Enrollment at SVHS increased by 70 students at the beginning of the 1977-78 school year. New faces moved into the valley from places varying from Okinawa to Hereford, Texas.

Mr. Carwin H. Linford was replaced by a new superintendent. Dr. J. Allen Lowe served as principal at SVHS for three years before being called to this position.

Filling the empty seat left by Dr. Lowe was Larry Jensen. He set many goals including: 1. Putting together an attendance policy that everyone can live with. 2. Increasing communications with students, parents, and the teaching staff; and 3. Creating a feeling of honesty with the school. He also proposed an open door policy wherein anyone with questions could talk to him at any time.

An assessment of school facilities was instituted to increase the effectiveness of Star Valley's education system. The school board was mainly interested in "instilling vocational education in the minds of our citizens," therefore, they proposed a \$4 million vocational addition to the high school. This included auto mechanics, metals, and woodworking shops, a business complex, home ec. facilities, space for drafting, electronics, arts and erafts and two science labs. Bond failed.




The CRT program continued strong in its second year. Thirteen students each semester availed themselves of training in the community from people engaged in various trades.

Welding classes found a way to help beat the energy crisis. They constructed wood and coal burning stoves which heat and cook. Welders also repaired and built farm equipment.


Building construction classes erected a second house which was sold in the spring. They made the cabinets for it and also built quilting frames for use in home ec. classes.

Clothing classes had a fasion show, May 5, where girls modeled outfits they had made during the year.







Krambule teaches psychology




In addition to being a counselor, Jan Krambule taught a psychology class once a week to 29 students. The main focus of the class was on personal and interpersonal growth.

Braves had seventeen seniors graduate from the squad, with four seniors receiving either All-State or All-Conference honors.



Braves continue winning streak Beat Evanston in 15-14 thriller



Others under the Brave rule were two newcomers, Powell and Preston. Powell has lost both encounters the past two years and Preston has lost three of three games played.


The most remembered game during the '77 season was with the Evanston Red Devils. The Braves were down by seven with just two minutes to go. The Red Devils had the ball on the fifty-yard line when defensive end Blair Lancaster recovered a fumble, thus giving the Braves the ball.

Brave Quarterback Kurt Leavitt went straight to the air, completing a 15-yard pass to Blair Lancaster, then a 20-yard bomb to Flanker Ben Ewing with just one minute to go. Leavitt then threw an incomplete touchdown pass to Lancaster.

Not giving up with only 40 seconds to go in the game, Leavitt again went to Lancaster for a first down on the nine-yard line. Leavitt, taking the challenge on his shoulders, ran the ball in for a touchdown on the option, still leaving the Braves one point behind.

Leavitt again ran the ball for a two-point conversion; Braves, won 15-14.

Sophomores win 5, lose 1; Frosh struggle with 2.4 season



Coach Kurt Spender became head coach with Lewis Lamb as assistant. Coach Doug Broadnead decided to coach only basketball.



Spackman, Harmon coach spikers for new school record 8-6







Track comes back, no home meets


Track returned to SV and began April 10, but there were no home meets due to scheduling problems and inclement weather.
















Music students captured audience's March 15-16 with their interpretation of the Broadway musical Carousel.

The climax comes when Billy is killed and Julie must raise their child, Louise, alone. This emotional tension is revived when Billy is given a day to return to earth and help those he


loves to decide within themselves to "Walk On" through the trials that may come.

Assemblies display many talents Pride Week assembly honors some


National School Assemblies and student assemblies displayed various feelings of pride in numerous fields of activity.



In the SVHS assembly contest the Senior Class assembly took 1st place with Freshman and Sophomores placing 2nd and 3rd with their original productions.


National School assemblies ranged from mime to magic. Leo Gasca amazed his audience with balancing, acrobatics and mystifying acts.


Tony Stirling presented an animal review with his trained dogs. The canines danced, jumped and balanced themselves into the hearts of the students.

































1977-78 president honored

Signs, crepe paper and balloons adorned the halls, while buttons, hats and stickers added to the attire of SVHS students.




Sophomores gain nine
