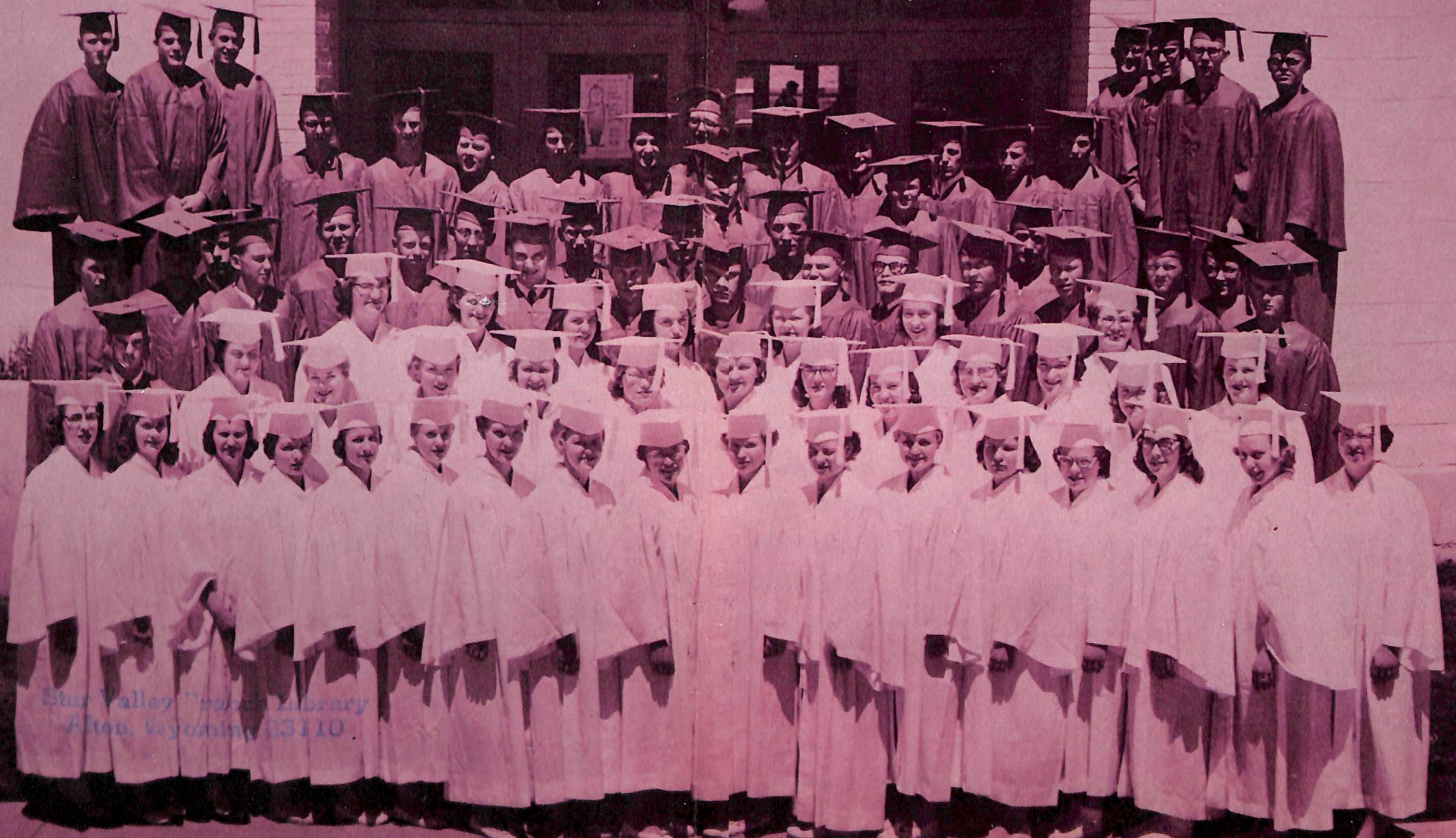




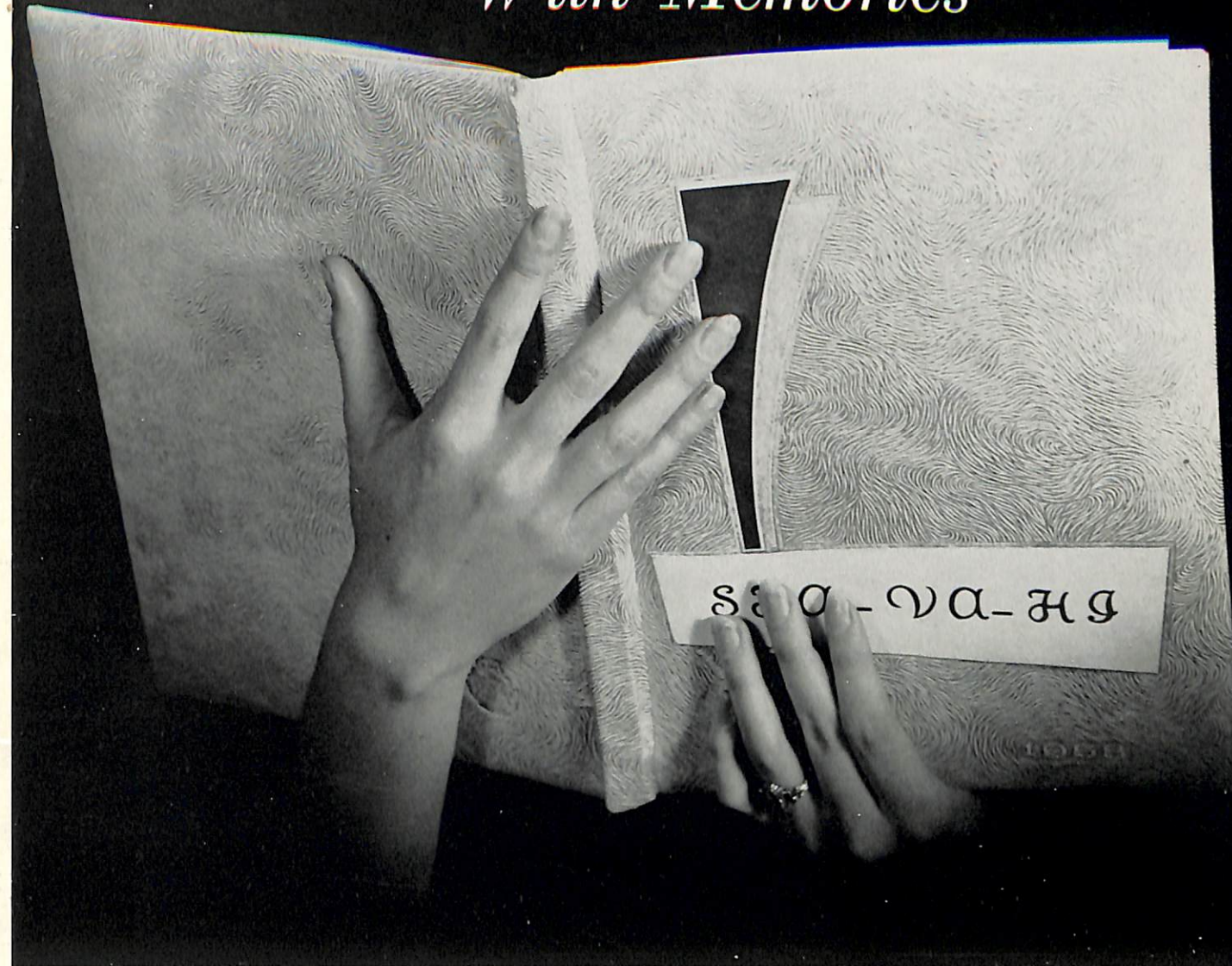

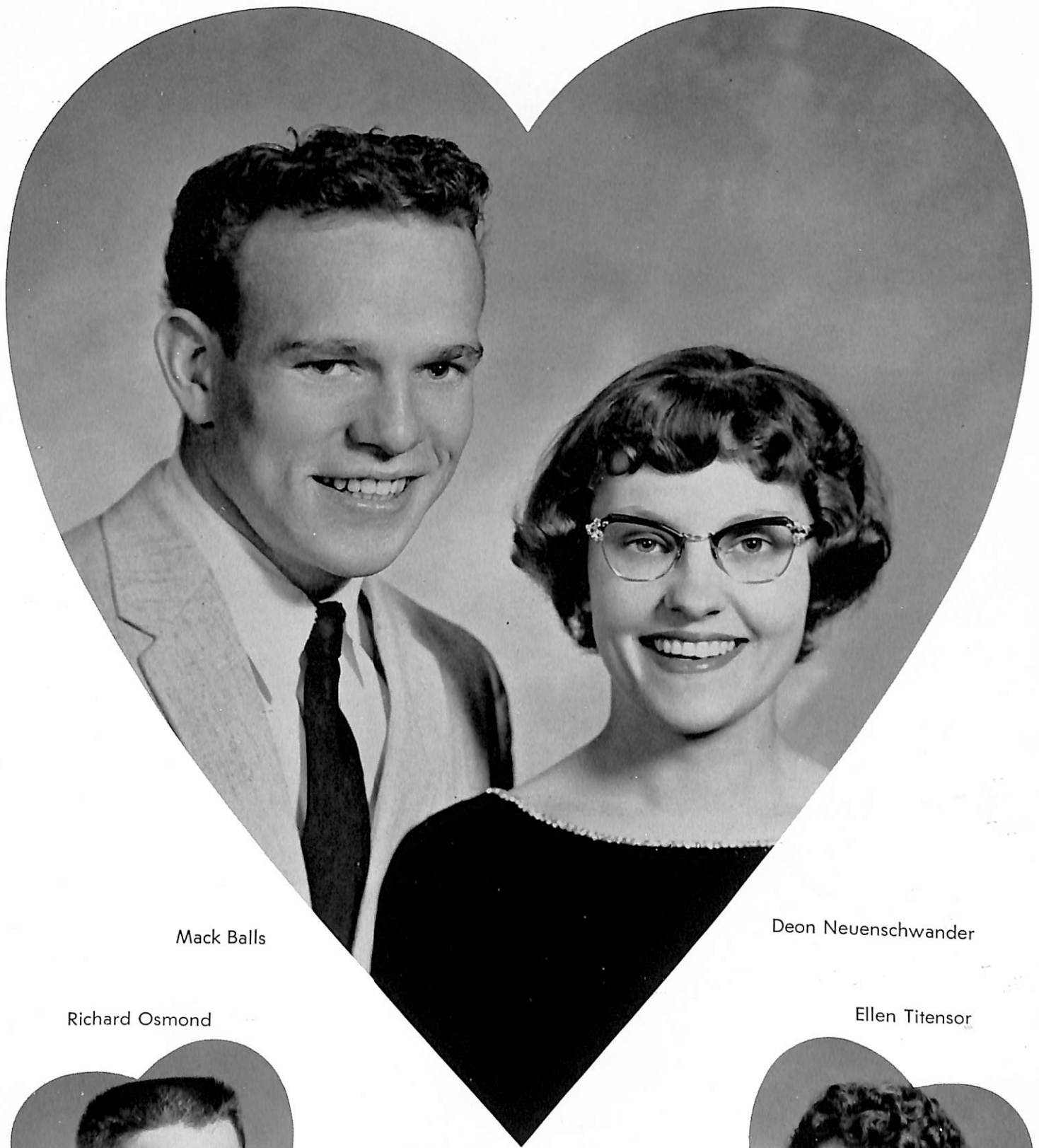

Class Personalities



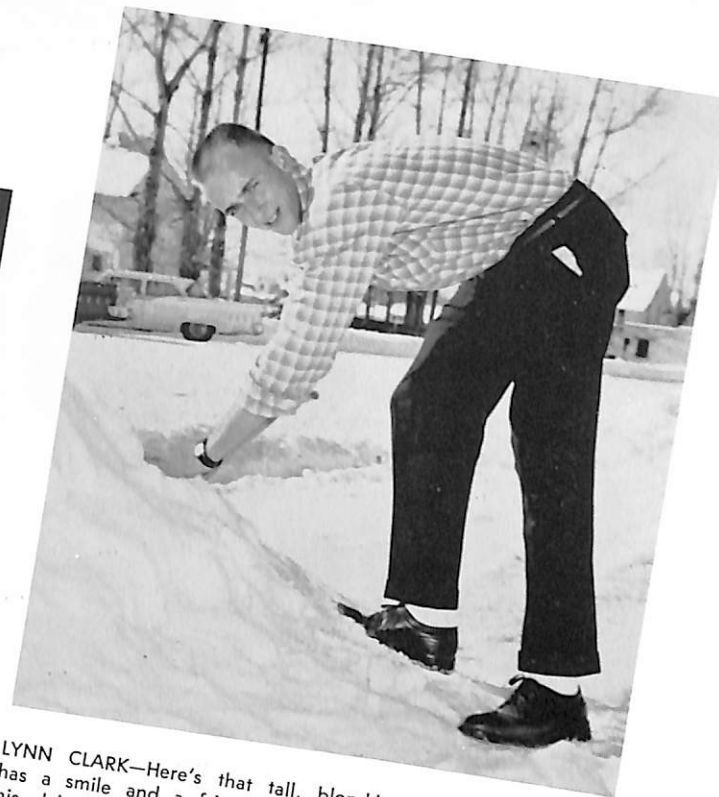

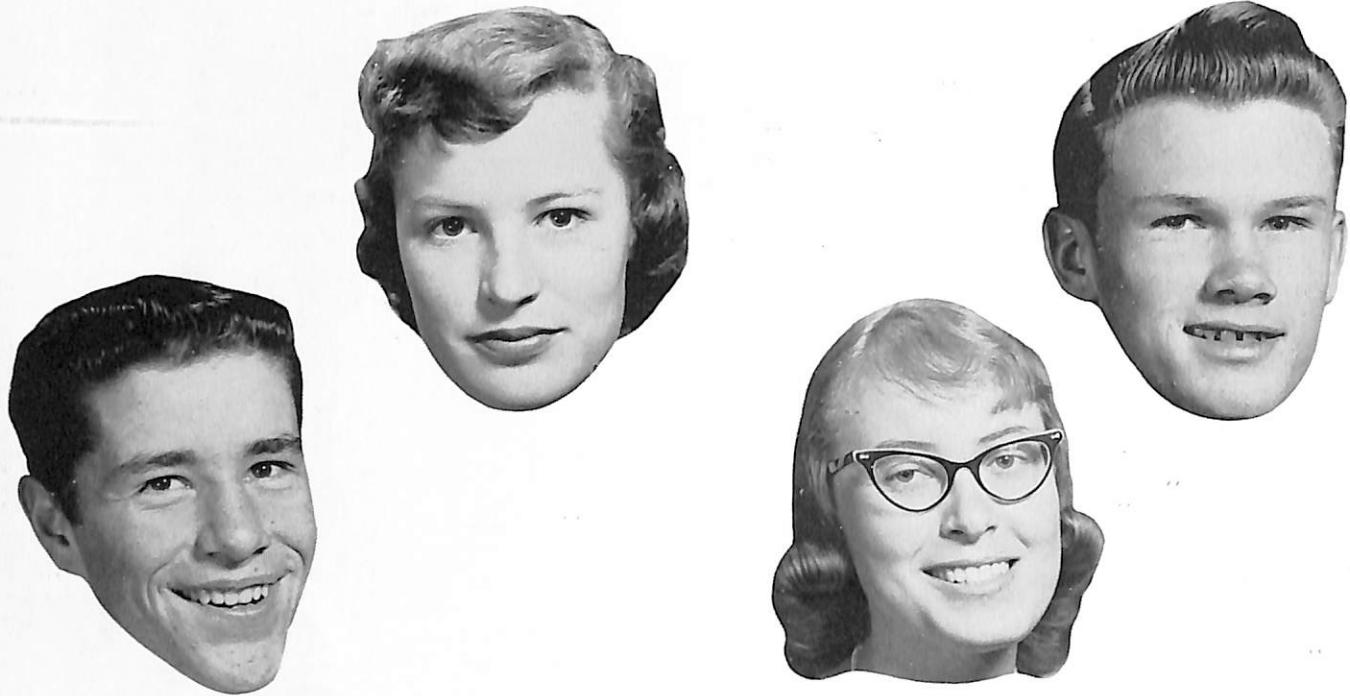

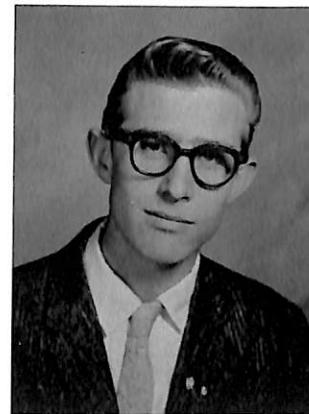
Alpha Eta Mu

Future Farmers of America

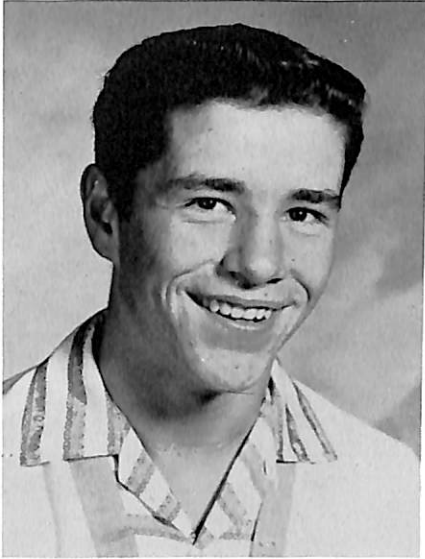

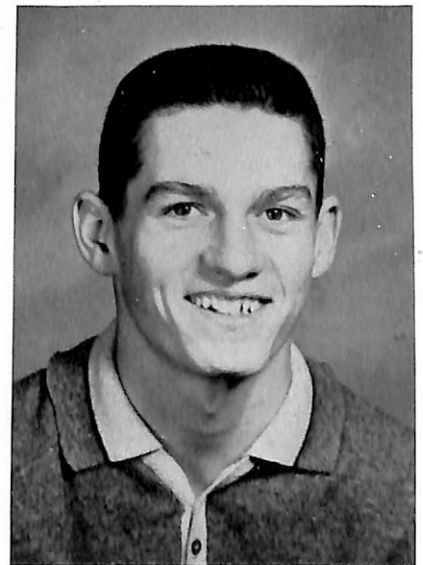

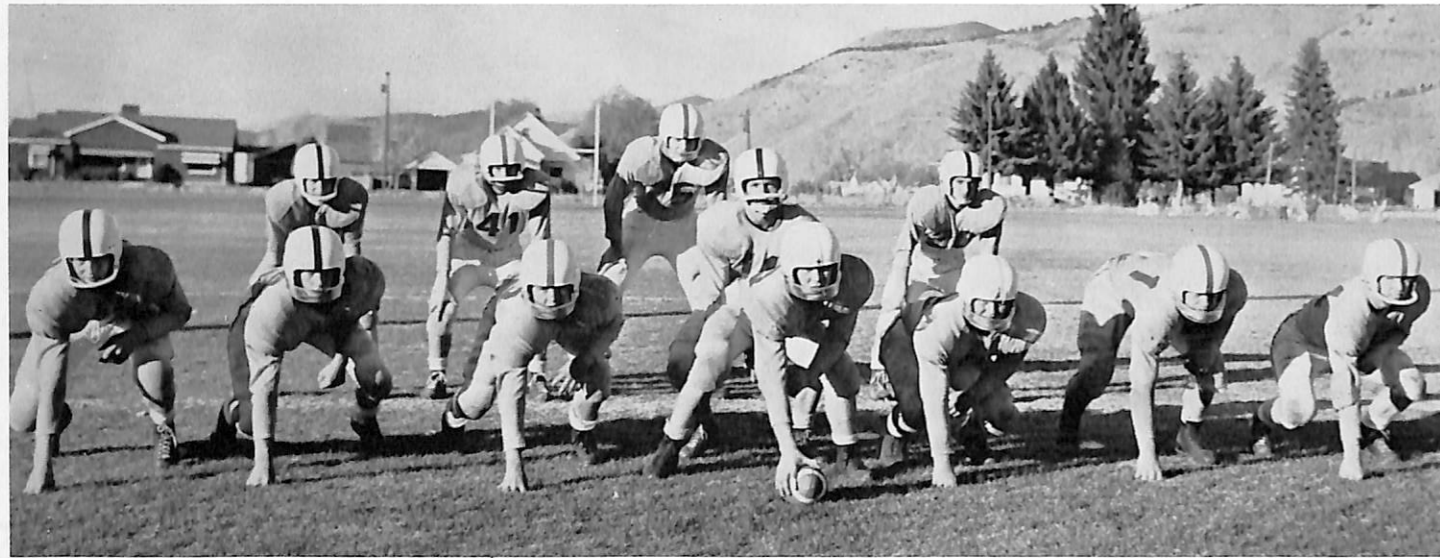

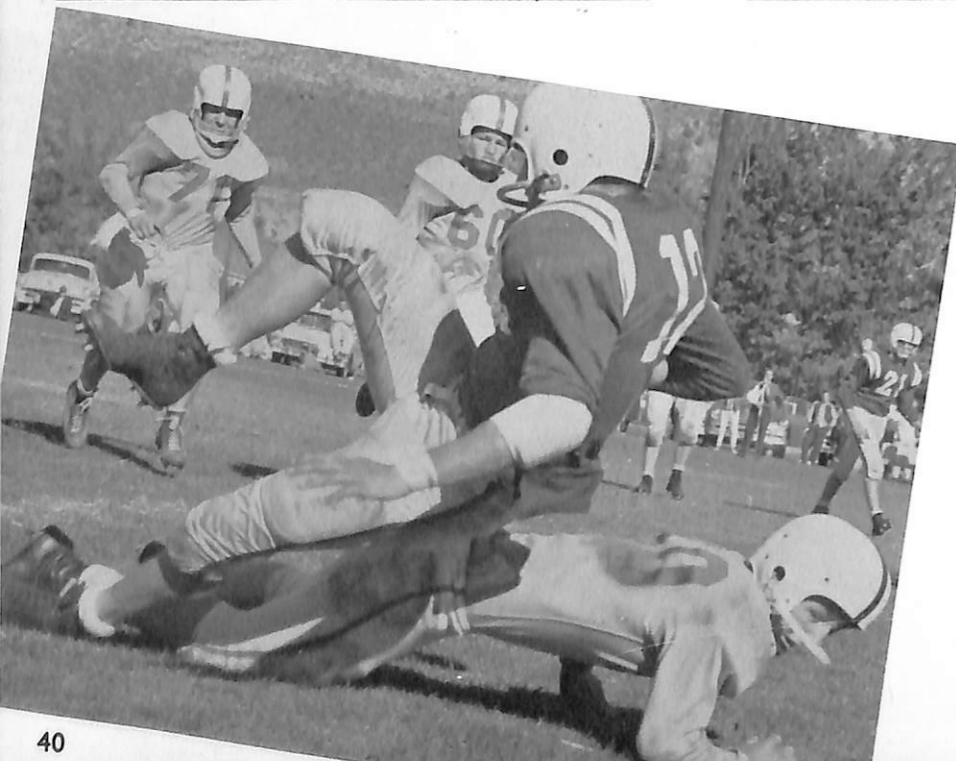

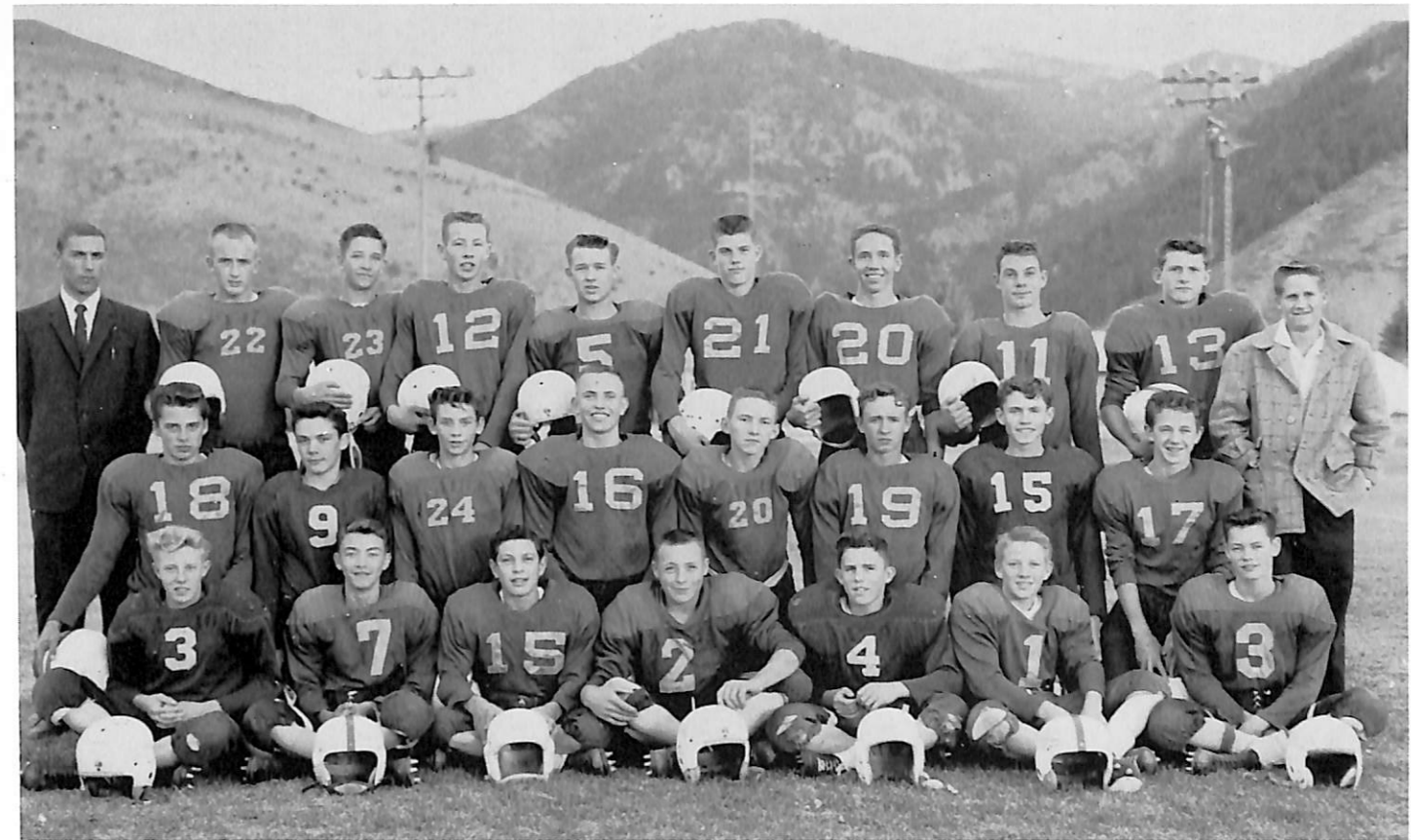

Basketball

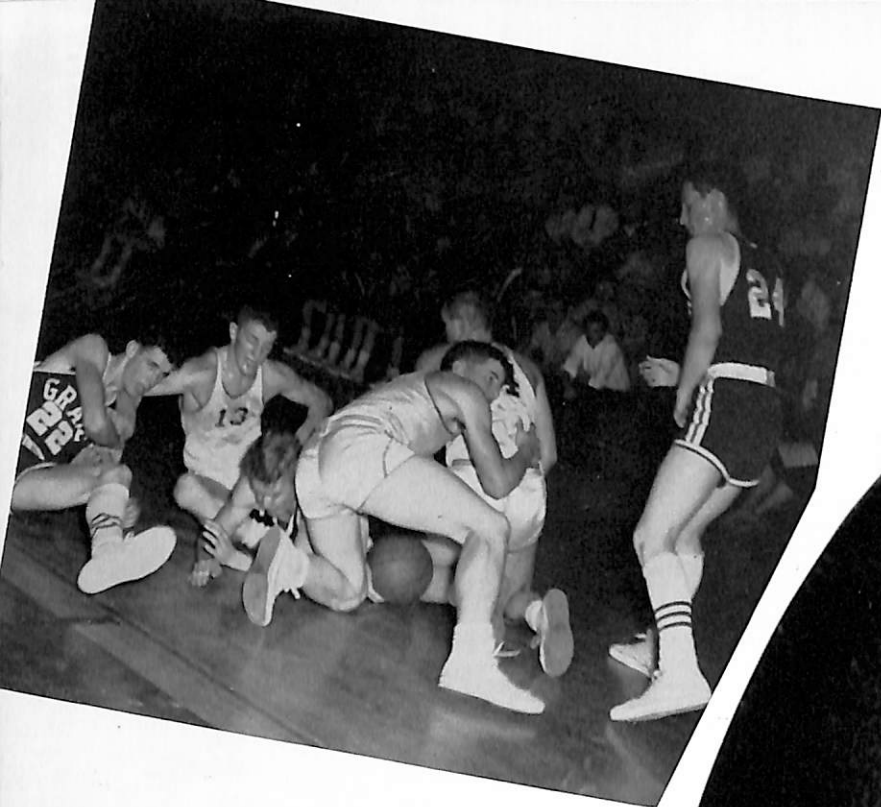

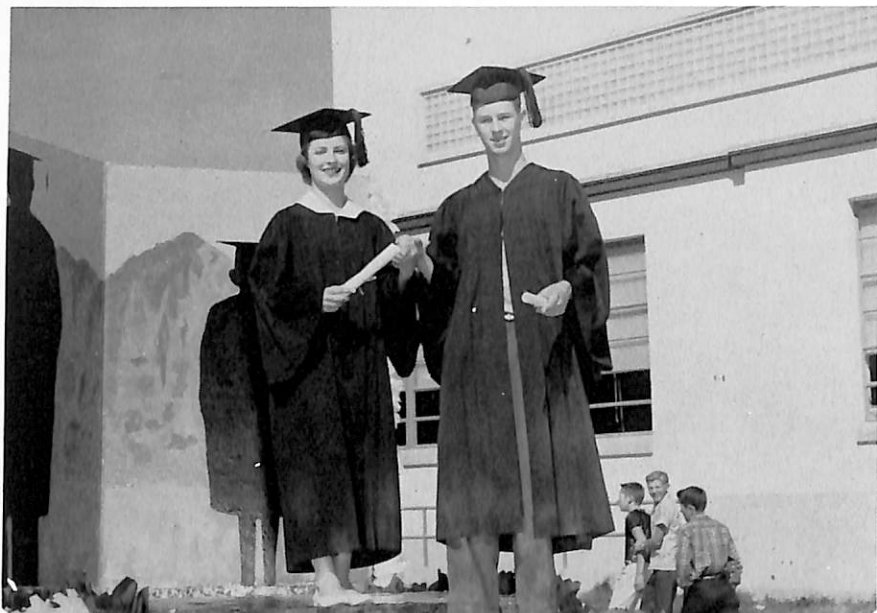

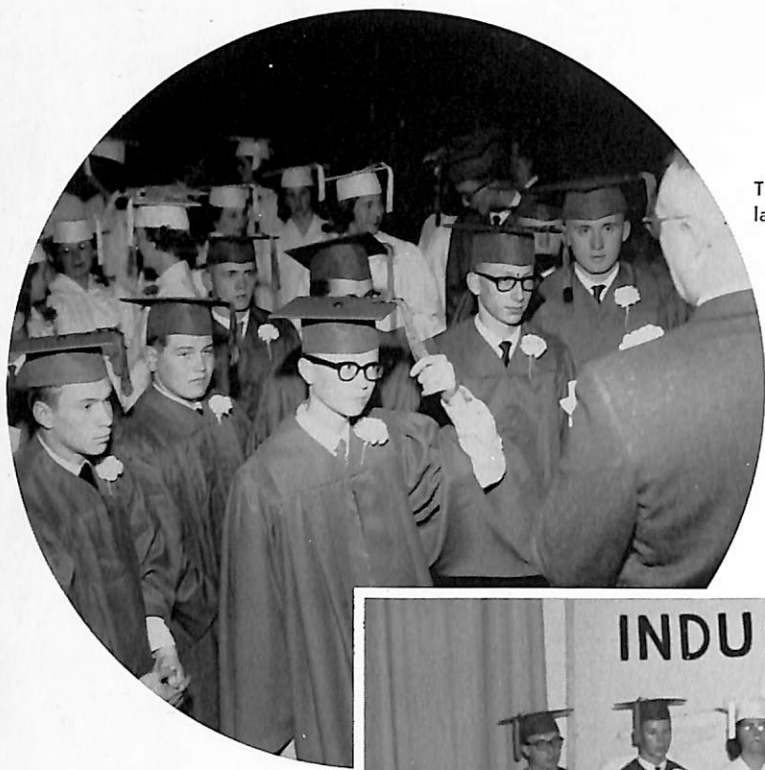

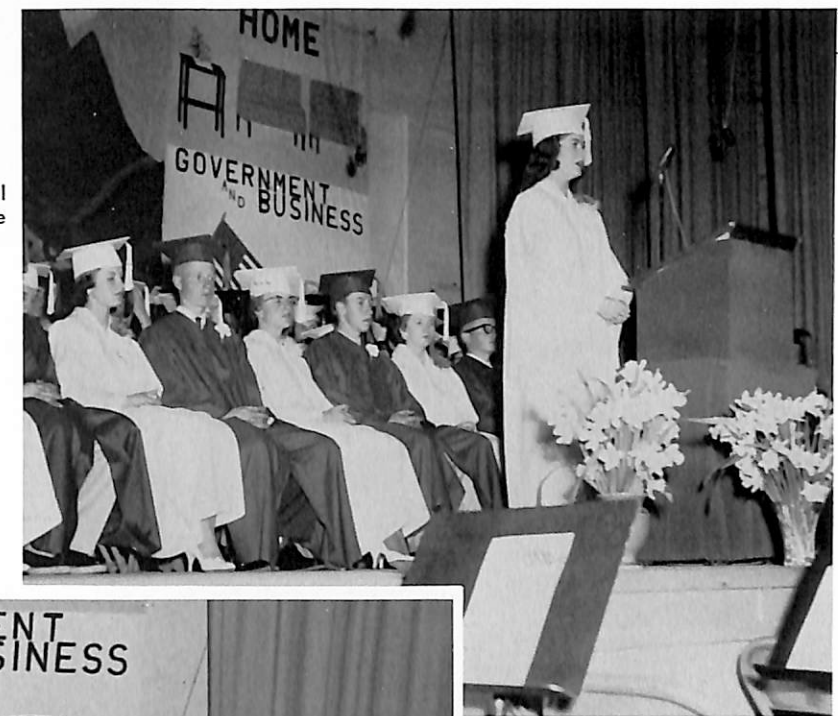

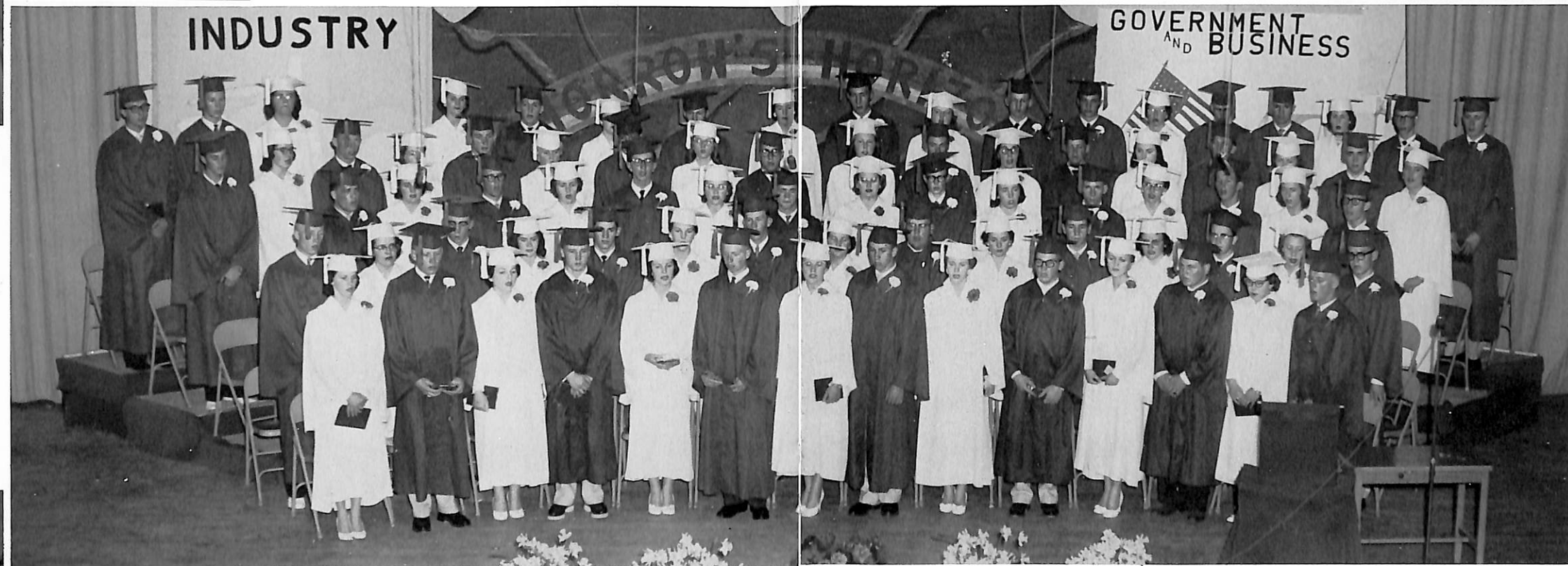

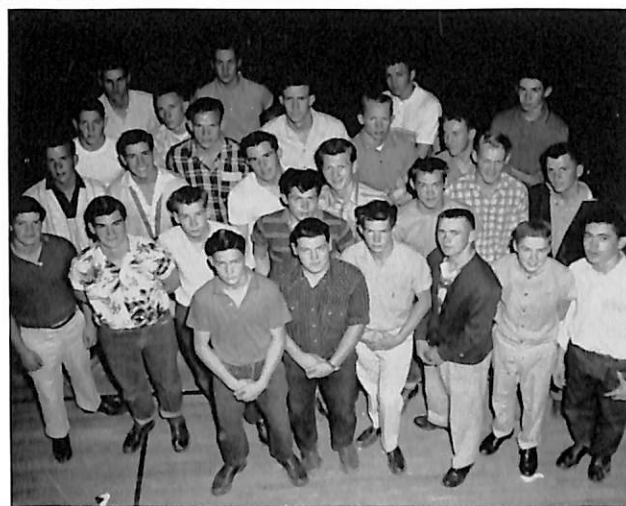
Thespian stars or honor bars were awarded to the above students for their work in the drama field. Don Wooden and Gladys Gardner were chosen as the best actor and actress of the year.

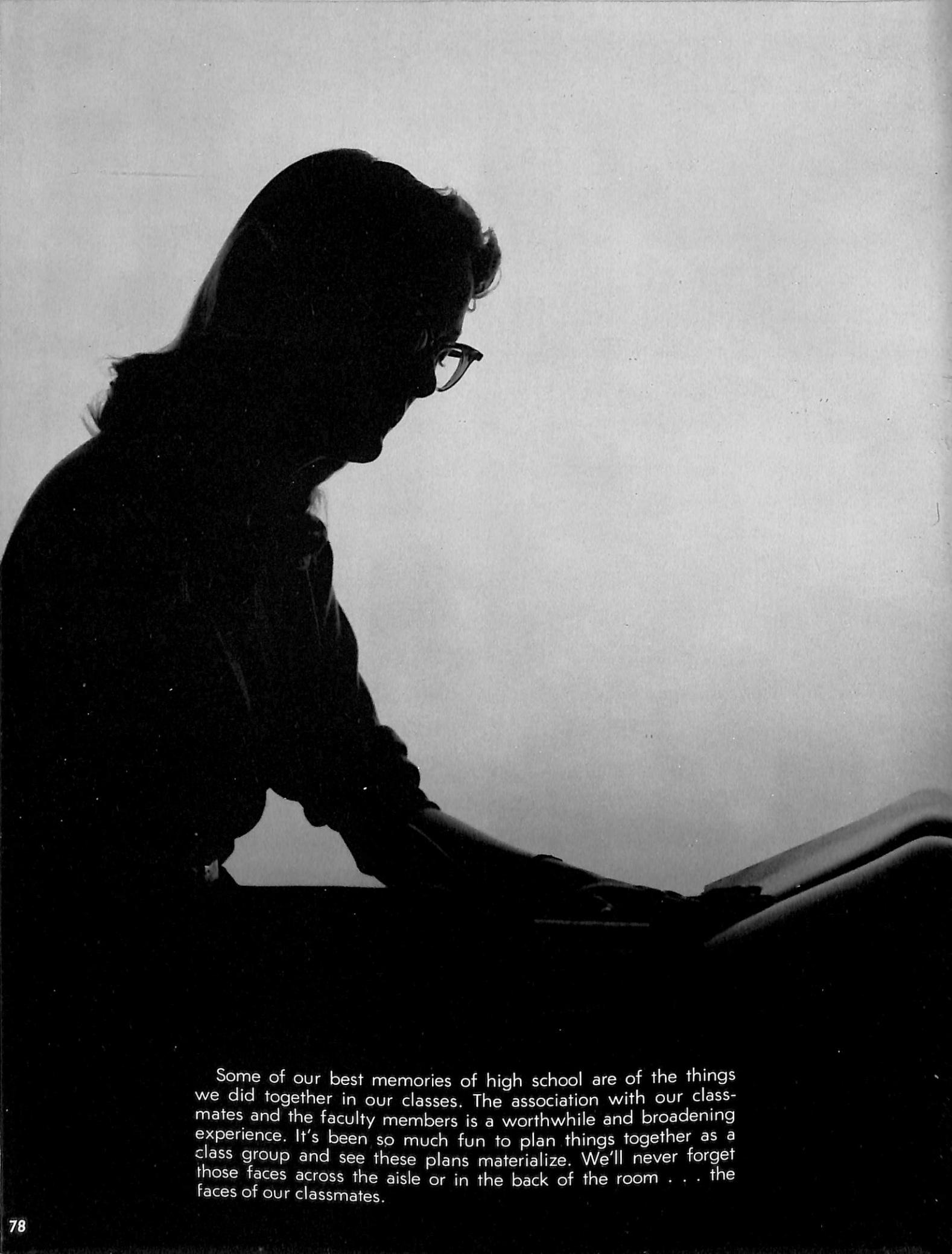
We are the Student Council, the governing body of the school. We represent the various departments in school. We sponsored many activities this year which include Homecoming activities, shows, and a matinee dance.
