












It Was a Time for Thought, A Time for Change

Pac Man fever was a hot one this year along with the popularity of all video games.








Everybody Dance!










Dances add pizazz

Election week means hard work


As election week hit S.V.H.S., so did the cookies, cupcakes, buttons, and divided halls with red posters on one side, gold on the other.





Many of the teachers here at S.V.H.S. receive additional help in their classes from students known as Teacher Aids.







SVHS Business as usual


381 students enrolled in one or more business class this year. Classes varied in size from 73 who took Type I to 11 kids enrolled in Business Law.




"His speech may either make or break many chances to get ahead," stated Mrs. Wray, senior English teacher. She was not talking about an especially gifted student either. She was talking about every student

Students must learn that good communication is essential for their futures. English should be taken seriously. As one teacher stated, "The students are the future leaders of our country."






Heading the yearbook staff was Tara Bateman. With the small staff everyone had to work hard.


The photography department, headed by Veldon Izatt, contributed hours of work and hundreds of photos to help put out the publications.


Math Department figures it out

College acceptance is becoming more strict in the area of math and future policies may require more math for the high school student to keep up with the economic and computerized systems of the world.





Under the direction of Mr. Neil Tippets, the mixed chorus participated in several events, including the annual Christmas concert and the production of the school musical, "Music Man."
















With the addition of Doug Broadhead to the Social Studies department, things really took off this year.




















Our Time to Shine















Freshmen look ahead

At the Awards Assembly held on May 17, many of S.V.H.S.'s outstanding seniors were recognized and given various awards of achievement.













Regional Champs, Third at State




Freshmen and JV set up a perfect season




Height was added to our team as Seniors Phil Davis and Dave Draney gave the lift we needed to make our shots count.






JV looking good, getting better


Battling through a building year





Tracksters come out champions

After a good finish last year, the Braves' tracksters put on an awesome show this year. For the third time, the Star Valley Braves became regional champions, and then went on to capture the State title.

Girls' Track blazes through season







On February 25 they traveled to Casper where they cheered the wrestlers on to the state championship.













SAE expands


Members of the innovative music group participated in numerous festivals, which were all hosted here. Performances featured both modern and classic jazz tunes.







Drama: Take two



Jr. Legislature hosts regionals






Candidates for boys' and girls' state spent seven days of total exhaustion representing our school in Powell this year.
