And we walked forward all the while.

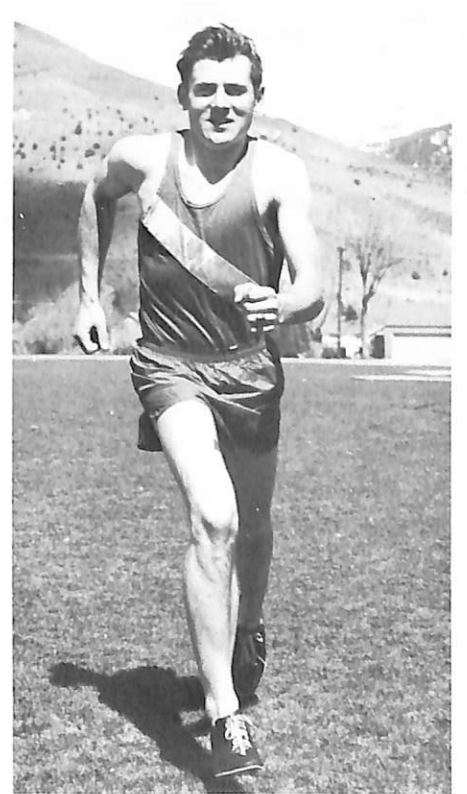
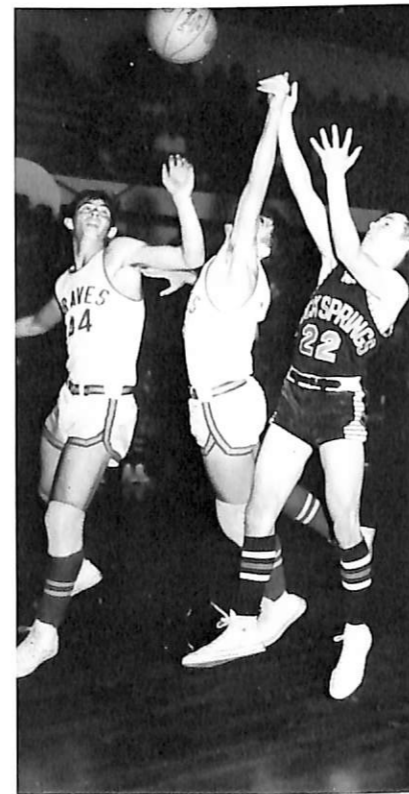
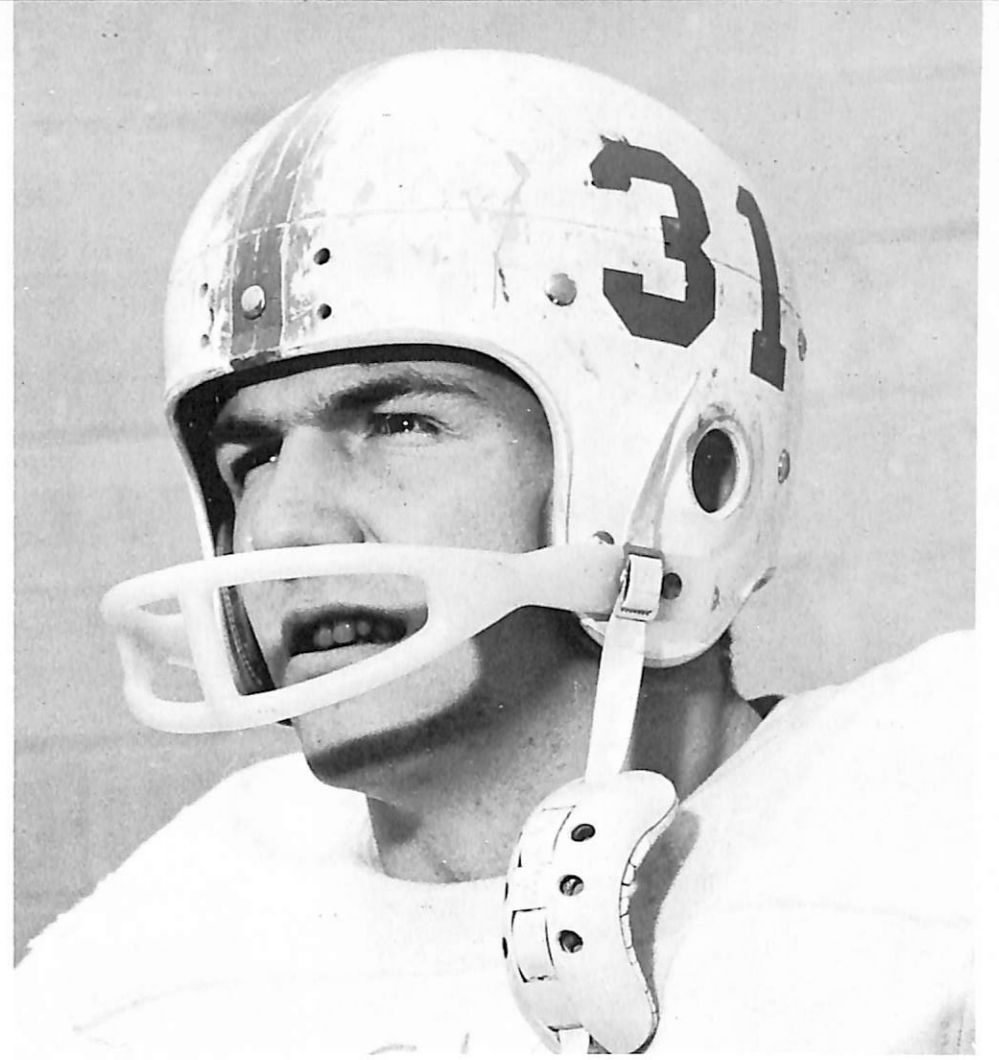

Sophomores deviate from daily schedule as they are given shots, which are given to tenth graders each year.



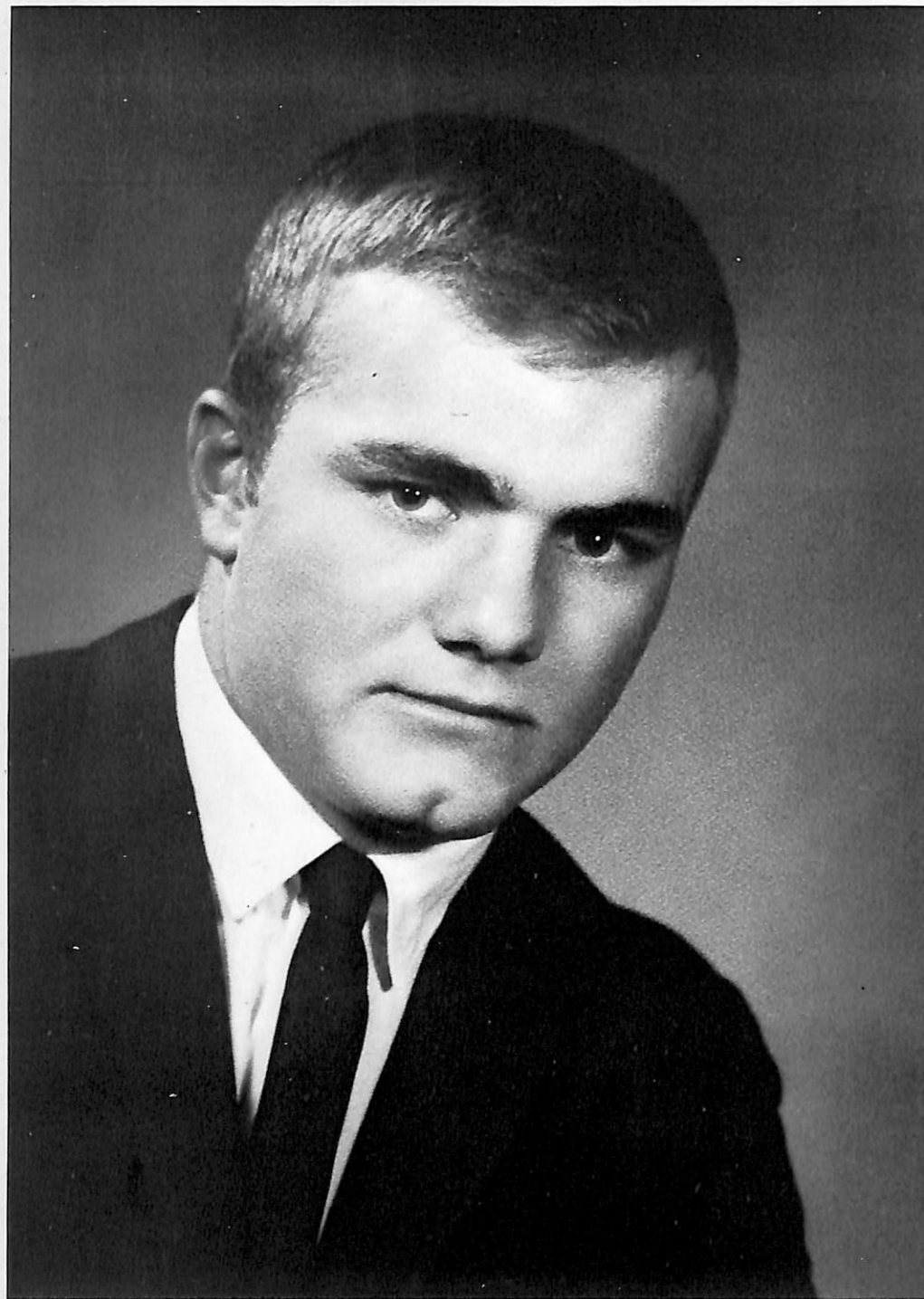

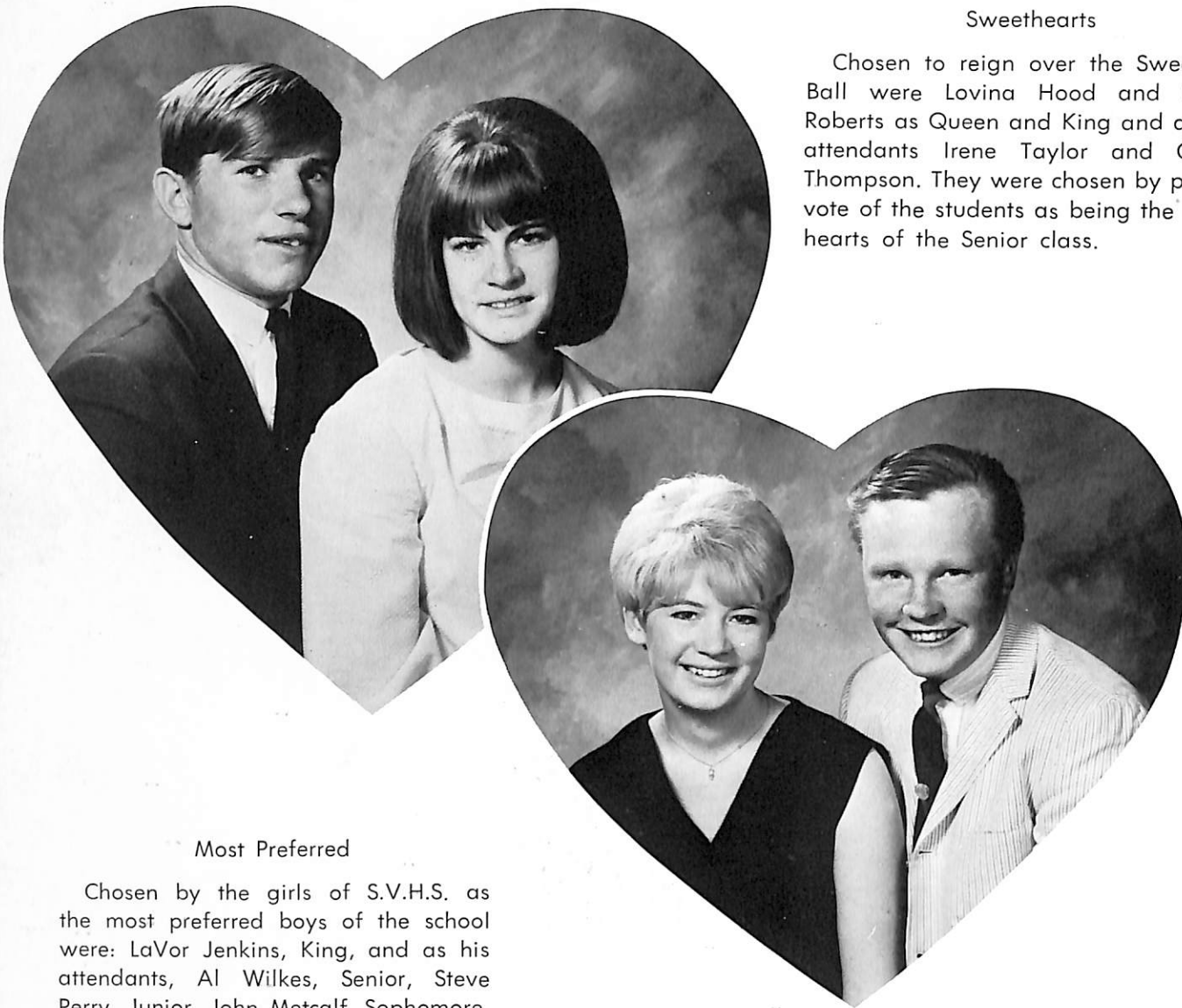

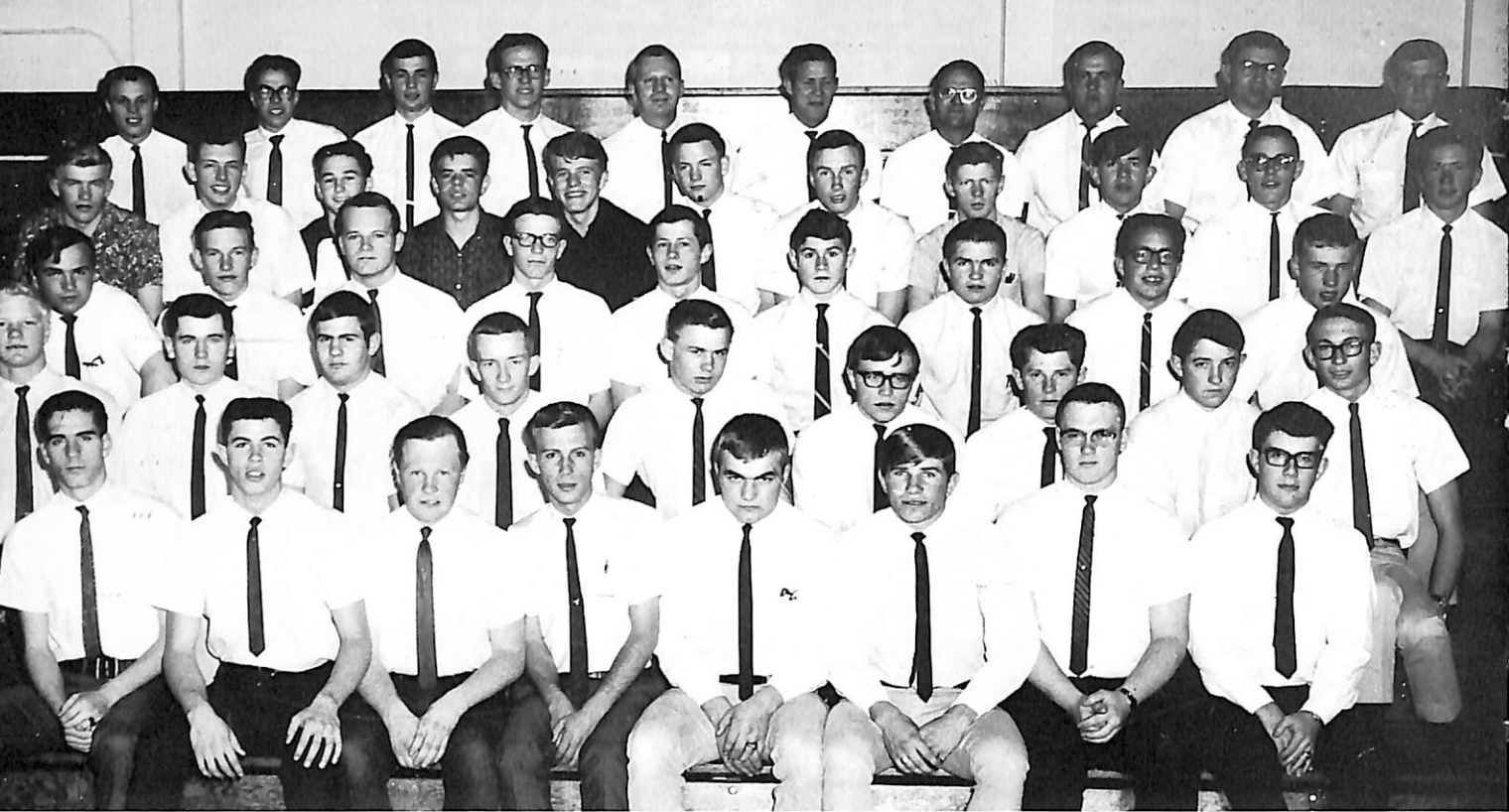

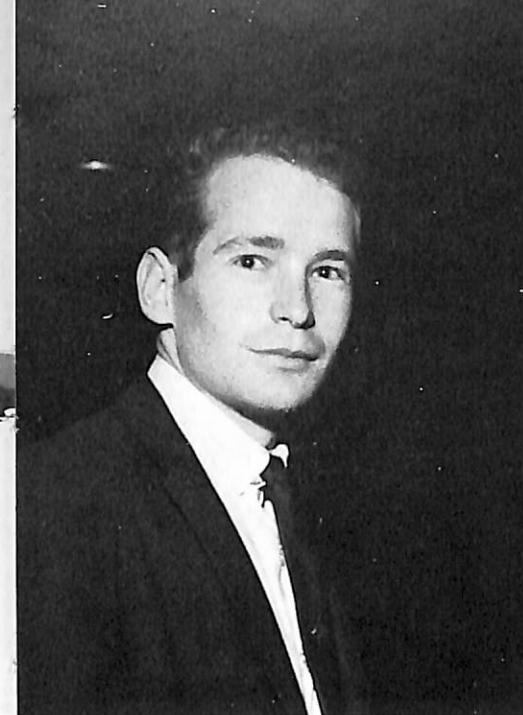
Chorus

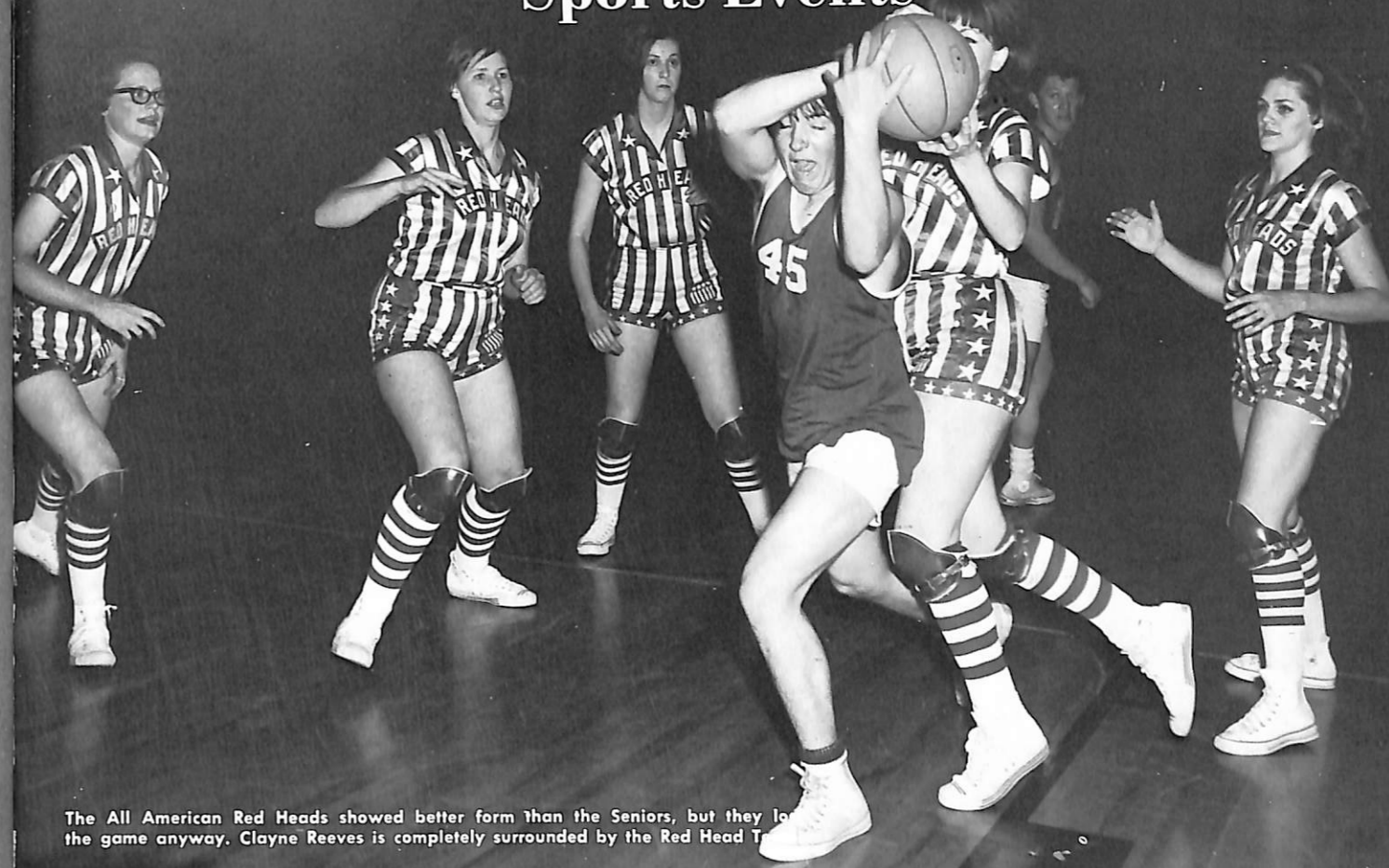
Varsity Matmen

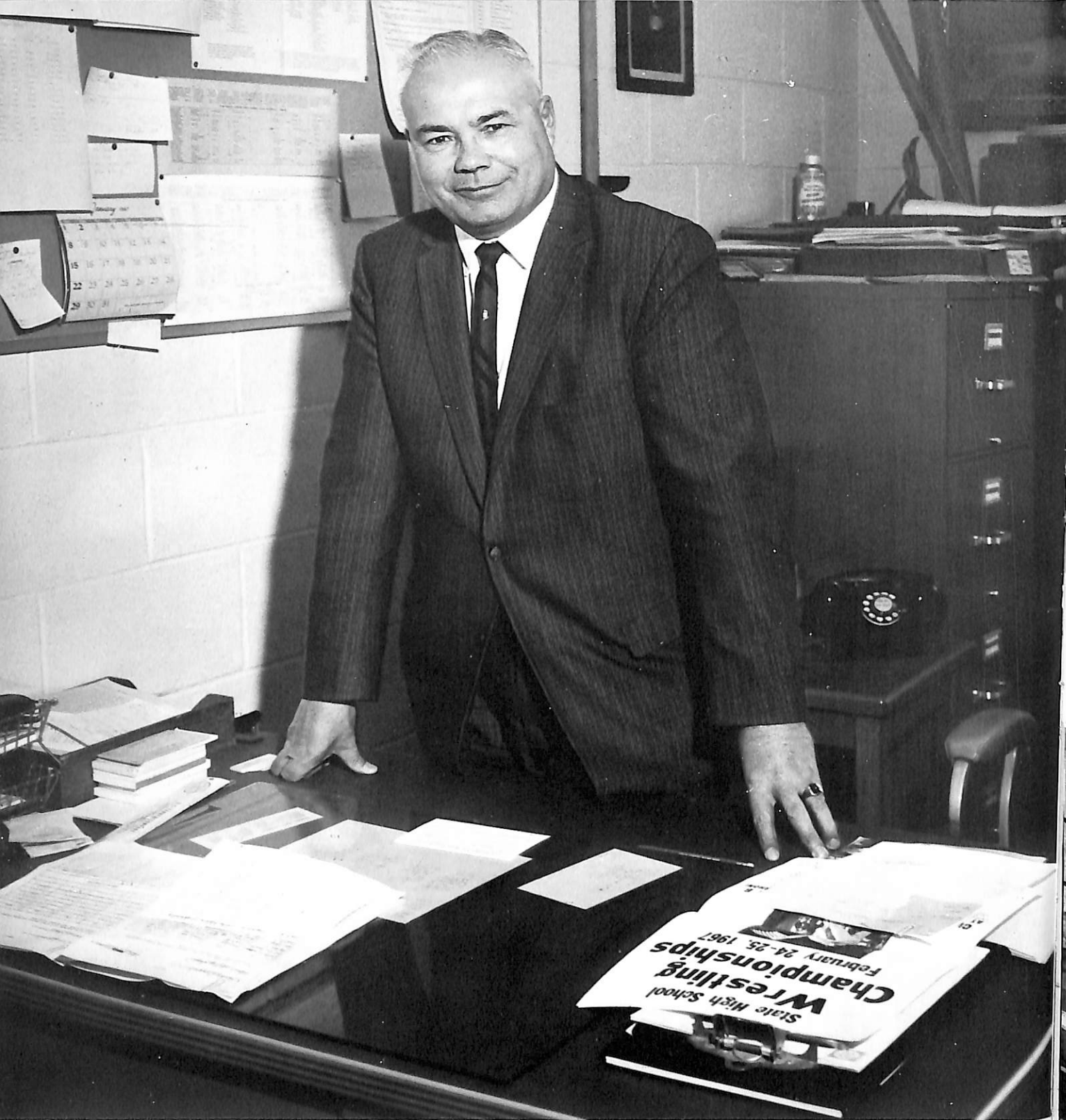


The Pep Stars accompanied our team and cheered them on to victory . . . on to State tournaments, where the Cheerleaders followed with their support.

A school provides charts for unsailed seas.

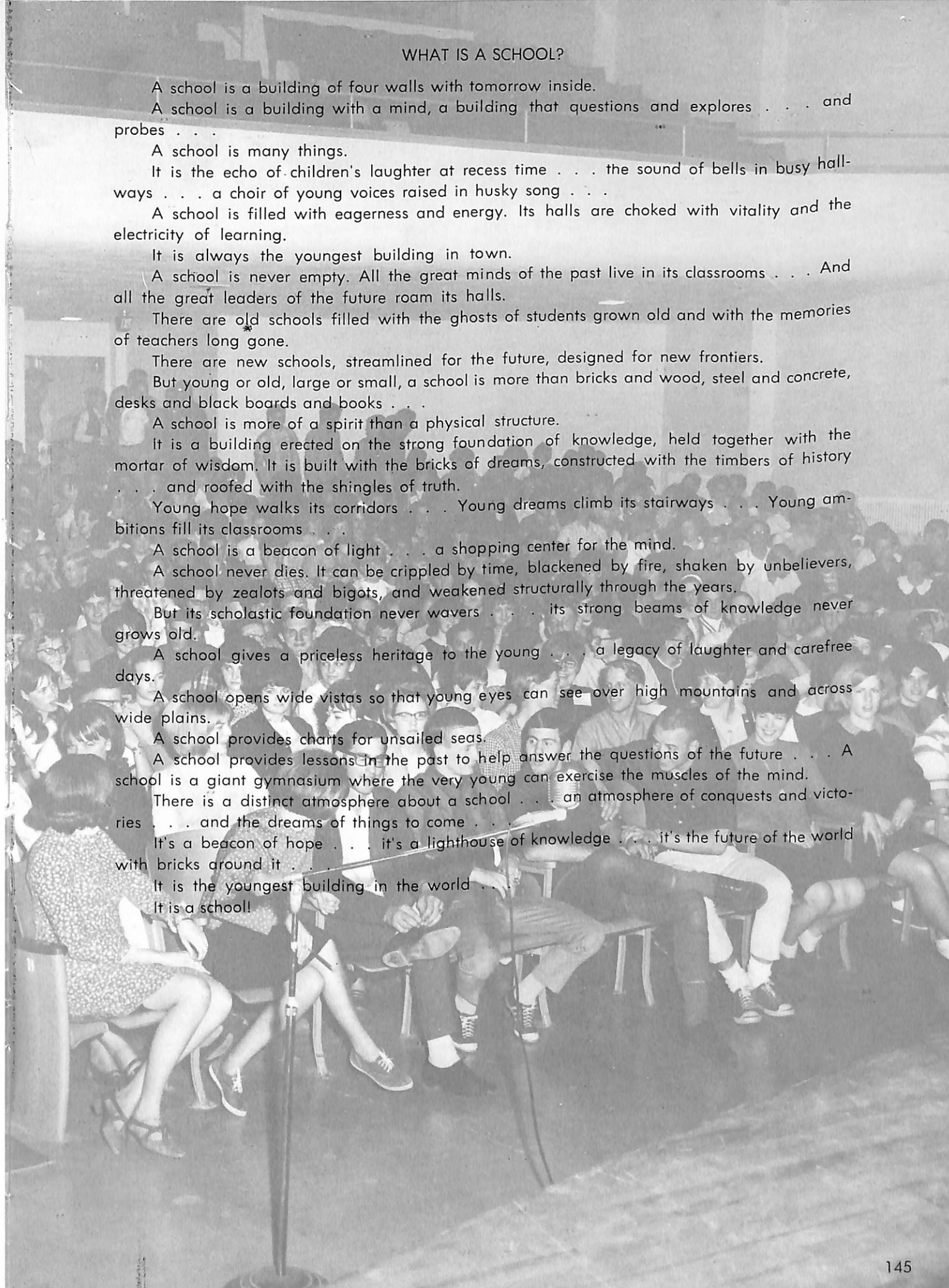
A school provides lessons in the past to help answer the questions of the future . . . A school is a giant gymnasium where the very young can exercise the muscles of the mind.
