Math pushed us and challenged us and made us smarter, but that didn't mean we had to like it!



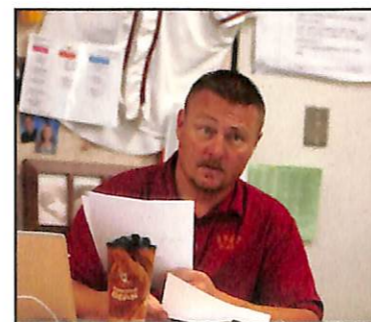

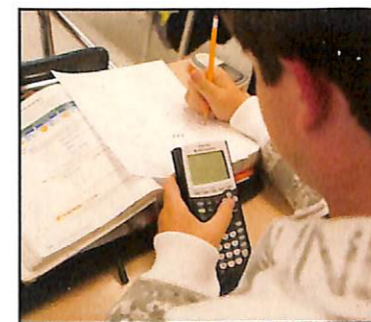

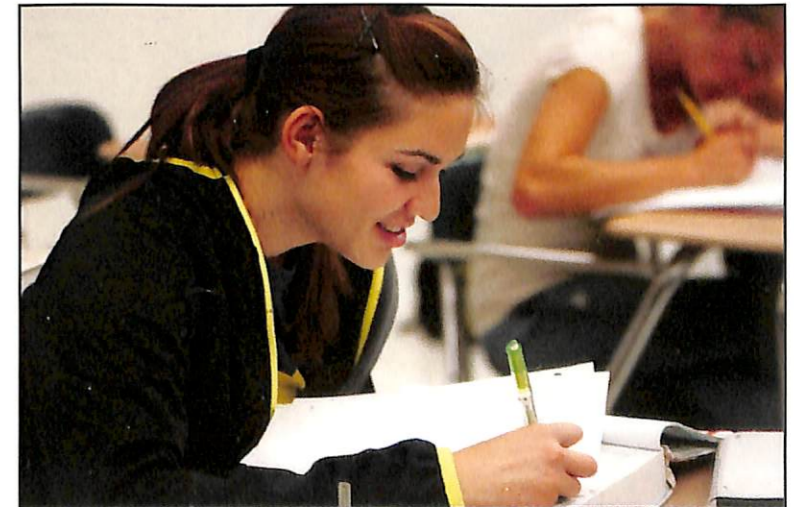

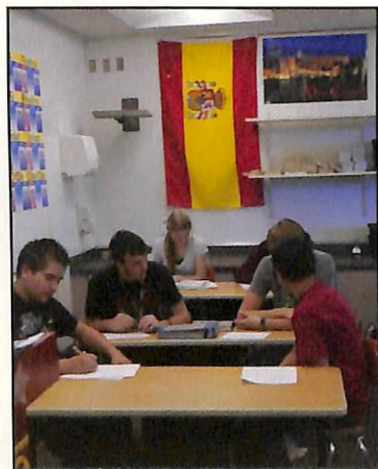

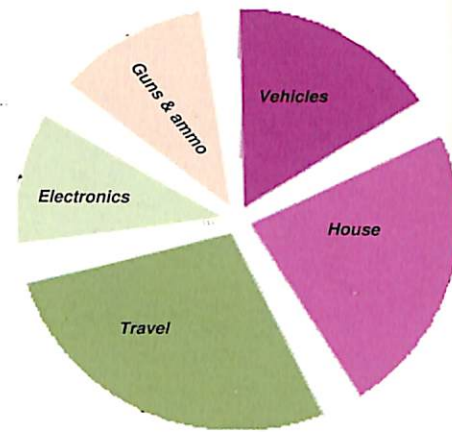

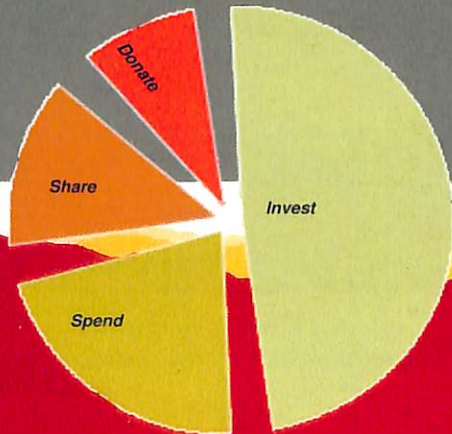

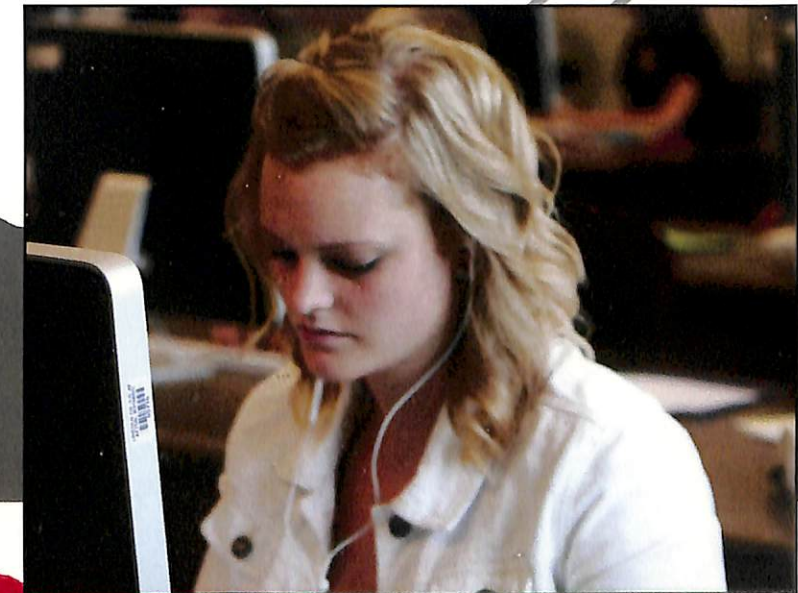

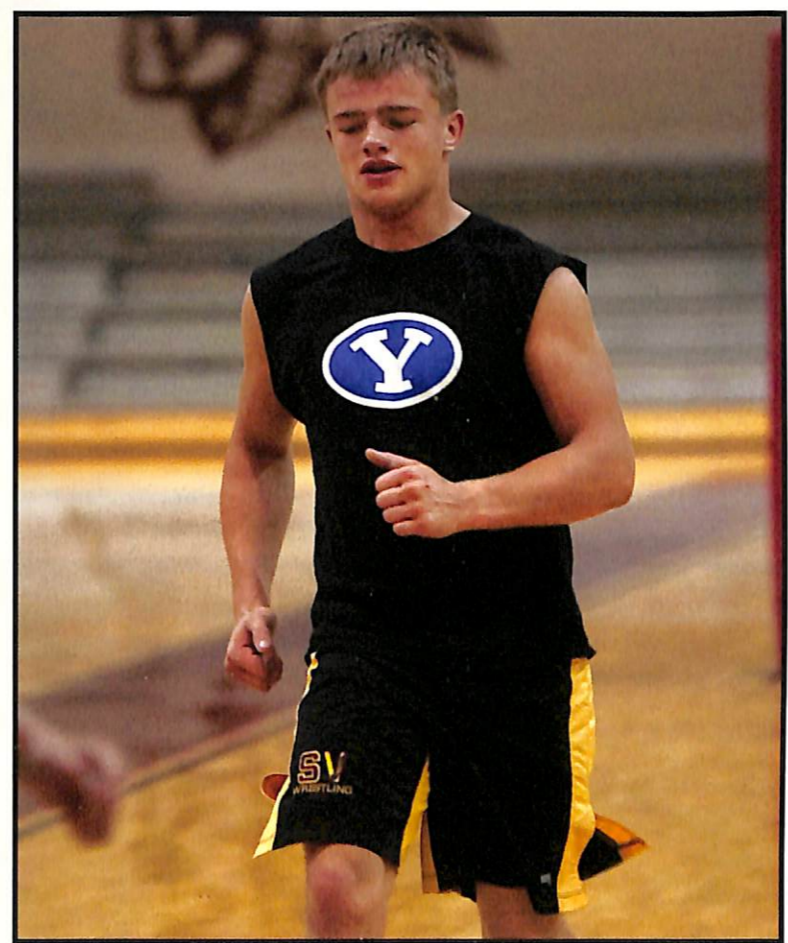

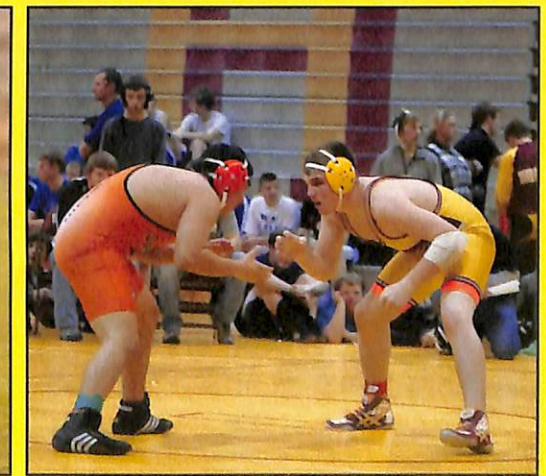

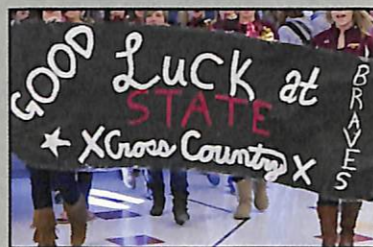

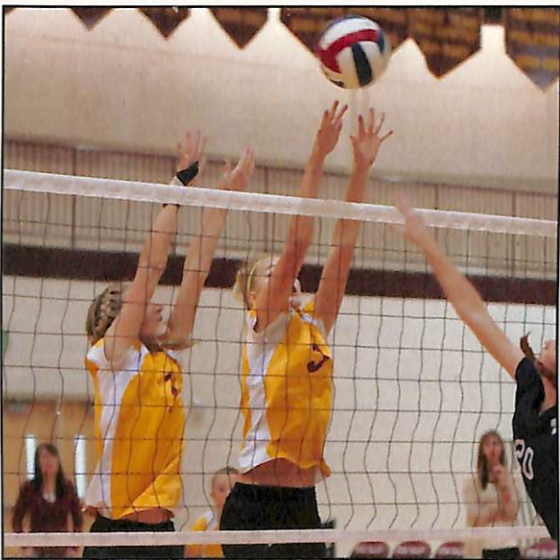

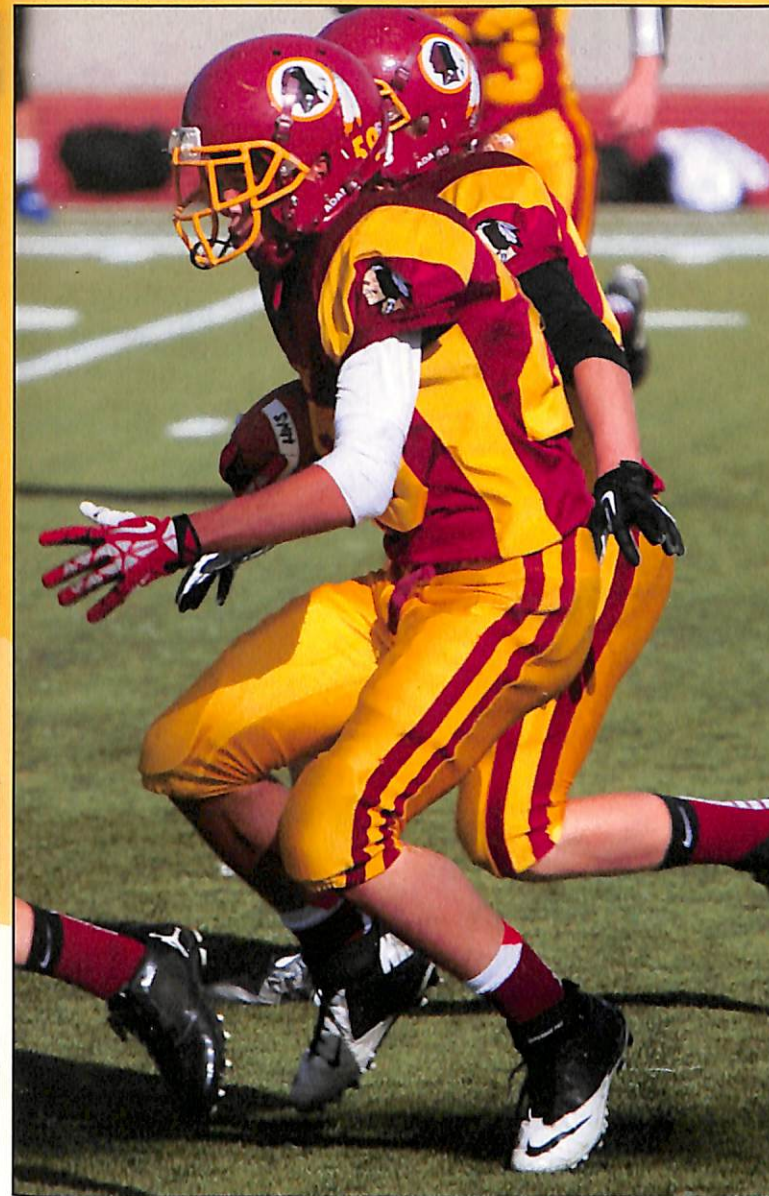

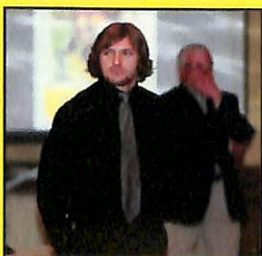

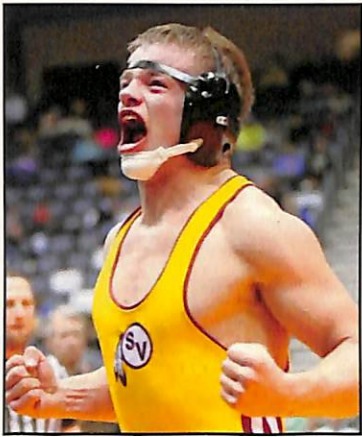

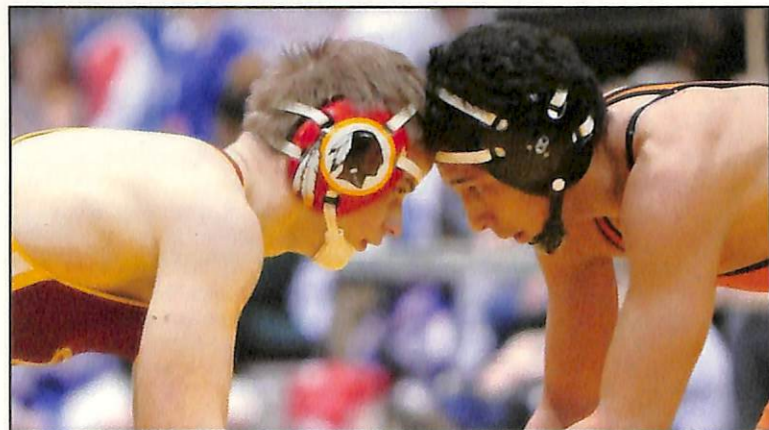

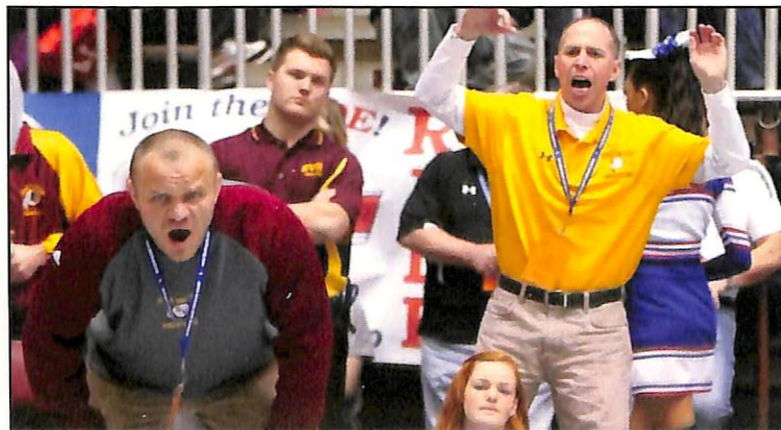

Many of the boys felt that they learned important lessons over the season.

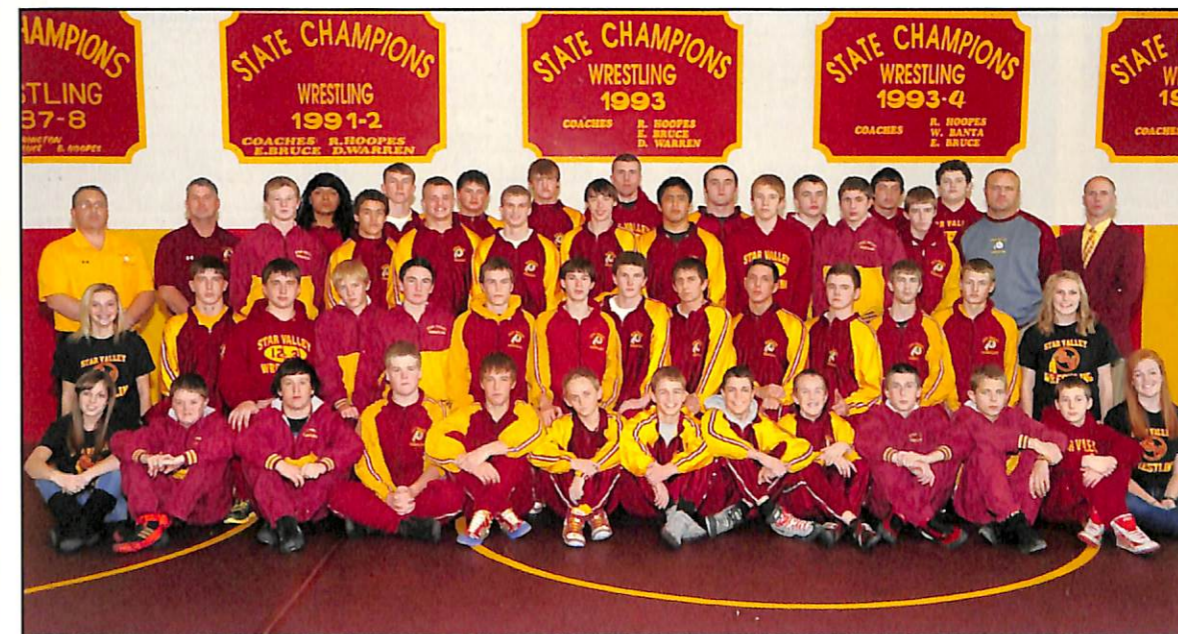

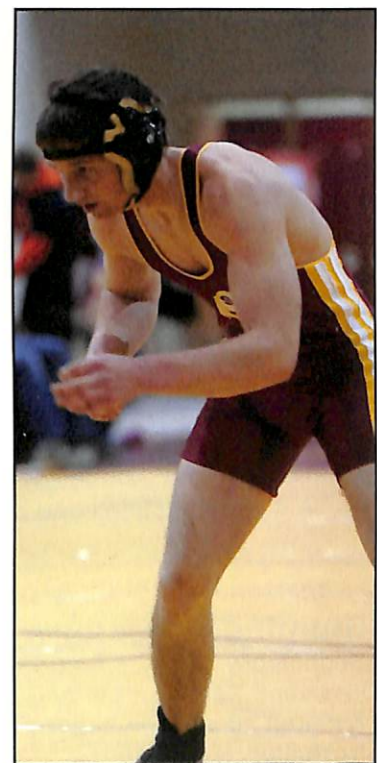

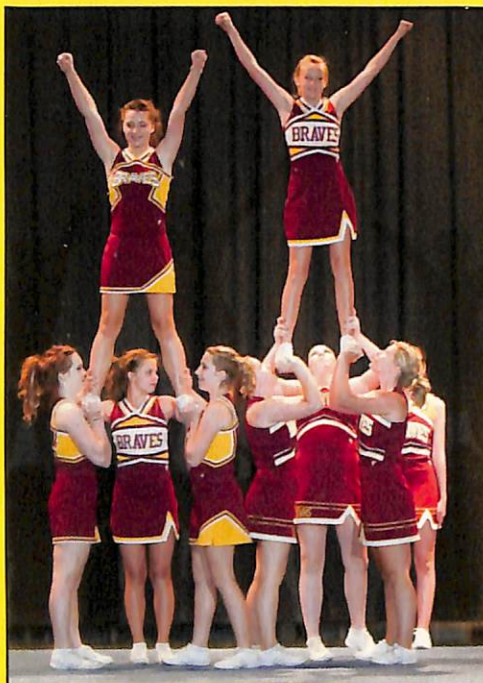

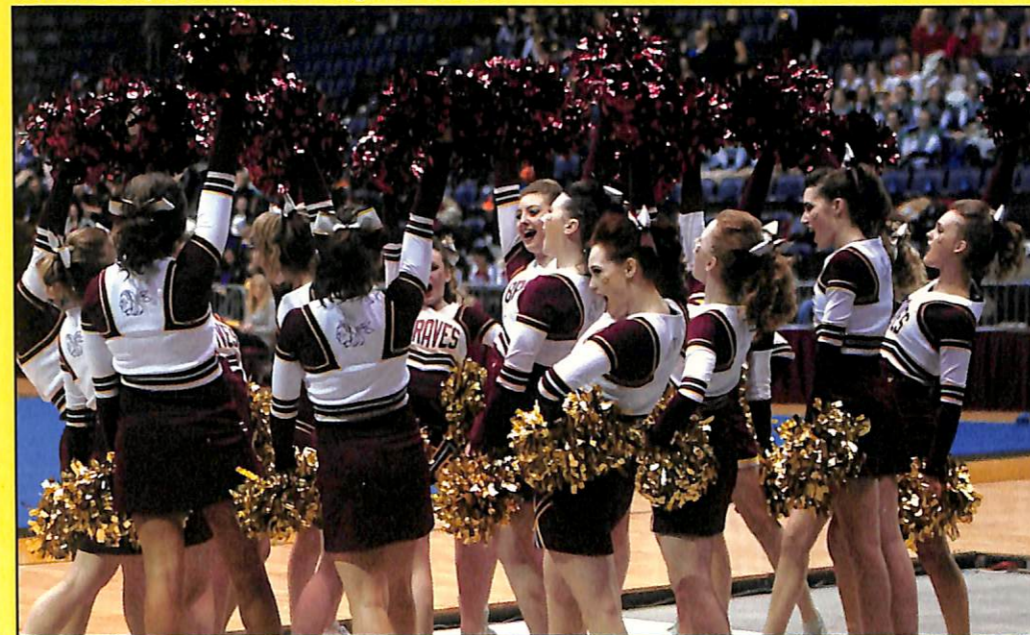
"We have a Christmas party and exchange regular and white-elephant gifts," said freshman Joni England.

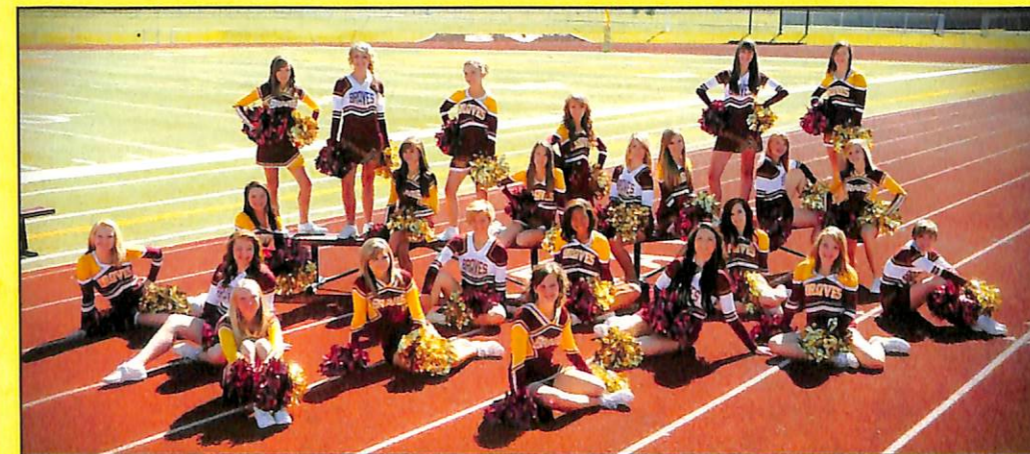

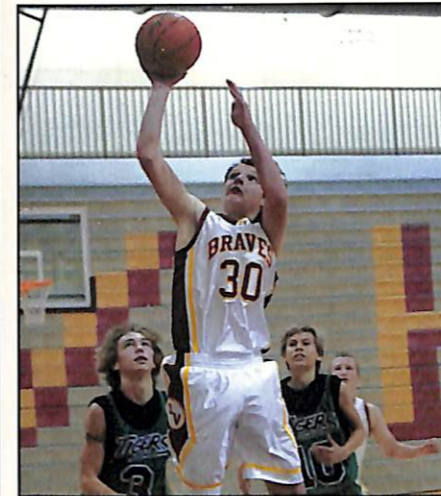

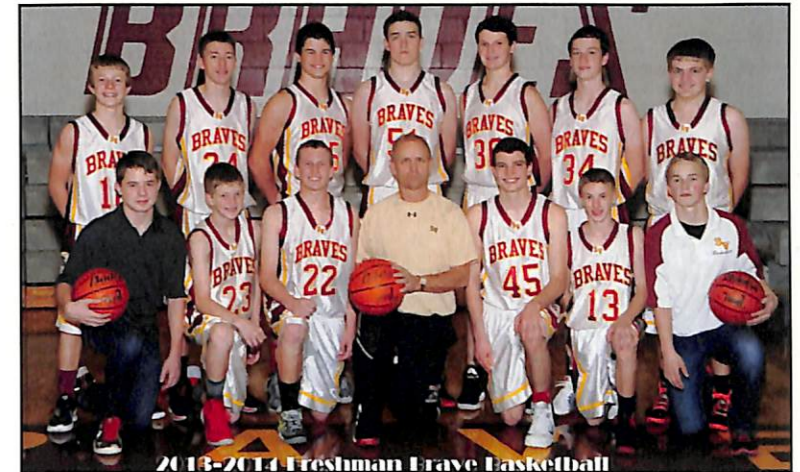

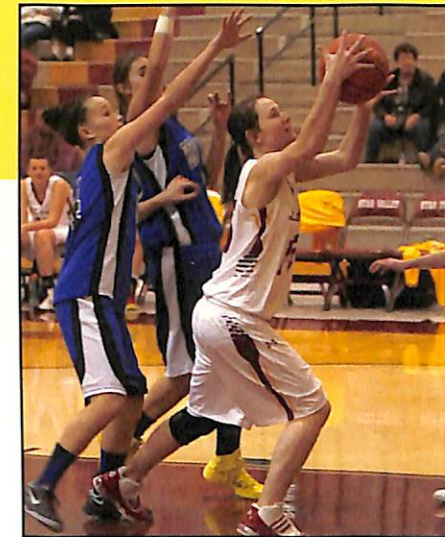

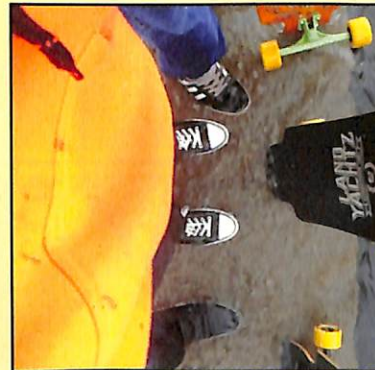

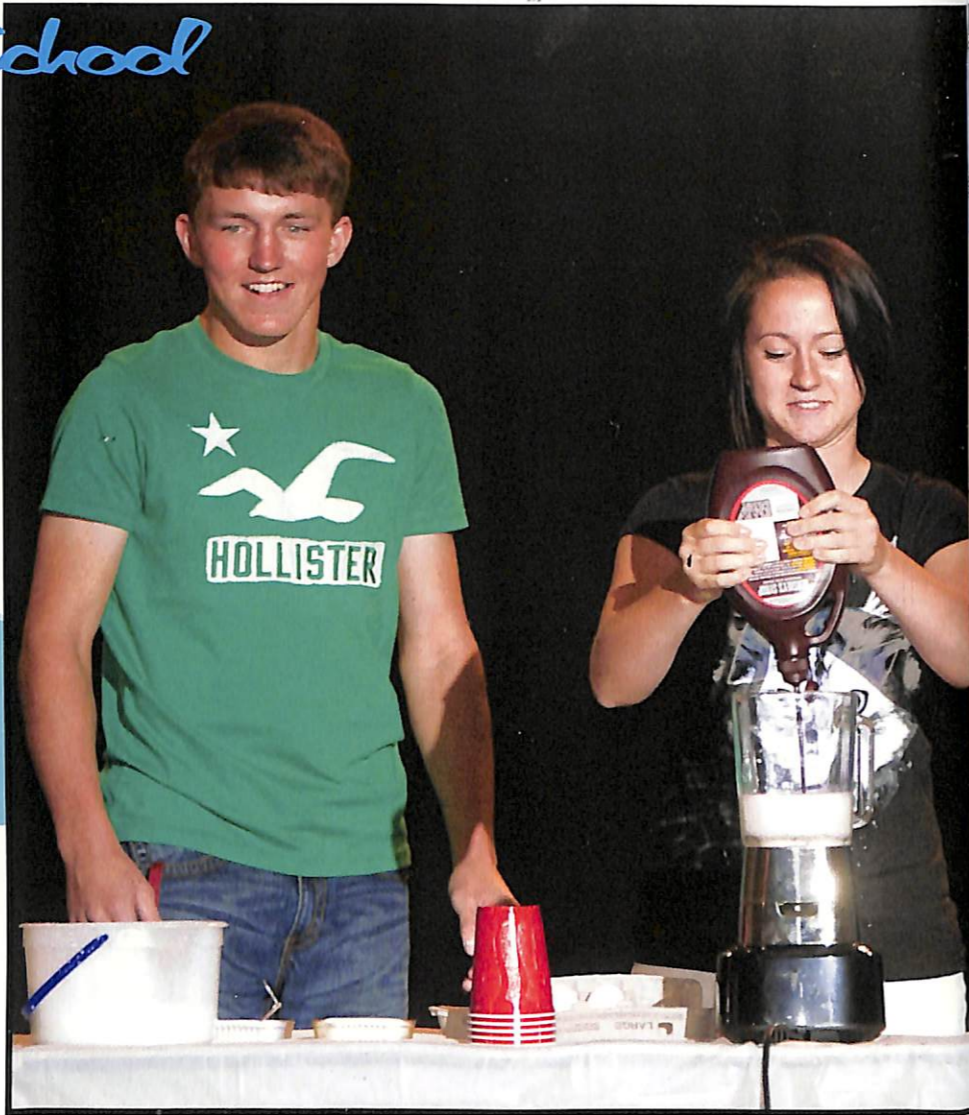
Back in May of the previous year, these hopeful student body officers hung up posters promoting their ideals and showing why they should be the school's next leaders.

Besides collections showing the personality of the collector, they also gave students a chance to collaborate with other like-minded classmates and make more memories.

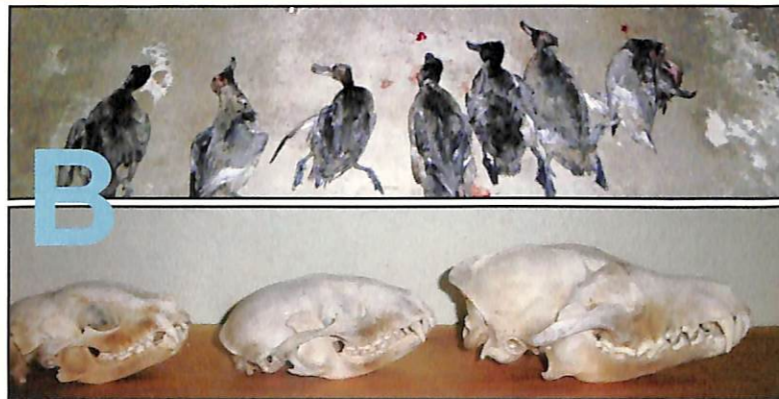

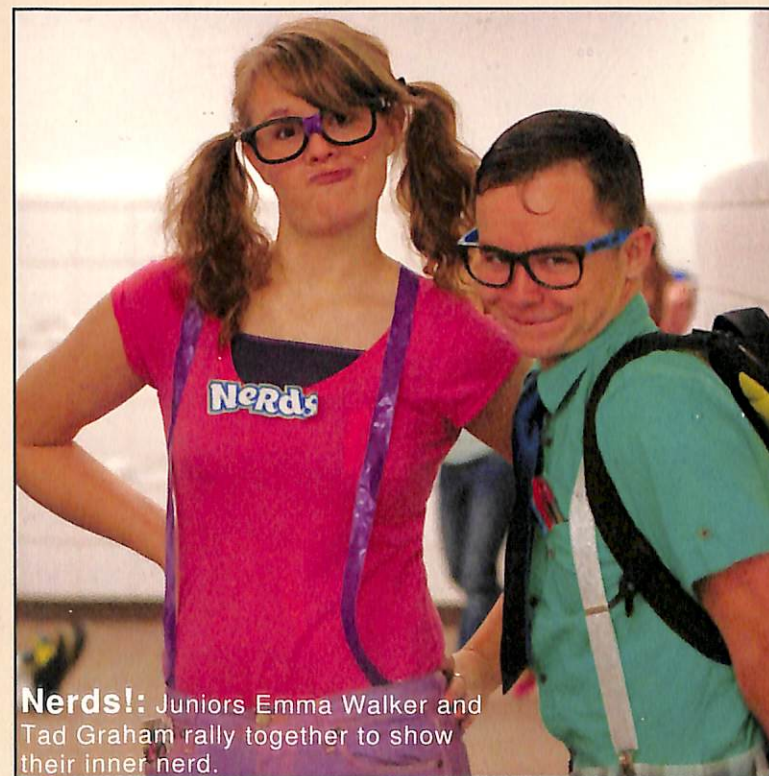

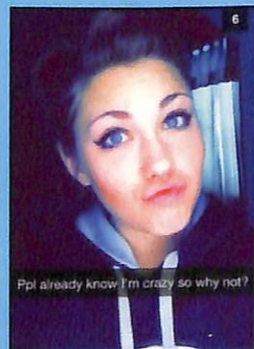

Pop culture choice made us all unique in our own little ways, but it also brought us together.

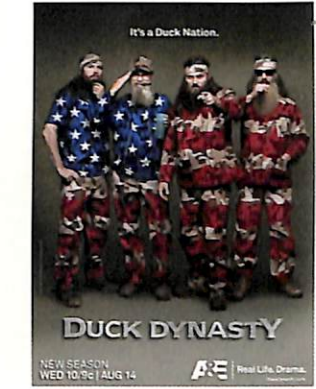
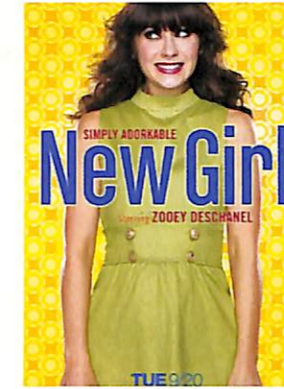

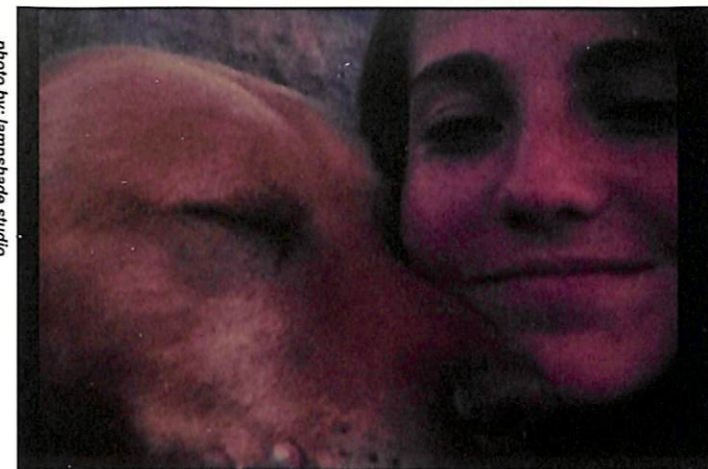

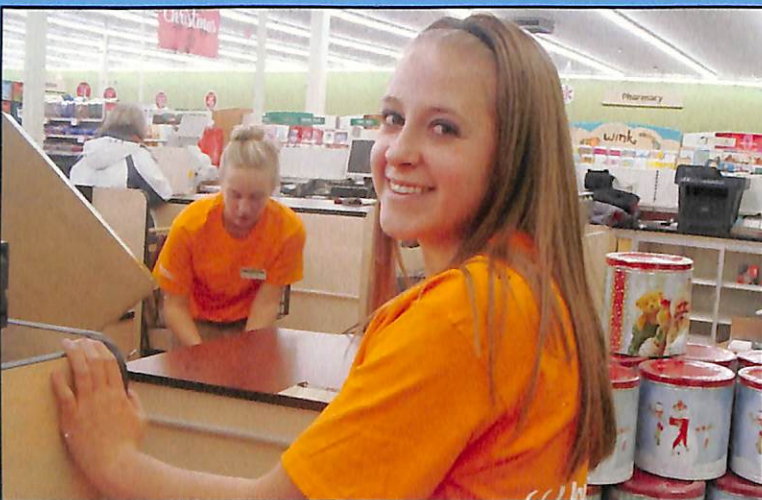

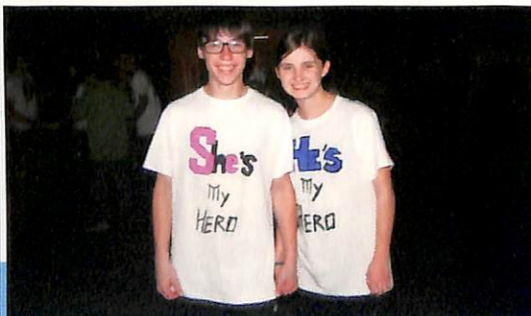
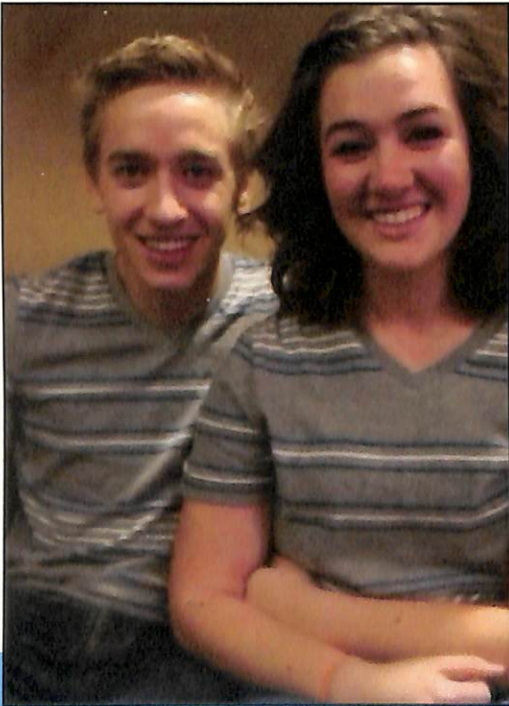
FFA Plus 4-H & Fair Equals Fun

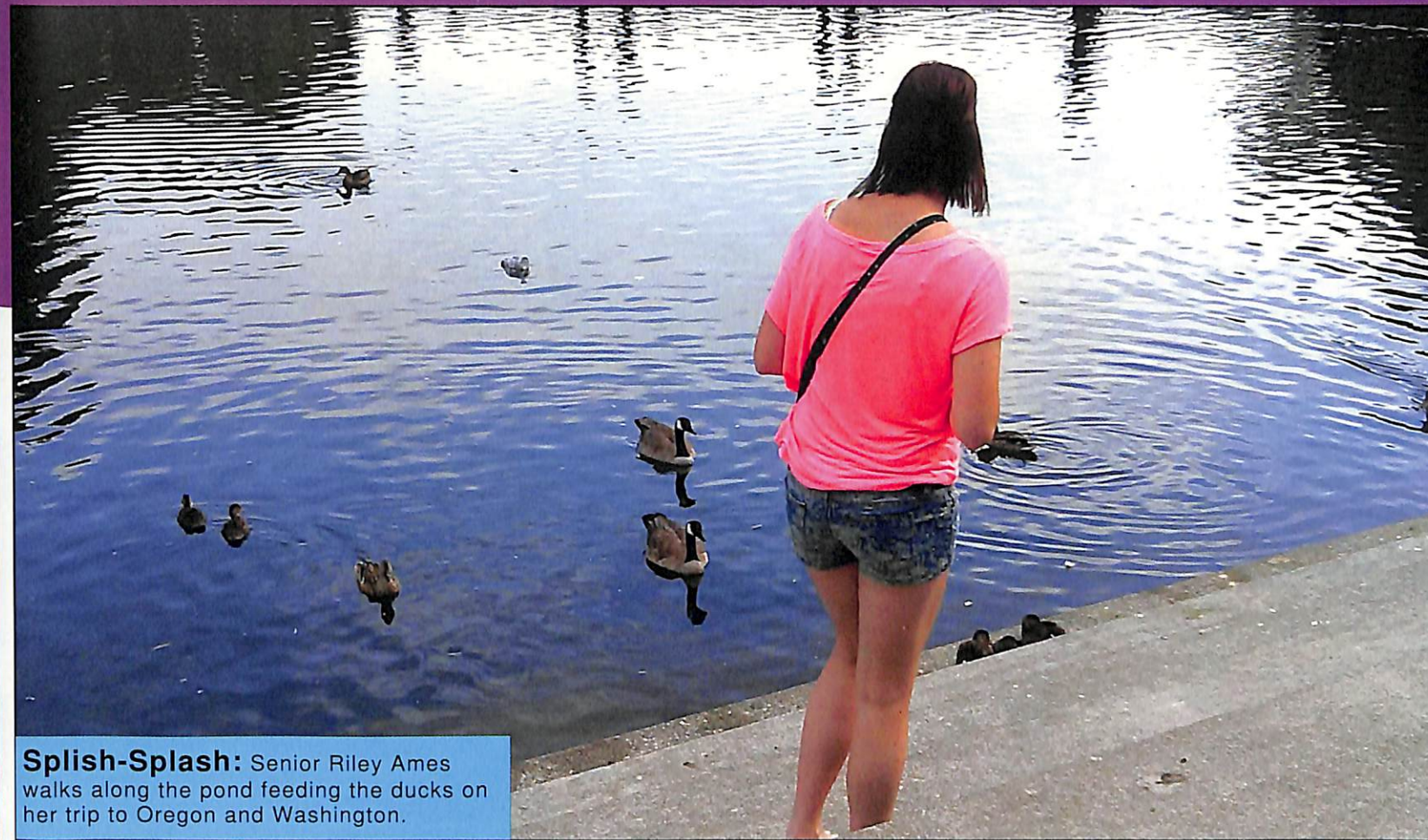

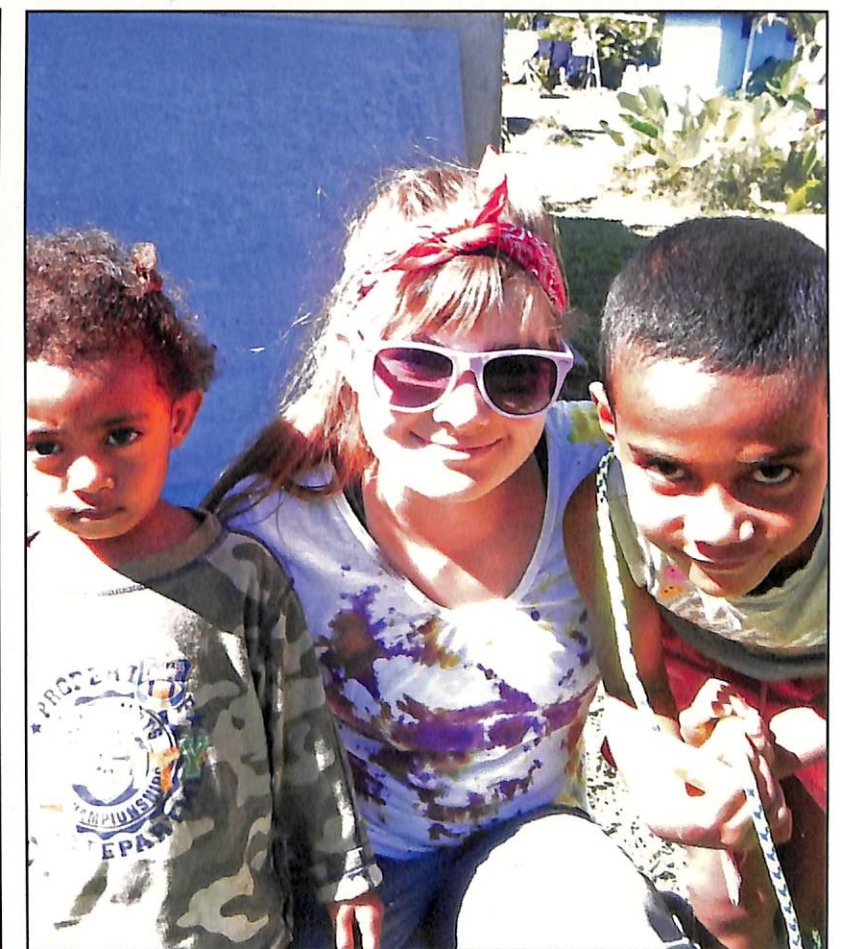

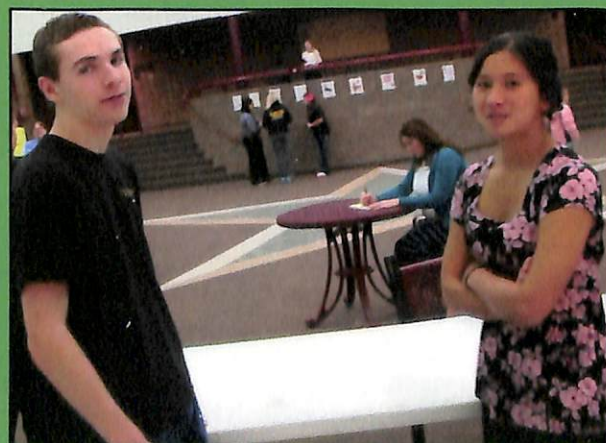

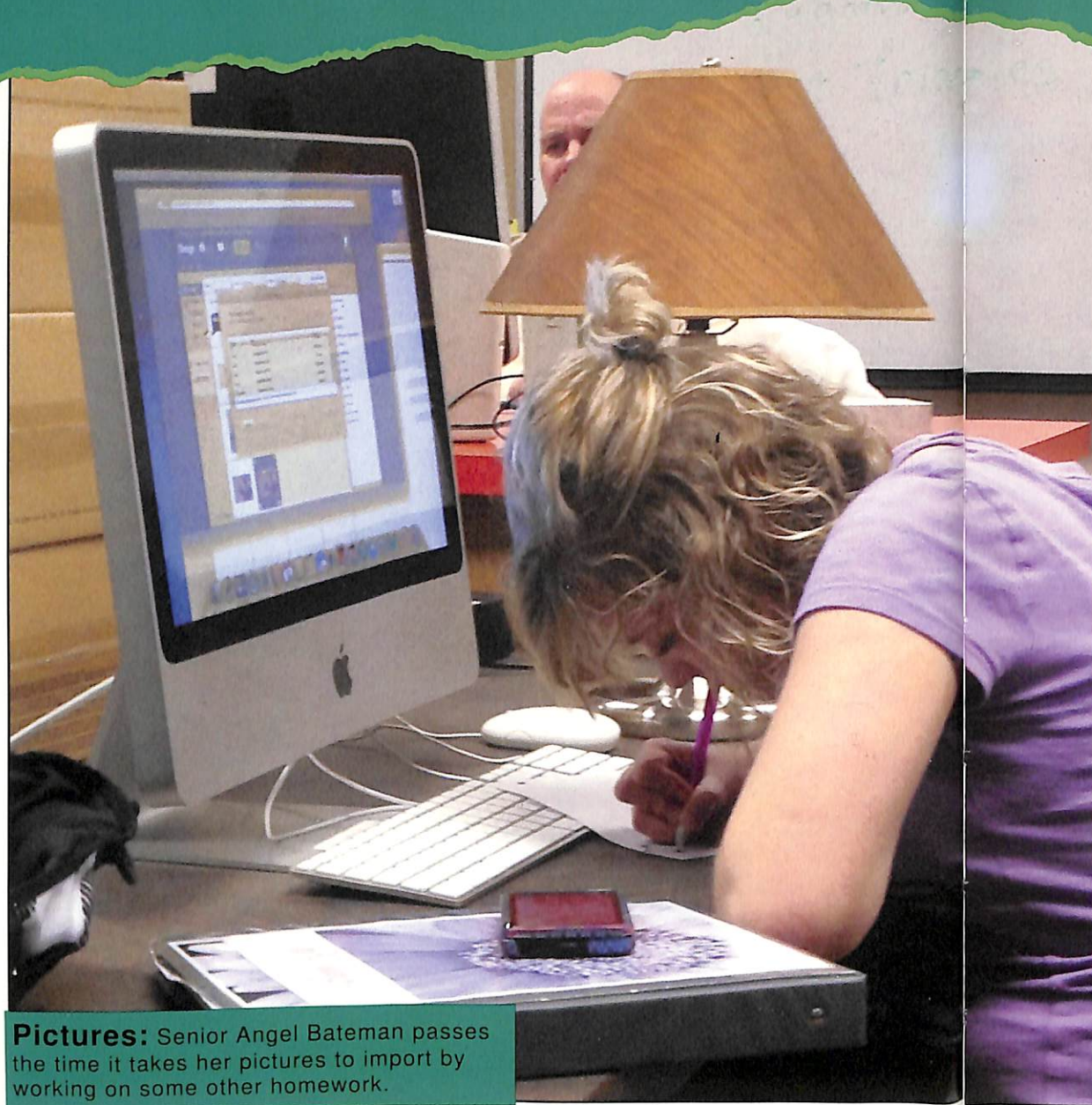
Staff members preserve memories

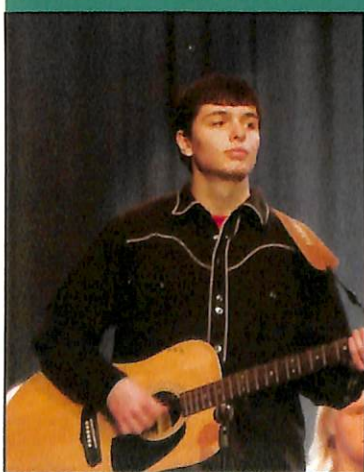

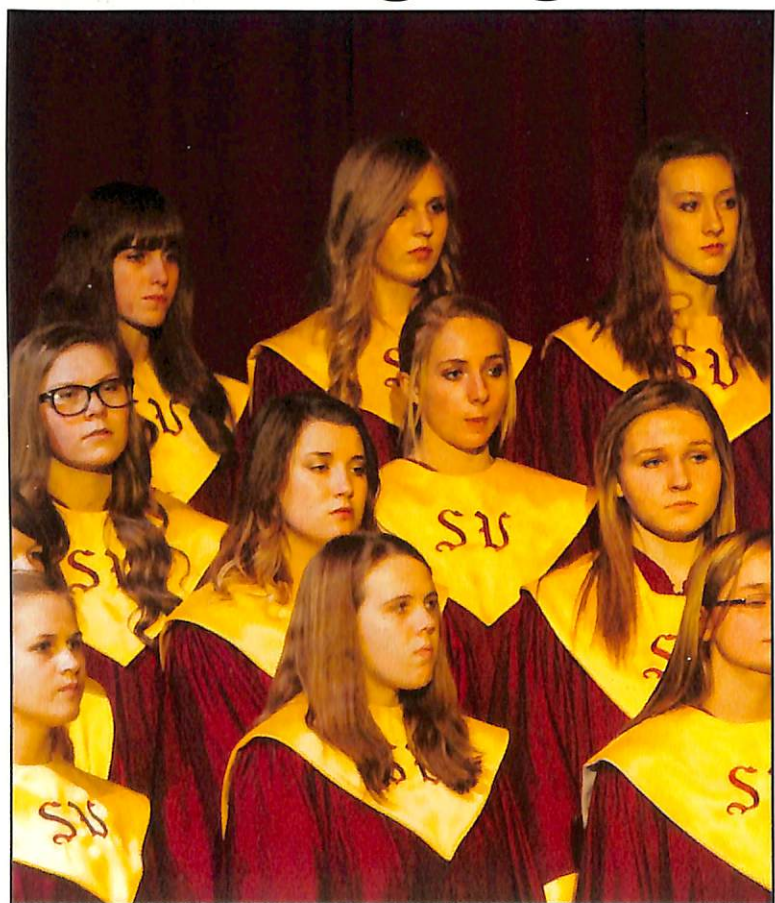

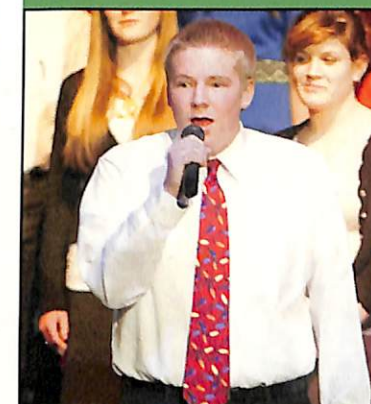

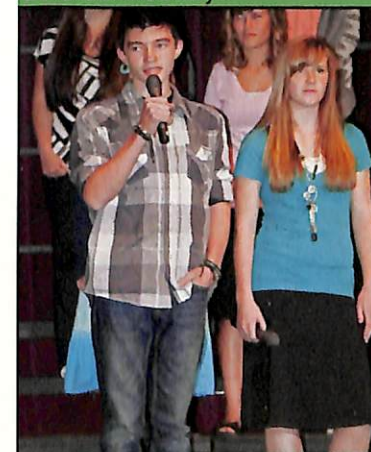

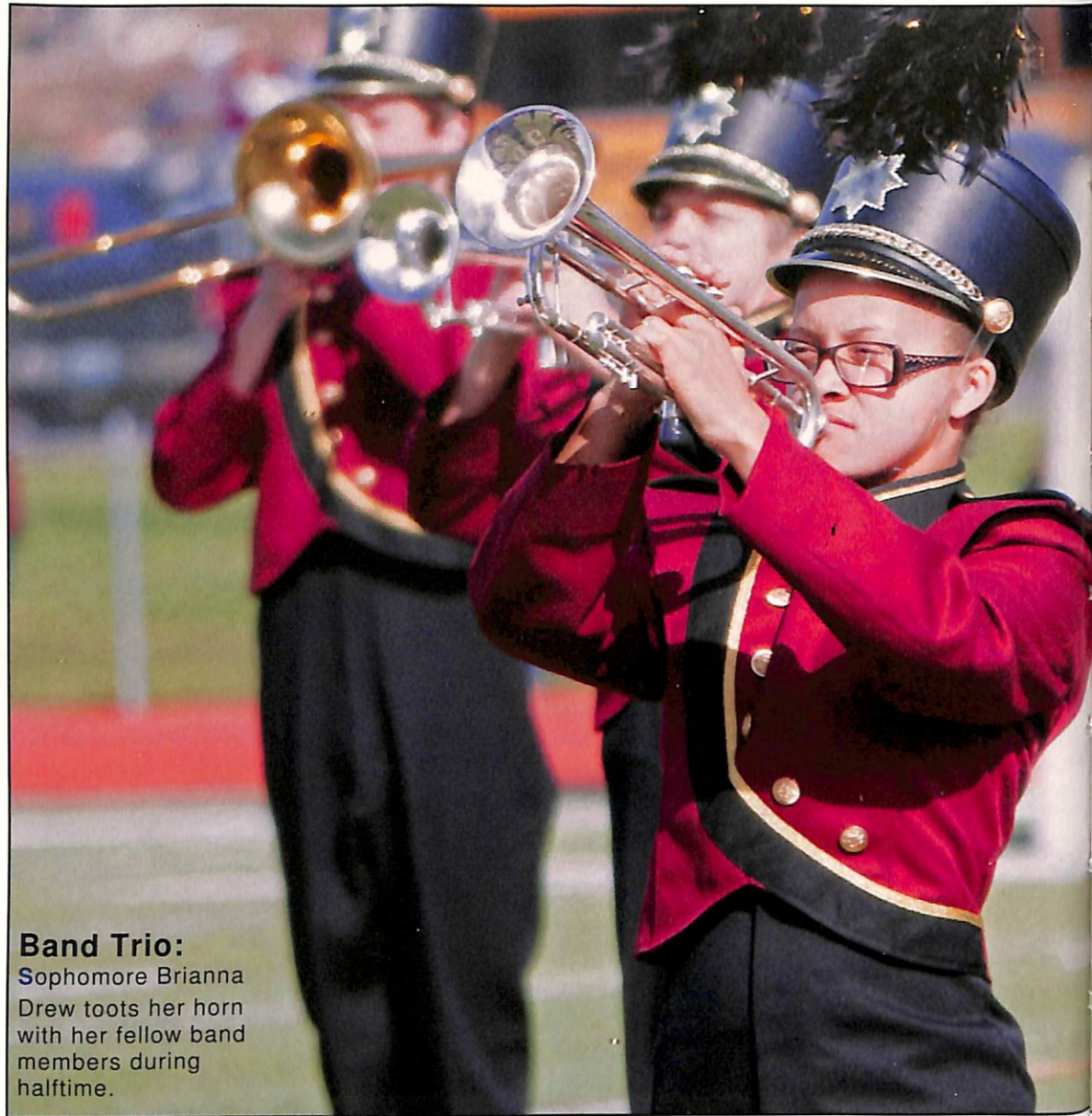

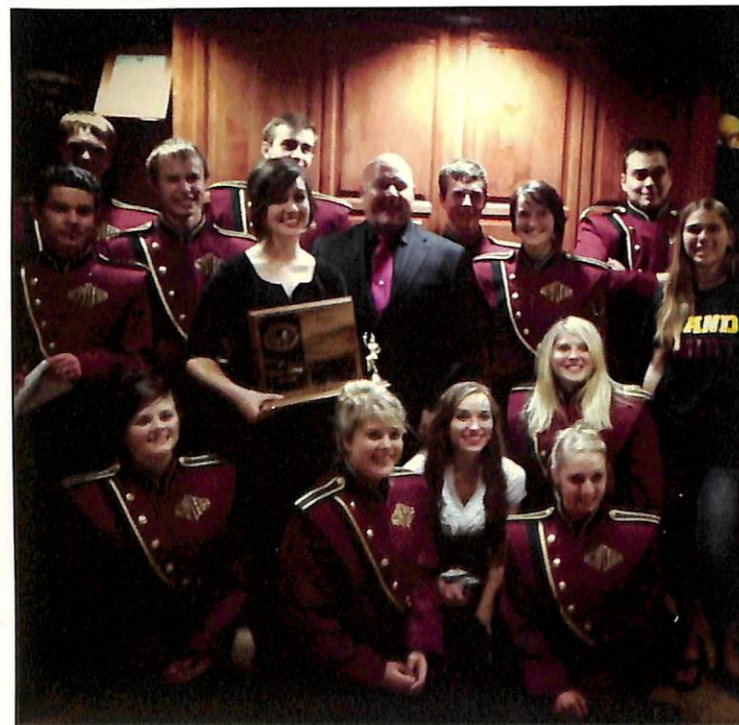

Band Members Make Memories and Music

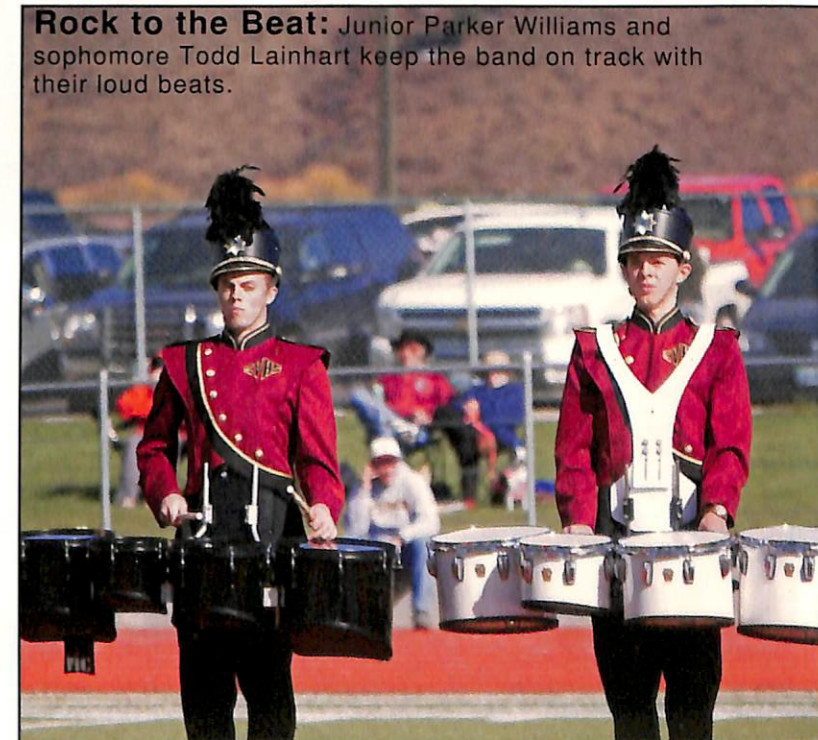

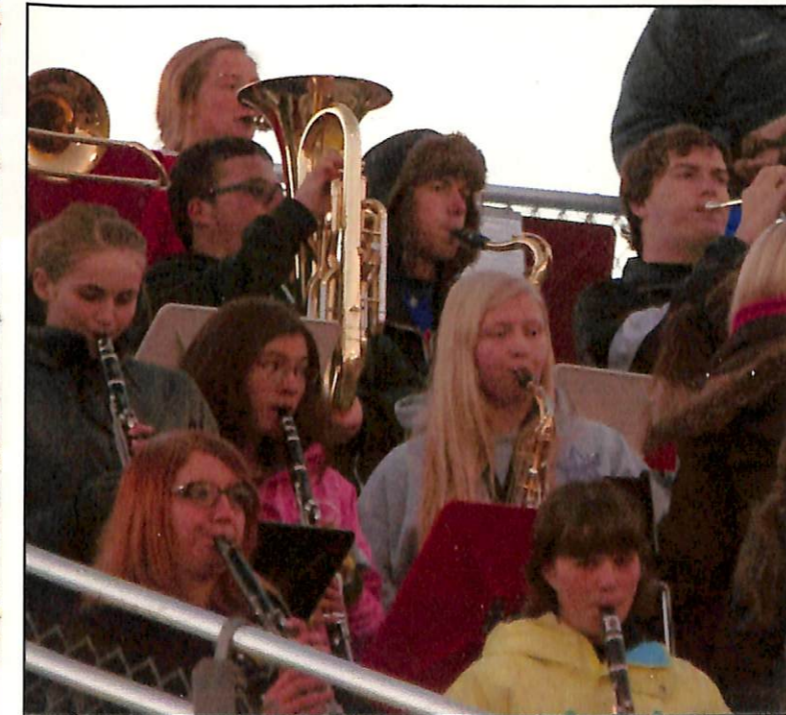

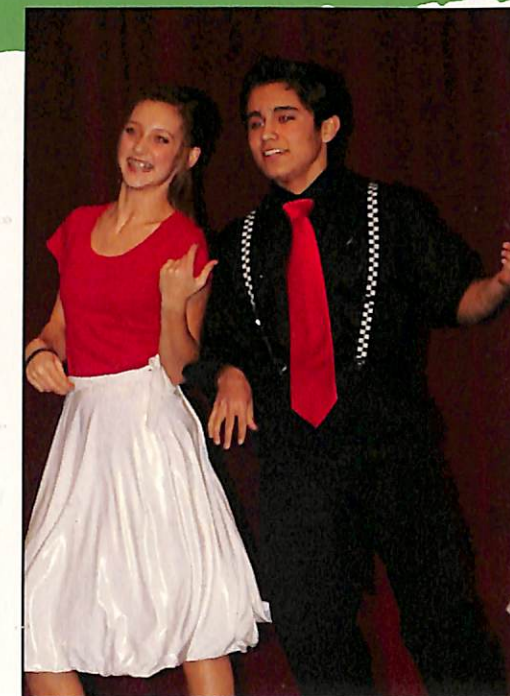

The dance club performed for the school on many occasions as well as the Heart of Christmas during the holidays and local dance recitals.

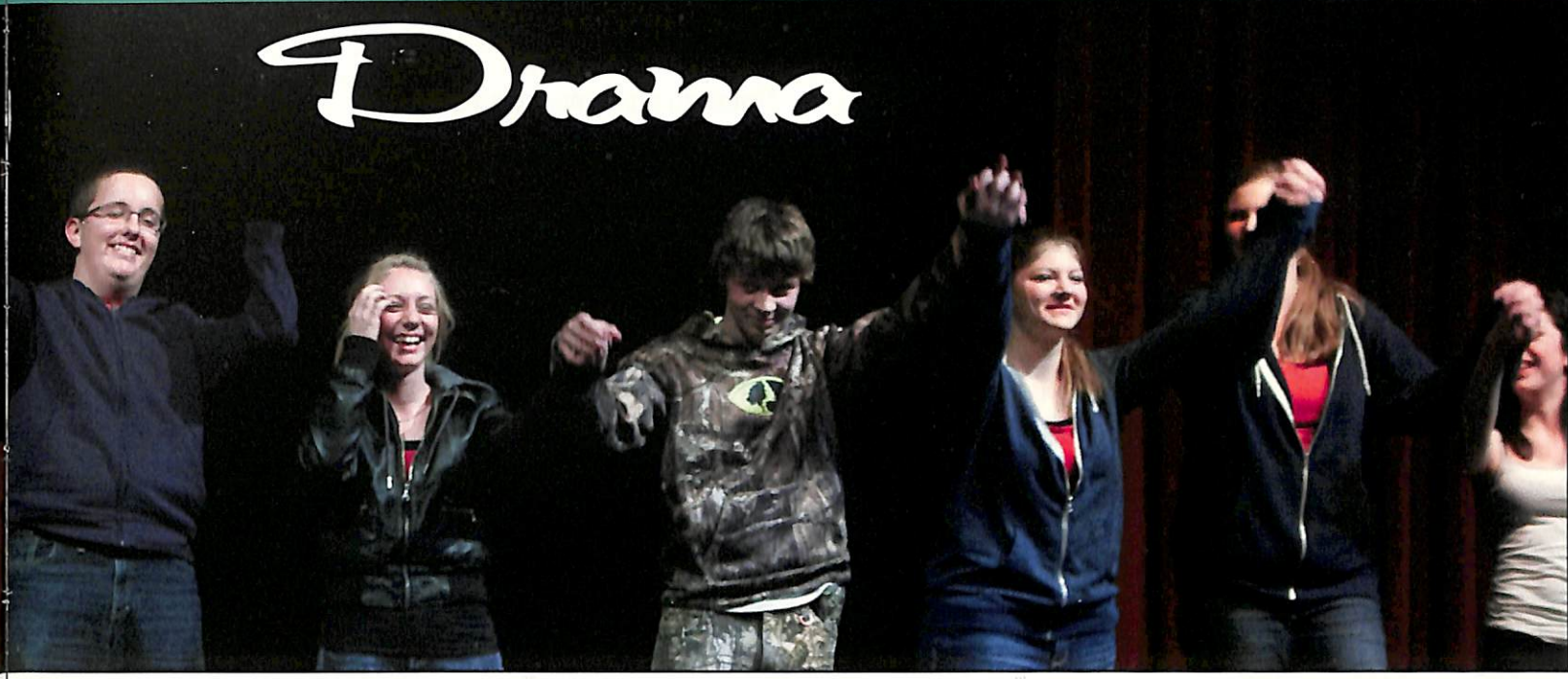

Drama instructor Venice Lancaster said, “It would be nice to have more kids next year. We have a lot of fun here, and it’s a really great learning experience.”



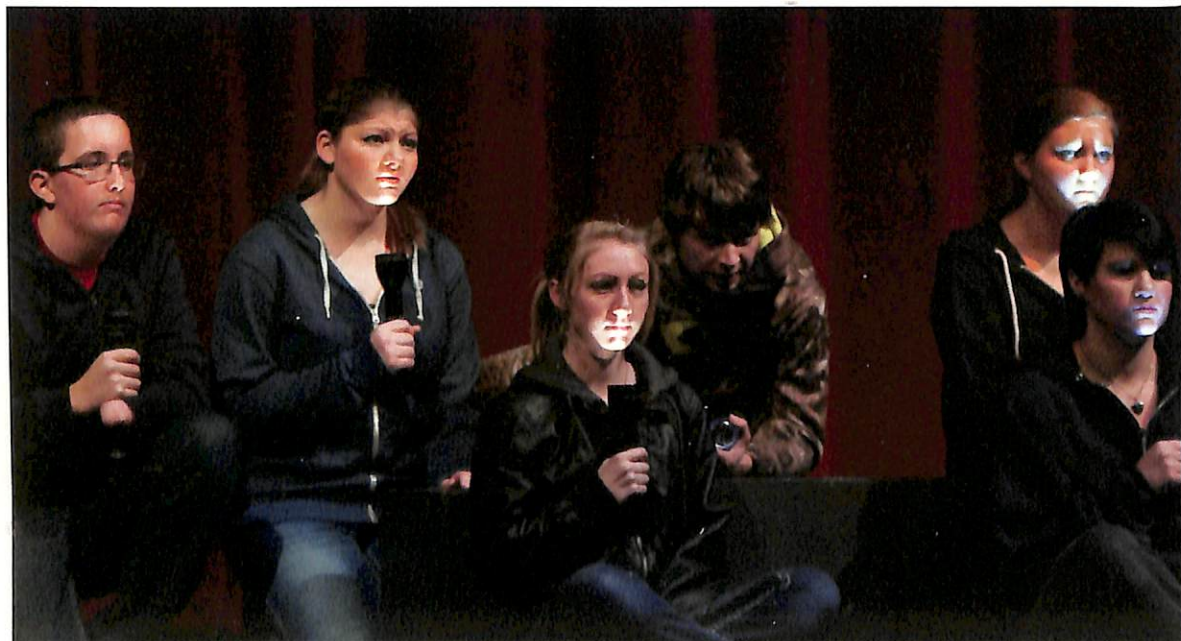

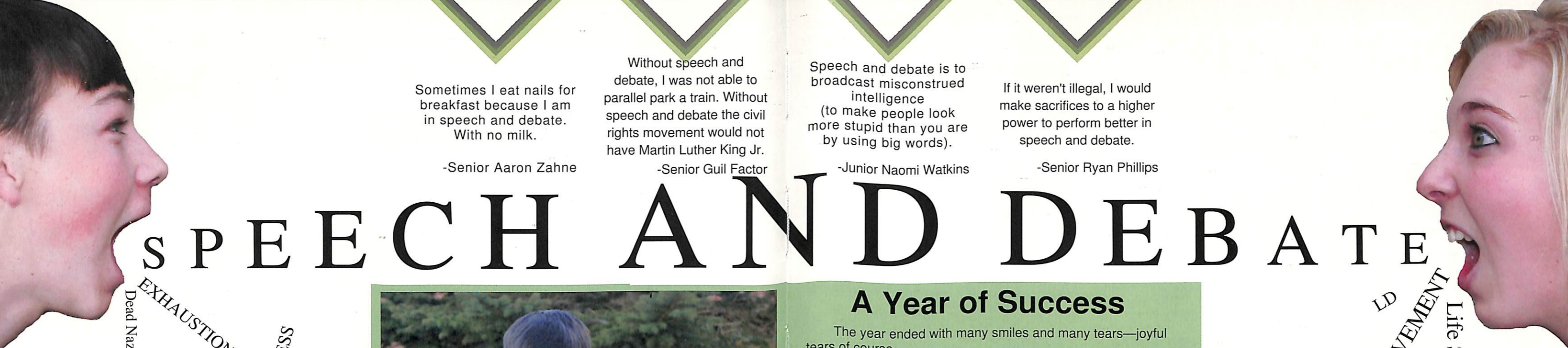

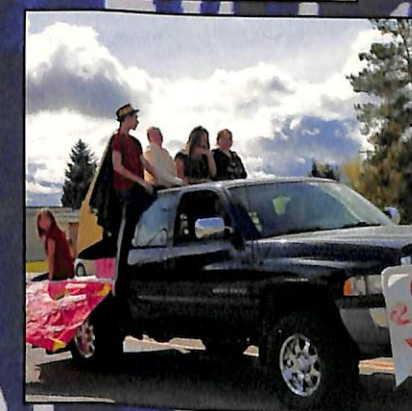

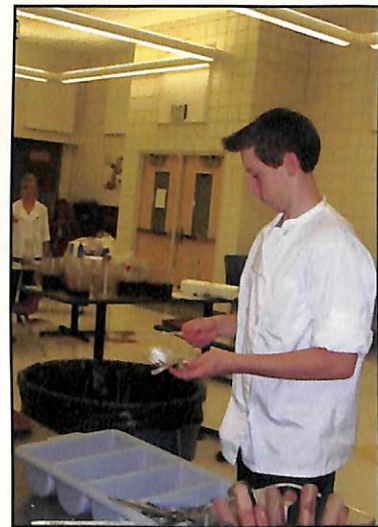

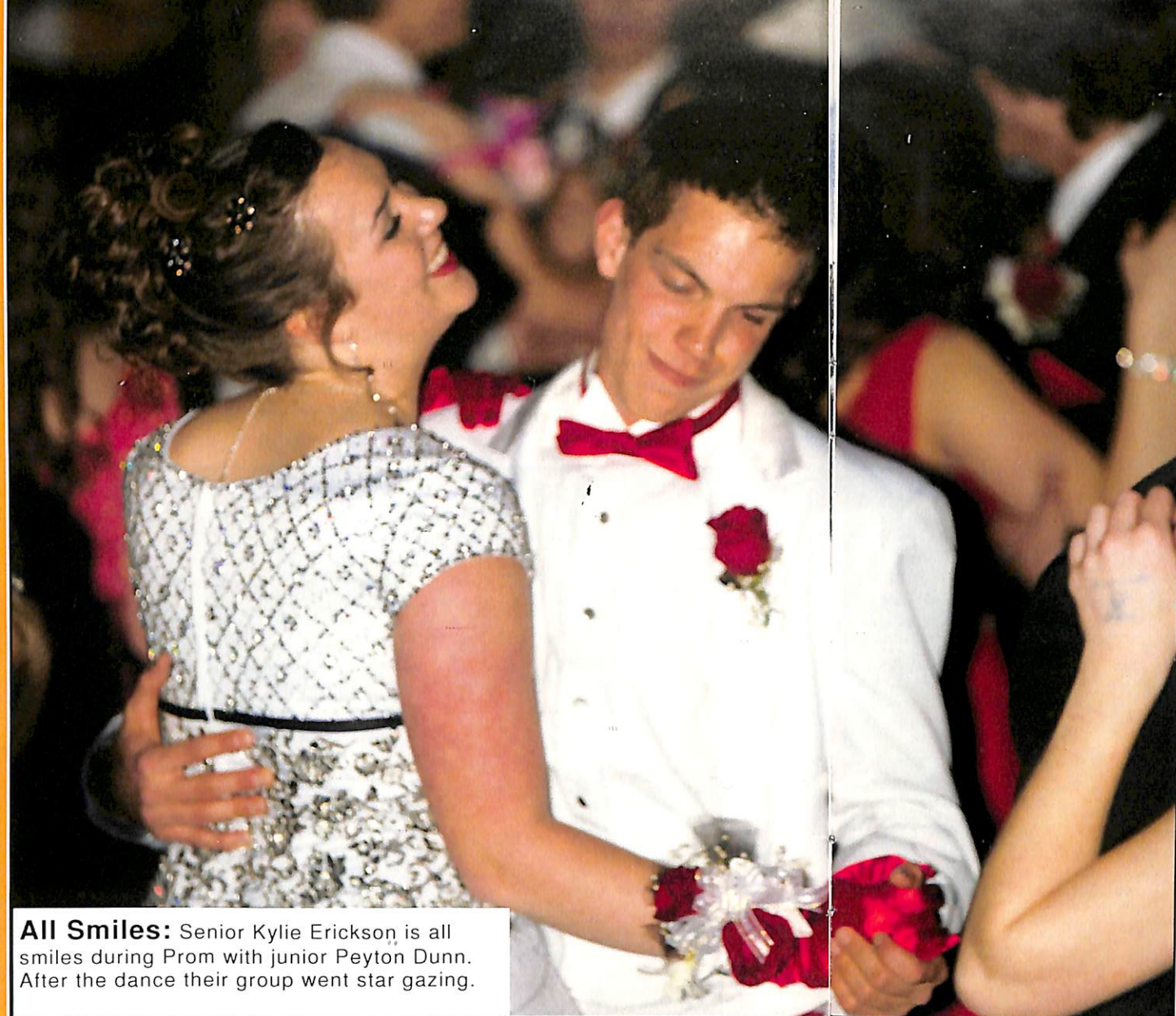

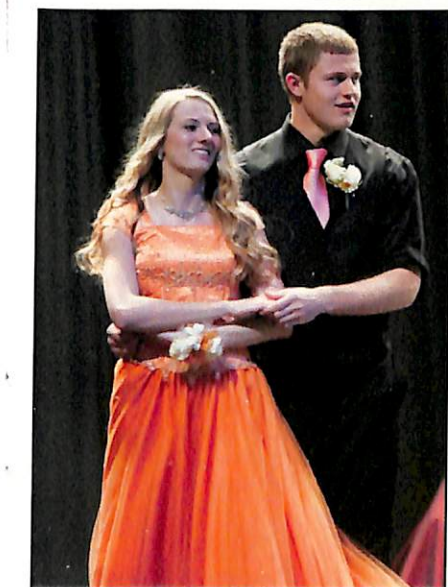

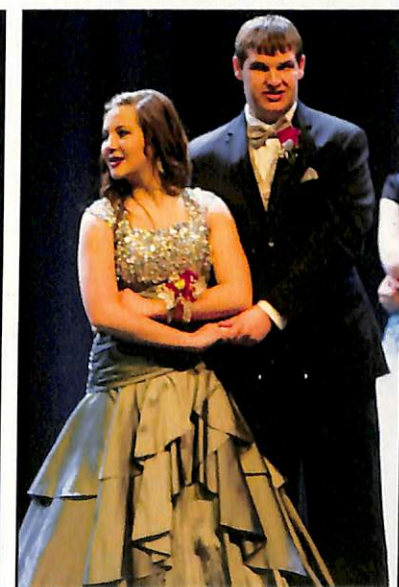

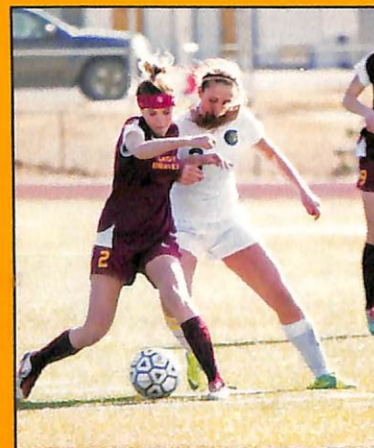

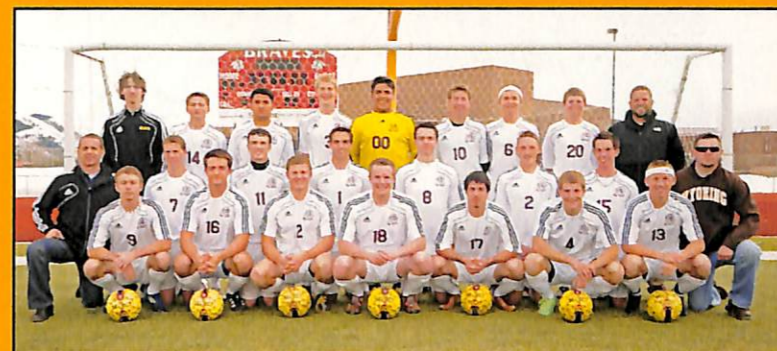

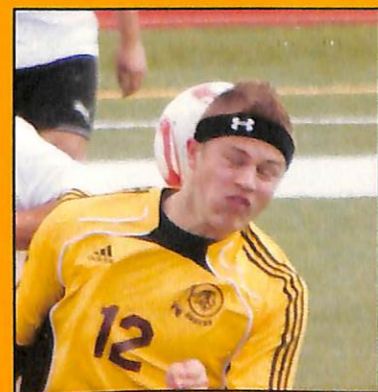


Soccer Rules!: Senior Dayne Abrams forces the soccer ball towards the goal.

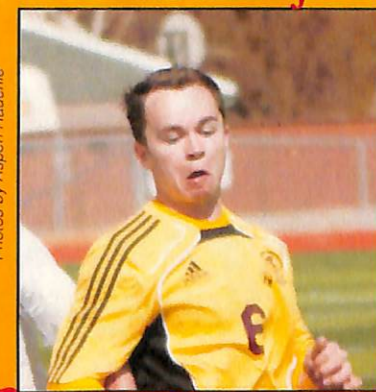

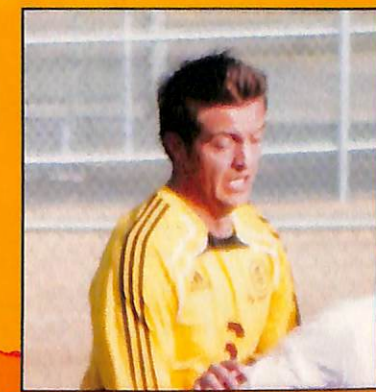

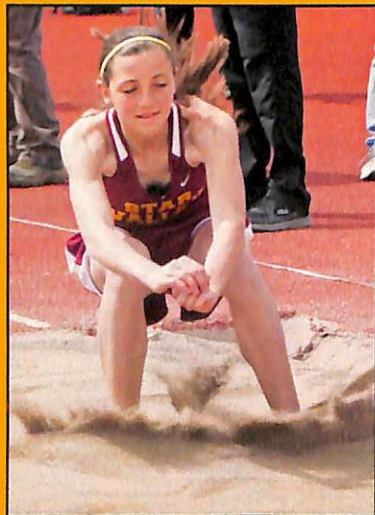
