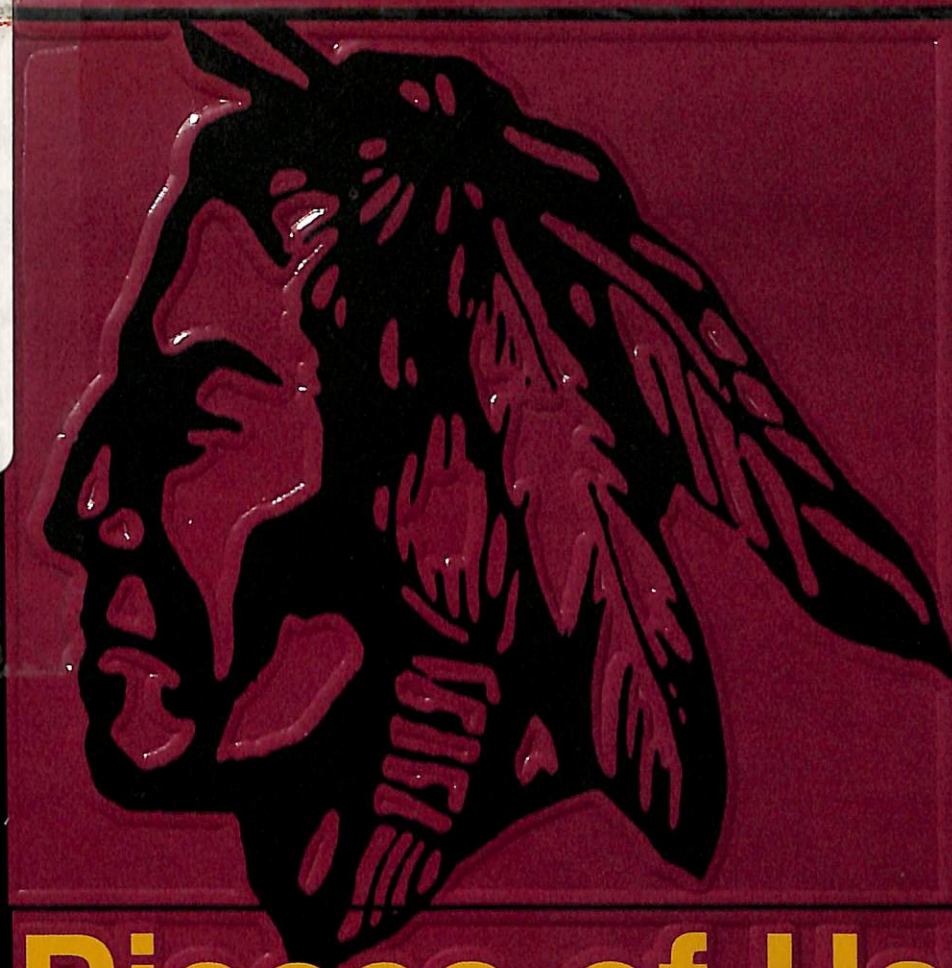

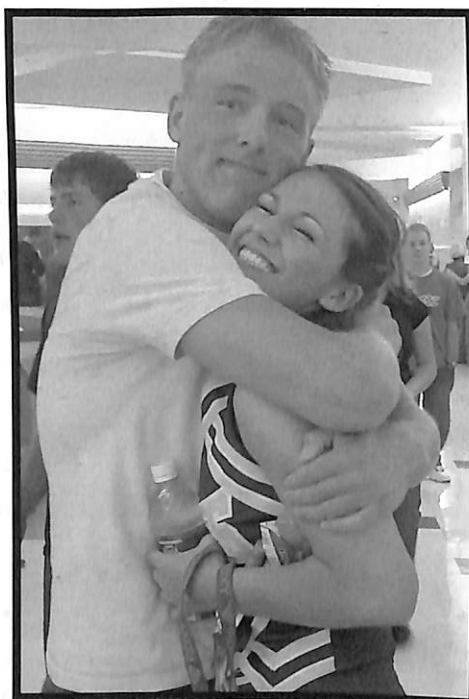
Pieces of Us

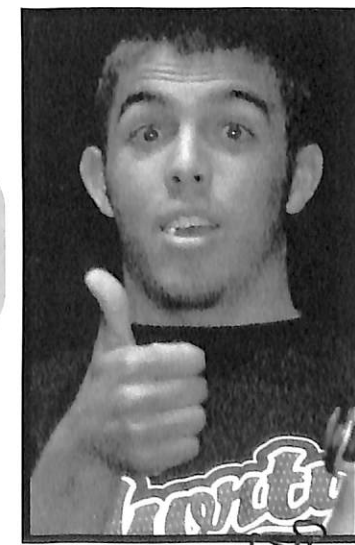


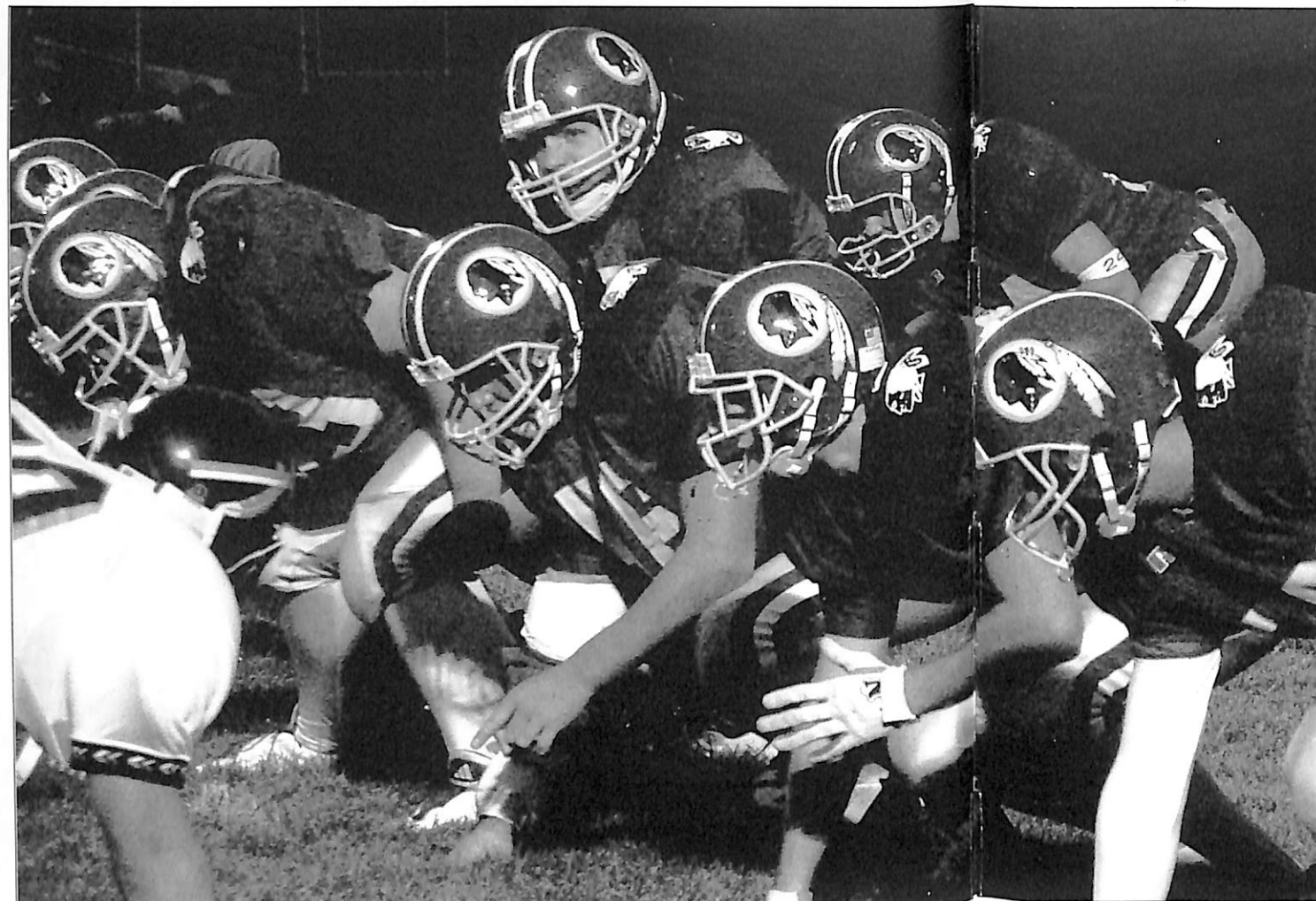

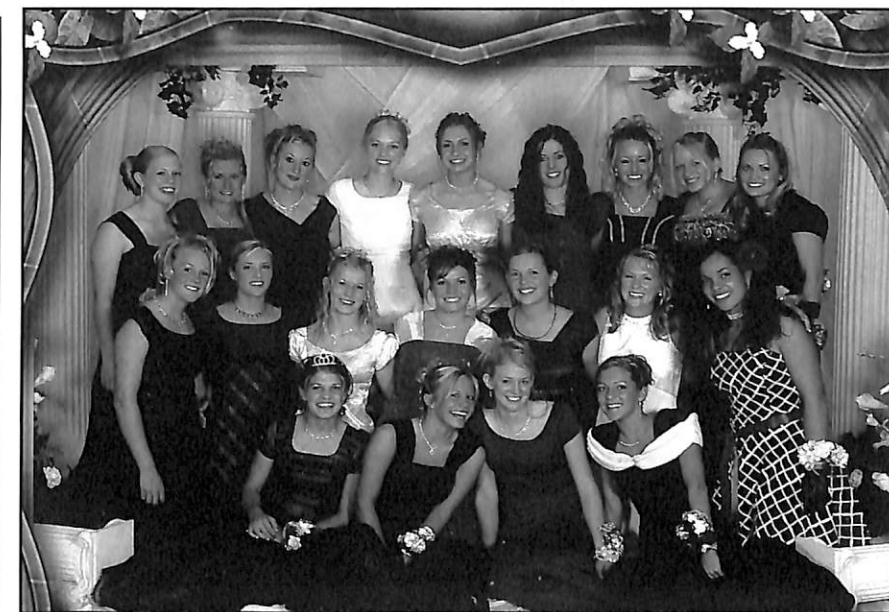
Cheerleaders Decorate a Beautiful Night

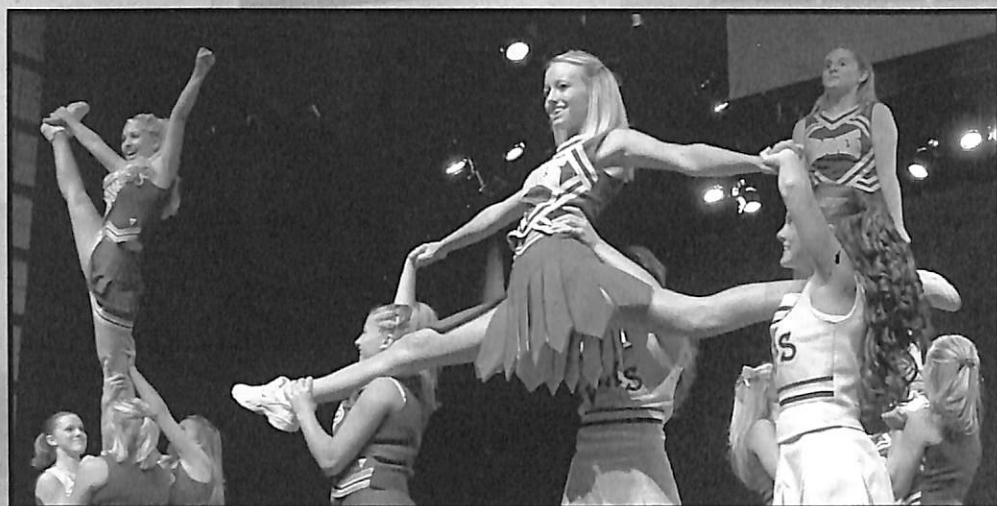

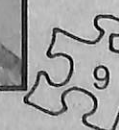

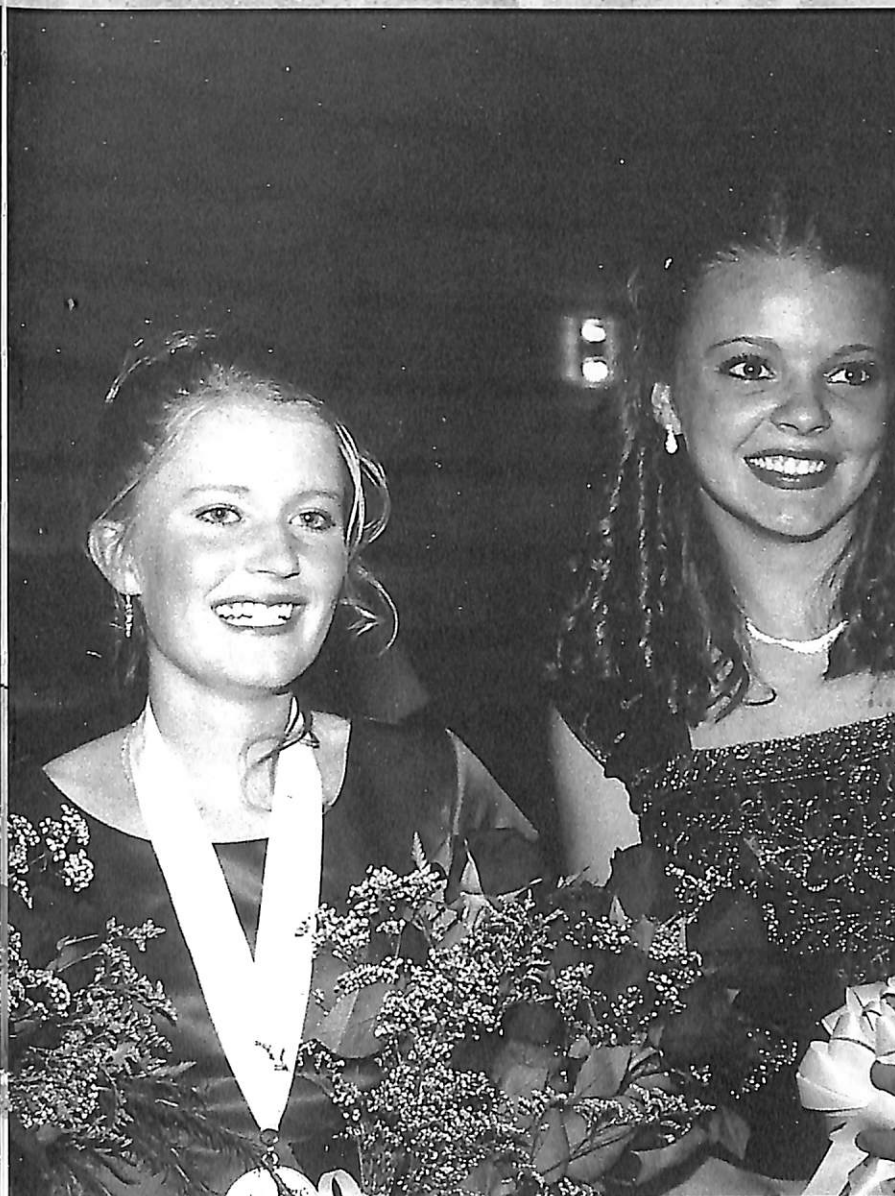
and judges, creating a most enjoyable night. This year's Junior Miss pageant truly did live up to its theme of "Once in a Lifetime."

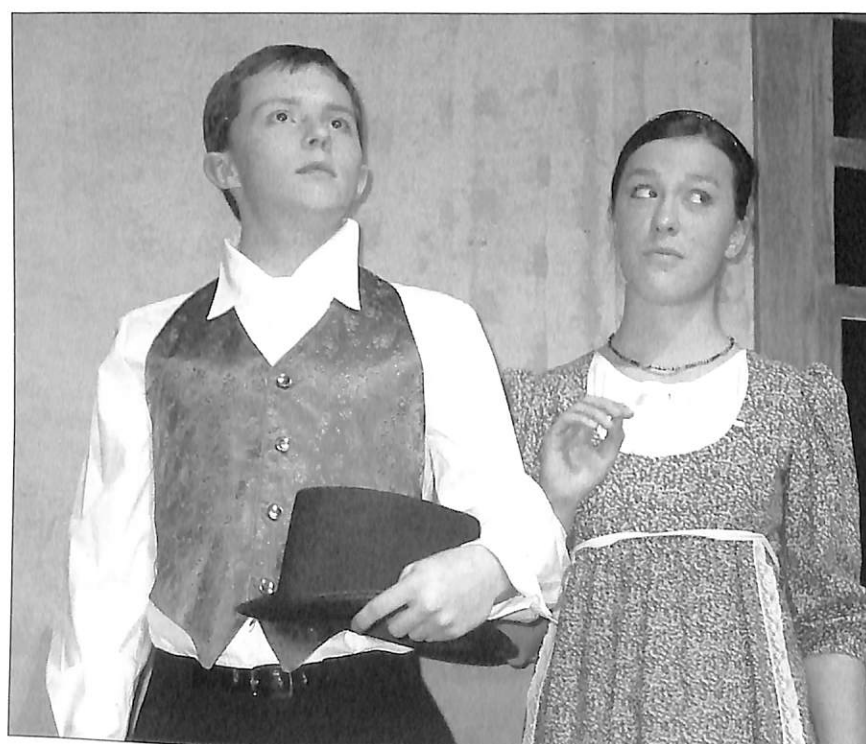

Then there are those of us who

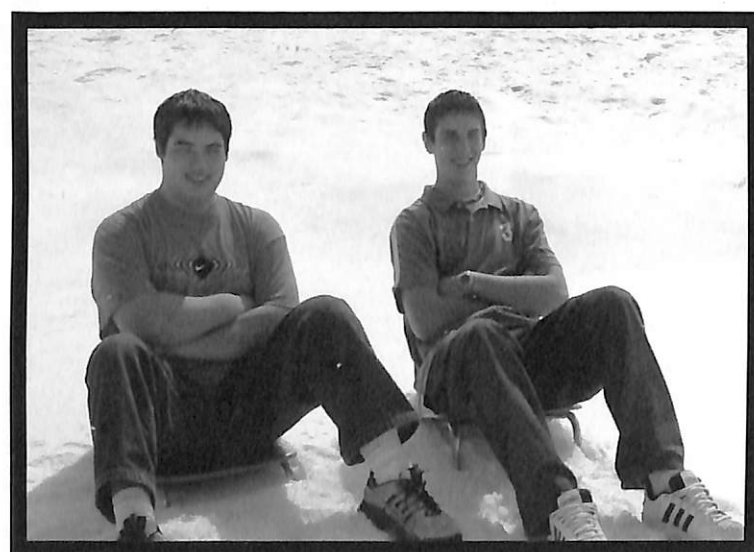
choose to take the risk of frost bite and take advantage of the fresh powder.

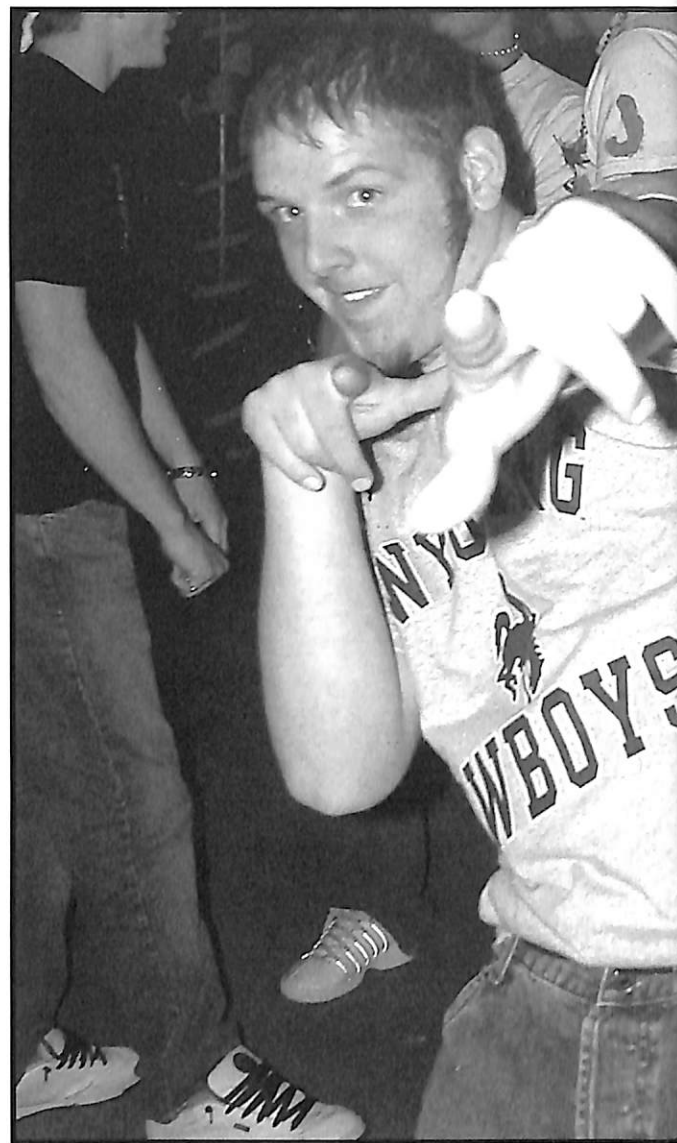

Bringing Diversity Together

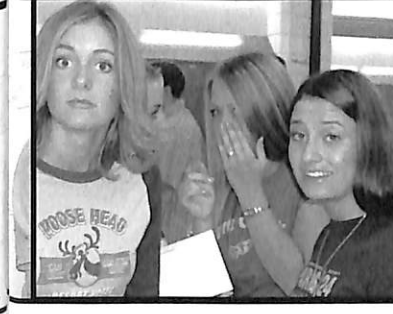

Weekends Work!

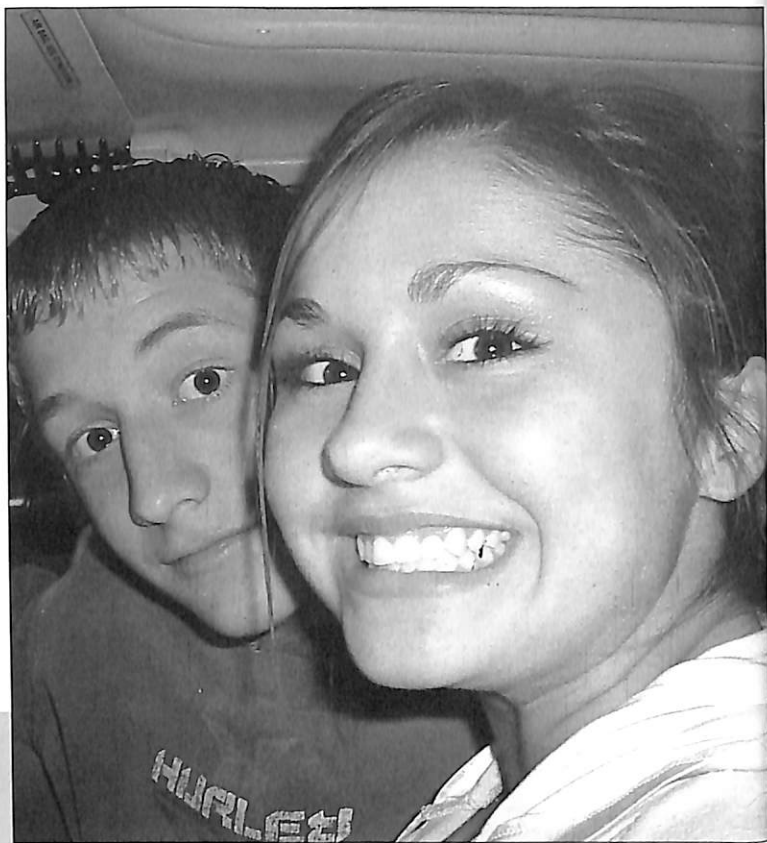
Where would we be without Friday, Saturday, and Sunday?

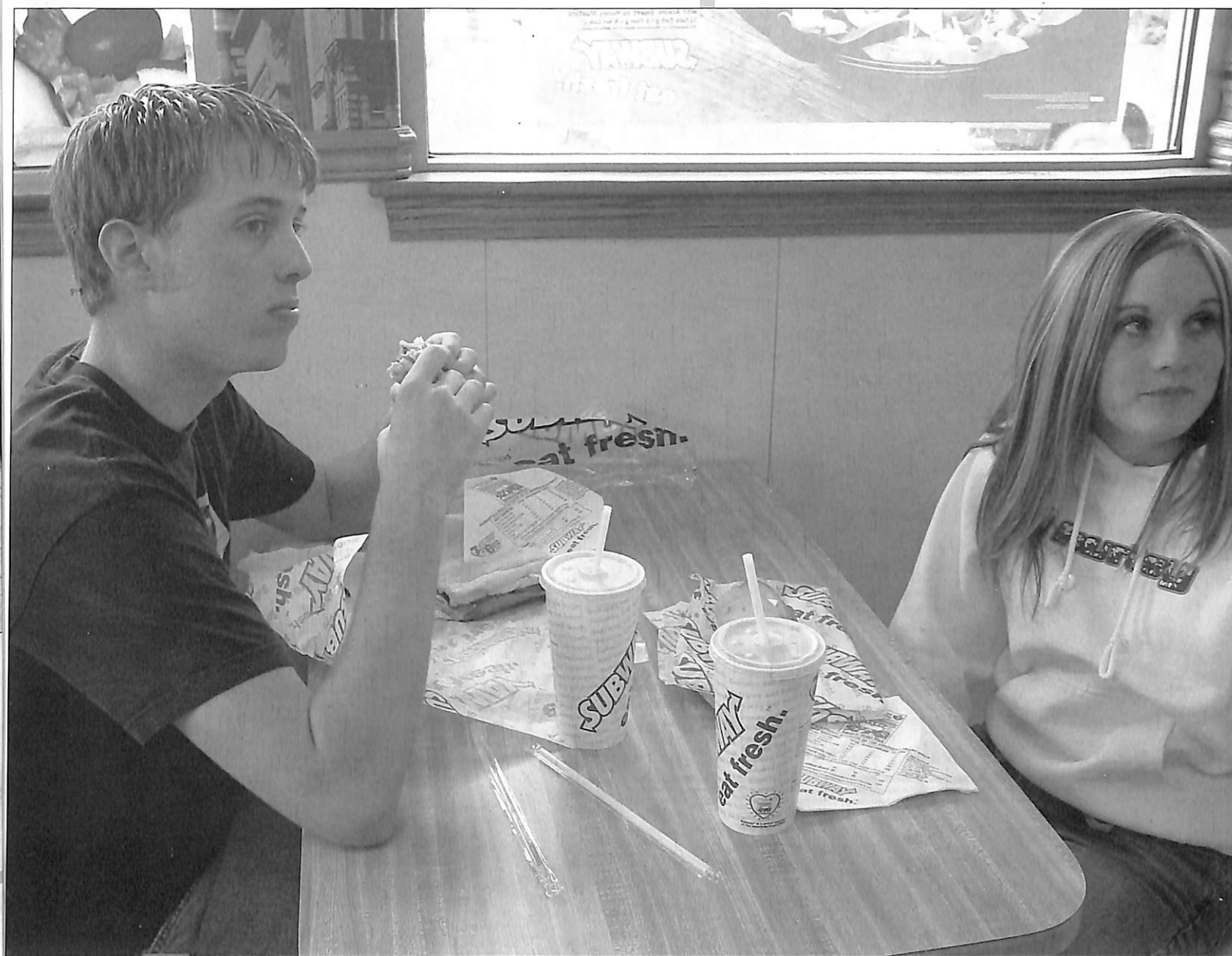
When 4th hour came to an end each Friday afternoon, we students used those three days to unwind and relax, otherwise we may have cracked under the pressures of high school.

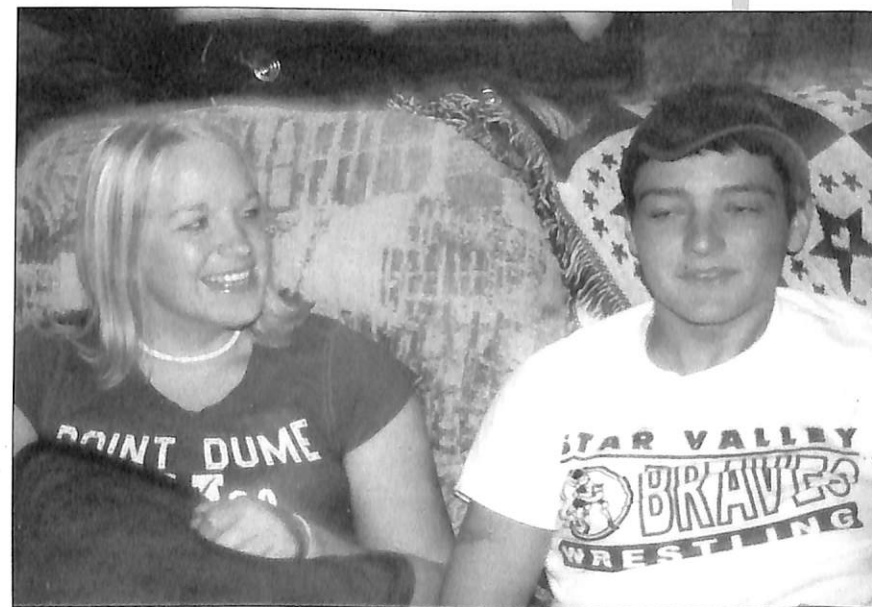

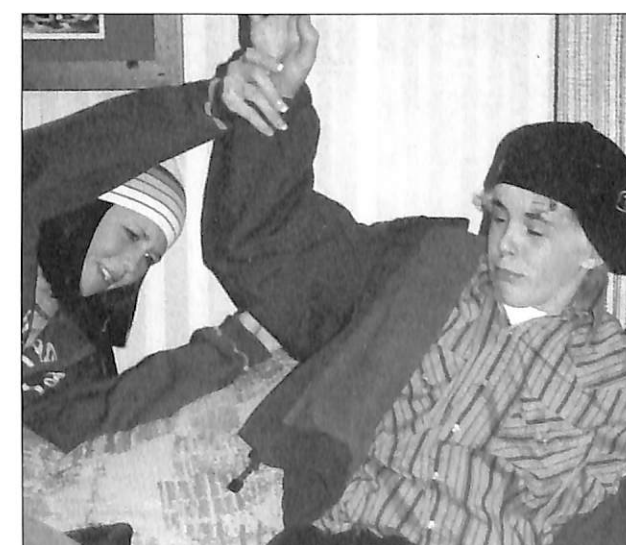

This year the Prom-goers felt like they were stepping into Hollywood with all the elaborate decorations the junior class put up. Stars hung from the ceiling,

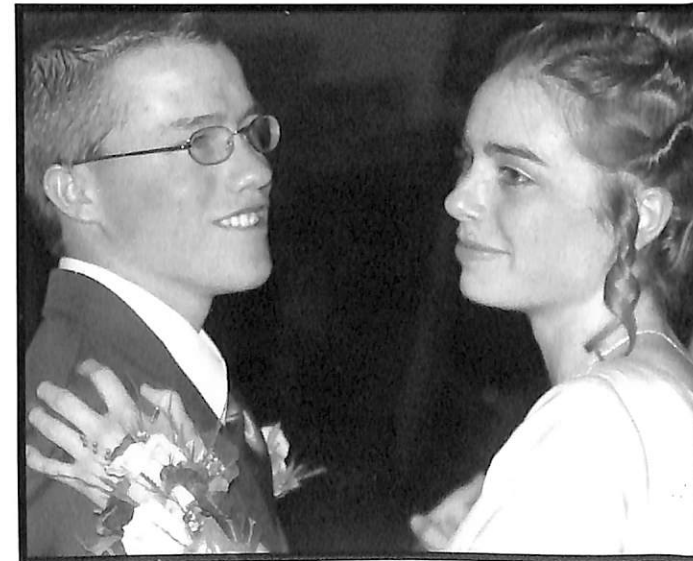
and the royalty walked on red carpet.

Spring break brings to mind tropical places, mountain trails, and freedom from work.

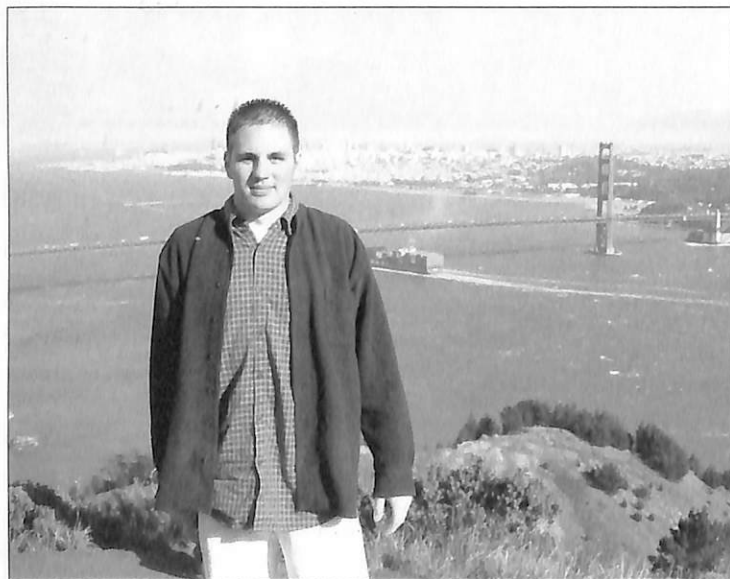
However, the sad reality of the matter is most of us spend our time here in Star Valley. This year some lucky students visited places that the rest of us only dreamed about.

Without a week off in April, we would never make it through to May. No matter what the teachers may tell you, they couldn't handle it either.

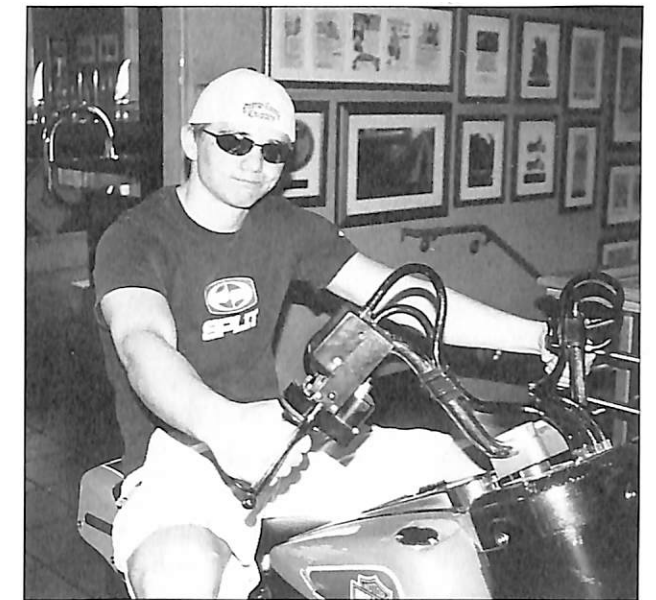

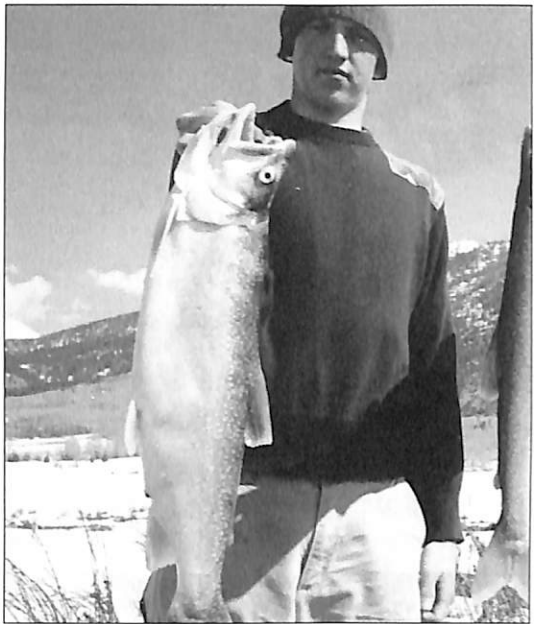
Hunting is such a big deal here in SVHS that we celebrate it with a few days out of school during fall break. Some of the most successful hunters in the state walked the halls of our school this year.

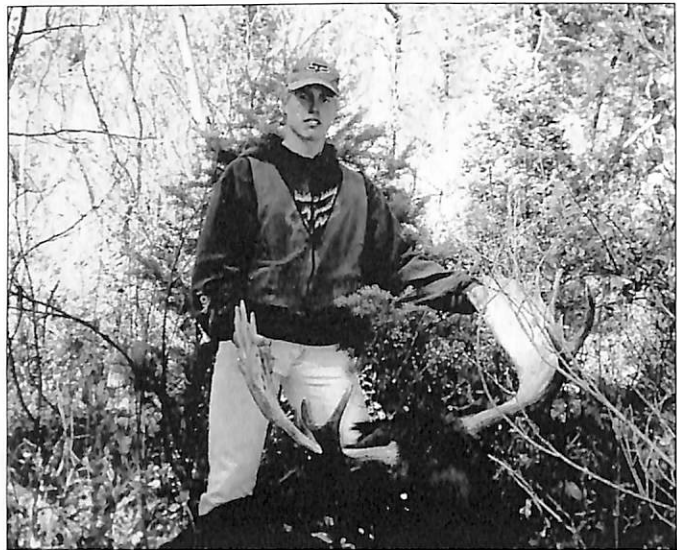

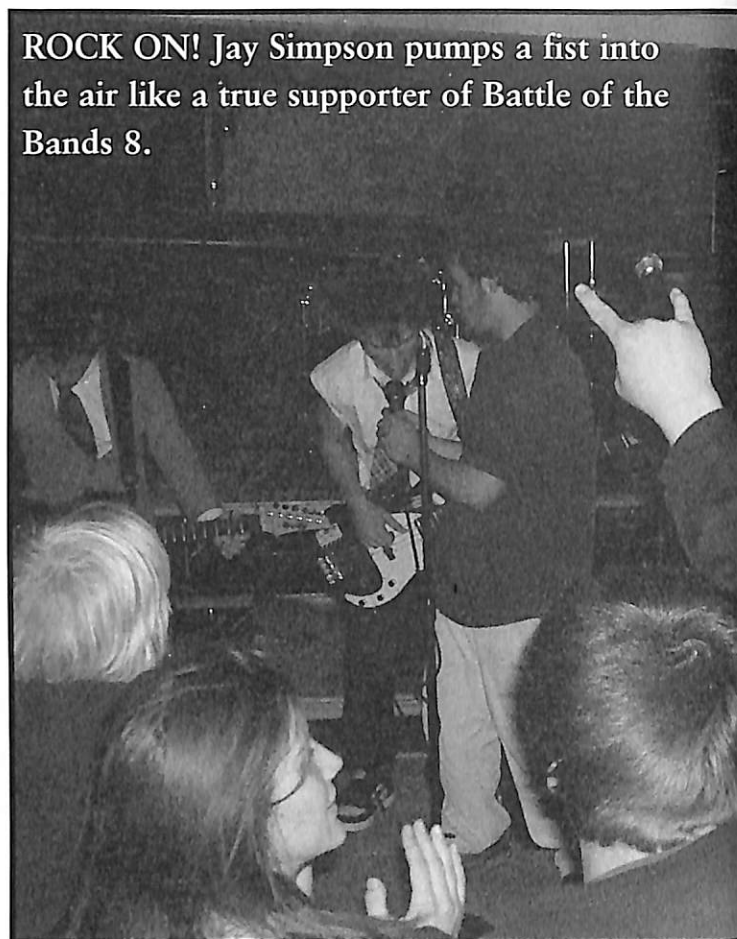

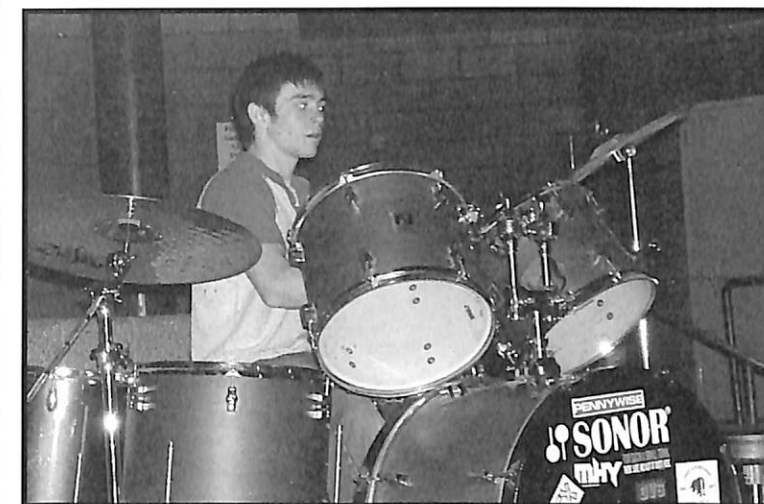

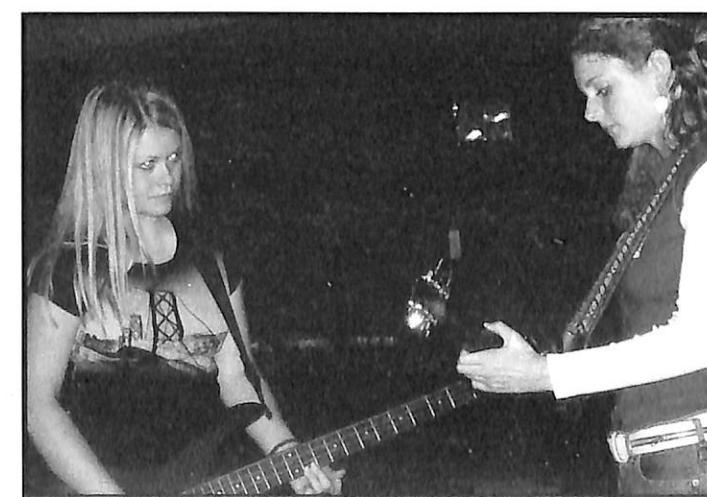
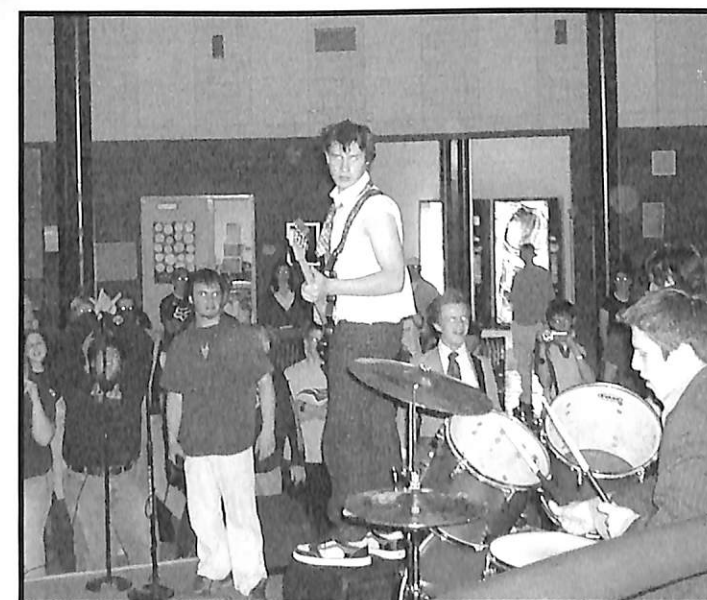

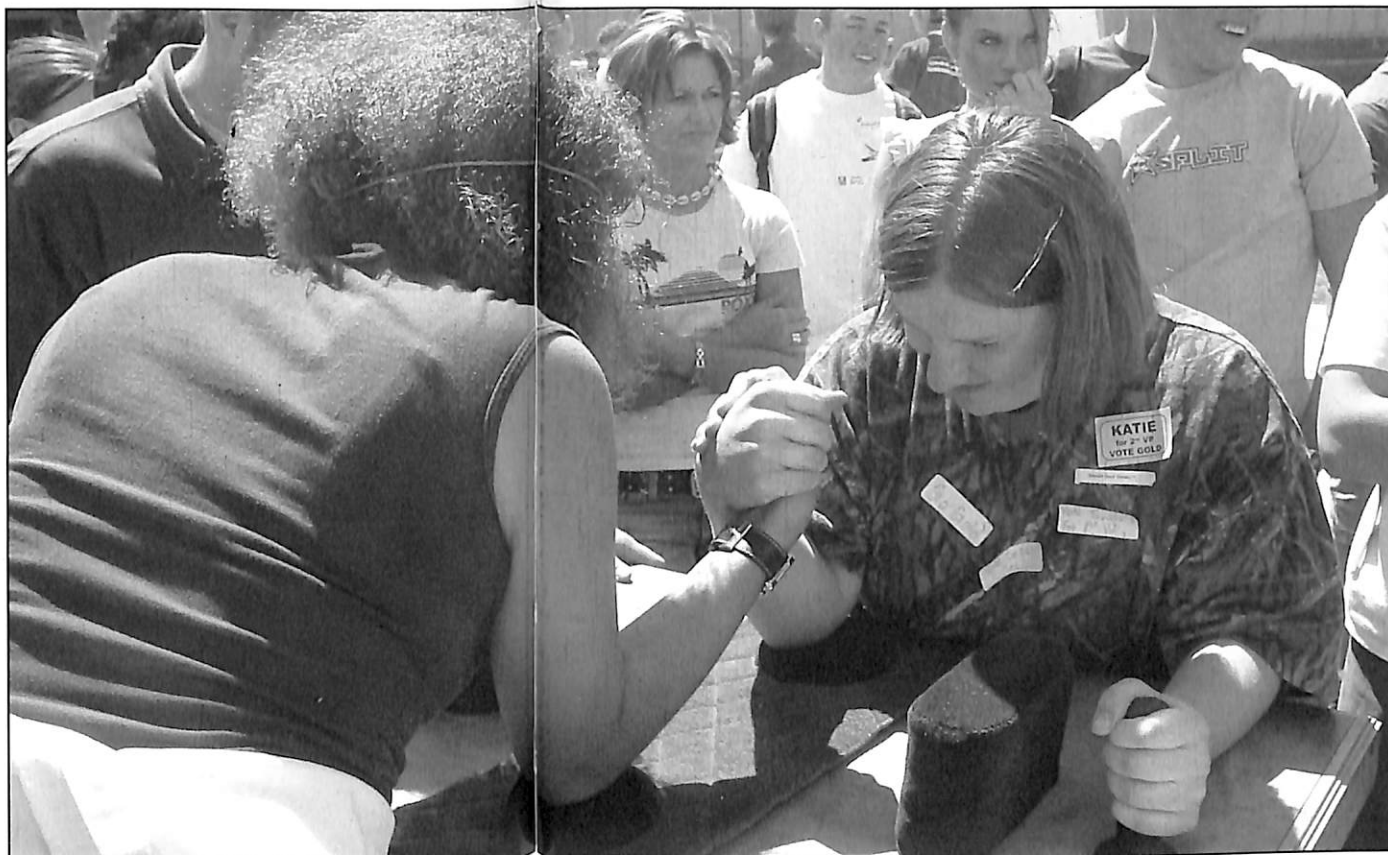

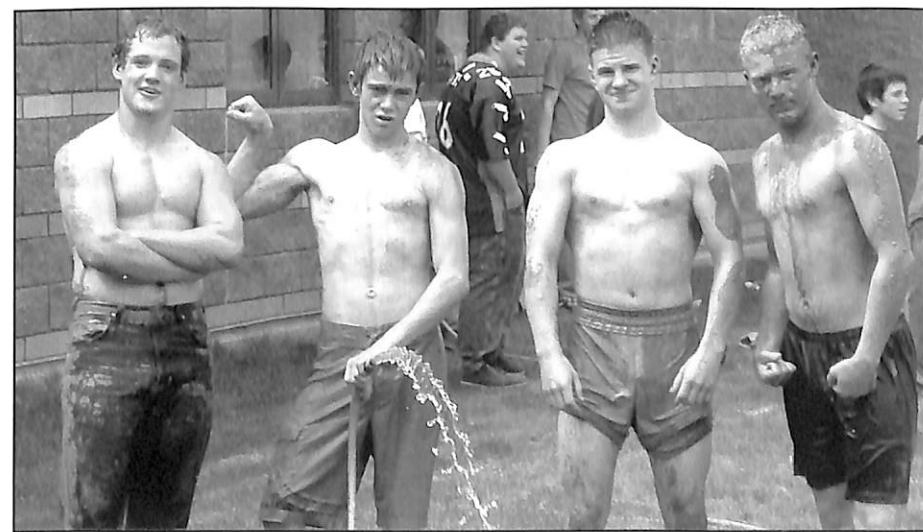

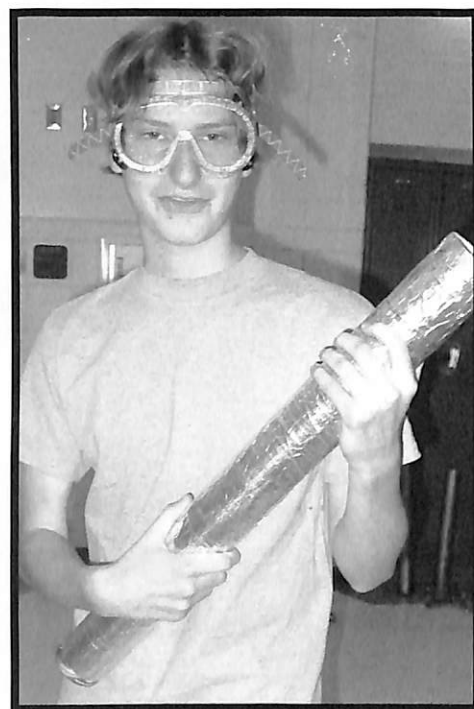

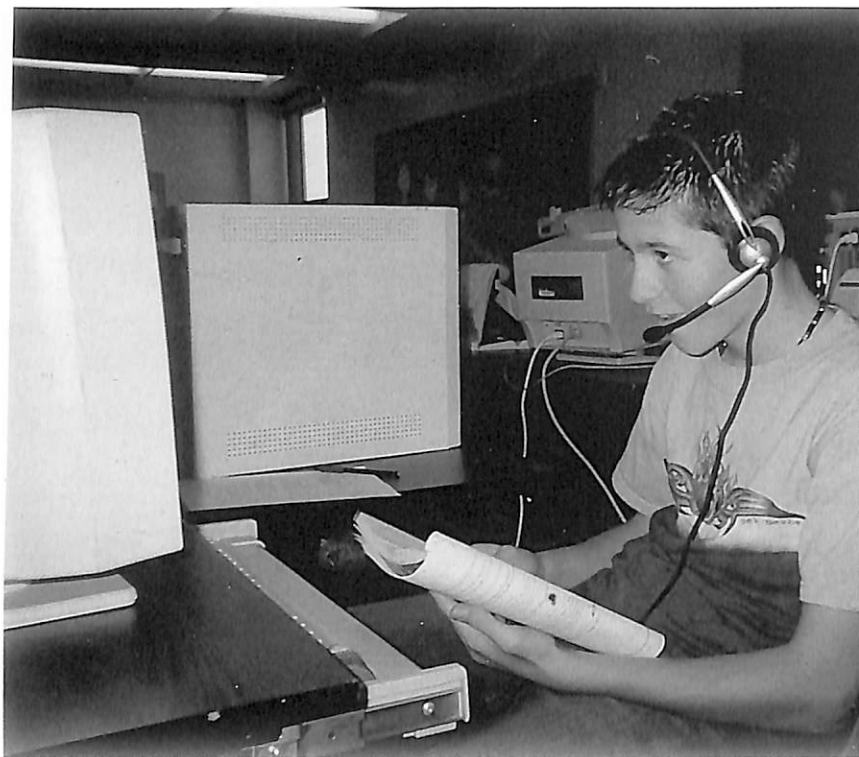

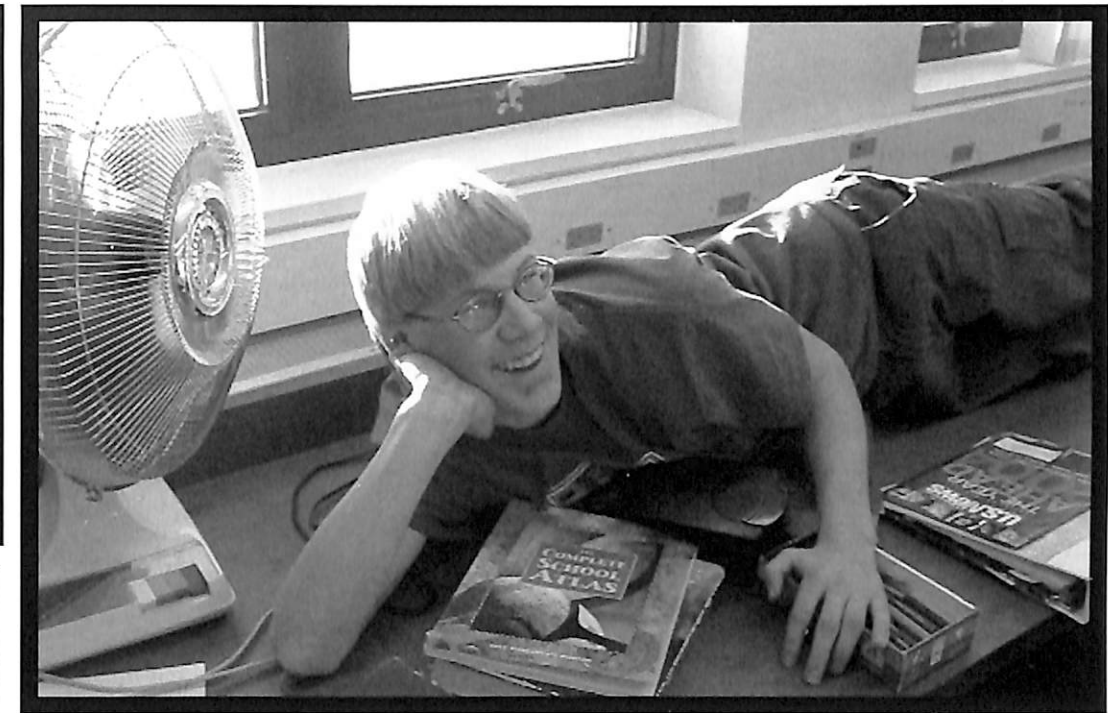
Literature and History fill the all ready overflowing minds of students

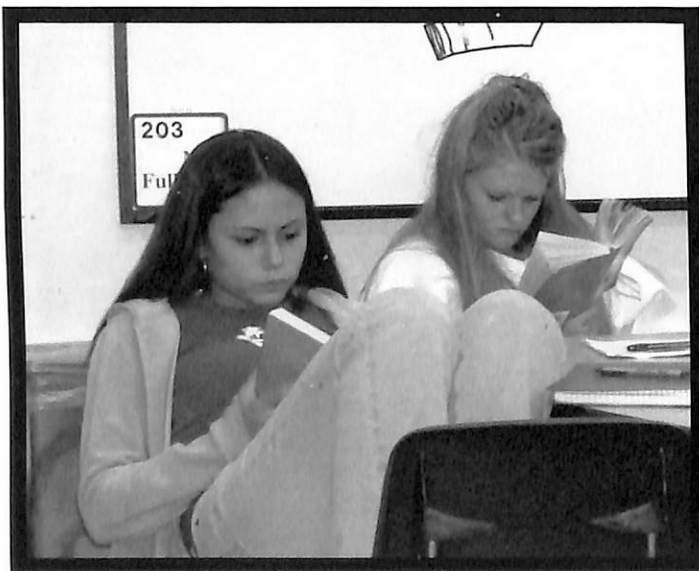

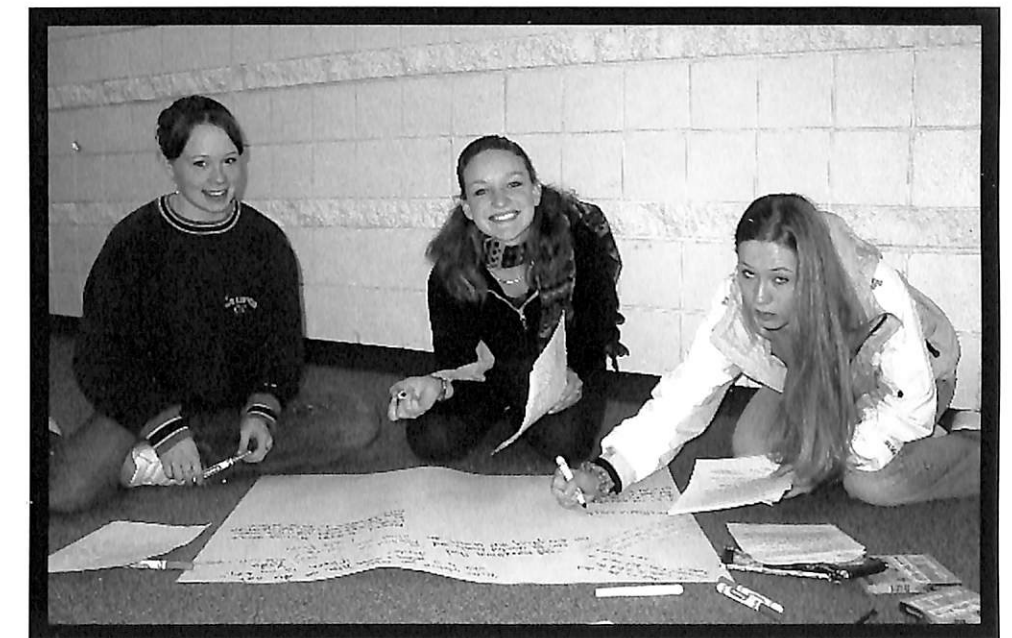

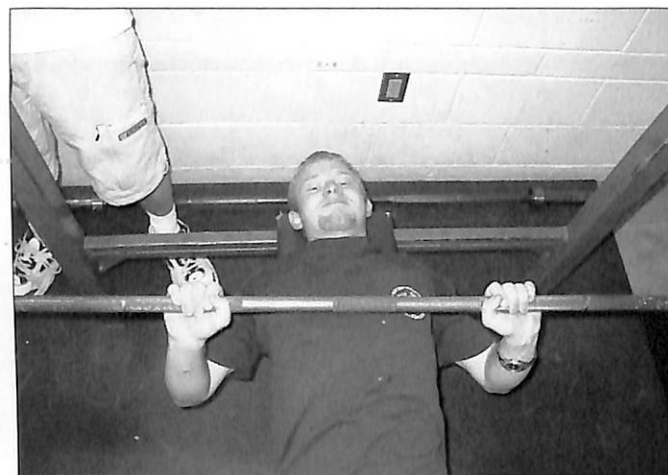

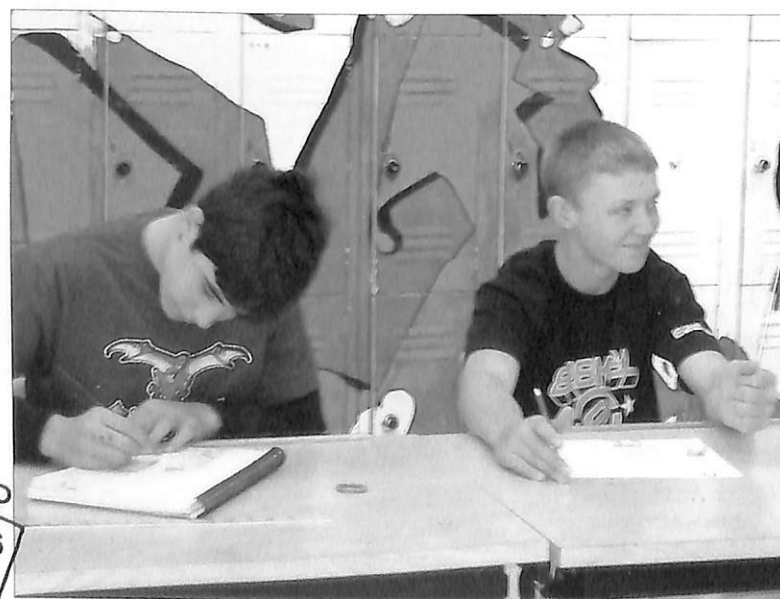

sportsmanship are qualities that our coaches teach these students.

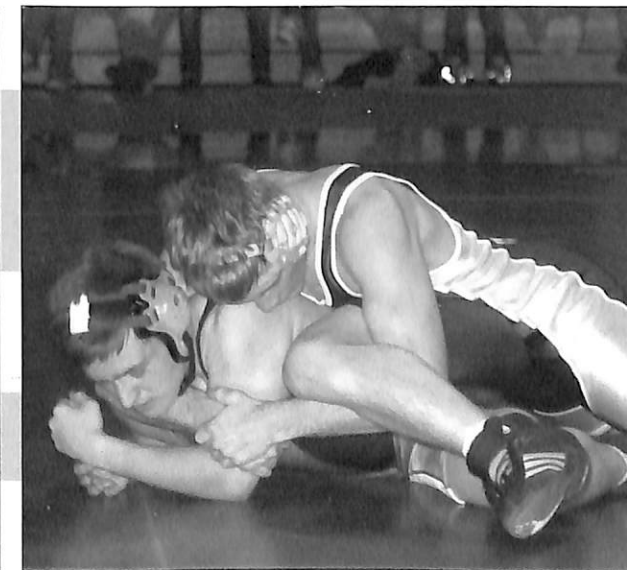
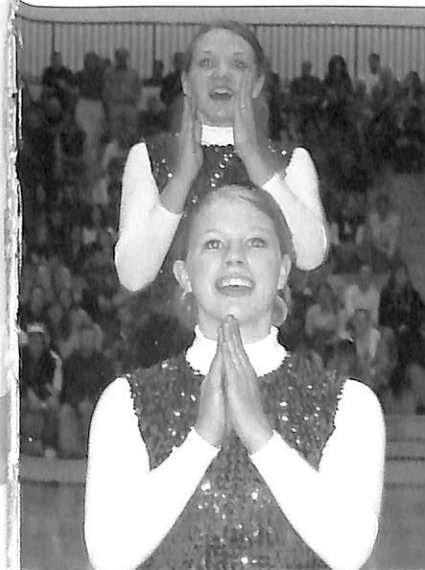

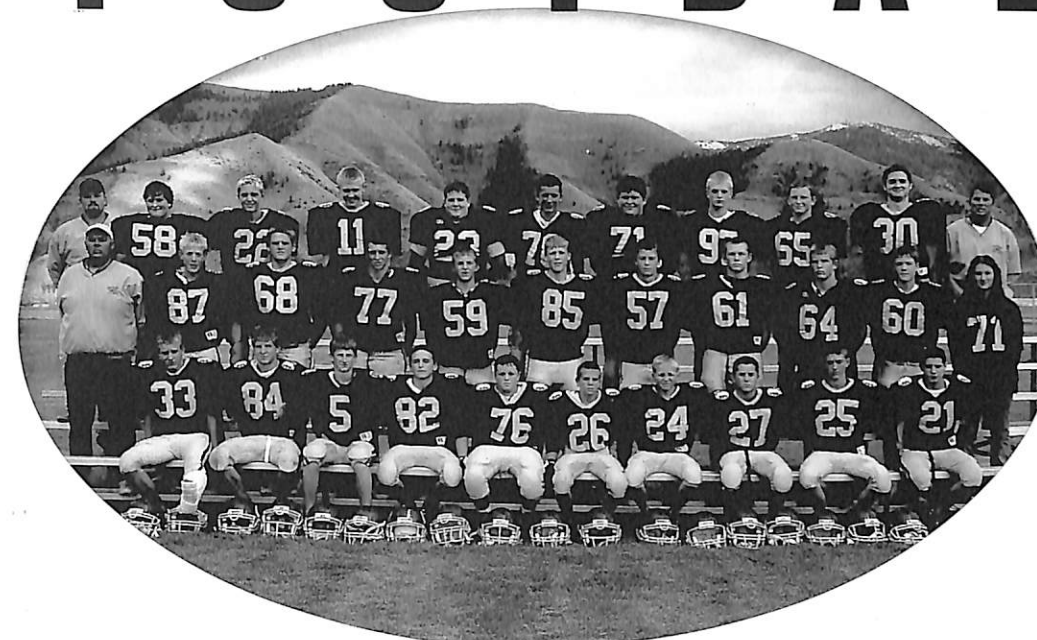

Teamwork pays off. Any of the volleyball girls who worked for hours - on any given school night would agree that practice is one of the most important elements of any sport.

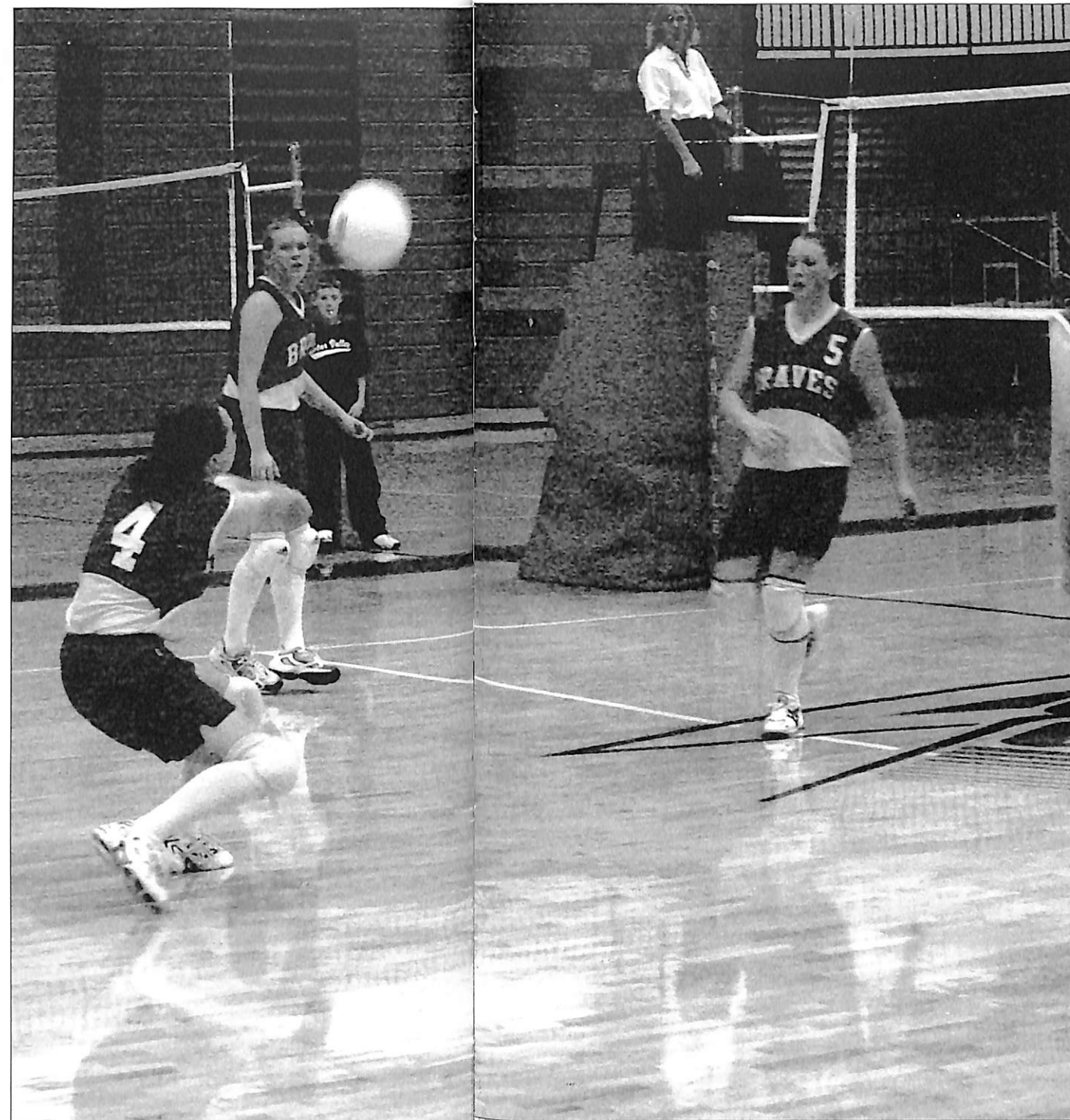

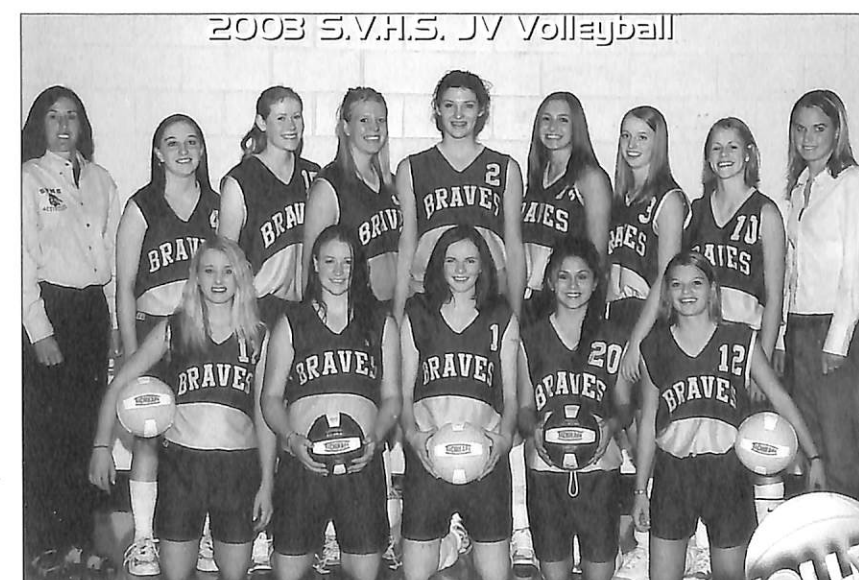

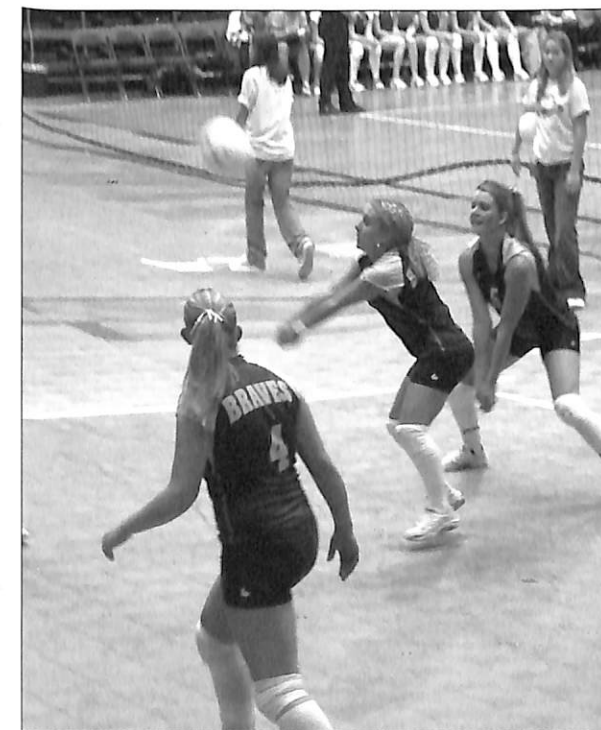

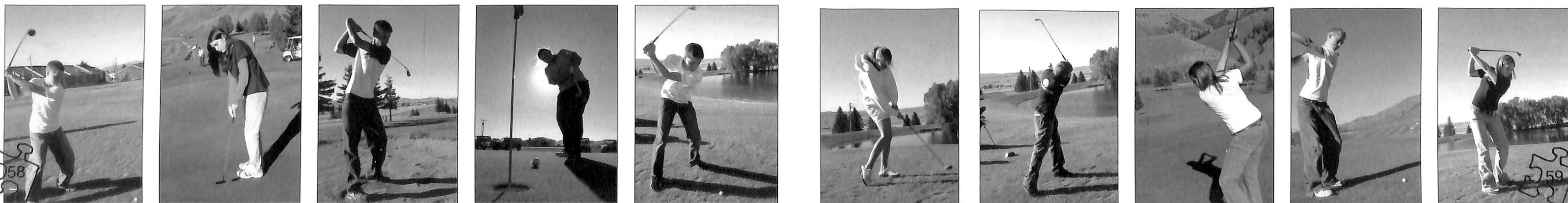

Winning the second consecutive trophy for the Star Valley Braves wrestling team, our boys did it again.

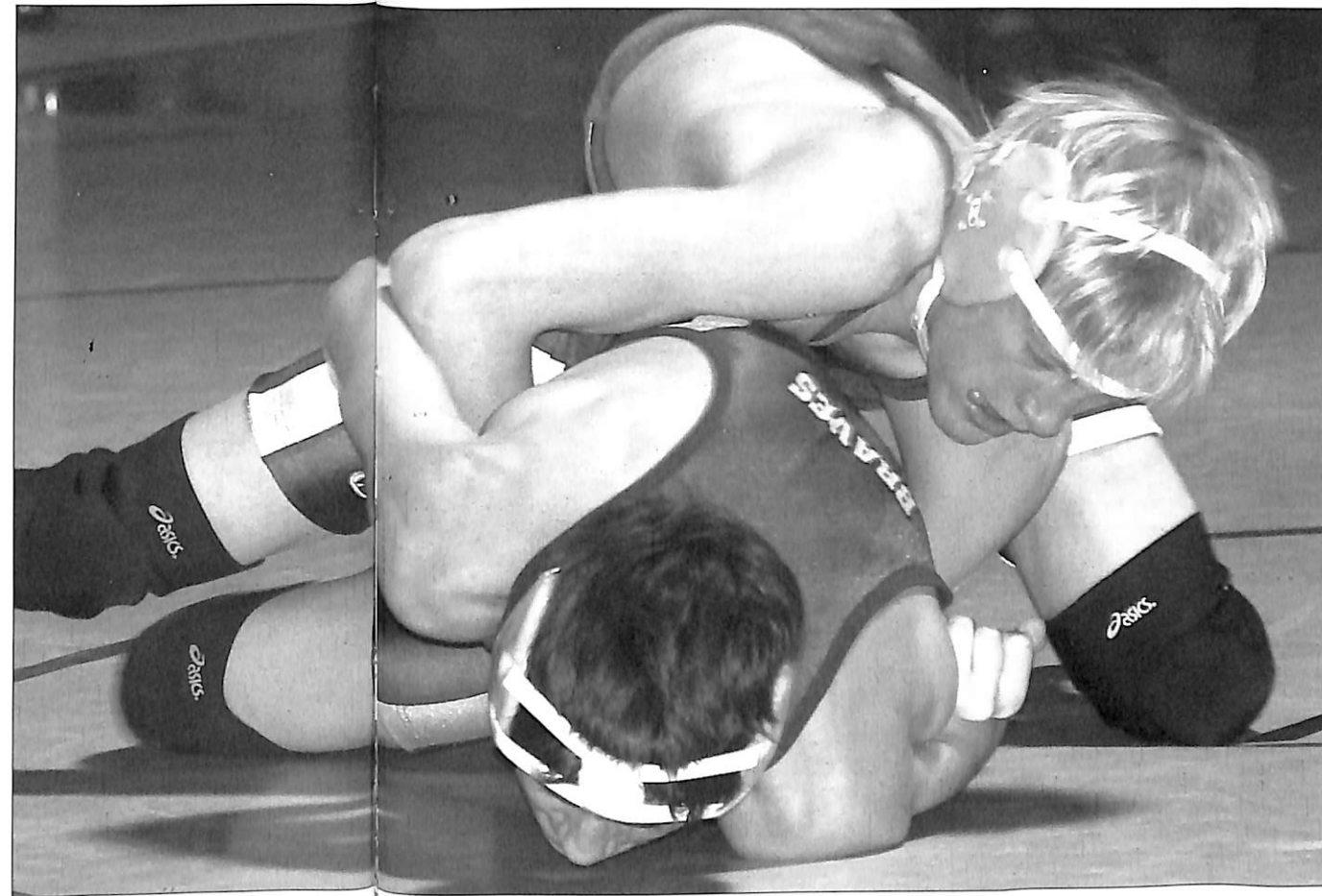
Not only did they win state but they also scored a record high in team points for the state, ever!

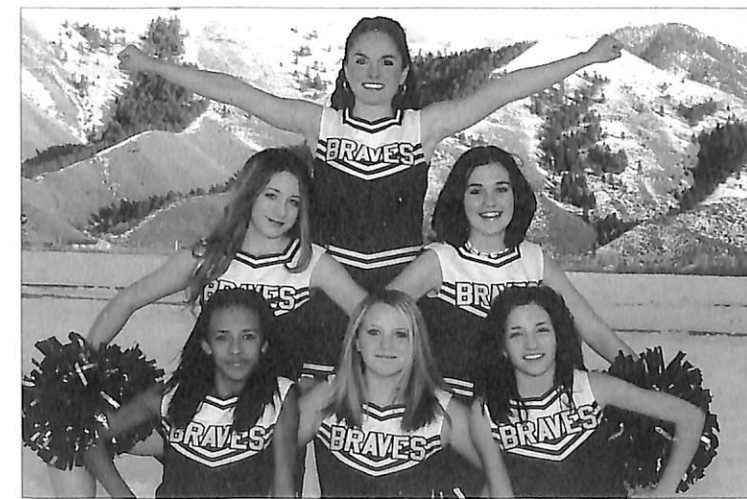

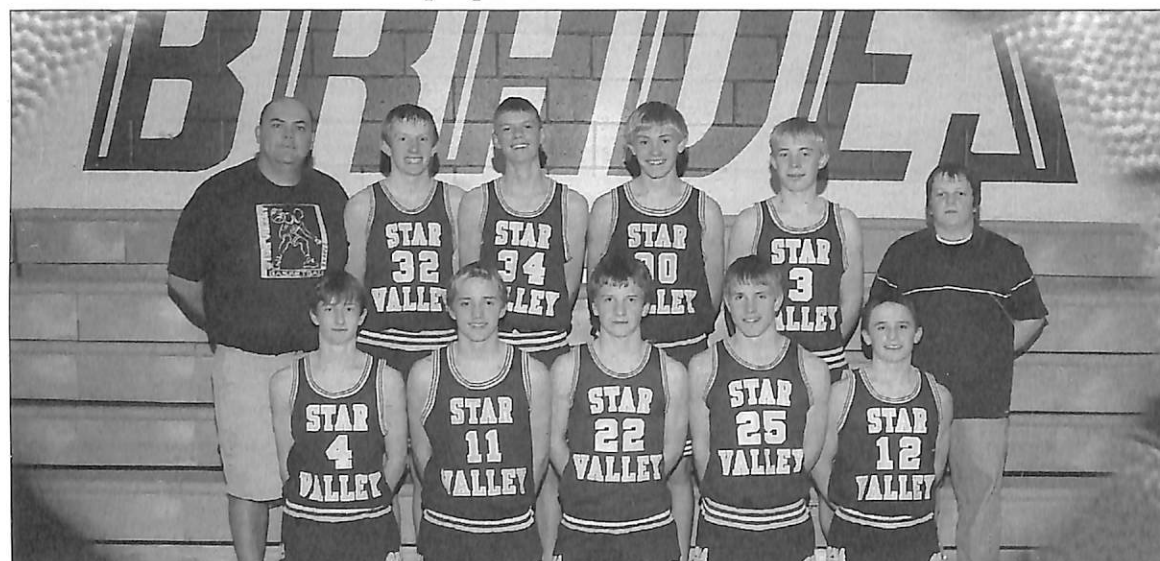

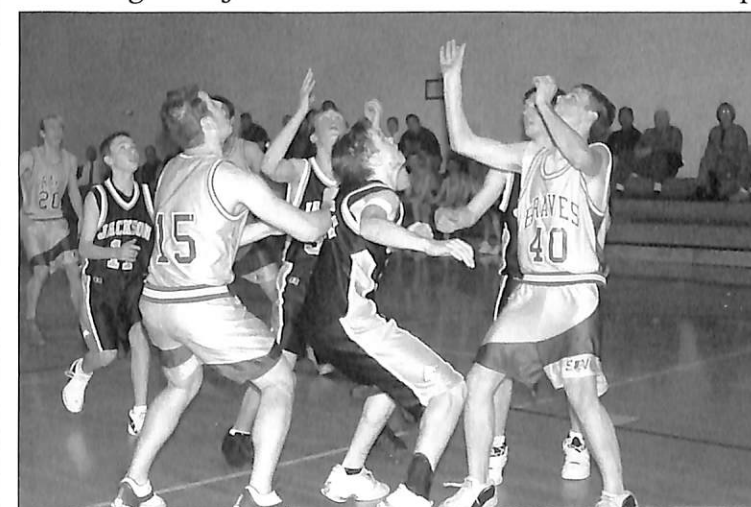

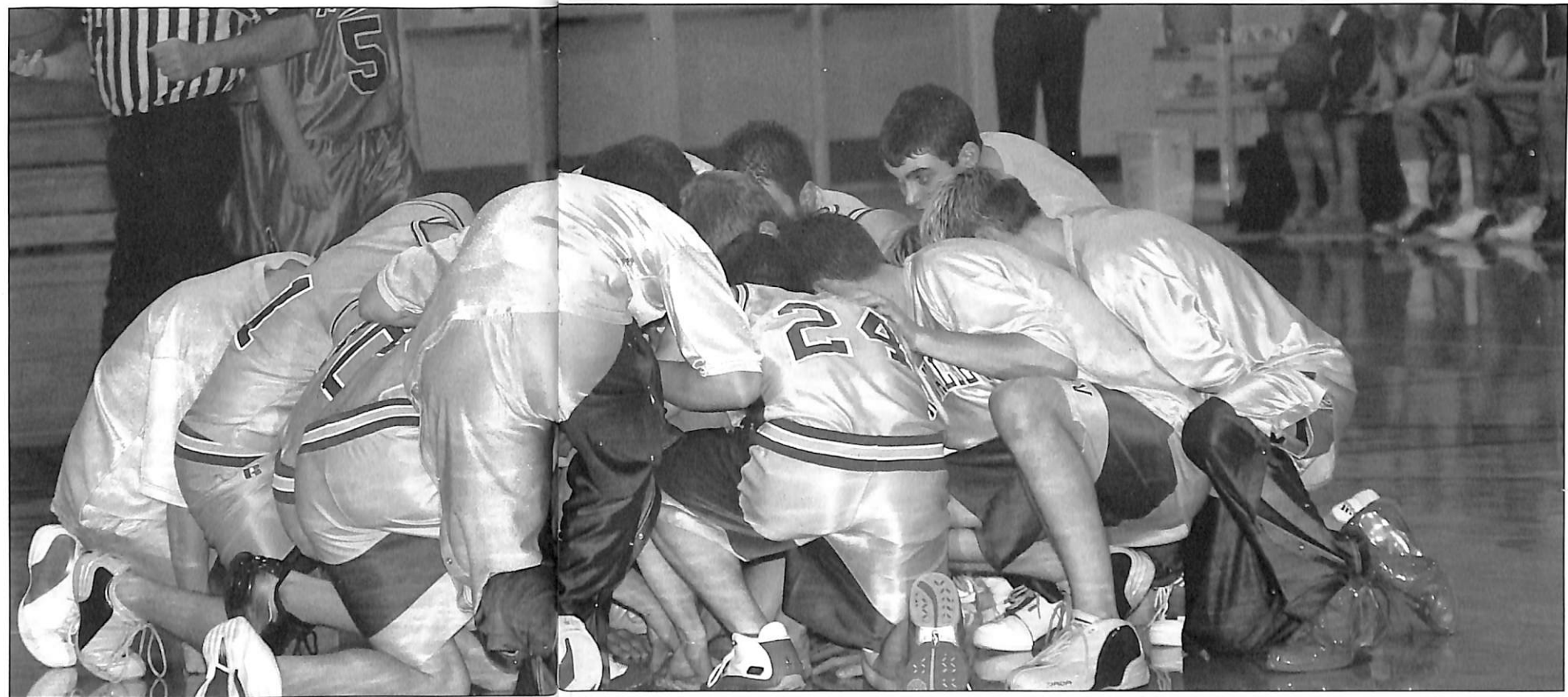
Varsity Basketball Finishes Third

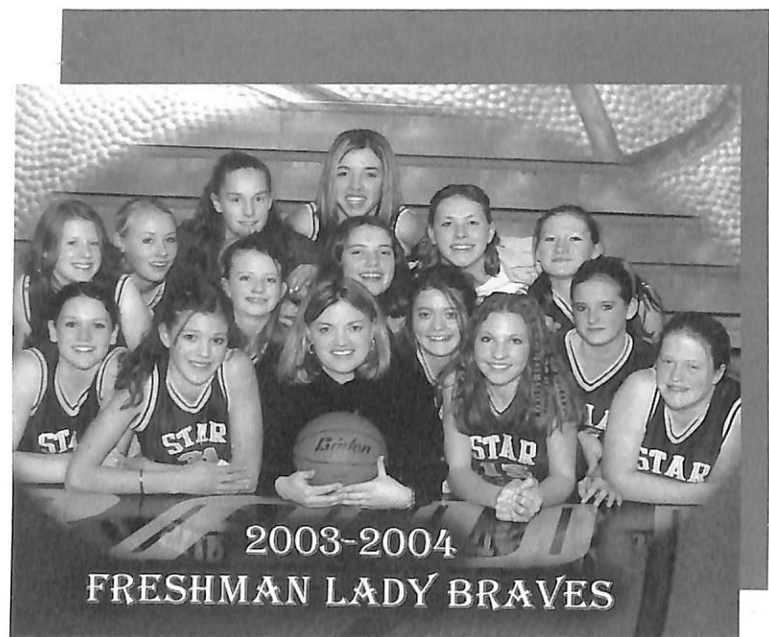

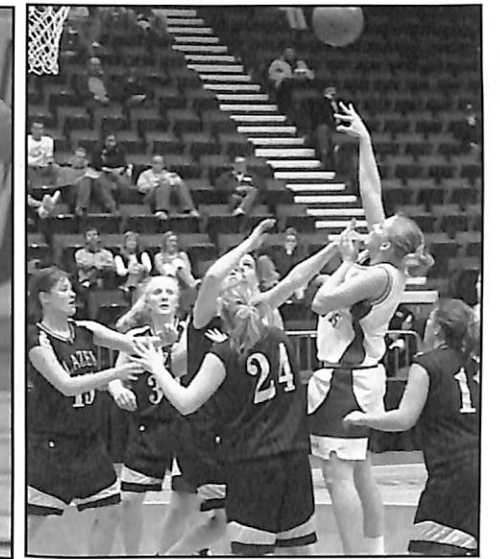

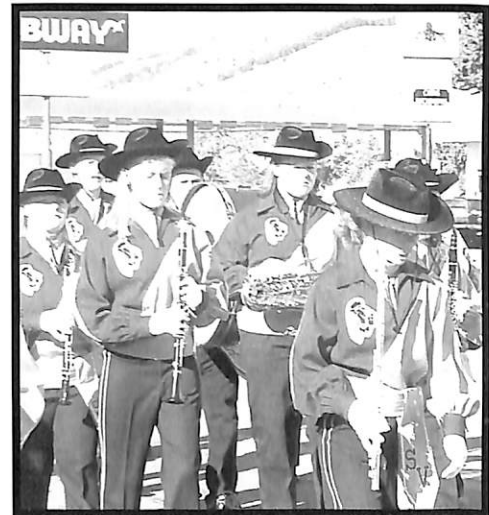

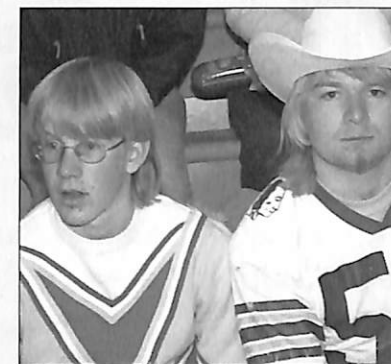

include Taco Time (now including Samuri Sams), Subway, and the seasonal Red Baron.

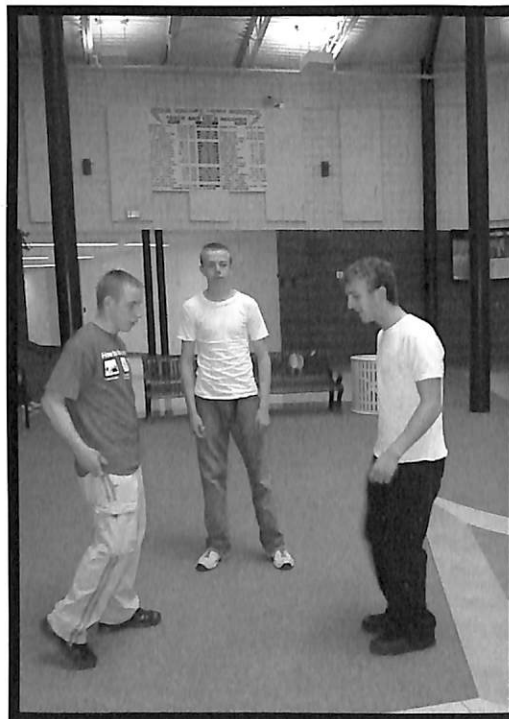

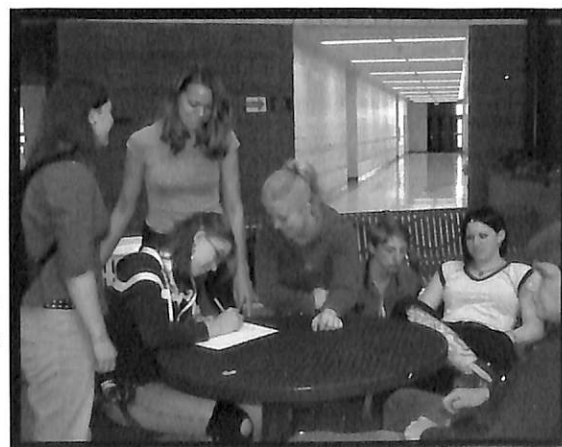

movies, enjoying a bowling night, tie-dying the champions shirts, going swimming in Jackson, and traveling to Casper to support our basketball teams and dance squads.

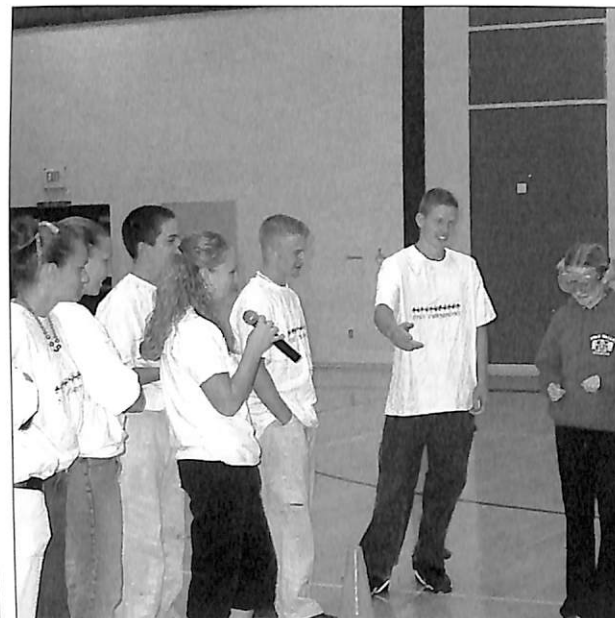
This fun club helped get students involved in improving our school. Not only did the members have fun, but they did great work with the elementary schools where the students look up to them.

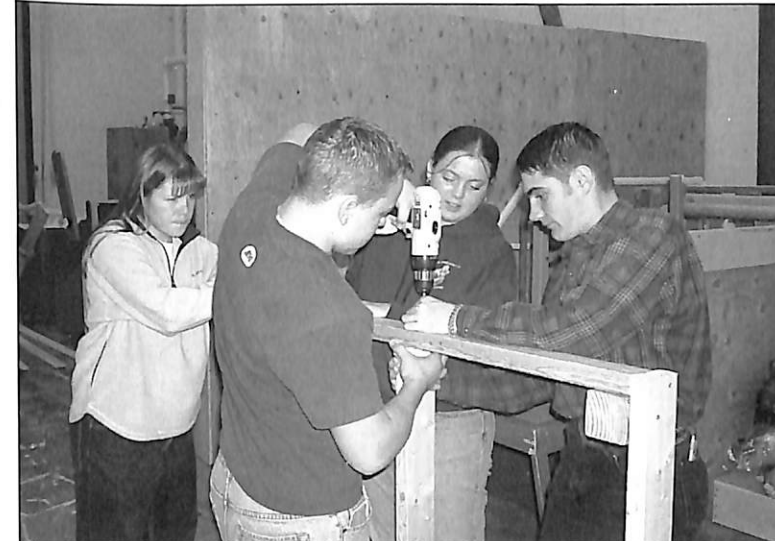
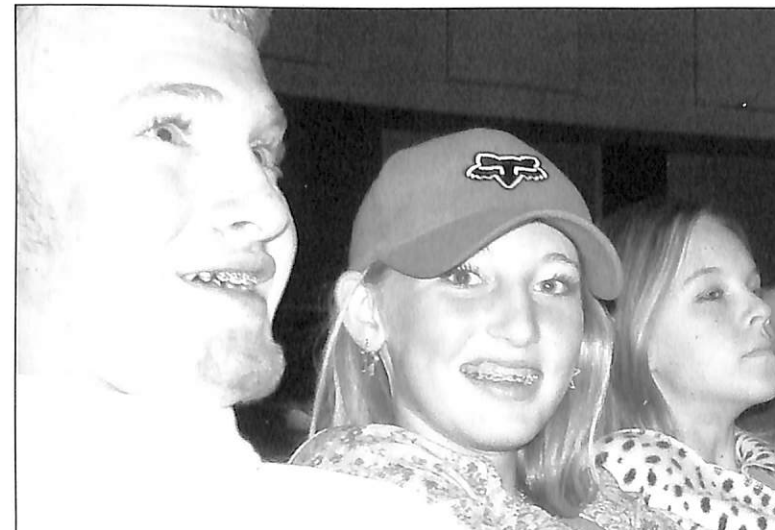

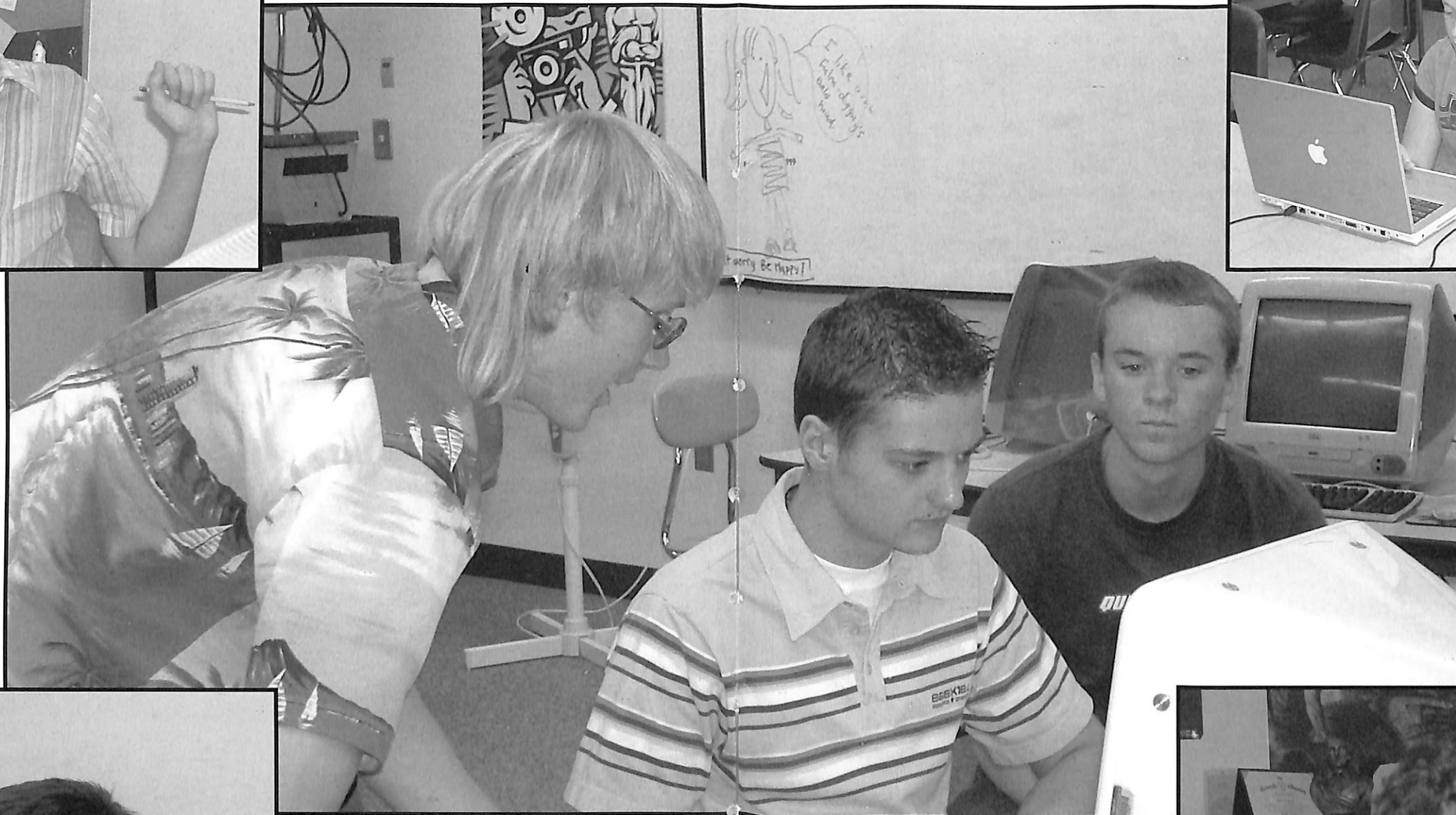

Through long meets, excruciating bus rides, and newly-made friends, speech is an organization that created memories for a lifetime.

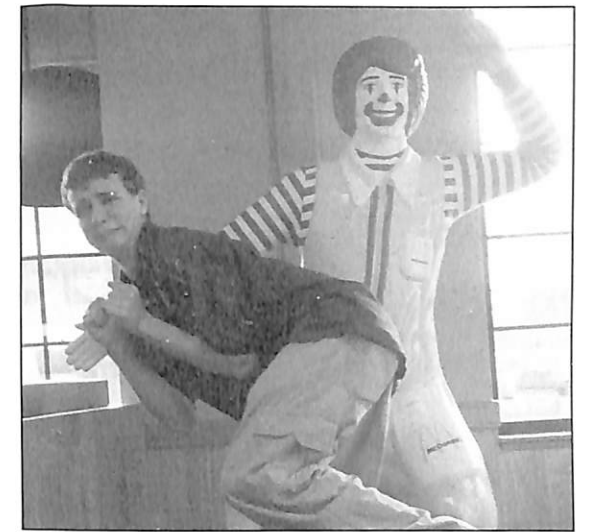

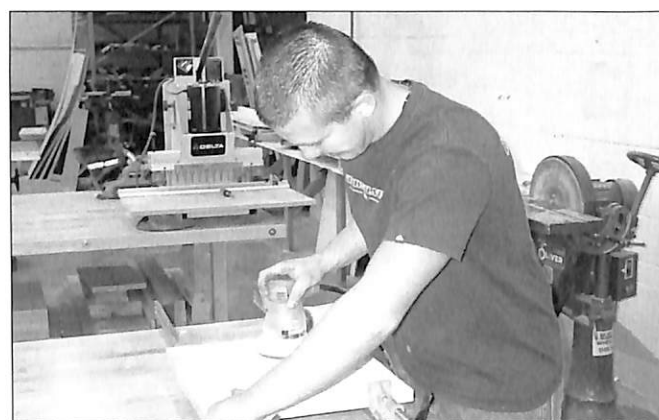

Freshmen Finish First Year

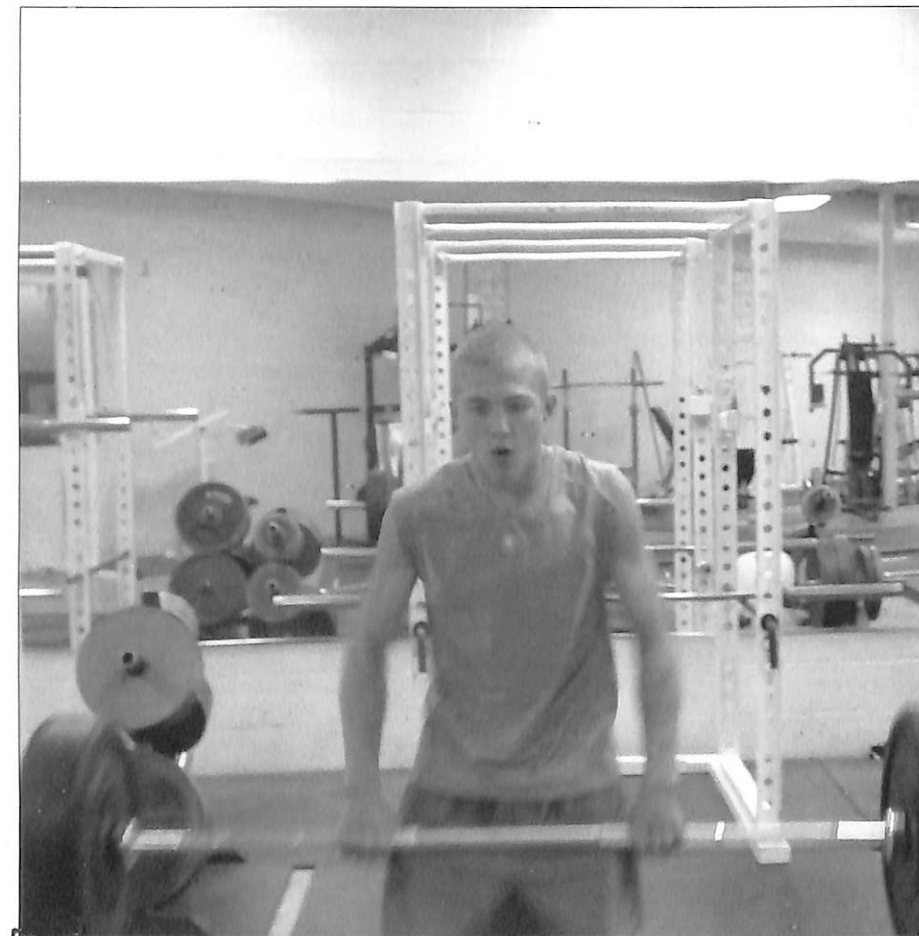
It does get better

Don't worry. Every junior faced the same situation, and it was perfectly normal for you to feel a little (or more than a little) scared about the next step: senior year.

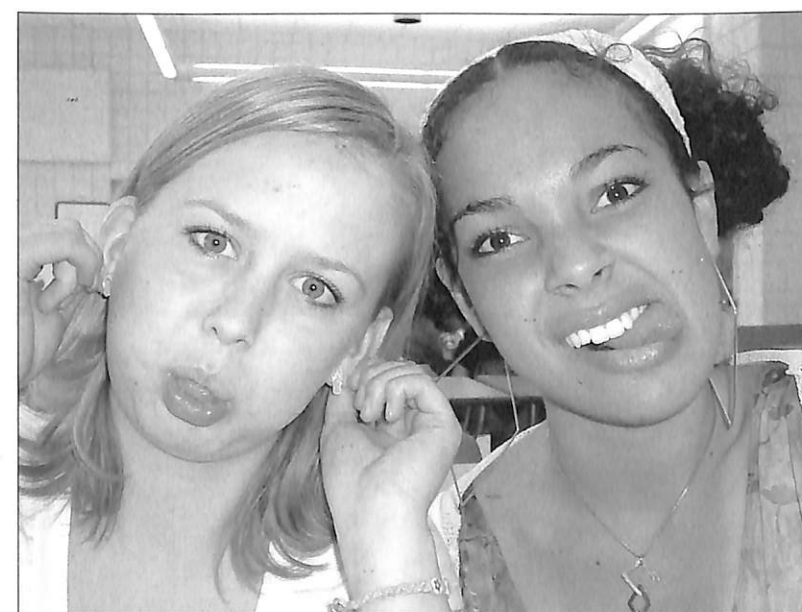
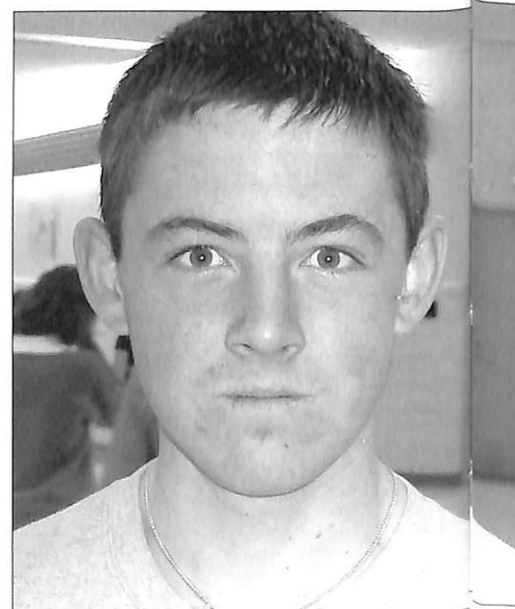

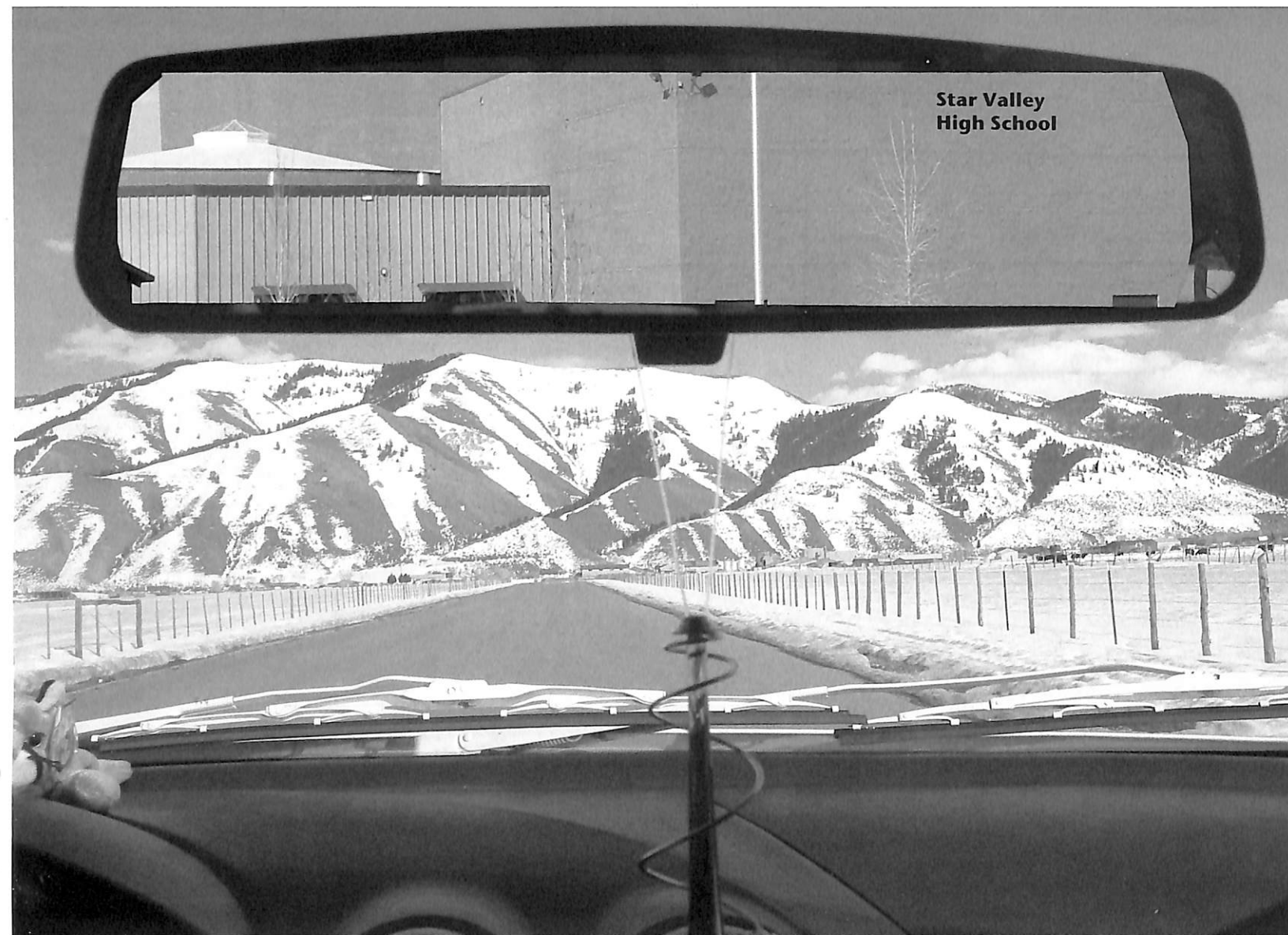

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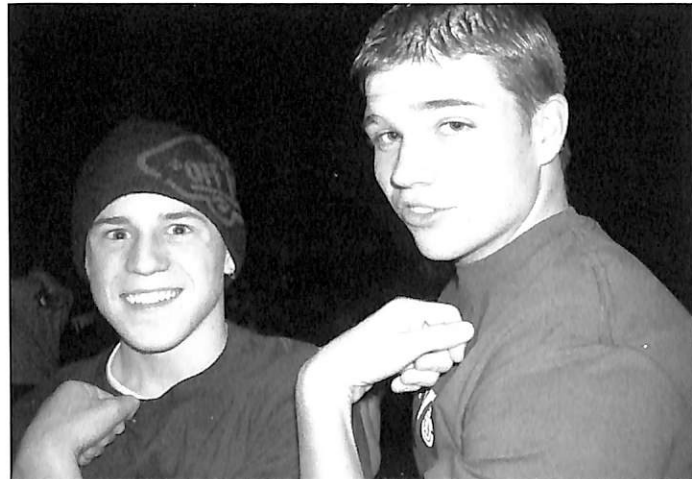

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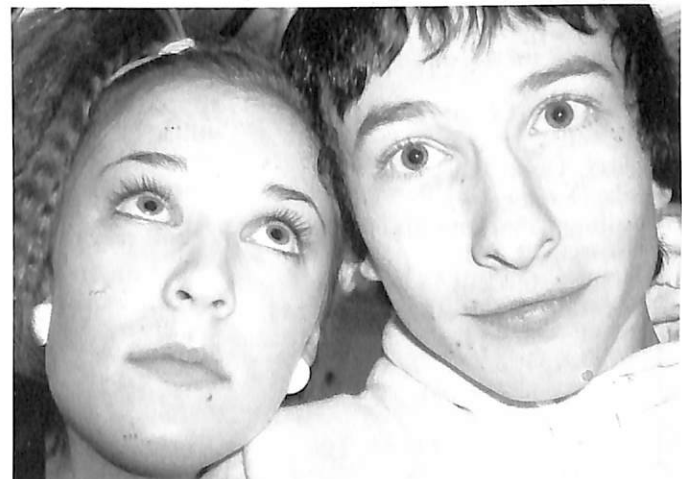
