Excellence in Action


















## Loud and Proud




## Braves Varsity Basketball



In addition to the hours of effort put in at meetr, our boys practiced after



### Preparing students for success


PA and VICA, two organizations aimed at creating success, helped teach skills valuable to cost able to each student's future.



No one wanted to spend their only free time laboring over homework. Most of us procrastinated our homework until the last possible minute; this usually meant late nights and extremely early mornings.




The Braves soccer team members of 2005 enjoyed the distinction of playing on the first ever schoolsponsored soccer team in SVHS history




# Junior Prom 2005
