



struggles when he said, "I didn't have any trouble with math until the teacher tossed in the alphabet."








King Arthur apply to us today," said senior Brooke Anderson after reading Le Morte De Arthur in senior English.


"It's strange to see how superstitious people were and how harsh their punishments were," said junior Cheyenne Erickson about The Crucible.



From Nazis to the Speaker of the House, our history teachers made us become part of the history we studied.







Ricky Sessions, when asked her science ambition, said, "A Pediatrician is a great job because they work with kids."









lenging. Sophomore Colter Draney, in his first year Spanish, said, "It's kind of tough, but its fun."




Foreign languages challenged minds and tested nerves, but in the end students walked away with valuable knowledge that will someday help them take on the world.











New faces appeared in the department this year as we navigated the road through high school, but the things we did in P.E. and the people we did them with formed the basis for lasting memories, fun, and good health.






These hard working students added new meaning to class work as they learned valuable skills and techniques to apply in the future.



Treble Tones and Singco **Impress SVHS**


10ir has remained one of the most popular classes at Star Valley High School.


One hundred and twenty girls tried out for Treble Tones and 180 students tried out for Singcopation. In all, one-third of SVHS participated in a choir this year.





This year the band had the opportunity to go compete in state marching band competition. They ended up bringing home an excellent rating after it was all said and done.


Judges score school bands at state a little differently than other sports. Each band receives a mark between one and three, with one going to the very best performances.



Art club also performed many


projects for the high school and the community, including painting sets for the musicals, helping paint faces at the Halloween carnival, and painting business windows at Christmas time.

For a reward, the Art Club members went on a few field trips, including seeing a wonderful exhibit at the University of Utah featuring artwork from Monet to Picasso.


Most art students agreed that this creative class was one of the most fun, most creative courses available this year. The art classes of 2008-09 gained new skills, worked hard, and played hard.







Fellow Brian Heiner said, "I liked the field trips we went on."




During the past year, seniors went to work all throughout the valley during class time.

Nurses Start to Train Early


This year Certified Nursing Assistant students worked hard in order to certify and gain a license as a CNA while still in high school.







The sophomores represented Star Valley well and will continue to do so. Every year the sophomore class kicks it up a notch.





When Star Valley basketball fans look down the road, they will remember how hard these players worked to get better and prepare for their future as varsity starters.




Braves Join Top Ranks for First Time in 4A

Since the first day of practice, the freshmen came out and played nothing like the youngest team in the school. They pulled out of the season with an unbelievable 20-0 record.




The sophomores finished out the season with a 15-2 record. Coach Crosby said, "It was my best season ever. I had a lot of fun."



Participating in Special Olympics gave these kids an opportunity to compete in activities their peers enjoy. Taking part in these sports gave them a feeling of accomplishment and success.






This year the Brave Cadettes Swent through some changes.



Homecoming united the school, seniors to freshman, against one common enemy: the Marsh Valley Eagles. The Braves prevailed.







Not only did the members feel good about the service they offered, but their work didn't go unappreciated by those who received it. Kelsey Jensen said, "NHS is the best!"







The FFA club took advantage of our surroundings and taught students how to better use our environment, not only for the benefit of agriculture but also for society in general.


FFA learned and competed in several different categories. The mechanics team competed by taking apart different mechanical objects and putting them back together like old tractors or solving problems on paper.




Participants contributed much of their personal time to practices in the auditorium and the middle school gym. While there, they learned many hard flips, turns, lifts, and other difficult



One thing was for certain: In a small town like Star Valley, entertainment came the hard way, but when given the opportunity, these students really knew how to have a fun time.









Our fans liked to stand out and express themselves with raucous chants and lots of screaming in support of our Braves.



Club Works to Stop Drugs


R.A.D. students stayed extremely motivated all

R.A.D. members took charge of Red Ribbon Week and promoted unity in the student body to Rise Against Drugs by holding an assembly for students decked out with red ribbons.



All throughout the year students enjoyed many assemblies. Held at least once a month, we always enjoyed a break from school to see what was in store for us during the assemblies.



Fellow senior Kevin Brough added, "It gave me the chance to party like a rock star."





Once the hard work finished at the end of the day, everyone wanted a break. Every now and then we all felt like a change of scene.


Having the opportunity to do something productive, entertaining, and interesting outside of school gave everyone something to look forward to at the end of the school day.






