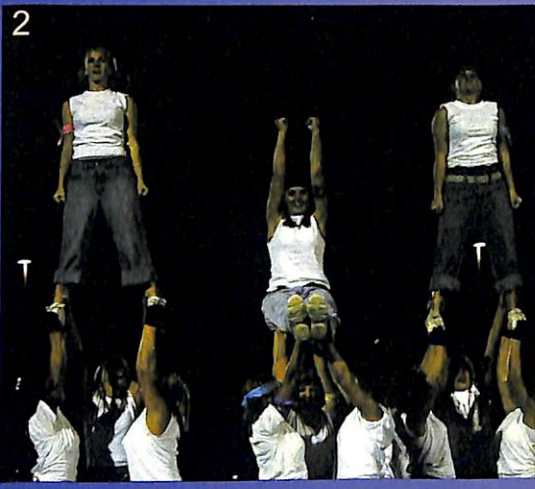

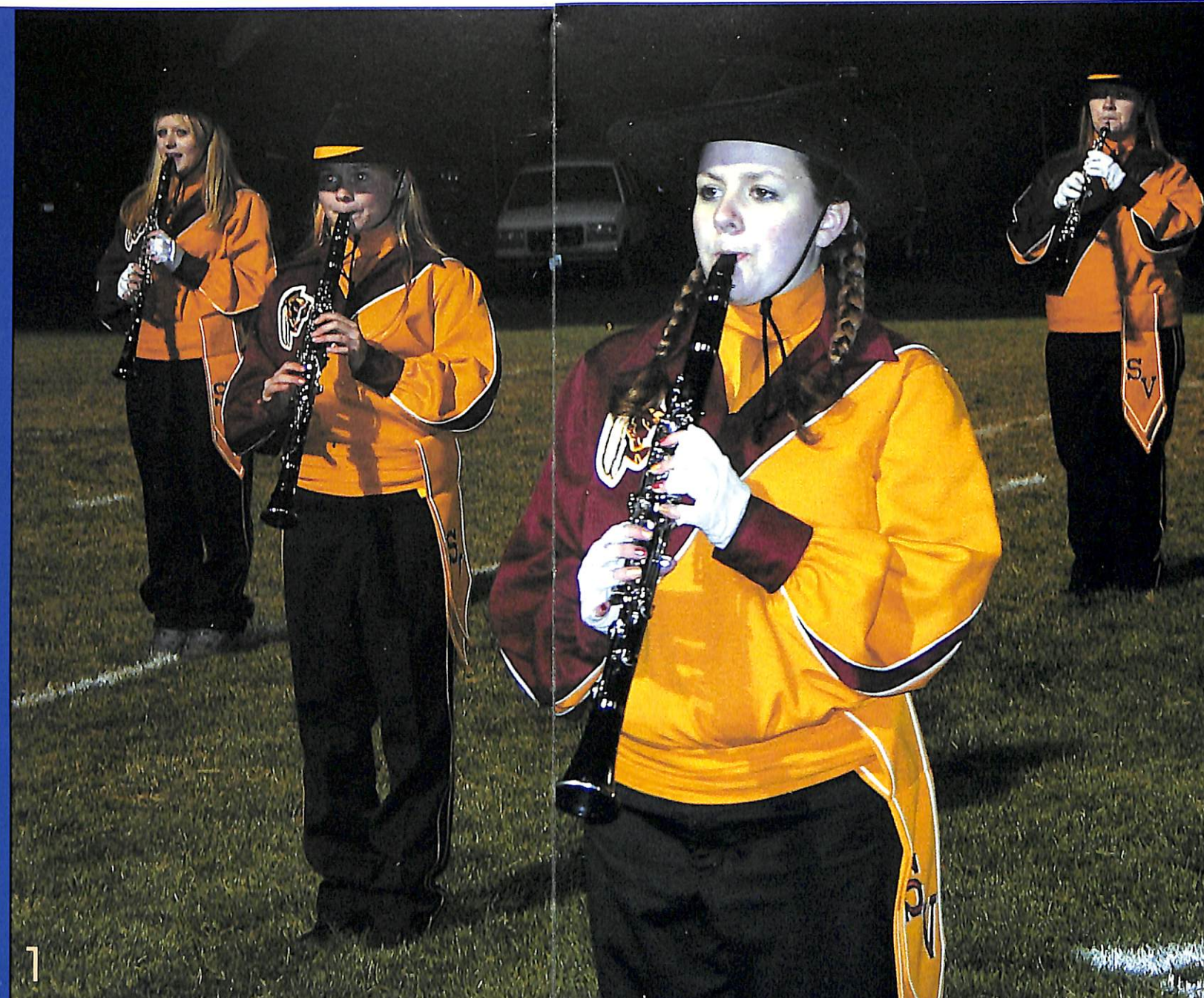

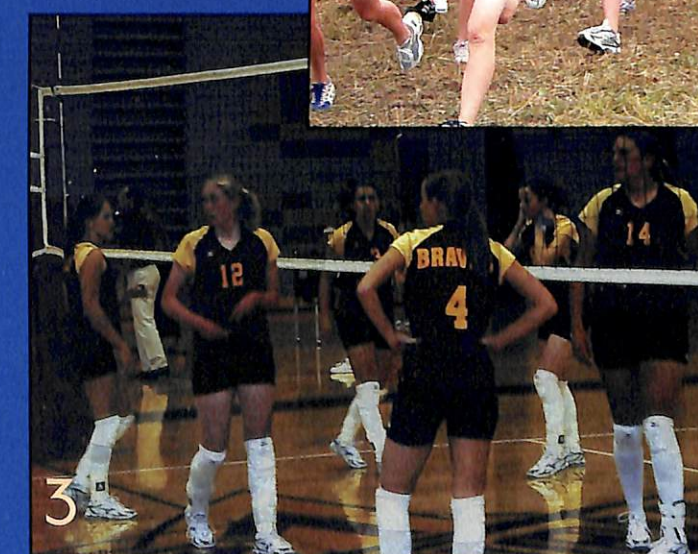

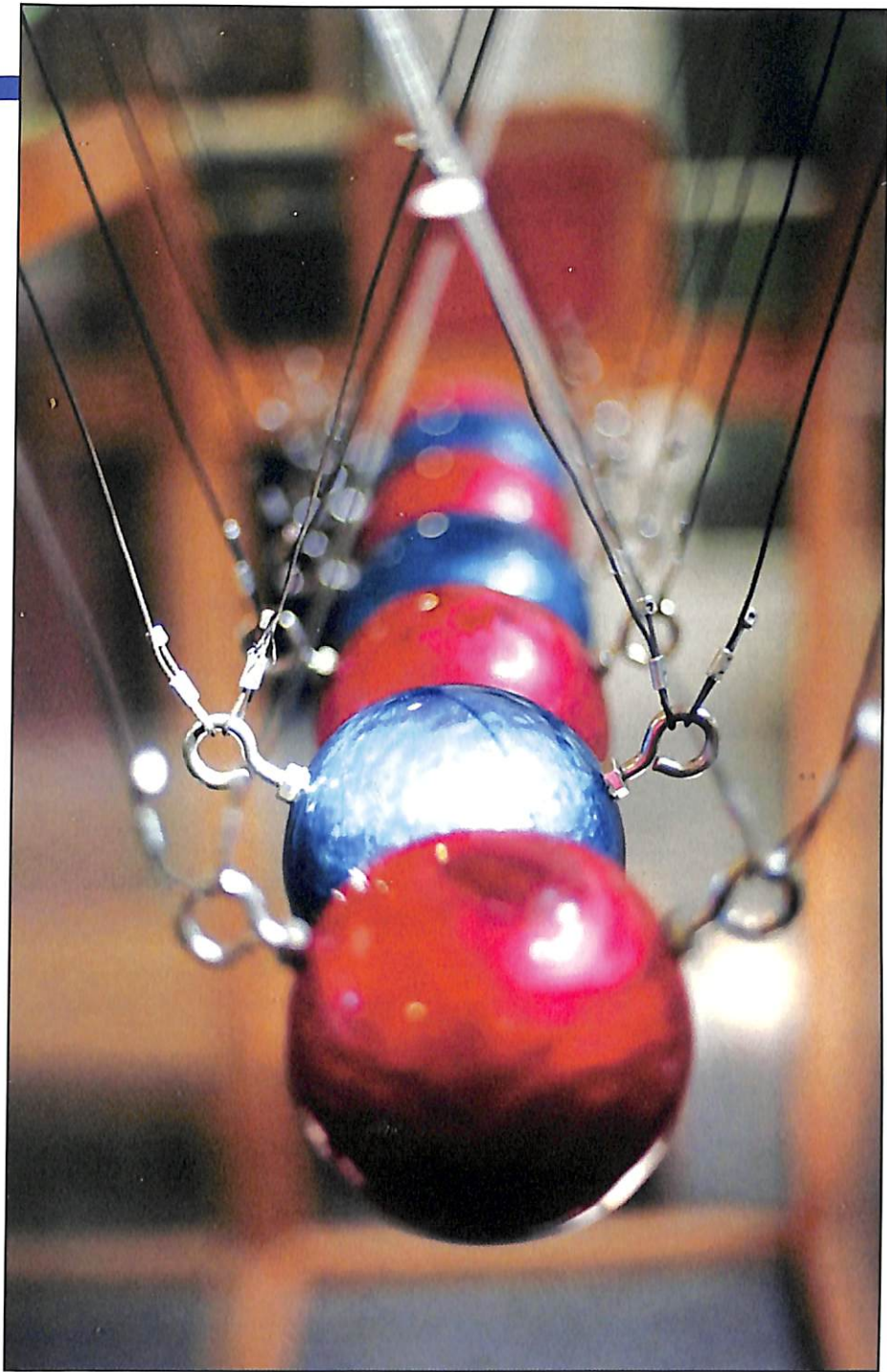
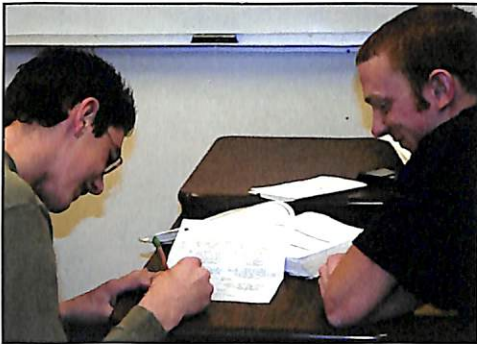
NATIONAL HONOR SOCIETY

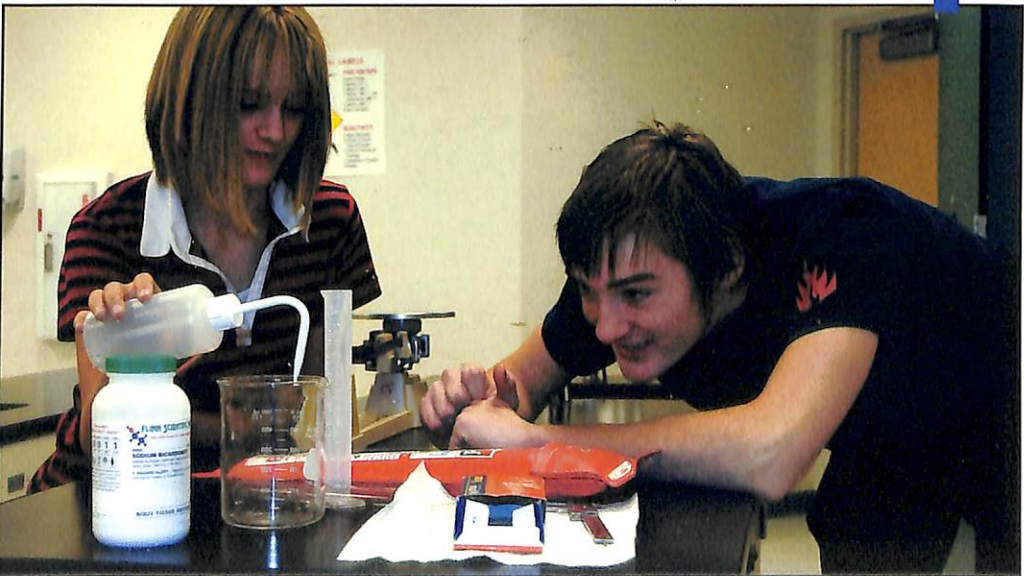
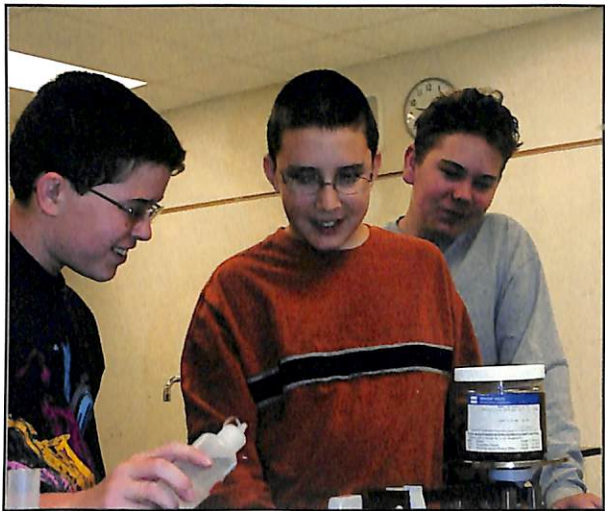
Science Club

How do they do it? I can't stand sitting through 90 minutes of Biology without falling a sleep! Some are born with a natural love for science. Is the science club right for you?



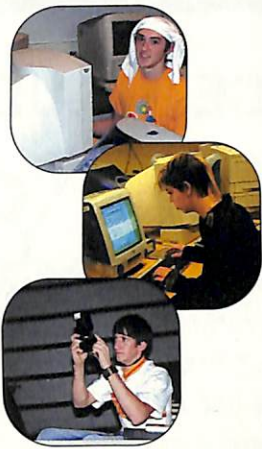

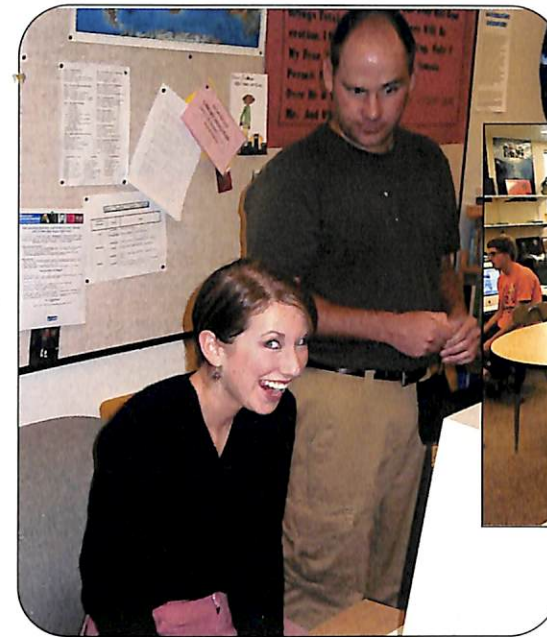

SPEECH

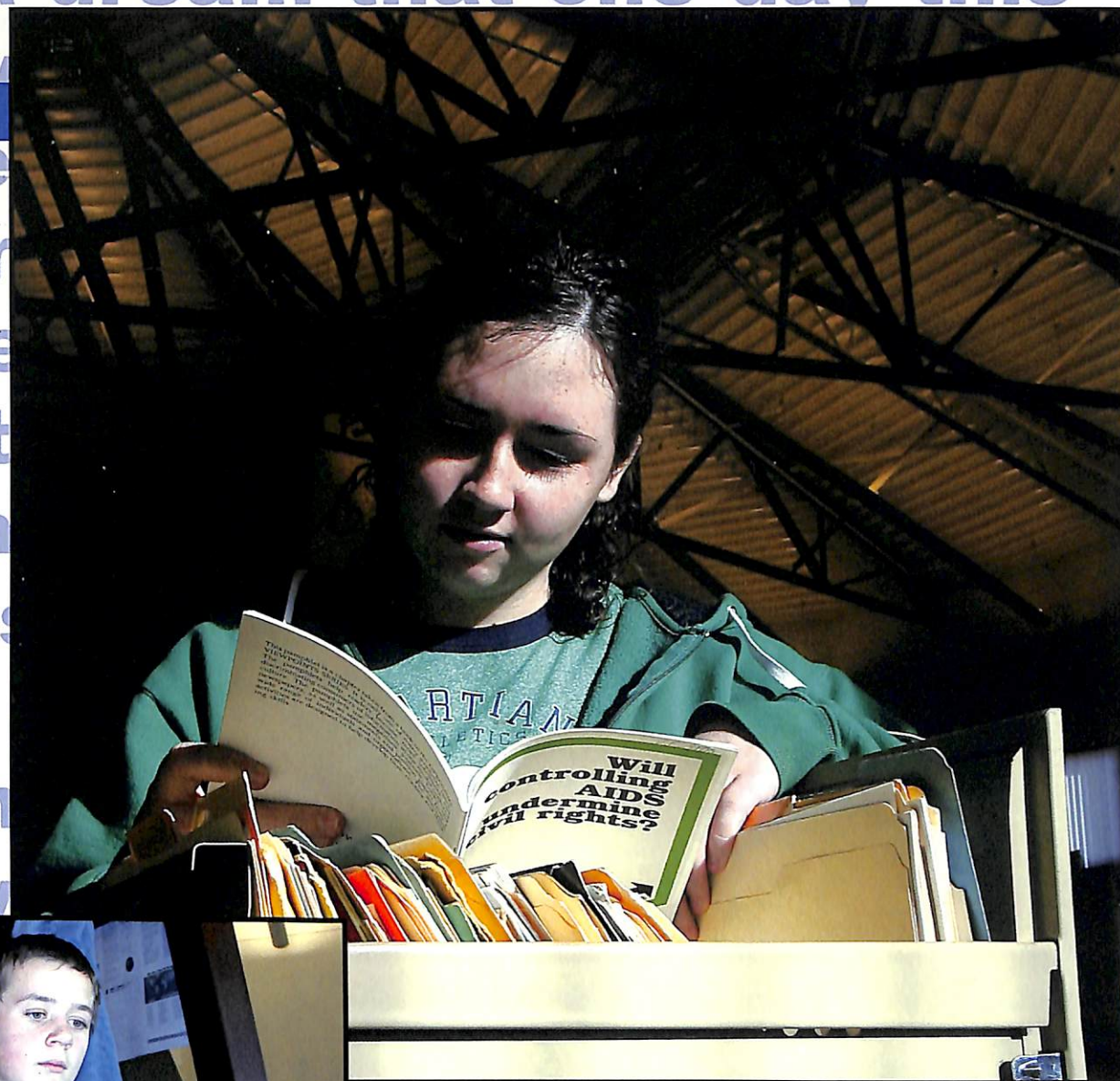

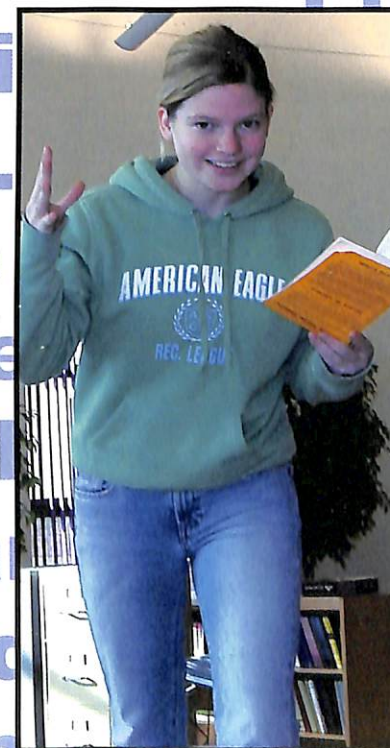


Angie Miles and Devin Luthi act out a humorous skit for a presentation in Speech.

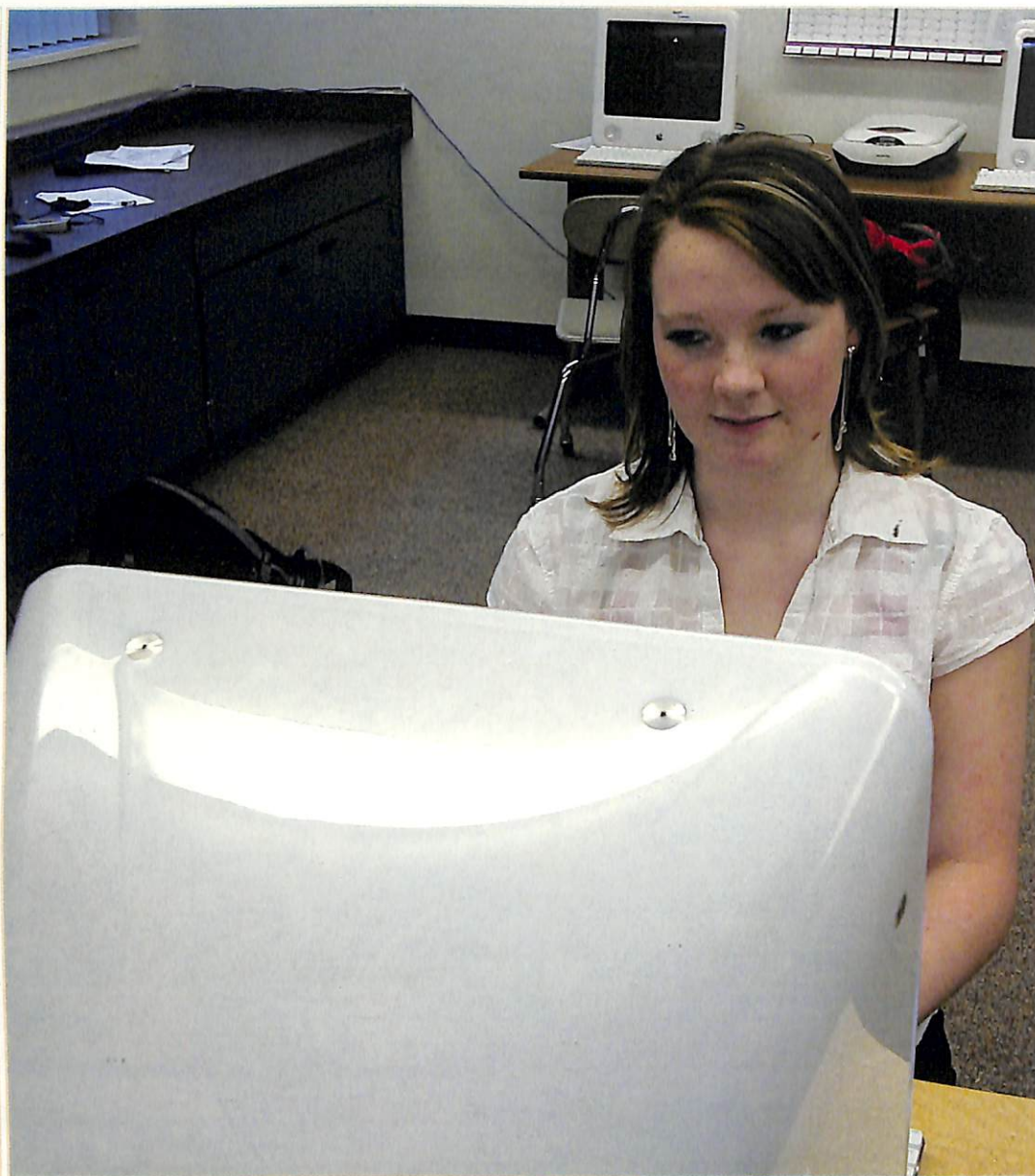

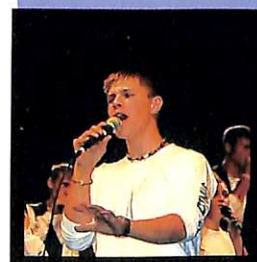

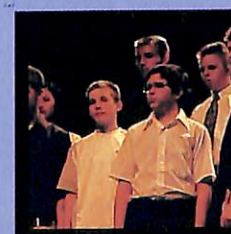

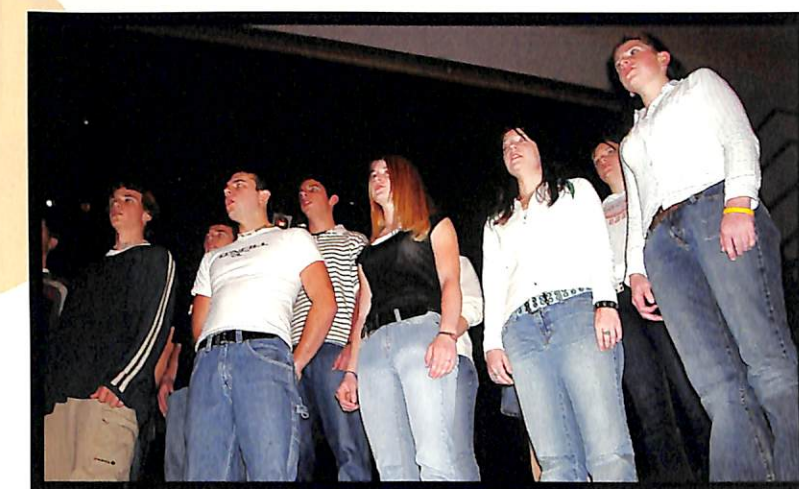

Each year many students find how rewarding and fun participating in the school play can be. Even those with small parts felt involved in something bigger than themselves, and their pride showed.

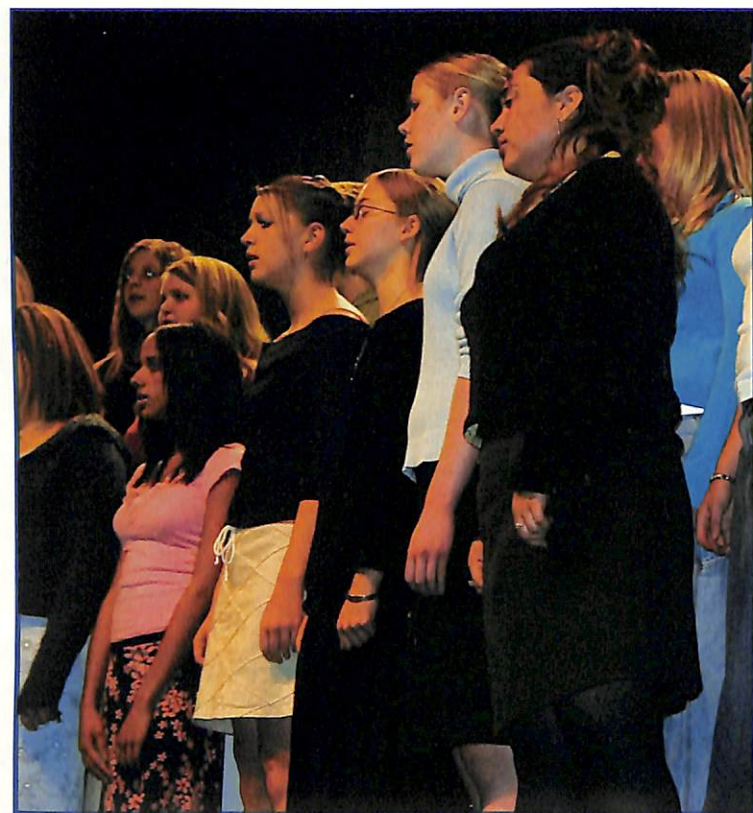

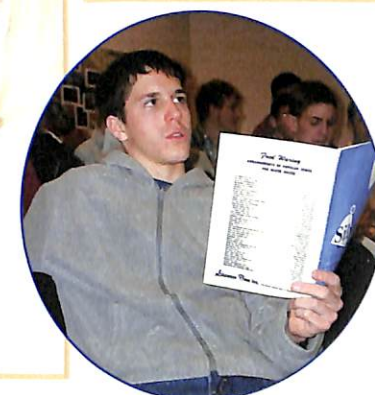

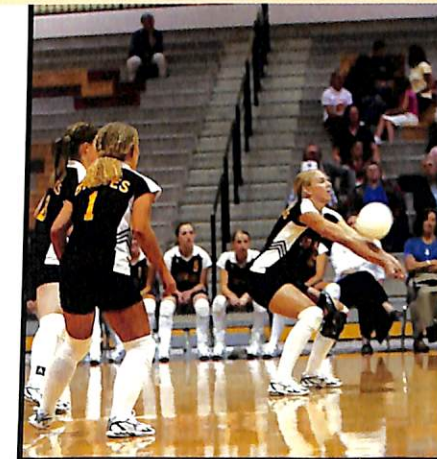

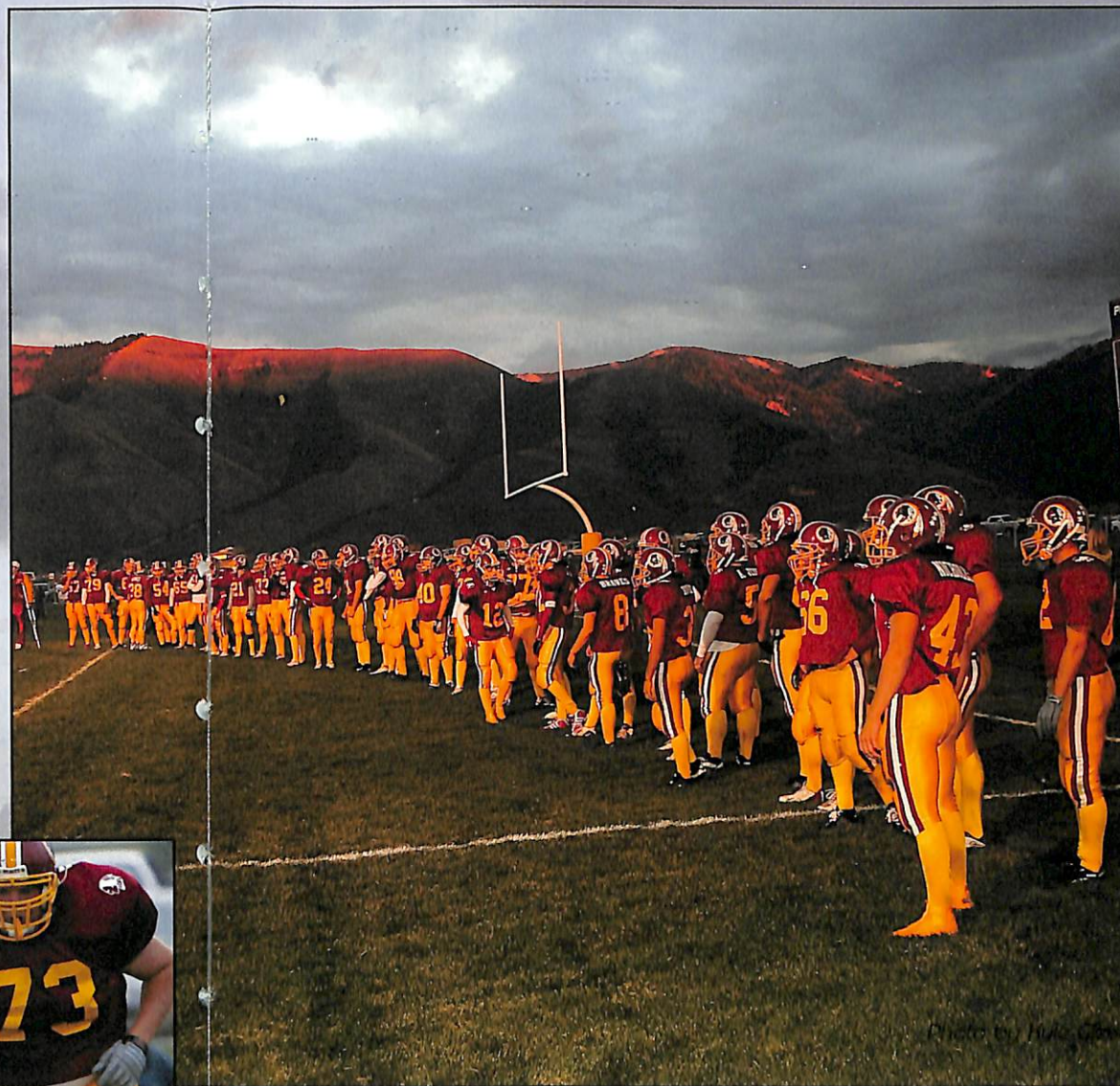

Although defeat and hard times came to the Braves, they never gave up. They continued working hard throughout the entire season, and that's all we could ask of them.



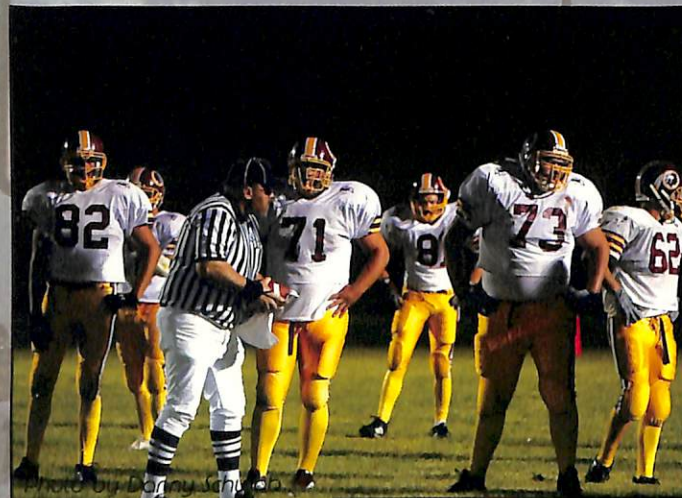

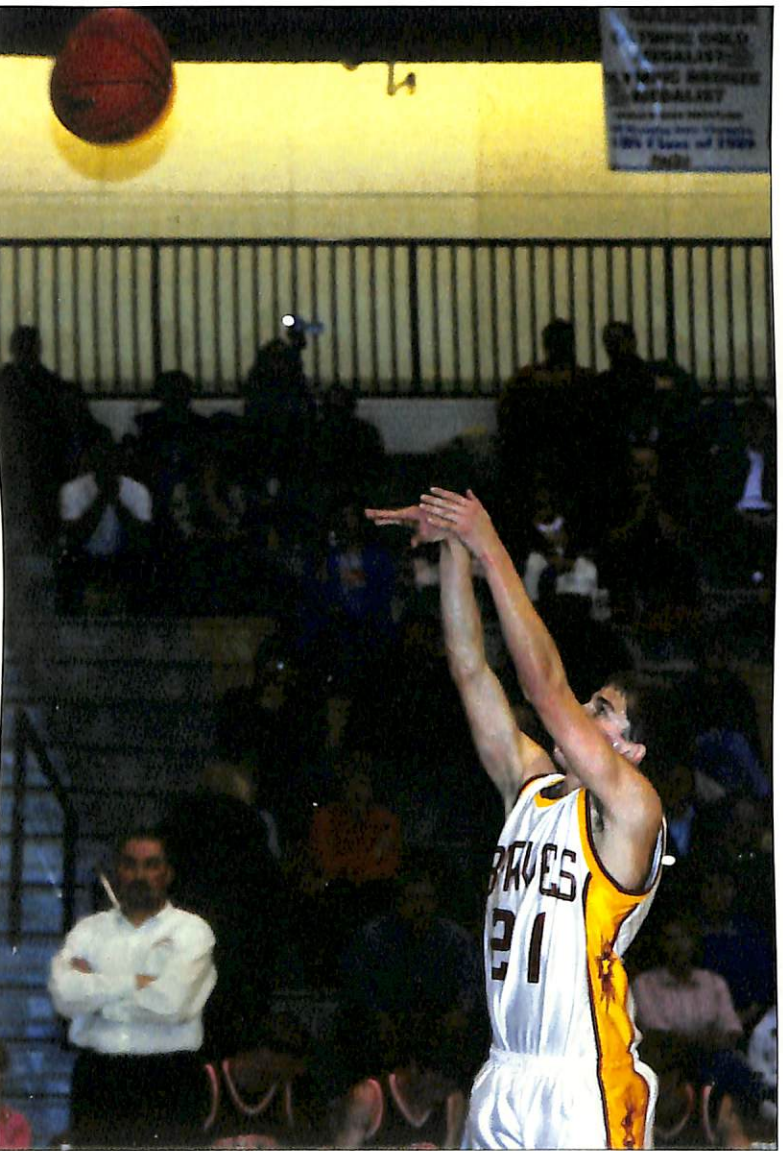

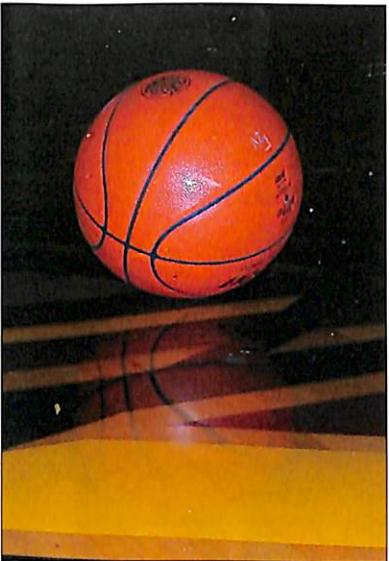

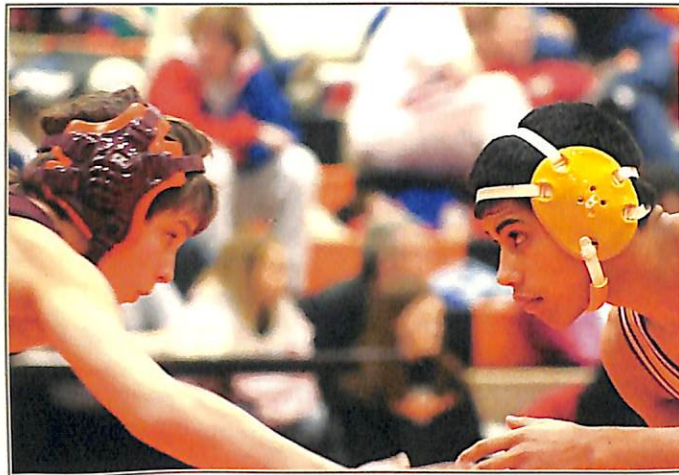

After all that we saw from the Star Valley wrestlers this year, one thing is for sure, the Braves always lead the state in wrestling.

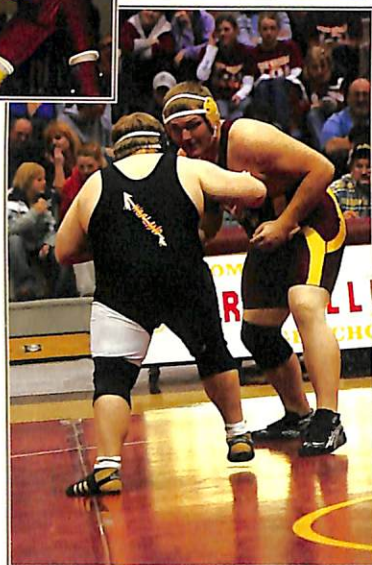

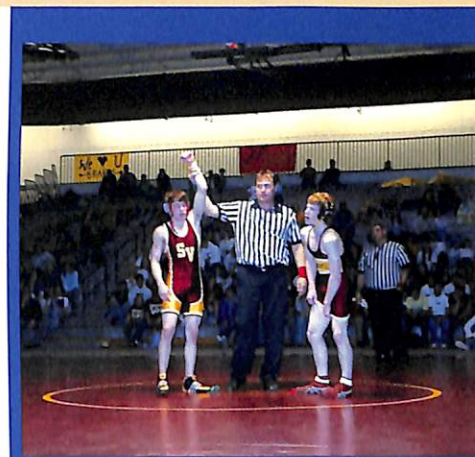

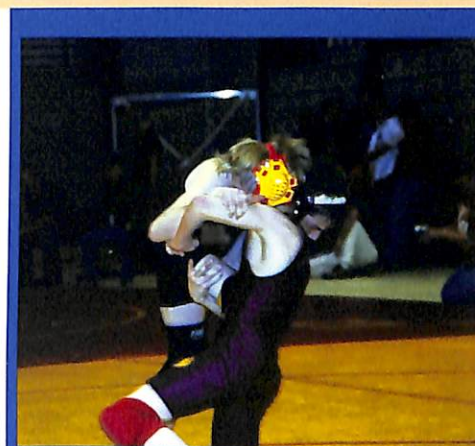

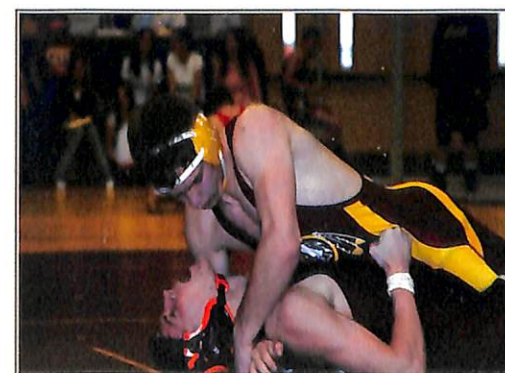

Don't feel worried about ditching school during those powder days. You will be learning the textbook education as you're slashing the powder.

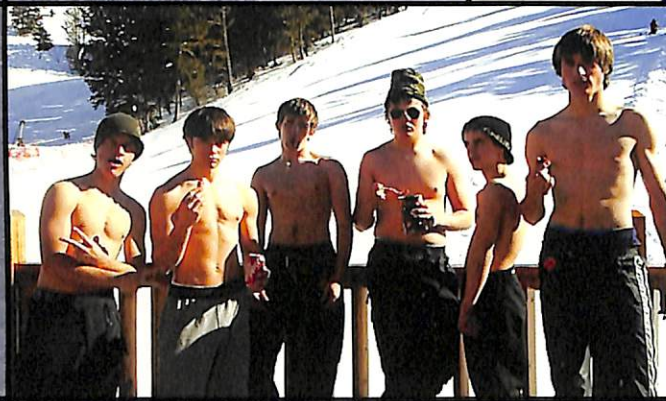

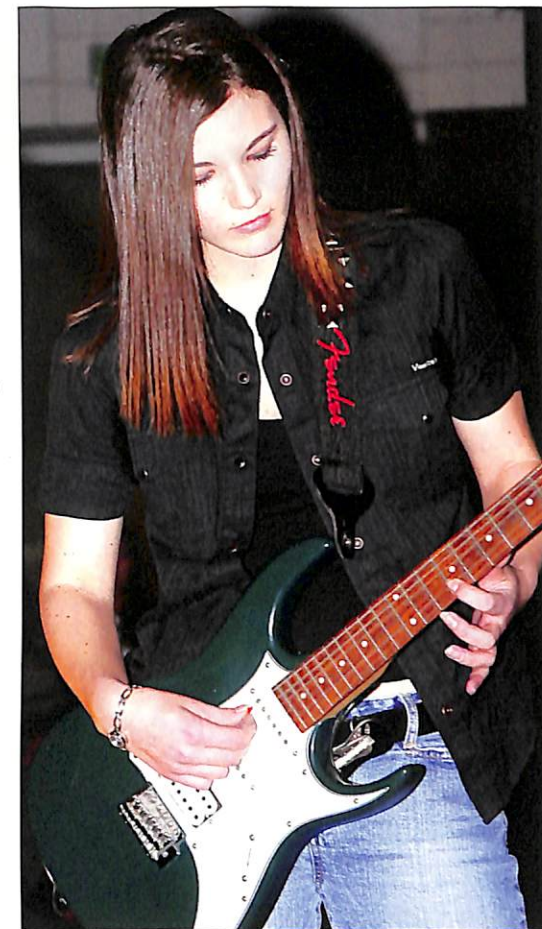

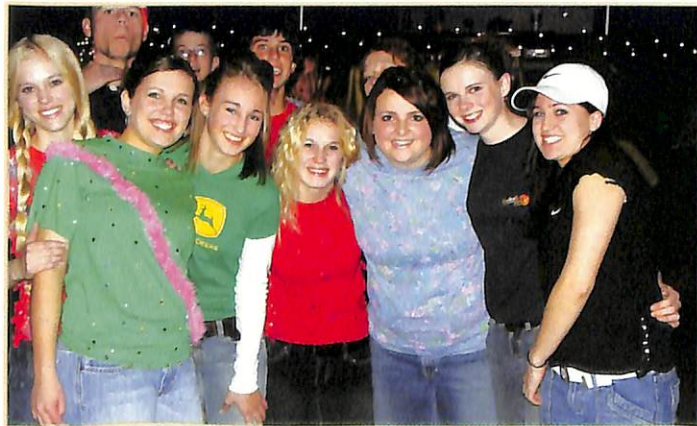

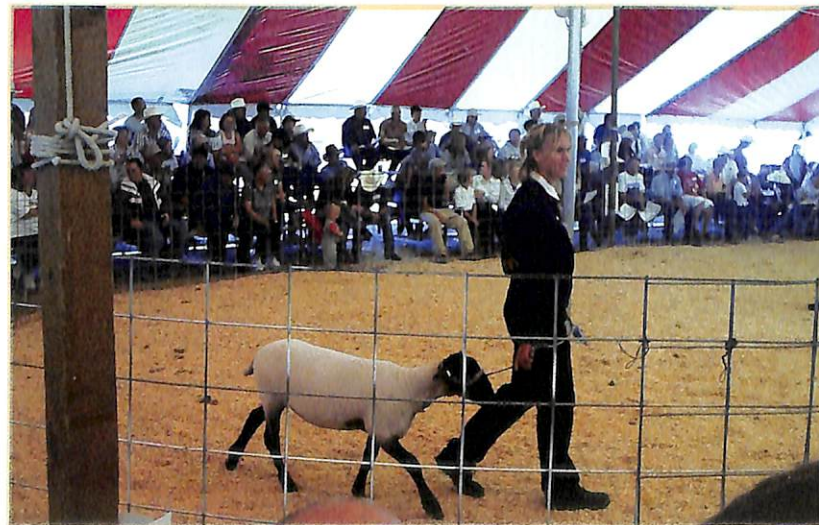

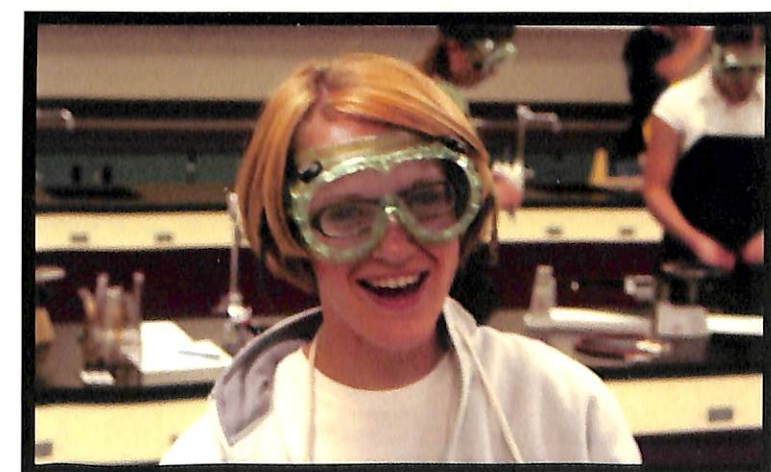
Working in the lab

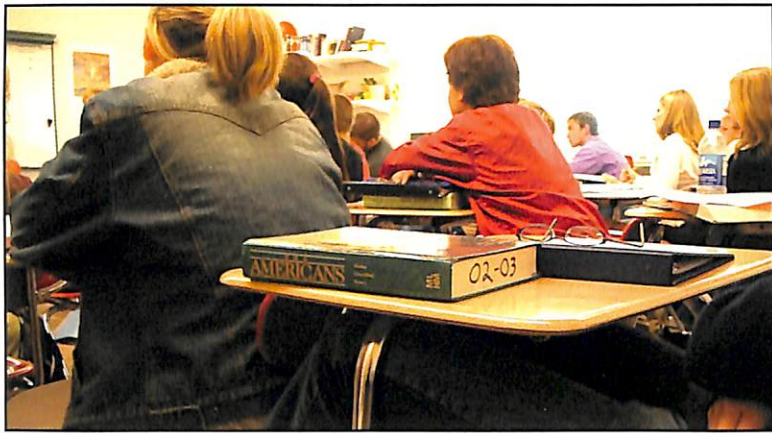

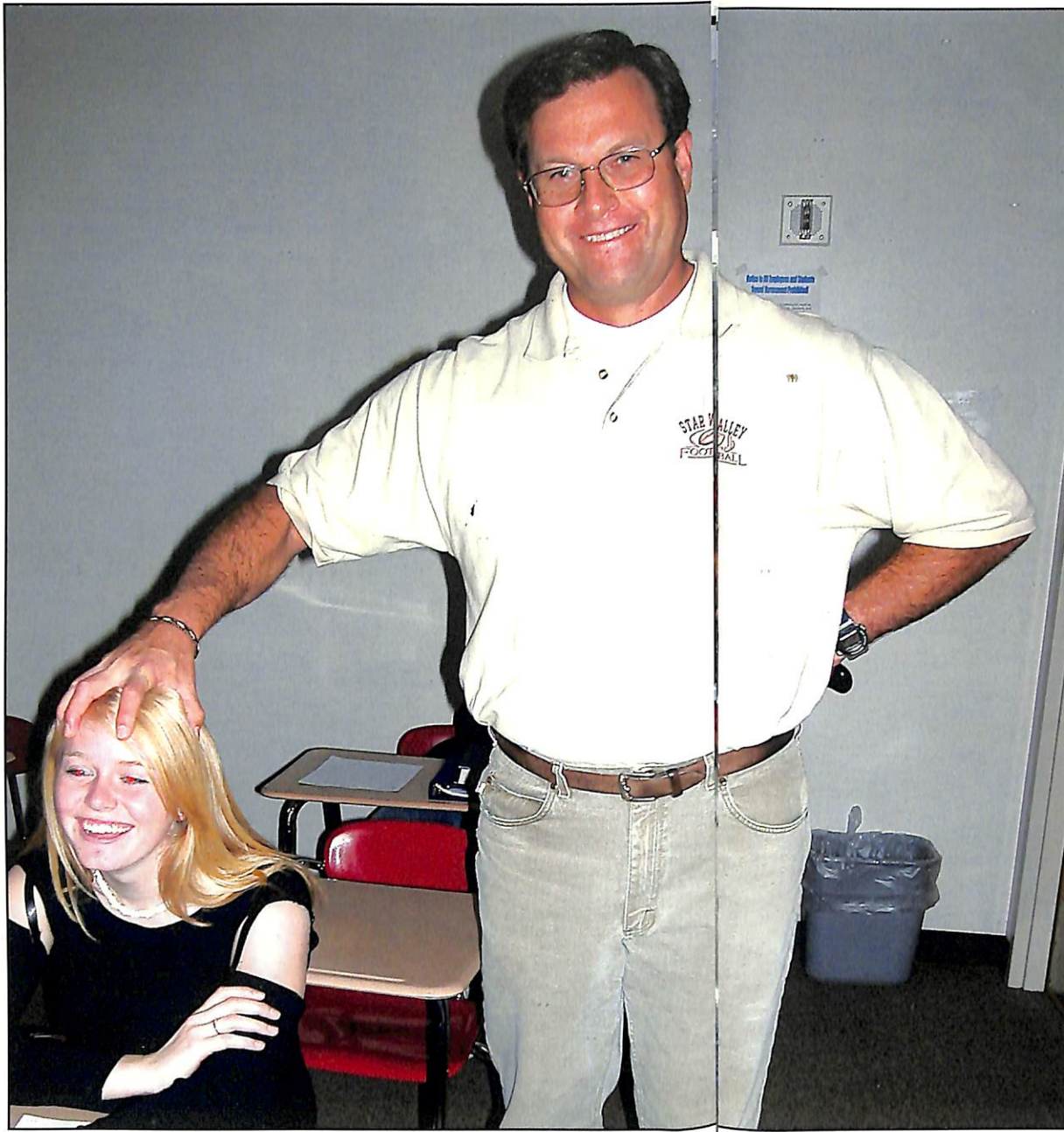

REMEMBERING THE PAST

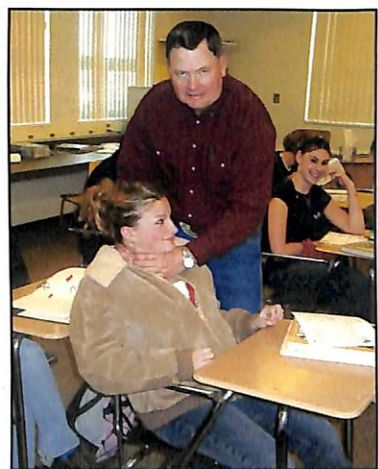

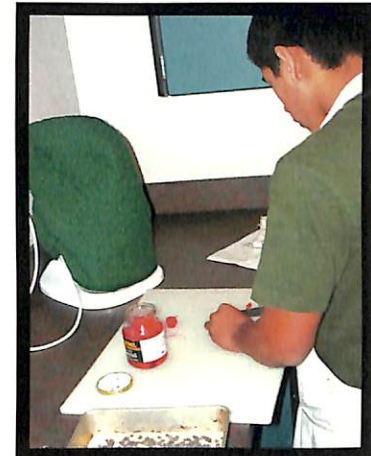

Industrial Education consists of classes often over-looked by many students, but these classes usually become the first building blocks for future careers. In these

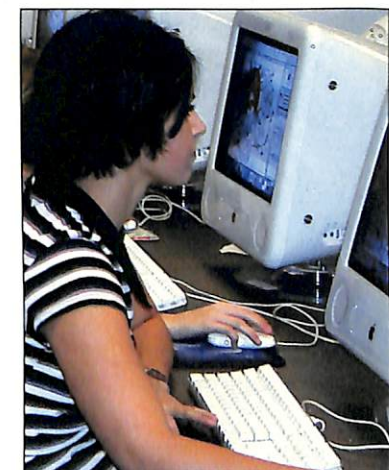
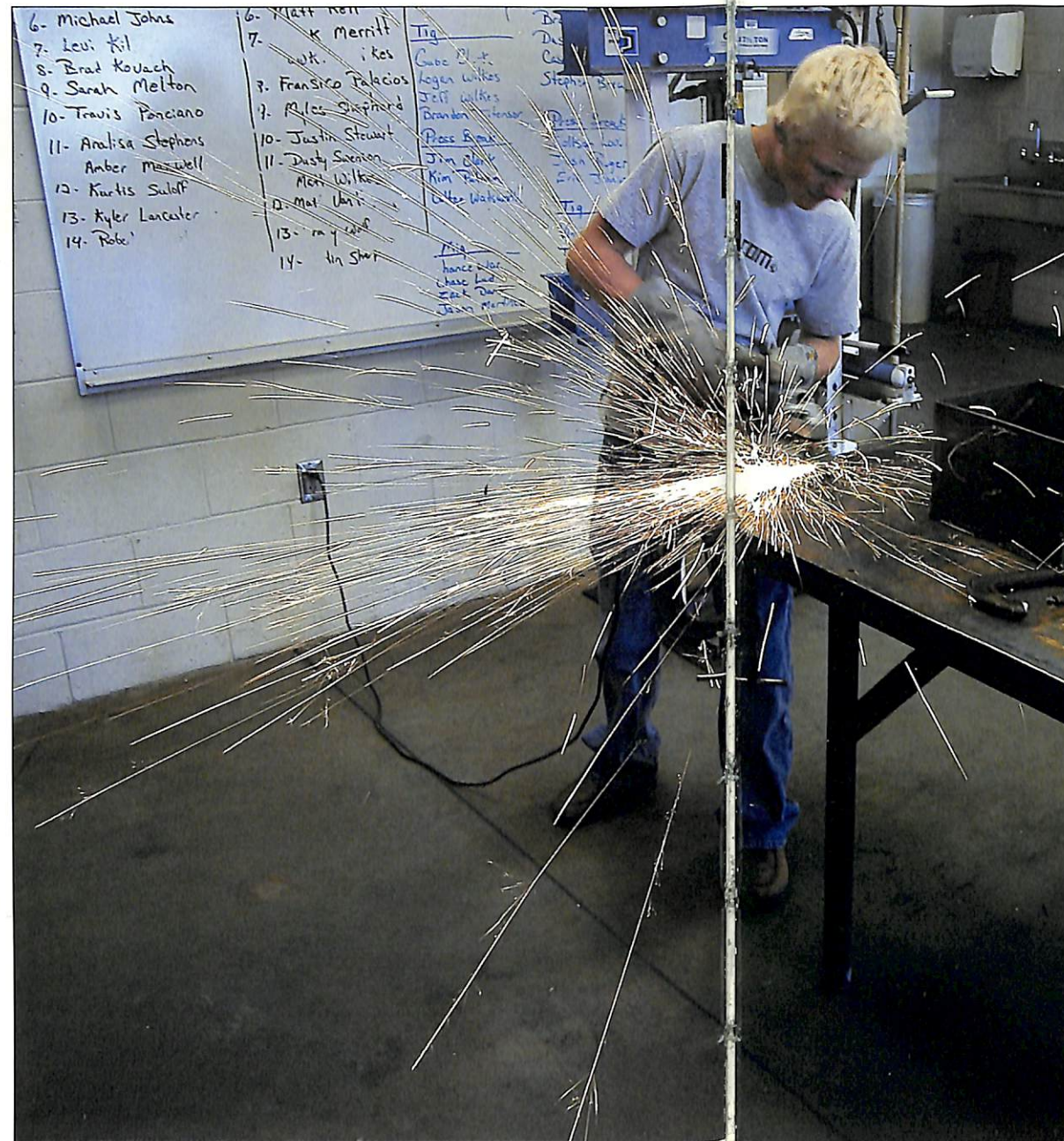
classes students really get to learn things that they will use in life-after-high school. Senior James Woods said, "In shop class I get to work on things I want to."

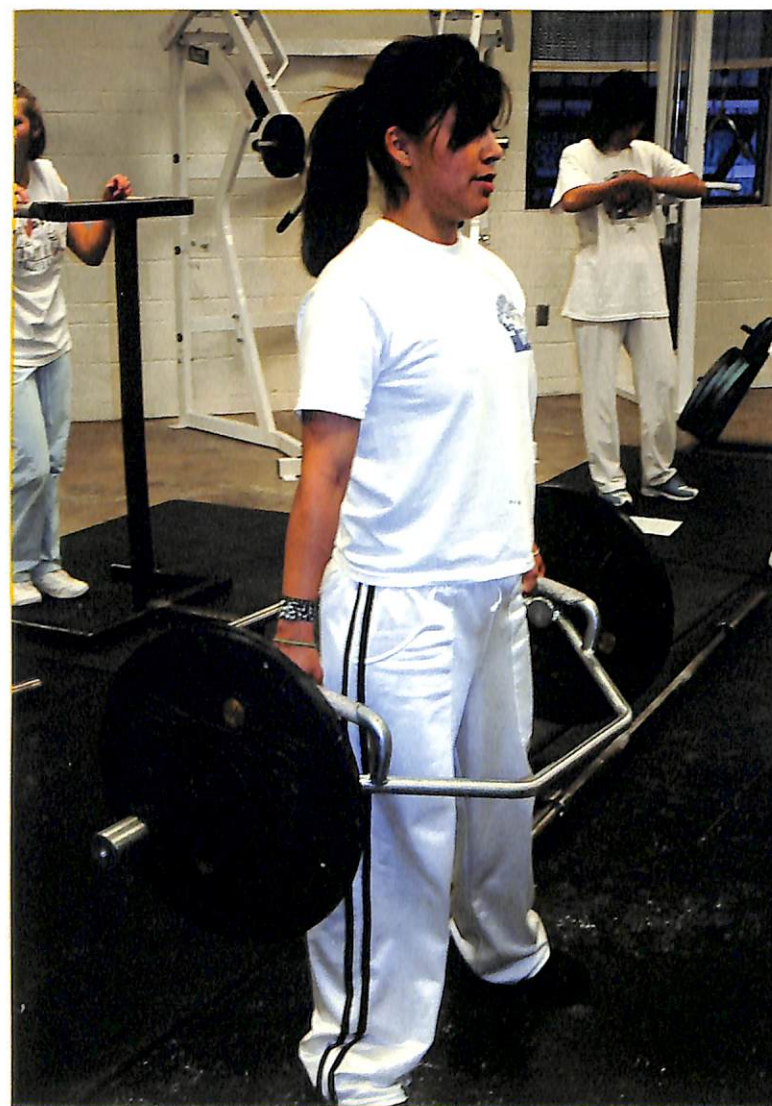

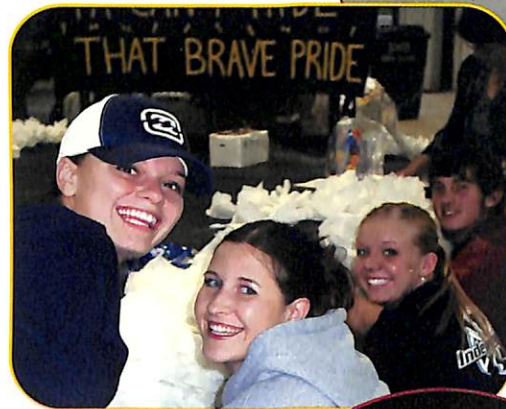

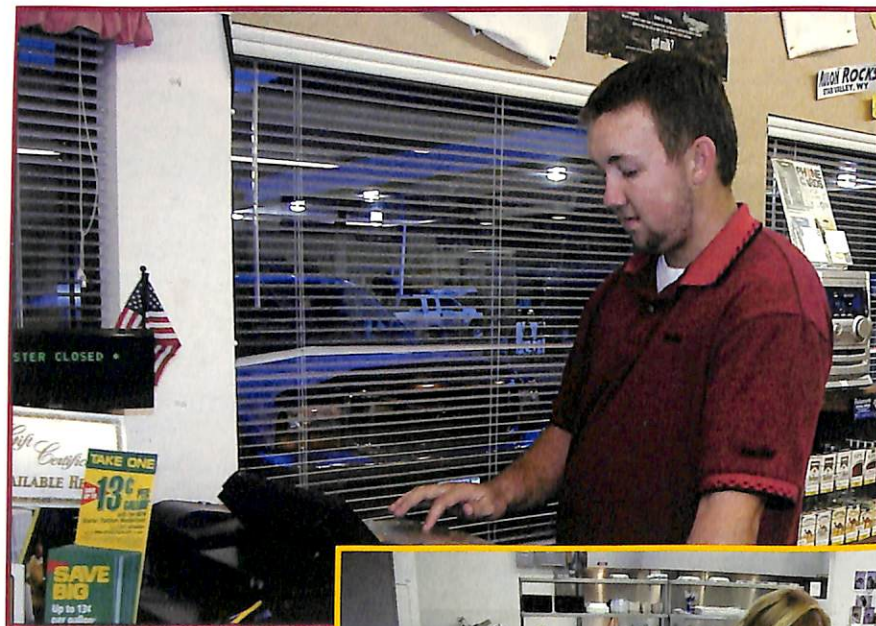

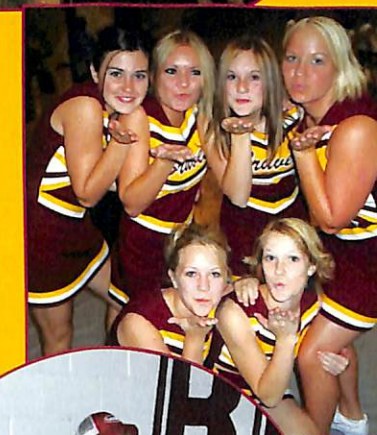

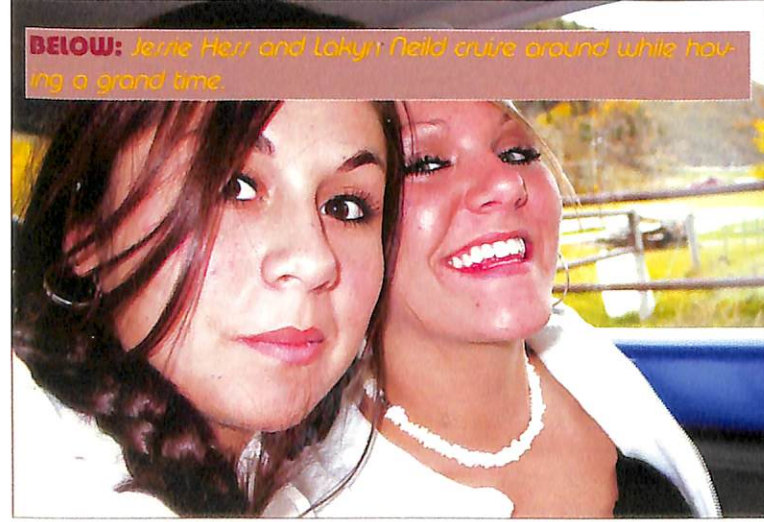

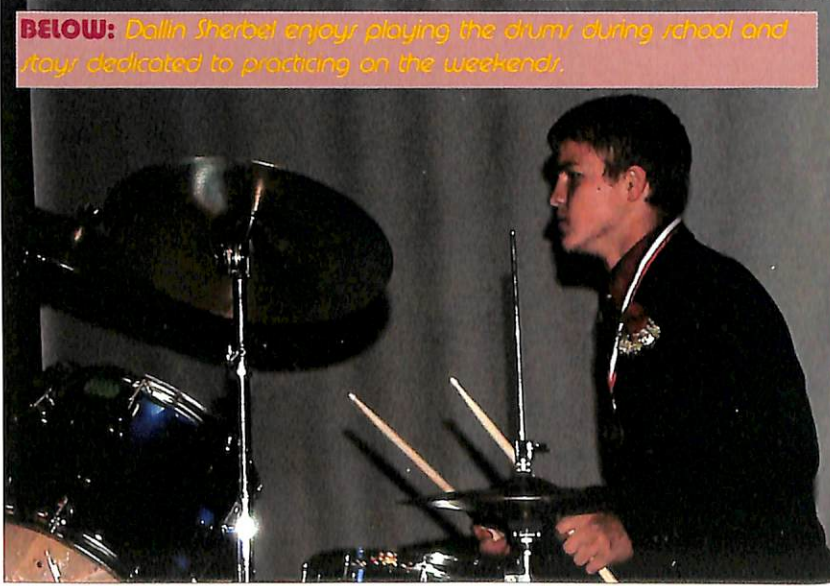

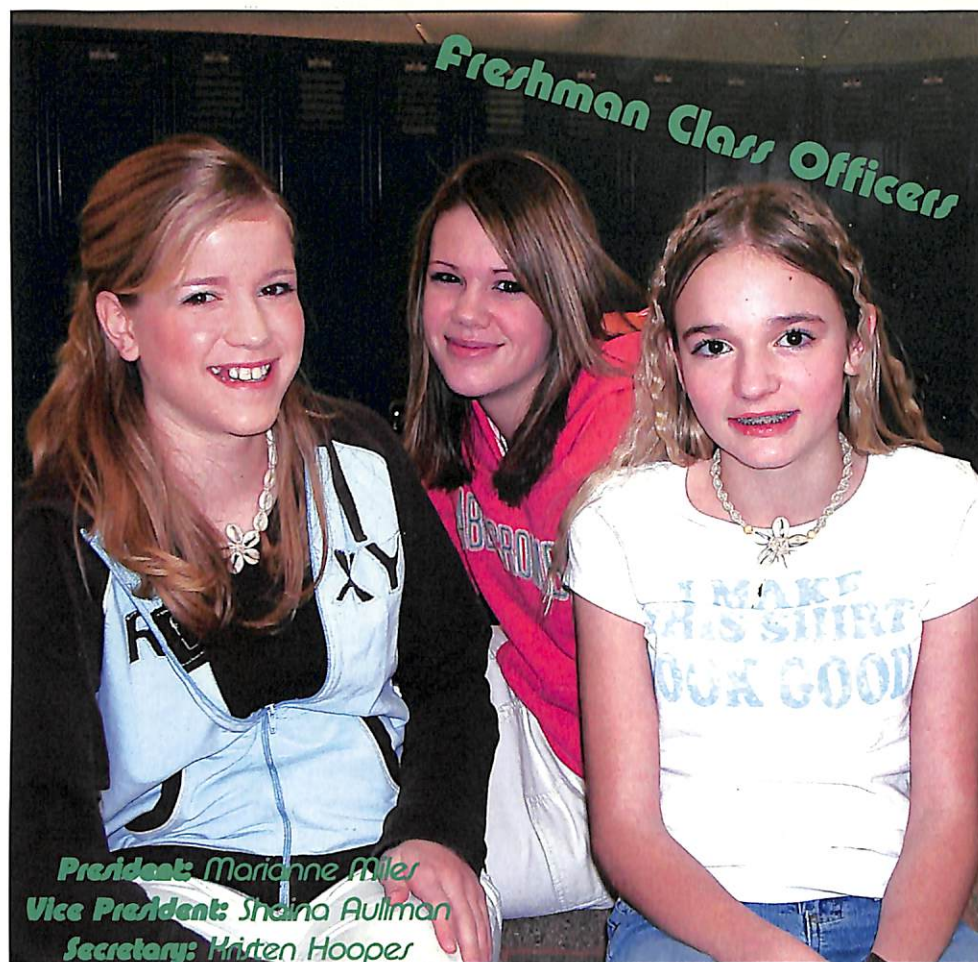
Freshman Class of 2008

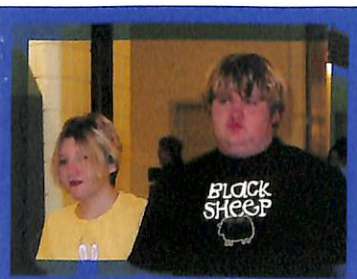

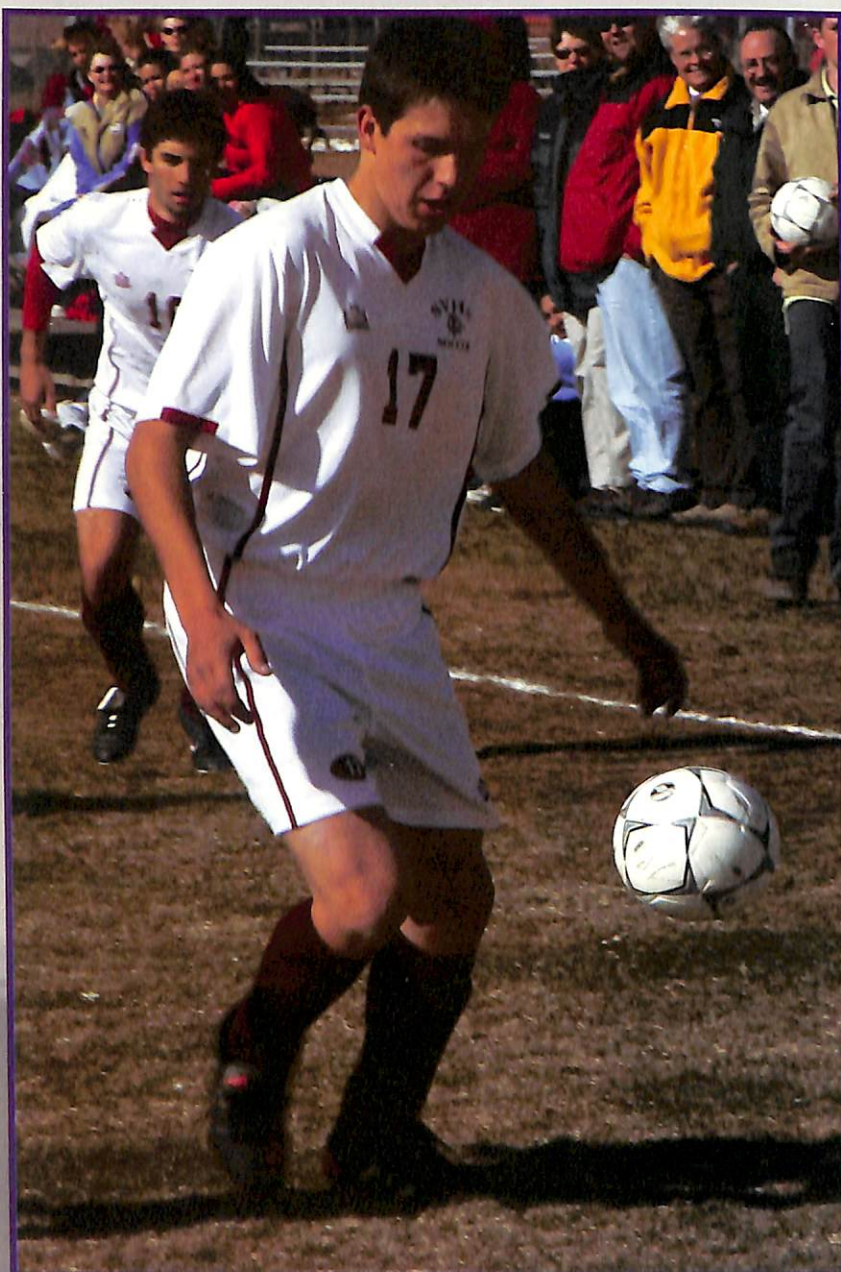
The Braver soccer team members of 2005 enjoyed the distinction of playing on the first ever school-sponsored soccer team in SVHS history.

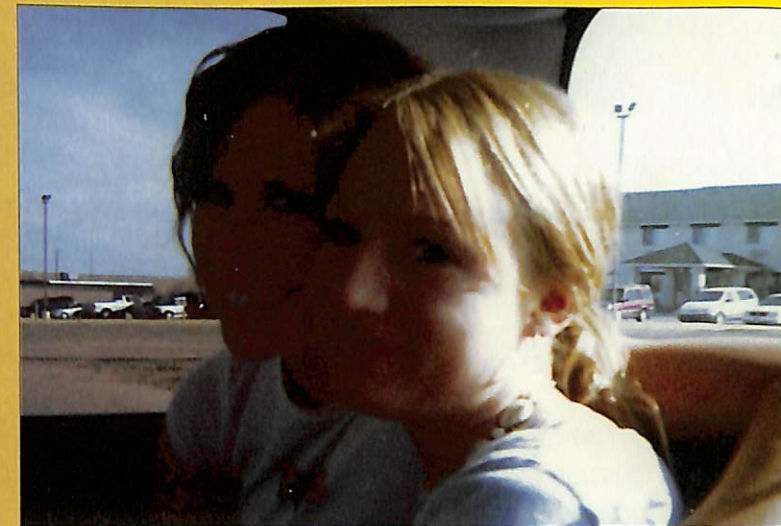

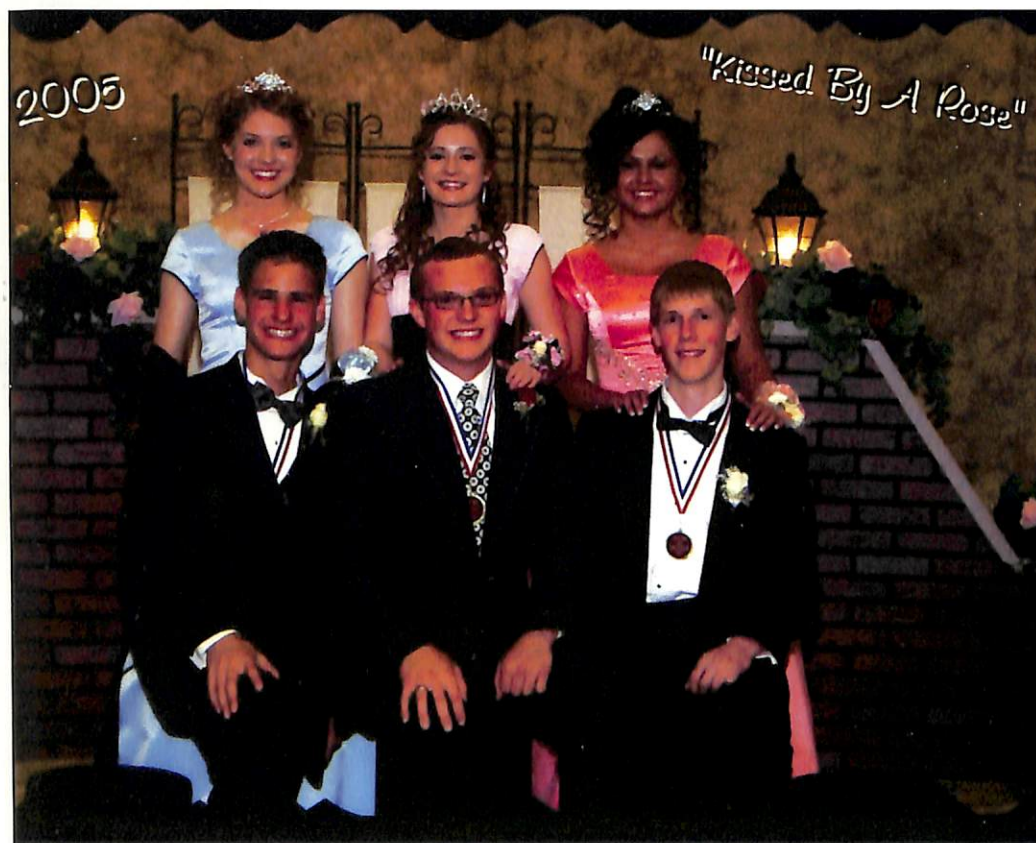
Junior Prom 2005

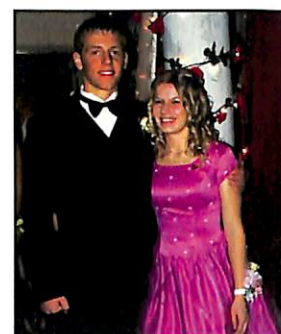

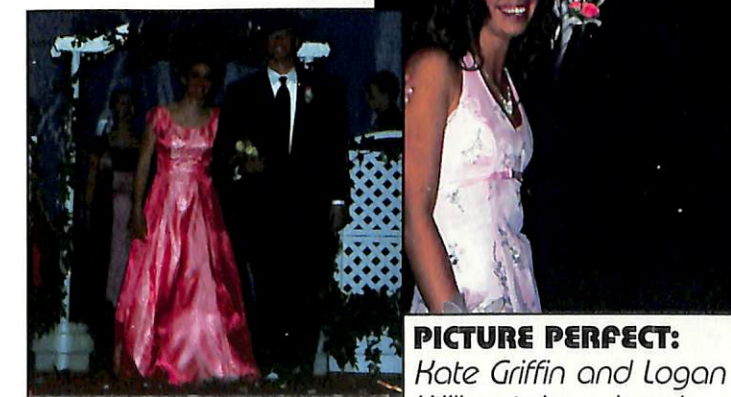

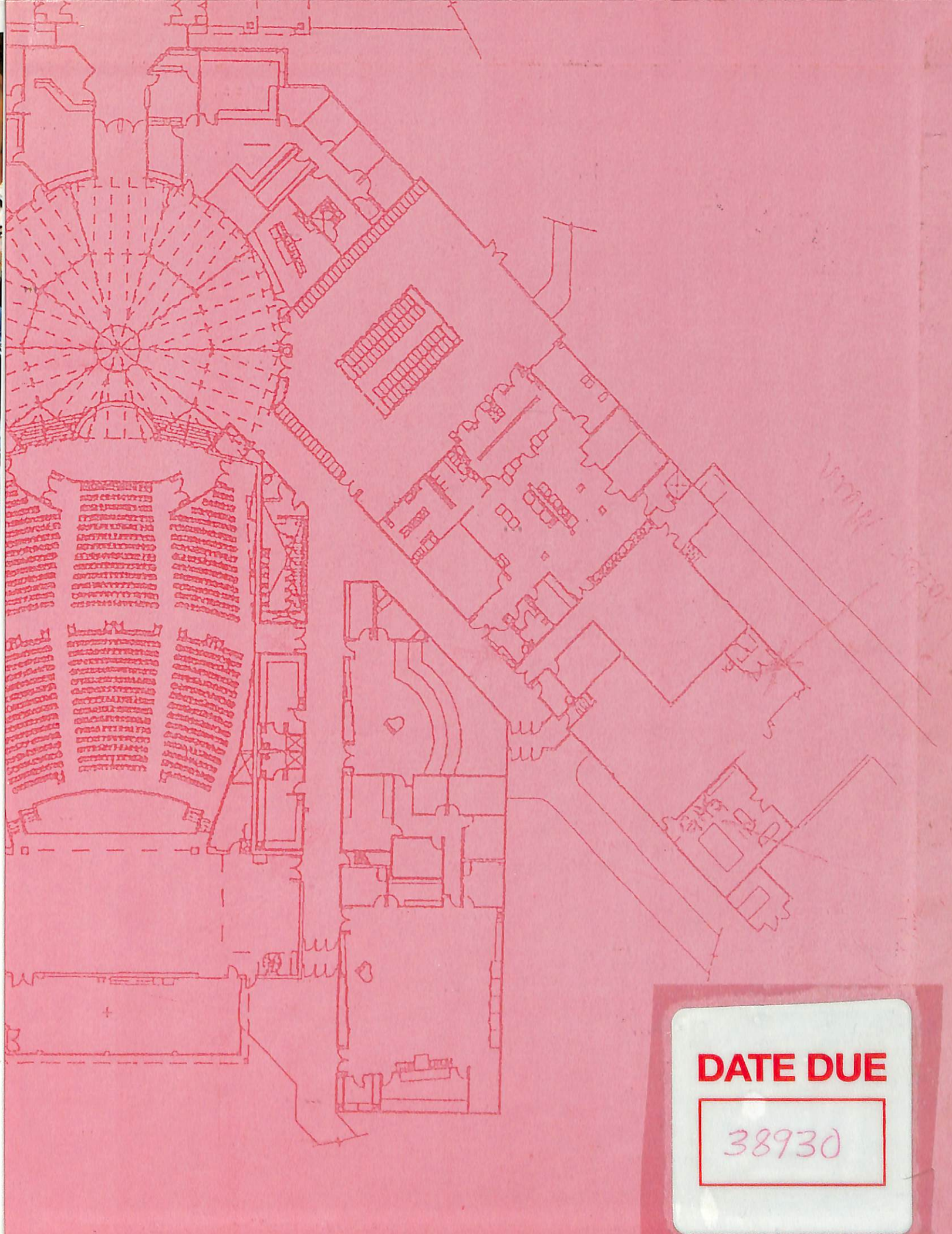
