






become.
















Weekends gave us a chance to get to know new people outside of school. They gave us a taste of adulthood with responsibility of





pring break brings to mind tropical places, mountain trails, and freedom from work.


However, the sad reality of the matter is most of us spend our time here in Star Valley. This year some lucky students visited places that the rest of us only dreamed about.


Spring break finally arrives an eternity after Christmas. We have to endure nearly three full months of solid school, making that first week in April all the more enjoyable.









School, let's face it— that's what we are here for; we had knowledge crammed into our little brains wether we liked it or not.




in life. The classes also brought out hidden talents that students didn't know they had.




"There is no 'team title,'" said Guild, "Just individuals... one in four win a ribbon [for their art work]"


The team definitely had "big fight" this year, but thanks to Worland they ended up placing 4th in the state.








work with. They worked very well together [because they] worked on teamwork," stated Coach Frazier.







Inning the second consecutive trophy for the Star Valley Braves wrestling team, our boys did it again.


Not only did they win state but they also scored a record high in team points for the state, ever!





Although the boys returned from Casper without a first place trophy, they never lost their determination; as Coach Erickson said about the team, "Big hearts-never say die-never quit!"





The cheerleaders don't have anything to dance to. Can you imagine the game-time atmosphere if we had no pep band to pump out the music during Braves' games?


Thank goodness we have the pep band. Every home game these devoted, musically-talented students show up to play


Publications for the


Freshmen Finish First Year

Don't worry. Every junior faced the same situation, and it was perfectly normal for you to feel a little (or more than a little) scared about the next step: senior year.








