Together through presentations and videos,





### Science

### Students Develop Skills for **Future Careers**

This year science students had the choice of physical science, biology, chemistry, biotechnology, zoology, geology, Honors Biology II, honors anatomy and physiology, honors physics, and honors physical geology.

Several of these courses offered college credit, allowing students to get a head start on their education. Senior Chance Blankenship said he was taking physics because he is, "interested in a career in astrophysics and the class will cover the basics of mechanics."

In these classes, students were given the opportunity to work with precision and accuracy to produce the best results in labs. Some students were successful in their work: however, others found themselves in difficult

situations. Sophomore Biology student, Zack Sims, told about an experience he had while working on the infamous Cabbage Lab: "I missed class and Mrs. Clinger said I could do the lab by myself during 5th period. 






Some of the skills that students learned from P.E. centered around getting in daily exercise in order to



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# Foreign Language Students Face Something

Different

As each student went through the monotonous schedule of English, math. history, etc., they never got the chance to experience something different until foreign language study gave them a glimpse into a different culture.

In these courses, students had the opportunity to go down their individual paths in a different way by learning new languages like American Sign and Spanish. These courses promoted the cultural acceptance and knowledge that otherwise got overlooked during a typical school day.

Spanish I, Spanish II, Spanish III, and Spanish IV were offered to everyone, as long as they were taken in order. Spanish III and Spanish IV were offered as concurrent courses allowing students to earn college credit while learning the popular language.

While Sign Language I was offered to juniors and seniors, only seniors who took the first class could enroll in the Sign Language II class.

Two sisters who took this class, junior Kaitlin Lebeau and senior Karissa Lebeau. have two deaf parents. Lebeau described her situation as "weird and different", but later said that "everything and everyone in the world just talks and greets each other without thinking about it. At home I actually have to pay attention and not just skip over what they say." She concluded that Sign Language made her a better listener, and it made her social skills sharper, a skill everyone could improve on.



Vocational education provided practical experience in a particular occupational field.



These classes helped prepare students for future demands in the working world. helping them learn the value that comes from combining job skills with reliability, a good work ethic, and perseverance.









department was CRT, also known as work experience, which allows students to work outside of the typical classroom.



### SV Braves Keep Up the Spirit



# Varsity Football Players Put Team First




The team experienced success in multiple games, tournaments, and matches that took them the all over Idaho, Utah, and Wyoming.


The team came in 2nd at regionals and earned a trip to the state tournament in



At the state competition the cheer team was able to place second in their stunt and fourth in their non stunt performance.



Freshman Keaton Dana said, "Going to the tournaments was not only our way of improving but also gave everybody a chance to get to know everybody. You learn to support each other on the team."




When asked about how the year went together, Emma Thomson said, "I thought our season went well. We really bonded as a

team and had a fun time on the bus getting to know each other; we played good and worked well together." As Thomson said, the team enjoyed a successful year and had opportunities for growth.













### Jazz Band hosen Musicans Work for Perfection













Being a member of Singco took a lot. That was shown as the group had just a couple of



Allred did her best to make sure that everyone felt comfortable within the group, so they could perform with confidence and do their best. Because of this, Singcopation found success and lived up to their name.





Most of us did not think about taking photos every 5 seconds to simply "capture the moment." Serious photographers found life behind the camera interesting.


Photography class gave students a sense of purpose just like any other hobby. Senior Alexis Connelly said, "I took the class because I generally like to take pictures and


it seemed like an interesting thing to do. It also gave me the opportunity to explore my options and figure out what I want to do in the near future."







As we said goodbye to the many adventures we made during the summer of 2017, we prepared to embrace this year and all that came along with it!








Students participated in various traditional dress up days like Merica Monday, Throwback Thursday, Pajama Day, and Spirit Day where the students were able to show their school



On the upside, these once lower classmen became upperclassmen and did not fail to let the school know about it. Juniors celebrated the feeling of finally nearing the top of high school.



### Seniors Look Back on Good Ol' Days







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
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
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
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
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
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# Spring Experience Provides Opportunity for Growth



During the season, the Braves fought their way to the top with hard work, team unity, and commitment. Each member of the varsity and JV team was able to contribute their talent and dedication to the season.







# Prom 2018 Daters Enjoy Golden Night Out


