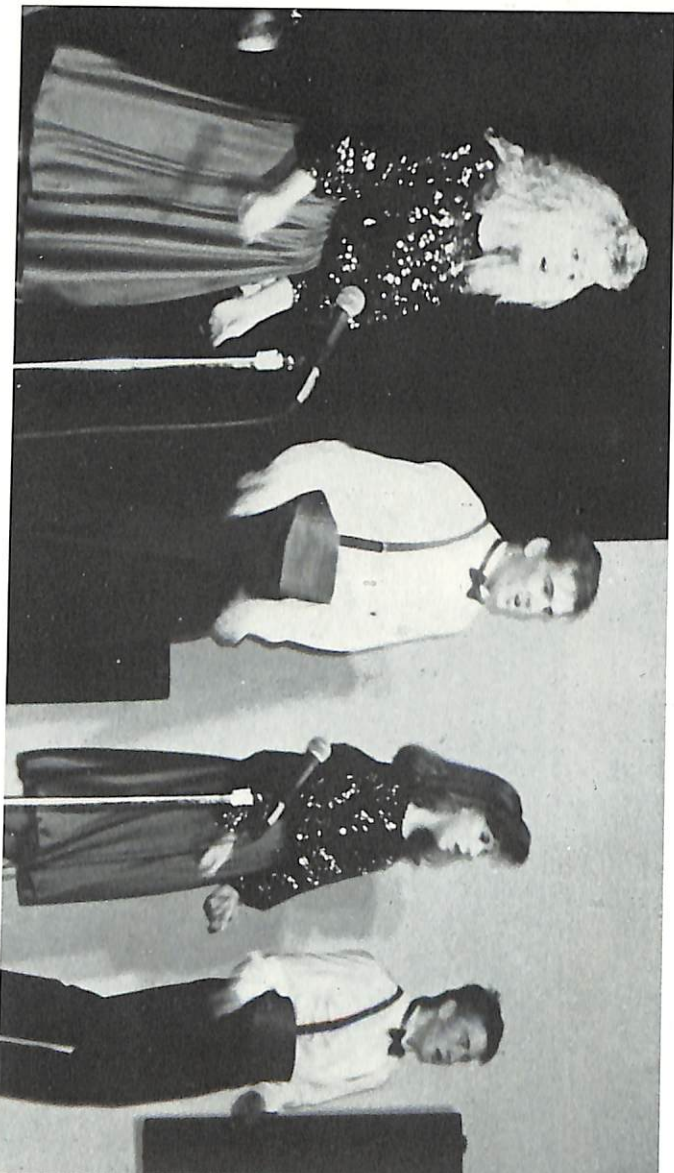

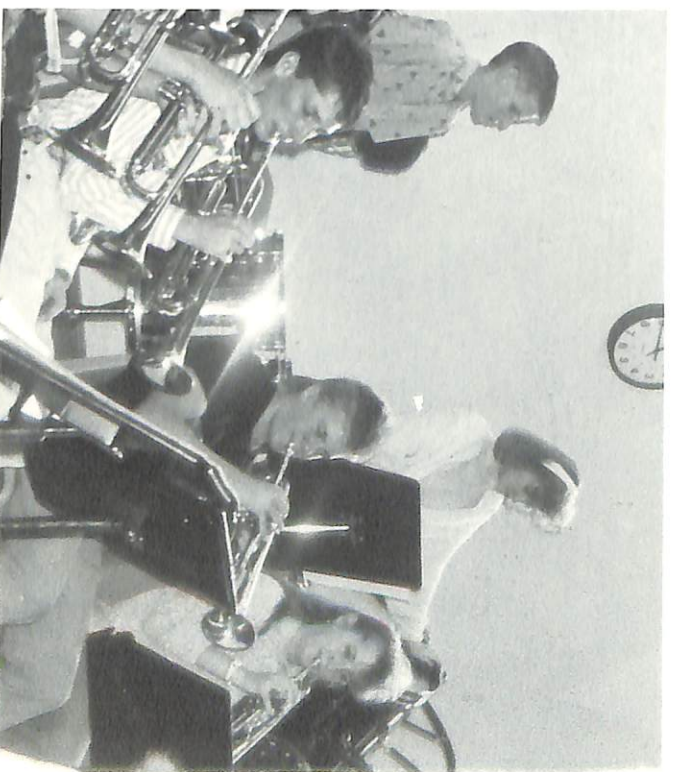

The student council also changed the method for choosing cheerleaders. Instead of the 75% judges and the 25% student body vote, they changed it to 60% judges and 40% student body.



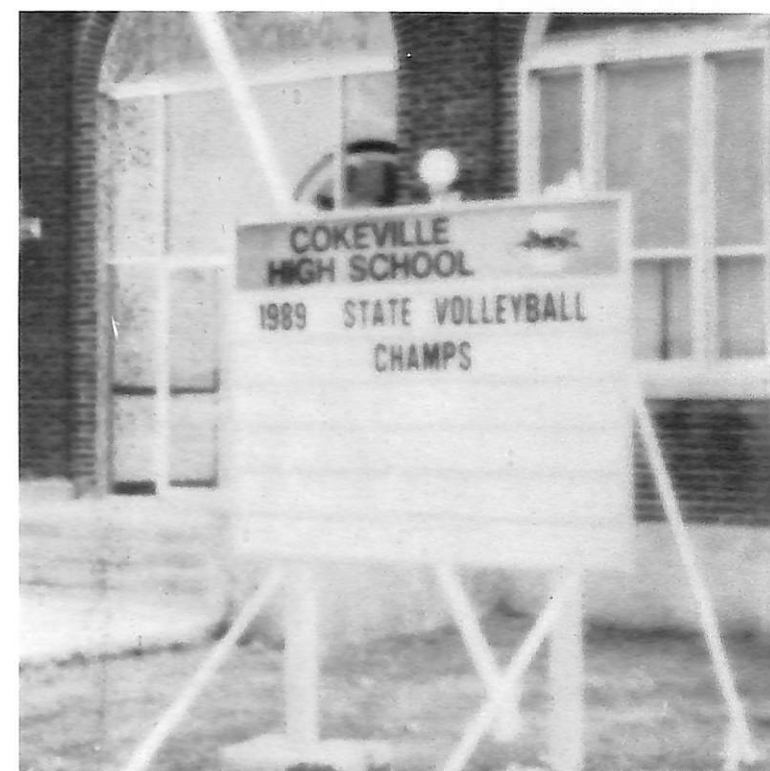

Current Events



On November 9, 1989, East Germany lifted restrictions on emigration and travel to the west, and within hours thousands of Germans celebrated on and around the Berlin Wall. "The wall" which has divided East and West Germany since 1961, has finally begun to crumble.

On April 15, a pro-democracy student protest began in Tiananmen Square for talks on increasing social freedoms and ending official corruption. The Goddess of Democracy, a 33-foot-high replica of the Statue of Liberty which has become the symbol of the movement for democratic reform, was crushed by tanks and taken away. While the government claims that nearly 300 people — mostly soldiers — were killed, diplomats and Chinese say up to 3,000 died, and the Chinese Red Cross officials estimate 3,600 people were killed and 60,000 were injured.





Striking during the evening rush hour, just as Game 3 of the World Series was about to begin, a catastrophic earthquake, registering 6.9 on the Richter scale, rocked Northern California on October 17, killing 62 people and injuring hundreds, caving in bridges and freeways, igniting fires and causing widespread damage to buildings.



The Exxon Valdez, a 987-foot tanker owned by Exxon Shipping Co., struck Bligh Reef about 25 miles from Valdez, Alaska, ripping holes in its hull, gushing millions of gallons of oil into the ocean. Thousands of workers helped scrub the oil-fouled shorelines.



Leaving a trail of death and destruction across the Caribbean, Hurricane Hugo, with its 135-mile-an-hour winds, smashed into the coastal city of Charleston, South Carolina on September 22, 1989.

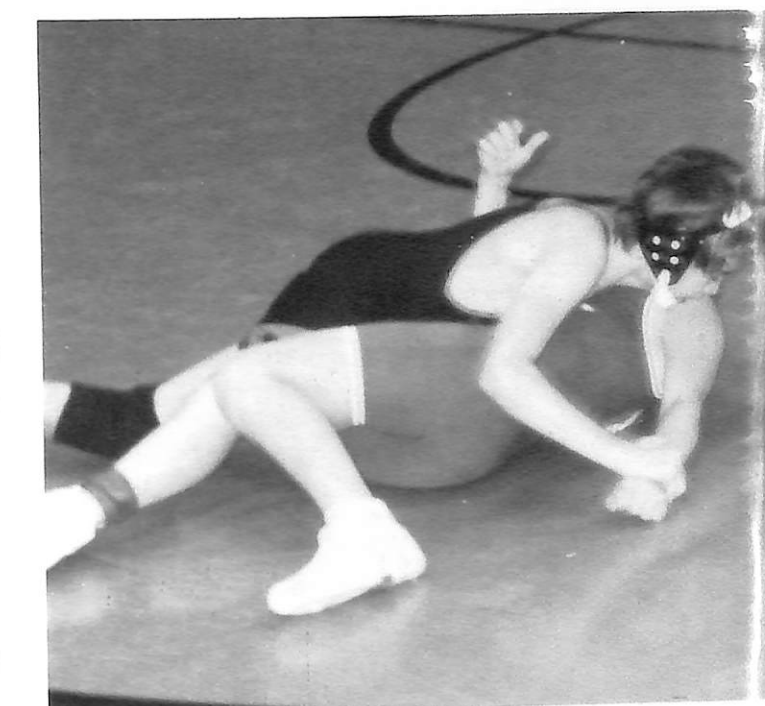
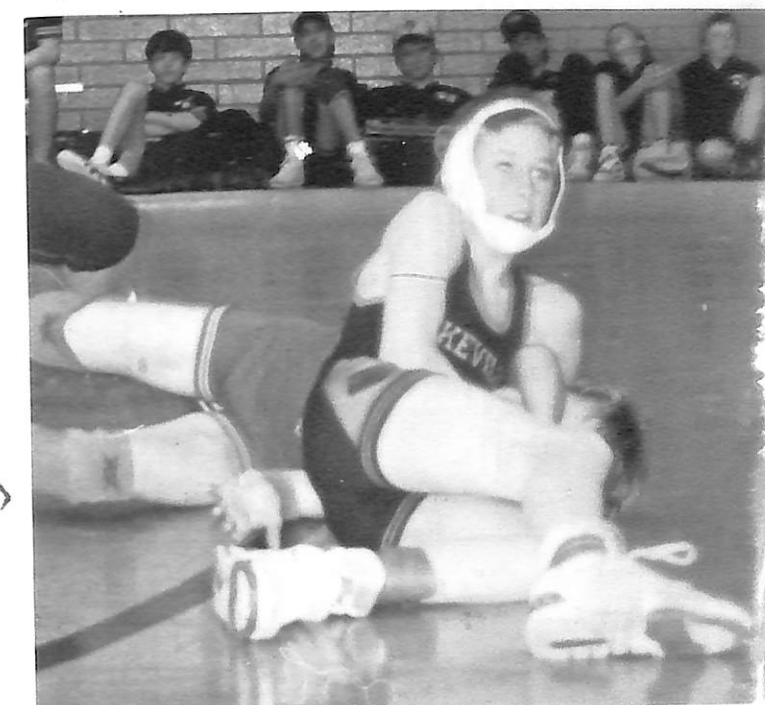
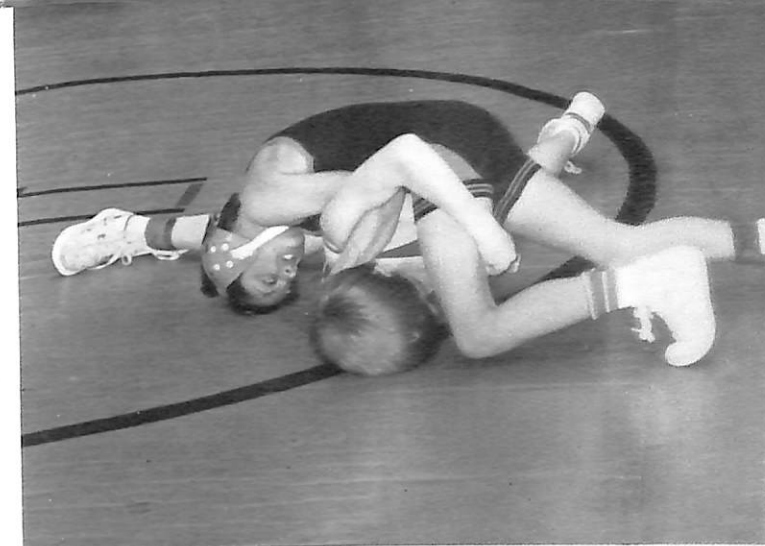
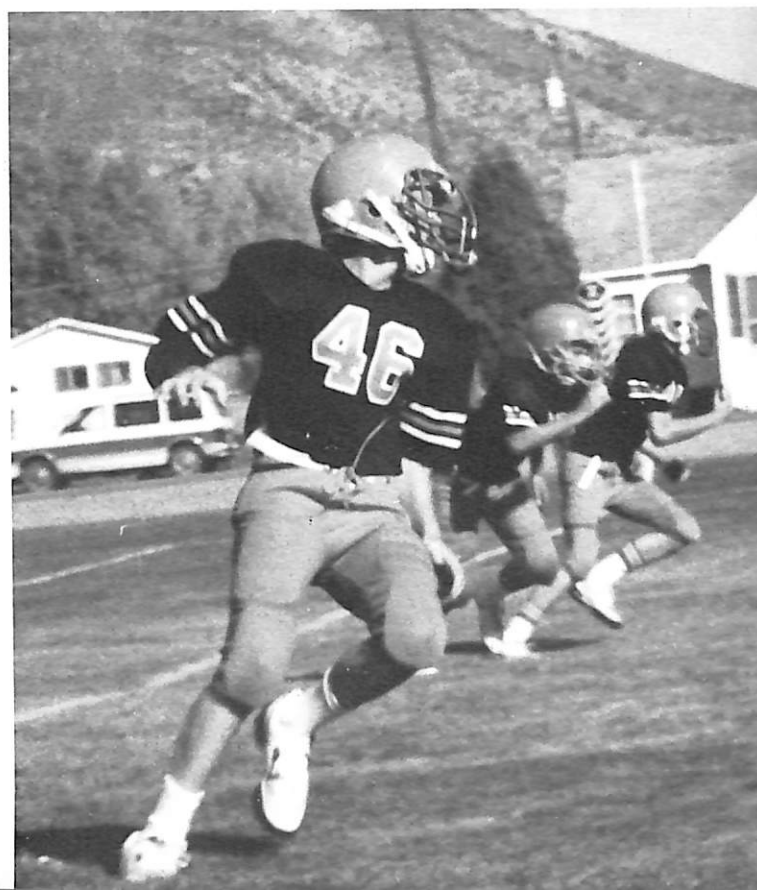


Gridders Have Winning season

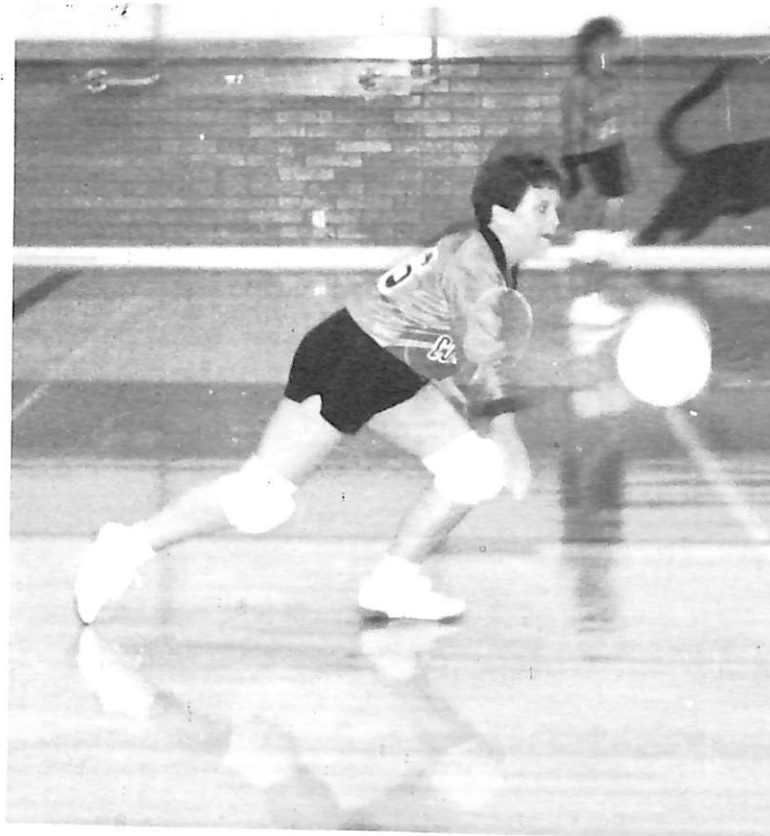
Girls Look Ahead

CHS is Success

The year started out with state championships in football and volleyball. The girls volleyball team traveled to Chicago for a national volleyball invitational where they represented Wyoming. Their 84-game winning streak came to an end when they lost to Mother McAuley High School from Chicago; however, they came home more determined and captured a fifth straight state championship.

The football team boldly stepped up to 2-A competition where they trounced the larger schools, and took state by defeating Burns 46-0, thus putting the team's winning streak at 23.

Then it was the basketball team's turn to make their stand. After a heartbreaking loss to Farson during regional tournament play, the boys went to state where they walked away with the state championship by defeating Arvada-Clearmont. It was the first basketball championship in nine years.

With three state championships already, the girls basketball team couldn't let down the community. They were able to pull off a perfect season and the first girls basketball championship recorded in Cokeville's history.

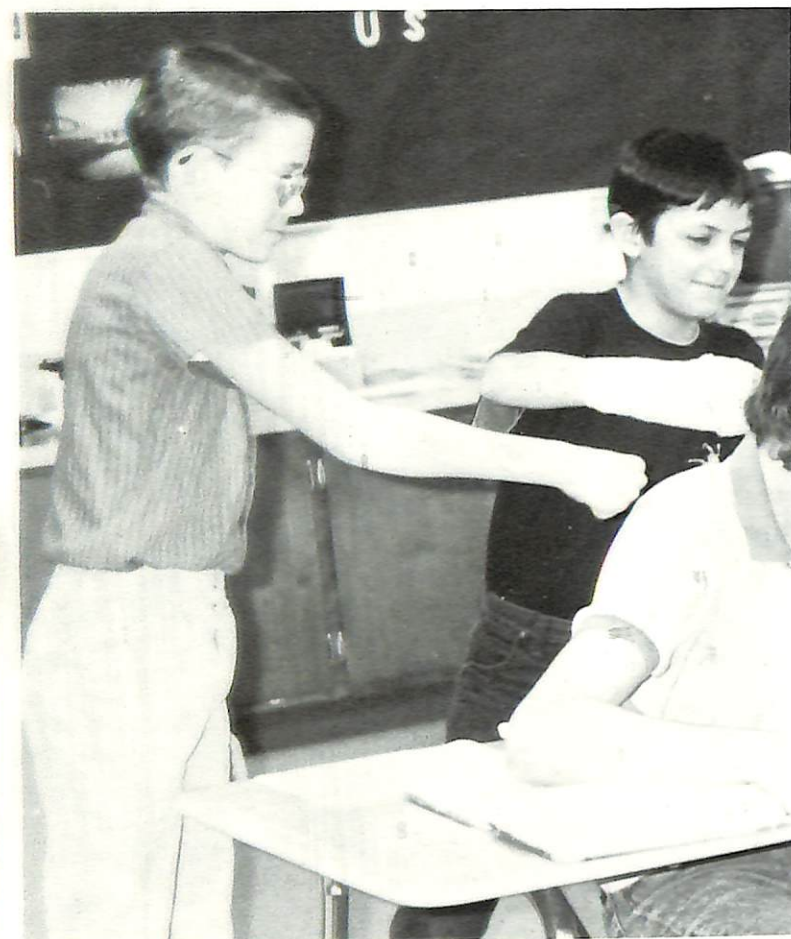
Although they were

The three girls and six boys on the track team were able to pull off a remarkable accomplishment by bringing home second and third place trophies from regionals. Warren Coates, the lone senior on the team, took state in both the shot put and discus, and set a new 1-A state record in the discus with a throw of 157 feet.

With so much being said about the sports programs, we sometimes forget about the music department. "We probably had the best choir, since I have been here," said director John Miller. He proved it too, by having four members of the band and choir attend All-State.

We were able to gain recognition not only state-wide but also nation-wide. This came in articles such as U.S.A. Today's report "Cokeville Makes Its Mark As Wyoming's Title Town." All together it was a year of great accomplishments and success. But don't be surprised when great accomplishments happen in the future.

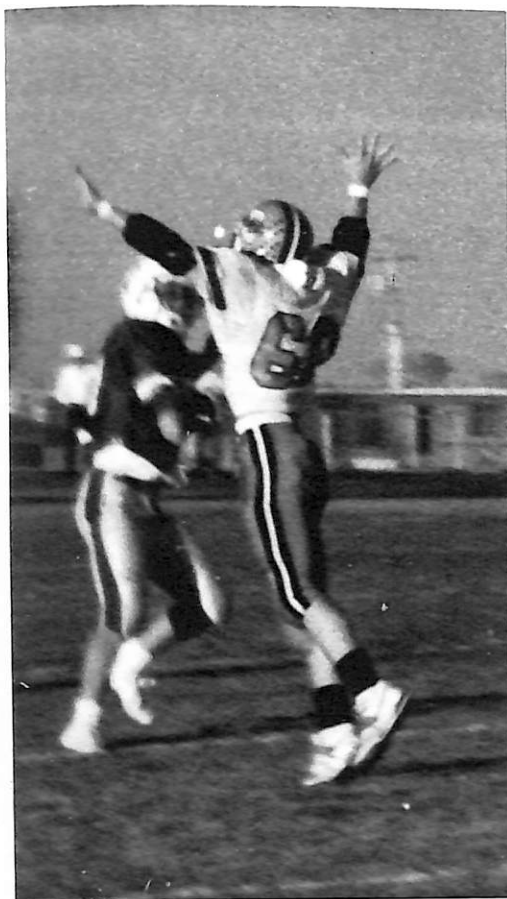
