

Regardless of the method of learning, what we did in the classroom was where the rubber met the road this year; our academic pursuits helped us grow.





















Thompson and Austin Hoopes.



audience and left viewers in awe with their dance routines.



















No matter what students at Star Valley High School were doing, they put their heart and soul into it. And you can tell by the looks on their faces.



















Whether they chose to help at the school or help elsewhere, our students and staff enjoyed giving their service.





The Treble girls had another successful year filled with friendships and beautiful music that will last a lifetime.







On the whole, members were just happy to be playing music together.



enjoy the warm spring.








